The crowds were harangued by speakers of all kinds, among them several of evident socialistic proclivities. The latter warned the government that while the unemployed were passive now, if not soon relieved they would attack the baker shops next.

Motions were made and adopted demanding the opening of relief works by the government, and the appointment of a minister of commerce.

An early conclusion after the formation of the Cabinet was that Gen. Joseph E. Johnston would be appointed to some high post. This expectation was explained by the process of politics which assumed that the influence that had been equal to the work of removing Gov. McLane, of Maryland, from the competition for the Maryland Senatorship by giving him the mission to France, was further able to take care of its own by taking care of General Johnston, Gov. McLane's brother-in-law.

As to Mr. Garland, he must feel in the worst possible shape as to both the public and his associates in the Cabinet. In the latter relation he has never been comfortable, if he is to be credited with ordinary self-respect.

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
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
