Dear Sir:

Doubleless many of the good folks in Marion will remember a Pastor that was stationed at Marion a number of years ago the Rev. Dr. M. D. Trinity who was in charge of the Methodist Church. He was transferred from he Holston to the Baltimore Conference some years ago and in April of this year he was sent to our church, Trinity from the Central church of Staunton, where he had been Pastor for seven years and his people very reluctantly gave him up, as he was greatly loved as a Pastor and a man and many warm tributes were paid him by the people of Staunton. Our church lost a very wonderful young preacher the Rev. J. JUGGLING THE PROPOSITION

The Honorable George P. Coleman possesses a wonderful mind. It is hitched to a double back apparatus and revolves with inconceivable rapidity and it is so geared that it can revolve ways at the same time.

To this remarkable mind is due the discovery that the Virginia anti-bellum debt was and is a good thing for Virginia. Equally starting is the discovery, he has just announced, that if Virginia will only borrow \$50,000,000 the fact of borrowing will reduce taxes. Taxes are measured by governmental expenses and Mr. Coleman's proposition is either (1) that governmental expenses will be diminished by borrowing millions, or (2) that if we borrow money to pay current expenses, current expenses will be paid out of borrowed money instead of out of current revenue. The first proposition is absurd, the second is suicidal.

No state and no individual could survive such an unsound economic policy. If we use borrowed money to pay current expenses we may live for a few years on borrowed capital without taxation, or with a lessened taxation, but in the end such a policy means bankruptcy. No juggler in figures can wipe out the fact that if roads in Virginia are to be built they must be paid for and the money must come from the taxpayers of Virginia. If bonds are issued then the cost of roads is increased by the interest on the bonds.

The present bonds in Virginia will run for 167 years before they are paid off at the rate of retirement now in effect. At 3 per cent interest \$3.00 in interest will be paid for every \$1.00 received in bonds. In other words the State is paying out \$4.00 so as to obtain \$1.00, and this at only 3 per cent, interest, while the rate of interest on the bond issue now proposed will be not less than 4 1/2 per cent. In the face of the past experience with bonds in Virginia, even the most optimistic person will hardly expect to retire the proposed \$50,000,000 bond issue in less than thirty-three years.

EAT WHOLE WHEAT

"During the World War we all joined gladly for the general good in the injunction to 'Eat less Wheat,' and learned through experimentation that bread-made of one-third, or even one-half potatoes, was as palatable and as nourishing as bread made of the flour in general use. Now, for the benefit of the farmer, since the world does not require our surplus wheat, we are urged to 'Eat More Wheat.'"

"Once every neighborhood had its small water-power mill, grinding with mill-stones, and it was the universal custom to take a small quantity of what or corn to the mill to be ground into flour or meal—flour or meal which did not have the last vestige of the germ or heart of the grain and bran bolted out of it, as is the case in the large roller process mills of today. Then we ate the real thing."

"Now the best part of the grain, embracing the germ with its valuable vitamins and proteins, together with the bran, containing the bone and tooth forming mineral, is fed to the stock, while we are urged to eat more of the starchy remnant."

"This starchy remnant is white and makes bread that delights the eye of the housekeeper and the palate of those who do not know, but of the tragedy of feeding this to children."

"The real reason for this change in flour making is that flour and meal containing the germ will not keep long and cannot be shipped abroad. The public too has been trained to prefer this bread to the darker and, perhaps to many, last palatable whole-wheat loaf."

"The large number of small mills which turned out products that constituted real food are now seen throughout the State rapidly going to ruin, while the larger ones have changed their process to the modern crushing method which throws off the germ as a flake, bolts out the bran, and leaves the starch for food. This is nothing less than a national calamity."

"The real slogan for us to adopt is not, 'Eat More Wheat,' but 'Eat Whole Wheat.'"

"There is a table and wholesome breakfast properly, coarsely ground, whole oat-meal. The writer from Craig County by all should be able to furnish whole wheat and corn products other cities at a fair price? back to their old fashioned nutritious and will build up bone formation of soft teeth, furnish the focus for rheumatism or chronic conditions. overcome this great dietetic deficiency, or to supply the ingredients of these safe vegetables, cabbage, lettuces, spinach, turp and tomatoes, but preferably cooked. 

Every manufacturer of bottling equipment reports that bottles are buying only the up-to-date, automatic, sanitary machinery.

An example of this is found in the policy backing the well known Crushes. These carbonated fruit beverages, Orange, Lemon, and Lime flavored are being widely advertised. In each advertisement the ingredients are listed. Thus the consumer is assured that what he drinks is a pure, wholesome product.

REORGANIZATION OF AMERICAN LEGION.

An executive committee has been appointed to report at the next meeting upon a time and place of meeting, to submit definite plans for securing definite club rooms with equipment, and the most advisable method of increasing the membership. These matters will be passed upon at the next meeting, which will be held Monday July 23 at 8 o'clock at the Court House. A smoker will be arranged at that time, and a speaker will be secured for the occasion. It is hoped that definite plans can then be made for some constructive and regular program, and it is further hoped that through a program committee, interesting programs can be arranged for the

meeting hours, in which every man will have a real interest.

Let's make the Legion go. Every man with an honorable discharge try to be present Monday night at 8 P. M. at the Court House.

REPORT OF THE ANTI-TUBERCULOSIS COMMITTEE OF THE WOMAN'S CLUB.

Mr. L. E. Spear, representing the Virginia Tuberculosis and the State Board of Health, came to Marion, in March, to confer with the Anti-Tuberculosis Committee of the Woman's Club about free chest clinics in Marion. The State organizations promised to give four, one day, free chest clinics in Marion this year. The first one of these clinics was held June 22nd by Dr. E. H. Edwards of Richmond. Thirty-one persons were examined. The clinic was managed by Miss Bethea, who was assisted by Mrs. Gay, of Richmond. The next clinic will be some time in August.

The Tuberculosis Committee sent four patients, this year, to Sanatoria, three to Catawba Sanatorium and one to Blue Ridge Sanatorium, at Charlottesville. A boy was at Blue Ridge one month and one patient will stay at Catawba two months. Two of the patients stayed a very short time at Catawba.

About \$98.00 has been expended for tuberculosis patients in 1923.

Free chest clinics will be held at some other places in Smyth County next fall, not earlier than October.


