Noel and Slempp Meet in Washington.

Washington, May 5.—John C. Noel of Lee county, Va., when seen in Congressman Slempp's office at the capitol today reiterated his statement, made in Richmond last Saturday, that he accepted as final the declaration made by Mr. Slempp that he will not again be a candidate for congress and that he, Noel, will make a campaign to succeed him.
"I feel sure that Slempp will not again be a candidate," said Noel in the presence of Slempp. "Therefore, I hope the convention which meets in Bristol, July 9, will name me as his successor. I feel confident that whoever the Republican nominee may be, he will be elected, so I am going out to gain the nomination and expect to win.

"I have campaigned against Irvine, the Democratic nominee before and beat him, and believe I can beat him again. In 1903 I defeated him for the Virginia senate and feel sure I can defeat him this fall if I can secure the nomination."

"Well, Mr. Slempp, you heard that, what do you think of it?" asked The Roanoke Times' correspondent.

"I guess he's right," was Slempp's reply.

"May we accept your previous statement: that you will not be a candidate again, as still standing good?" was asked.

"I have made the statement that I will not run again so often that it is unnecessary for me to make it again."

"Well, have you and Noel fixed it up so that you will retire in his favor?" was suggested.

"It's hardly a frame up, but I am out of the race, and Noel, says he is a candidate, that's plain," replied Slempp.

Nevertheless, it is still generally believed here that the Republican convention at Bristol will nominate Slempp again and insist on his running and that he will run.

Gov Glynn, of New York, says that state is engaged in building 12,000 miles of roads which will wear out forty years before they are paid for. Some counties in Tennessee and adjoining states have done the same thing. This doesn't mean that a bond issue to build roads is unwise—often it is the best of all ways to get them; but it does mean that it is unwise to issue bonds to build roads and then to let those roads wear out in a few years. Where Free-Trade Pinches the Poor.

When we import goods from abroad, instead of manufacturing them at home, it is evident we are diminishing employment for our own people. Half a dozen laborers at the wharf can handle imported goods which in the making have given occupation to hundreds of skilled workmen. And the consumer pays the bill in the long run—is bound to do so. The money that used to go into the many pockets of our working people now goes into the few pockets of capitalists and merchants. That is one big difference. That is where the Free-Trade shoe pinches the poor. A country is more prosperous as the workshop than as the warehouse of the world—Los Angeles Times.

Many Also Carry the Senate

Providence (R I) News-Democrat.
Besides the election of a House of Representatives next fall, the voters of many States will be called upon to elect United States Senators for the first time; and while a month ago it seemed almost a certainty that the majority of those elected would be Democrats, now the chances favor the election of the Republican candidates for the Senate in many States. There are two reasons given by close observers for the change in public sentiment. One is a more general realization that the Underwood-Wilson Tariff measure has been of little value as a reducer of the cost of living, while the effects of its provisions on the employees of the manufacturers and farmers has been most unsatisfactory. The second reason is the position taken by the administration concerning free tolls in the Panama Canal for vessels engaged in the American coastwise trade.

There is a tremendous opposition to the repeal of the exemption of these vessels being worked up in the far West and in the middle West, and Republican candidates for Senator in certain States are paying even more attention to the exemption matter than they are to the Tariff. The Democrats in the States referred to are trying to endorse the administration and yet stand with those who believe that the course taken by President Wilson is an unwarranted surrender of our rights in the canal to England.

Lower Court Affirmed.

Tazewell, Va., May 5.—Quite a sensation was created here to day by the receipt of a telegram by Mr. Wm. H. Worth from the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals sitting in Richmond stating that the verdict of \$25,000 awarded by Judge McDowell in the federal court at Roanoke to Mrs. Sarah E. Holdbrook, administratrix against the N and W railway had been affirmed. The verdict is said to be the largest ever given in Virginia.

The case originated in the federal court in Roanoke, being tried at the June, 1913 term. Mrs. Holdbrook, whose husband, Thos. Holdbrook, was a section carpenter for the N & W., was killed at Panty, W. Va. January 4, 1913, while acting temporarily as flagman for the railroad. Mrs. Holdbrook is a woman of very moderate means and lives in Wise county. Attorney Wm. H. Worth, in the face of an array of eminent counsel for the railroad, carried the case through the courts unassisted.

The branch plant of the Beecham Extract Co. at Wells, Delta County, is the first industry at that place to be affected by the change in the Tariff. The company manufactures tanning extract, and because of the recent removal of the duty on foreign tanning extracts the output of the plant has been cut at least 50 per cent, and the number of employees cut in the same proportion. The parent company finds that it can import extracts from South America much cheaper than it can make it at Wells. Superintendent Shaw says the business will never increase from what it is now, and the probability is that it will grow much smaller. The domestic sugar industry isn't the only industrial business that is being blighted by the new Tariff law.—Michigan Manufacturer.
