

THE REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.

9th District Republicans Choose National Convention Delegates.

STUART F. LINDSEY AND A. P. GILLESPIE FOR DELEGATES, AND D. F. BAILLEY FOR ELECTOR.—STANDS BY WALKER.

The republicans of the Ninth congressional district met in convention at Bristol on the 5th inst. for the purpose of selecting delegates to the national convention, which convenes in Philadelphia on the 19th day of June, and also for the purpose of choosing a district elector.

The occasion brought republicans to Bristol from almost every county in the district, and there were in attendance about 193 delegates, besides a number of guests.

It was not a difficult matter to tell just where these republicans stood as regards a course of action. They were all McKinley men and appeared to be equally enthusiastic in their sympathy for General Walker. The resolutions which they adopted in General Walker's favor bear no uncertain sound. These were, in fact, one of the most emphatic features of the convention and would vindicate the general in his cause regardless of anything.

Orchestral music was furnished by local talent. The convention was called to order at 2:30 p. m. by Mr. C. C. Lincoln, of Smyth county, district executive committee.

Hon. Stuart F. Lindsey, of Bristol, placed Hon. J. L. Gleaves, of Wytheville, in nomination for temporary chairman. The nomination was seconded by Hon. D. F. Bailey. There being no other nominations, Mr. Gleaves was nominated by acclamation.

In acknowledgement of the honor, Mr. Gleaves returned his thanks and spoke for about ten minutes, reviewing briefly the record of the administration and forecasting what he considered to be the immediate future of the republican party.

Mr. Gleaves said in part:

"Your policy is well defined; there is no doubt as to the future; a sweeping victory is ours in November. Four years ago, capital was idle and labor unemployed. The campaign was begun and carried through, with the result that when the smoke and dust of political battle cleared away, it was flashed across the country that your choice and mine had been elected president in the person of Wm. McKinley, of Ohio. The result showed that common sense had prevailed, and a man was elected in whom the country could confide and whose policy on the financial and other great questions was well defined. Every pledge and promise has been fulfilled, and the country has enjoyed three years of unexcelled prosperity. City and country alike have been blessed, and plenty, like the dew of heaven, has come to all classes, irrespective of condition. The outlook for the future is as bright and promising as you could desire it to be. No element of doubt exists. I am proud to say that under the present administration, the demon of sectionalism has been throttled, and that as a result of the election of a republican president."

Mr. Gleaves then referred to the Spanish-American war, taking occasion to compliment the brave boys who went to the front and placed the American flag upon foreign shores, adding that "today the morning drum-beat of America can be heard almost all the way around the world."

with a few words in favor of harmony, which he said was a necessary element to success.

On motion of R. A. Anderson, of Smyth county, R. W. Dickenson, of Russell county, was elected temporary chairman.

Hon. D. F. Bailey offered a resolution providing for the appointment of three committees, namely, committee on organization, committee on credentials, and committee on resolutions; and providing that these committees should be so made up as to include on each one, one man from every city and one from every county in the district.

Col. Honaker, of Bland, objected to this resolution, and Wm. C. Pendleton, of Tazewell, spoke in favor of its adoption. Finally Col. Honaker withdrew his objection, and the resolution was adopted.

As provided in the resolution each separate delegation named its own men for these committees.

The names were sent up to the secretary as follows:

Tazewell: J. D. Gillespie, organization; W. C. Pendleton, resolutions; T. C. Bowen, credentials.

Lee: Jno. C. Noel, resolutions; M. G. Ely, credentials; W. S. Coldiron, organization.

Russell: W. P. Henritze, organization; J. H. Meade, credentials; R. W. Dickenson, resolutions.

Wise: H. L. Rollins, resolutions; J. M. Goodloe, organization; S. N. Tyler, credentials.

Washington: H. H. Hamilton, credentials; Paul E. Hayter, organization; J. W. Hortenstine, resolutions.

Craig: C. C. Lincoln for each of the three committees.

Dickenson: J. C. Smith, resolutions; J. L. Adams, credentials; Samuel Reas, organization.

Bland: D. J. Honaker, resolutions; L. T. Gullehon, credentials.

Scott: J. P. Carnes, resolutions; J. M. Dougherty, credentials; J. J. Alley, organization.

The committee as reported was upon motion, approved. Upon motion of H. Peyton Gray, of Pulaski, the convention took a recess of twenty minutes in order to give the committees time to prepare their reports.

The committee on credentials, upon the reconvening of the convention, reported that all counties and cities in the districts were represented by duly accredited delegates, except Buchanan, which was not represented at all. The report was adopted.

The committee on organization reported recommending Judge M. B. Wood, of Bristol, for permanent chairman, and R. W. Dickenson, of Russell, for permanent secretary. The motion to adopt the report and approve the recommendations carried by an unanimous vote.

Judge Wood was conducted to the chair amid the hearty applause of the delegates. He made a graceful acknowledgement of his gratefulness and appreciation of the honor conferred upon him. He alluded to what he was pleased to term republican prosperity as seen and felt under the present administration and as made manifest in the city of Bristol. He endorsed the expansion idea by saying that where the flag is now planted, the youngest grandchild represented in the convention would not live to see it torn down.

The committee on resolutions, reported, and the report was adopted.

The first section of the resolutions was a hearty endorsement of the administration of McKinley and of the man for re-nomination as the republican candidate for president. Following is the remainder of the resolutions verbatim:

Resolved, 2nd, That we declare it to be a matter of manifest justice for the house of representatives to accord to Gen. James A. Walker the seat in congress now held by W. F. Rhea, obtained by the practice of the most outrageous frauds upon the ballot box, committed at the last congressional election in this district.

"That the failure of the house of representatives to seat Gen. Walker would encourage and stimulate fraudulent methods on the part of the machine democracy, subject our party to increased outrage and weaken the cause of republicanism in this section of Virginia.

"That we declare it to be false that General Walker was defeated by republican votes, or on account of his loss of prestige with the true men of men of the party; and declare all statements to that effect to be untrue.

"That we hereby endorse and recommend that the state convention elect Gen. Jas. A. Walker, one of the delegates from the state at large to the national republican convention, which meets in Philadelphia on the 19th day of June, 1900.

A motion by H. Peyton Gray, of Pulaski, to proceed with the nomination of candidates for delegates, was adopted.

John C. Blair, of Wythe, placed the floor, and in a stirring speech, which met with hearty applause put in nomination Hon. Stuart F. Lindsey, of Bristol, for delegate. The nomination was seconded by Vincent Jesse, of Russell, who made a few very appropriate remarks.

John P. Carage, of Gate City, placed in nomination Hon. F. Hoge, of Scott, whom he was able to recommend in the highest terms, and not without the eloquence of sincerity.

W. C. Pendleton, of Tazewell, made an earnest speech, placing in nomination for delegate as the candidate of Tazewell county, A. P. Gillespie, one of Tazewell's most popular sons.

Hon. D. F. Bailey and H. Peyton Gray each made a speech endorsing in eloquent terms the nomination of Hon. Stuart F. Lindsey. Mr. Gray stating that he stood ready to pledge his county's fourteen votes to Mr. Lindsey.

Robert A. Anderson, of Smyth, in a few well-chosen and well-timed remarks, placed in nomination for delegate Gaylord F. Goodell, as the county of Smyth.

R. W. Dickenson, of Russell, next gained the floor, and placed in nomination James D. Honaker, of Bland county. Mr. Dickenson also seconded the nomination of A. P. Gillespie of Tazewell.

Judge McBroom, of Abingdon, made a brief speech endorsing the nomination of Mr. Lindsey.

H. H. Hamilton, in a speech embracing his accustomed flights of oratory, seconded the nomination of Mr. Honaker.

John D. Barnes, of Smyth, earnestly endorsed the nomination of Mr. Honaker.

Rogan Hurst, of Scott county, made a brief speech, seconding the nomination of Mr. Hoge.

The vote being called for the candidates responded as follows: Craig—Gillespie, 3; Goodell, 2; Dickenson—Lindsey, 6; Gillespie, 3; Hoge, 5; Lee—Lindsey, 15; Gillespie, 10; Honaker, 5; Pulaski—Lindsey, 15; Giles, 15; Russell—Gillespie, 10; Wise, 13; Honaker, 2; Scott—Hoge, 23; Gillespie, 11; Tazewell—Gillespie, 11; Smyth—Goodell, 15; Honaker, 7; Gillespie, 7.

Smyth—Goodell, 15; Honaker, 7; Gillespie, 7.

Wise—Hoge, 12; Honaker, 12. Wythe—Gillespie, 19; Lindsey, 19. Washington—Lindsey, 27; Gillespie, 25; Honaker, 2.

Bland—Honaker, 8; Hoge, 4; Gillespie, 4.

City of Bristol—Lindsey, 4; Gillespie, 33; Honaker, 3.

Totals—Gillespie, 136 1/2; Lindsey, 111; Hoge, 41; Honaker, 45 1/2; Goodell, 17.

The chair declared Lindsey and Gillespie elected delegates to the national convention. On motion, the nominations were made unanimous.

For alternate, J. L. Gleaves placed in nomination Robert Blair, of Wytheville; Vincent Jesse placed in nomination S. W. Aston, of Russell county, and H. Peyton Gray nominated R. M. Calfee, of Pulaski.

Gen. James A. Walker took the floor for the first time to speak in behalf of Mr. Calfee. He was urged to come to the stand and did so. Having endorsed Mr. Calfee in the highest terms, Gen. Walker, by permission of the convention, proceeded to talk of national affairs, and to compliment the intelligence of the party in the district and thank the convention for the interest manifested in his case.

On motion of C. C. Lincoln, Messrs. Calfee and Blair were elected as alternates by acclamation.

On motion of Mr. Lincoln, the convention voted thanks to the citizens of Bristol for hospitable treatment, and, on motion of Gen. Walker, thanks were extended to the officers of the convention for the efficient manner in which they conducted the affairs of the convention.

The convention then adjourned, and most of the delegates left immediately for their respective homes.—Courier.
