A BOILING LAKE.

A new sect has arisen in Saxony called the Imperial Brotherhood Association, whose object is to incite the people to go to Caucasus to escape the coming of Anti-Christ from the west.

It is reported that the statistics of the Reformed Episcopal Church show a greater addition to its membership during the past year than in any preceding one, not excepting the first of its organization.

PROFIT IN STOCK-RAISING.

Mr. Tell Priest, one of our most enterprising and public spirited farmers, is thoroughly imbued with the belief that there is more money in stock-raising than any other branch of farming enterprise. He bought last year \$106 worth of sheep, and of that lot he has sold \$192 worth of mutton, \$79.35 worth of wool, and has thirty-eight sheep left. He sold, Friday to Mr. J. T. Ewing, of Louisville, twenty-seven hogs, averaging a little over 325 lbs.

There are some interesting facts connected with the twenty-seven head that are worthy of particular notice, and we doubt if a similar test has ever been made by any one in this country before. On the eleventh day of last September he turned into his cornfield the twenty-seven head of hogs weighing each lot as they were turned in, and weighing them again on Friday, when he sold them to Mr. Ewing. During the 69 days they made the following gains in weight: One litter of seven pure Berkshires gained 24 pounds per day; one litter of eight half Chester and half Berkshire 14 pounds per day; one litter of five, three-quarter Chester and one-quarter Berkshire, 14 pounds per day; and litter of seven, three-quarter Berkshire and one-quarter Poland-China, 2 pounds per day.

SELECTING SEED CORN.

Prof. A. E. Blunt, of the Colorado Agricultural College at Fort Collins, gives these views on selecting seed corn: "If the stock be a healthy one and free from injury by insects or weather, the topmost ear is always the largest, best formed and has the best filled grain, provided the parents from which it came were perfect. Every variety of standard corn produces its best ear nearest the tassel, for reasons that are quite evident. Being nearest, it receives the pollen first and in greater quantity than those below it; another reason is that it is the natural distance from the soil, etc. A careful examination of the stalks in every stage of their growth always shows that the lowest ear has the longest shank, the next has a shorter one, and so on to the topmost one, which sets close upon the stalk. It shows also that the lowest ear is the smallest and the top ear the largest, as above stated."
