The summer was past; the harvest ended. The pilgrims decided upon a recreation. The governor sent out four huntsmen, who in one day secured game to last the colony a week. A Big Deal.

United States Steel Corporation Gets Option on Coal Lands.

Tazewell, Va., Nov. 21.—A deal of far-reaching importance to Tazewell county and the Southwest was made here last week by the probable acquisition of several thousand acres of coal land by the United States Steel Co. An option for 30 days was given the agents of the steel company on six thousand acres of Pocahontas No. 3 vein in McDowell county, owned by Tazewell capitalists, for \$75 per acre. The opinion was expressed by the representatives of the gigantic corporation that favorable reports had been made on the land in question. The property is situated in McDowell county, West Va., and is owned by the McDowell Coal Land Association, composed of C. A. Fudge, A. St. Clair, John C. St. Clair, J. S. and A. P. Gillespie, J. W. Chapman and R. O. Croudet, all of Tazewell. The deal represents a consideration of half a million dollars and it is thought here will be consummated within the next few days. From a reliable source it is also learned that the United States steel people have closed an option on the Empire Coal Land Corporation comprising over 12,000 acres of coal land near Richlands, this county. It is reported that the steel company will use the output of these mines for coking purposes, and will develop the mines to the fullest extent.

Holy Roller Fined \$25.

Pataaki Jury Found Him Guilty of Criminally Neglecting His Own Child.

Pulaski, Va., Nov. 19.—A most unique criminal trial, and one so far as the writer is aware, without precedent in the judicial annals of this State, was held in the Circuit Court here several days ago.

The case was that of the Common wealth vs. Price Cecil, otherwise, the "Holy Roller" case. It will be recalled that sometime since the defendant, Price Cecil, allowed one of his children, a boy some eight years old, to die from diphtheria and another child to be down with that disease, without calling in medical aid. Mr. Cecil is a man of means, of great natural intelligence, a good neighbor, a kind friend, and has always been of most exemplary habits.

Yet he and a number of his kindred and neighbors embraced the religion of the sect known as "Holy Rollers," a cardinal tenet of this sect is to be guided and governed in all affairs solely by the Bible.

They follow strictly, in cases of disease, the regimen prescribed by the Apostle James: "Is any among you sick? Let him call for the elders of the church; and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord; and the prayer of faith shall save him that is sick, and the Lord shall raise him up."

Receiving none other save this scriptural treatment, the Cecil child died from diphtheria.

The County Board of Health took action. A warrant was issued against Mr. Cecil. He was tried thereon, making no defense, and was fined \$25 and sentenced to three months in jail.

He remained in jail two days and then appealed to the court. The case then came up. It excited very wide attention and a large crowd was present. The defendant at times with his head in his hands, at other times with head thrown back and eyes closed, at first paid scarcely any attention to the proceedings. Judge Massie ordered the plea of "not guilty" entered for him, and the trial proceeded.

The dramatic feature of the occasion was when the defendant took the stand in his own behalf. He declined to be sworn as being against his religious scruples, but was thereupon affirmed, and drawing his chair up close to the jury proceed to make his statement. He had refused to engage counsel. It soon transpired that he needed none.

He made it clear exactly what his belief was in cases of sickness, as set out above.

His position was that each one was to be governed in every affair of life strictly by the Bible. He said that he had not been aware that there was any law requiring him, in a proper case to call in the services of a physician. Had he known there was such a law, he would have obeyed it, for the Bible required him to be subject to the powers that be. He had supposed he could use his own judgment. He exclaimed emphatically to the jury: "God knows I love my children!"

Judge Massie, in submitting the case to the jury, delivered the most comprehensive, lucid and eloquent charge ever heard from a judge on the bench here. He distinguished carefully and clearly between the right of every man to worship God according to the dictates of his own conscience, but said that the privilege ceased when it was carried so far as to invade the rights of others. A man was not required to call in the services of a physician for his child in every trival case, but should call in medical aid in a case where any reasonable prudent man would do so, and was criminally negligent if he failed to do so.

The jury found the defendant guilty and fined him \$25.00. They made the penalty light, as being a case of first impression and on account of the evident sincerity of the defendant. But it was also noted to the "Holy Rollers" that any one guilty in a similar case hereafter will be severely dealt with.

100 Killed in Revolution.

Fight Against Government Troops Results Disastrously for Forces in Mexico.

El Paso, Tex., Nov. 22.—One hundred persons were killed in rioting at Zacatecas, in the State of Zacatecas, 500 miles South of the United States line, last Saturday night, according to reports received yesterday morning. Soldiers fired into the struggling body of rioters with disastrous effect. One hundred is the lowest estimate of the loss of life, which may reach 500.

The American consul telegraphed the first news of the riots to the Mexican consul at San Antonio, stating the town was in a state of terror and loss of life was not less than 100. No details were given.

It is stated quiet has been restored in Zacatecas under rigid military rule. The latest reports are that the slain are still lying in the streets.

San Antonio, Texas, Nov. 22.—Widely circulated report that 400 persons were killed in pitched battle at Zacatecas, Mexico, last Saturday night, not confirmed.

Zacatecas is nearer to Mexico City than Eagle Pass and has better telegraph facilities to the Mexican capital. Reports from Mexico City state no word of any disorder at Zacatecas has reached there.

Eagle Pass, Tex., Nov. 22.—Advices state the outbreak by the revolutionists took place at Hernandez, about 100 miles South, last Sunday. Four citizens and two policemen are reported injured. The demonstration was of short duration. The street quickly filled with soldiers and the crowd dispersed, shouting "Down with Diaz."

Notice of Election.

VIRGINIA: At a Circuit Court continued and held for Smyth Co., at the Courthouse thereof, on Monday 21st day of November, 1910:

This day came the Board of Supervisors of Smyth County, by its attorneys and presented a petition signed by all the members of the said Board, praying the Court to enter an order requiring the Judges of Election of the County of Smyth, to open a poll on December, 22nd, 1910 to take the sense of the qualified voters of the said County, on the question whether the Board of Supervisors of said County, on the question whether the Board of Supervisors of said County shall issue bonds of Smyth County, to an amount not exceeding fifty thousand dollars, said bonds to bear interest at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually, payable on the first days of January and July of each year, one-fourth of said bonds to run for five years, one fourth for ten years, one-fourth for fifteen years and one-fourth for twenty years, for the purpose of Macadamizing and otherwise permanently improving certain public roads in the Rich Valley Magisterial District in said Smyth County, to-wit:

1. To macadamizing the road beginning at the mouth of Cove Creek on what is known as the river-road and running down said river road to the line of the Corporation of the Saltville, near McCready's Gap, a distance of about eight miles, said MacAdam to be nine feet wide with turnouts fourteen feet wide at intervals of about each one half mile, said turnouts not to exceed one hundred feet in length.

2. To permanently improve the following road: (A) The road running from the mouth of Muddy Branch up Beaver Creek to the Valley Road, a distance of about three miles, width, twelve to fourteen feet. (b) The road leading from old Broad Ford along the Scott road road via United Church to Cedar Branch, a distance of about five miles; width, twelve to fourteen feet. (c) The road leading from the residence of T. G. Sanders along the Walker road to the Rich Valley near the residence of H. L. Morgan, a distance of about two miles; width, twelve to fourteen feet. (d) The Rich Valley road running up Rich Valley from the line of the corporation of the Town of Saltville on the East of said Corporation to the Bland county line, a distance of about twenty miles; width from twelve to fourteen feet. (e) The road leading from the mouth of Cove Creek, eastwardly to Chatham Hill, a distance of about seven miles; width from twelve to fourteen feet. (f) The road leading from Olympia to the Walker's Mountain at Whitehead Gap, a distance of about 3 1/2 miles, width from twelve to fourteen feet.

It is therefore considered by the Court that the Judges of the Election of the County of Smyth, shall on December 22, 1910, open a poll at the various voting places in the County of Smyth, and take the sense of the qualified voters of the said County on the question whether the Board of Supervisors for said County shall issue the bonds for Macadamizing and otherwise improving the said Rich Valley Magisterial District, in said County of Smyth, not to exceed in amount the sum of fifty thousand dollars, and it is further ordered that the regular election officers of said County, at the time hereinbefore designated shall conduct such election and close the polls in such manner as is provided by law in other elections, and made return thereof, as provided by statute in such cases made and provided. And it is further ordered that the Electoral Board of Smyth County shall have printed and furnish the ballots for said election as required by Section 2 of an Act of the General Assembly of Virginia, approved February 25, 1908, as amended by an Act approved February 16, 1910. And in the event the question of issuing the said bonds for the said Rich Valley District shall be decided in favor of the issuing of said bonds, and said bonds are issued by the said Board of Supervisors, it is further ordered that the bonds so issued shall have written or printed on said bonds the following sentences: "These bonds are issued for Rich Valley Magisterial District, but the full faith and credit of the entire County is hereby pledged for their payment; and a tax to be levied upon the property of said district to pay them upon maturity" and said bonds shall be in all other respects as required by an Act of the General Assembly of Virginia, approved February 25th, 1908, as amended by an Act of the said General Assembly approved Feb. 16, 1910.

And it is further ordered that certified copy of this order shall be published for four weeks in the newspapers published in Smyth County, and posted by the Sheriff at the front door of the Courthouse for Smyth County, and at each voting place in said County, at least 20 days prior to the election.

Yesterday an order was sent to the State Anti-Tuberculosis Association for a large supply of Red-Cross seals to be used here during the holidays. It is expected that this order will be promptly filled and that within the next few days the seals will arrive. While the Red-Cross seals are used in every city and town in the United States during the Christmas holidays, the National Red-Cross Society, which devised them, insists that the greater part of the proceeds shall be devoted to local health work. The Red-Cross Society receives 12 1/2 per cent. of the proceeds, the State Anti-Tuberculosis Society receives 37 1/2 per cent. and local health work receives 50 per cent. of the gross proceeds. Joseph Dawson Dead.

Resided in Smyth County When Shot by the Moonshiners in 1867.

Joseph Dawson, a well-known figure in the official life of Hartford for nearly thirty years, died at Hartford hospital several days ago. He had been at the institution five weeks and about a week ago underwent an operation for the removal of a growth from the forehead. Since then he had failed steadily. He had not been in good health, however, for several years, due to advancing age. He was in his 78th year.

About 1860 Joseph Dawson went South to take charge of a woolen mill in Richmond, Va., and was in that city at the breaking out of the war between the States. During the time he was in Richmond he was allowed to assist Union prisoners with food and clothing. In 1863 Mr. Dawson was allowed to leave Richmond and came North.

In 1867 he entered the employ of the United States government as an Internal Revenue officer and was in the service only six weeks, when he was shot in the left hand by moonshiners in Virginia mountains and crippled for life. Later he was Government storekeeper in Greenen and Augusta counties, Va., for a number of years.—Hartford (Conn.) News.

The Mr. Dawson referred to will be well remembered by many of our citizens. He was for some time manager of the Holstein Woolen Mills when operated by Elijah Thomas, and entered the revenue service in this county. He was riding across the mountain from Burk's Garden to Tazewell when he was shot by a man named Hanshaw from a blind that had been erected by the road. After he was wounded he was brought by Mr. C. F. Lincoln to his home, where he remained 'til he was well enough to resume work.

Simply a Shout.
 Those who shout that the high cost of living would become a thing of the past if the Tariff should be revised again never go into details to explain how such a result could be brought about. Perhaps their idea of revision is to do away with the Tariff altogether.
 That secured, the cost of living might be reduced through the inability of those who want to live to meet their wants. A general reduction in wages brought by a flood of foreign-made goods, for instance, would cheapen the workers, and thus naturally cheapen what they had to buy. If somebody should present a practical scheme of Tariff revision that would result in the cheapening of what the people had to buy without bringing about a corresponding cheapening of those who work, no doubt it would result in something beneficial.
 But when there is simply a shout that the Tariff is responsible for high prices, it fails to prove anything. The problem of high prices has not been solved, even by those who make a study of political economy. There are no Tariff duties on what the people need most, and there is something else wrong.—Trenton State Gazette.
