Exhibits For Fair.

The fact that the Smyth County Fair Association has just gotten out one of the most attractive premium lists in its history, brings to mind, that we must begin to collect and properly store our County, when August 31, September 1, 2, 3, comes along. Many of our most important grasses and grain crops, such as blue grass, orchard grass, clovers, alfalfa, timothy, wheat, oats, rye, barley, etc., are now ready or soon will be ready to cut for exhibit purposes. All exhibits if this kind should be cut on level with top of ground when they have reached the proper stage of maturity, cured in the shade, stored where rats and mice can not injure them and in such manner as will retain the color.

Besides exhibiting at the County Fair, there is a desire on the part of some of our leading farmers, to see Smyth County make an agricultural exhibit at the State Fair this year. Many of you know something of the kind of exhibit it takes to be winners over all other counties in the State, since there are a number that have made exhibits consecutively for several years.

Needless to say, Smyth County has never been represented at the State Fair by such an exhibit and consequently has failed to realize from the advertising such an exhibit affords. It seems to me that this is one of the very best means of not only really putting our County on the map but of doing the same for many individual farms and farmers. In other words, the familiar old saying, "it pays to advertise" is still true.
