Lying About the Tariff.

Says the American Economist: in a timely and suggestive letter from a correspondent at South Norwalk, Conn., occurs a useful demonstration of the falsehood and unfairness which are resorted to in order that discredit may be cast upon the protective tariff. The instance cited is, we believe, typical of a general policy, almost amounting to a conspiracy, on the part of retail merchants the country over to blame the tariff for the marked-up prices of merchandise, when as a matter of fact the tariff has had absolutely nothing to do with such increases in price. The correspondent says:

Here is an incident from real life, whereon I personally can make oath: On Thursday, December 30, 1909, I went to a Shoe Store on Broadway, between Dey and Cortlandt streets, Borough of Manhattan, New York city, and asked for a pair of shoes. I was shown a pair for which the price asked was \$5. I said they used to sell the same pair for \$4.50. The clerk replied: "Yes, but the tariff was raised on shoes, and we have had to put up the price half a dollar." Said I: "You shoe manufacturers were given free hides by that same tariff law, in order that the consumer might have cheaper shoes and your response to the favor is an increase of half a dollar on a pair of

Rural Mail Boxes.

Order from Washington Regarding Loose Coins Placed Therein.

Postmaster R. A. Anderson has received the following circular letter from P. V. DeGraw, Fourth Assistant Postmaster General, which explains itself:

"In view of the extent to which the practice of placing loose coins in boxes by rural patrons has grown and the delay in the delivery and collection of mail and the hardship imposed on rural carriers incident thereto, you are informed that commencing February 15, proximo, rural letter carriers will not be required to collect loose coins from rural mail boxes.

"Patrons should enclose coins in an envelope, wrap them securely in a coin-holding receptacle, so they can be easily and quickly taken from boxes, and carriers will be required to lift such coins, and, where accompanied by mail for dispatch, attach the requisite stamps.

"This should be promptly announced to the rural patrons through whatever means you may employ, without expense to the Department, and you are at liberty to give the information embodied herein to your local papers for publication, if they so desire."

Conditions in S. W. District

Full Report of Supt. John A. Taylor to Anti-Saloon League of Virginia.

To the Ninth Annual Convention of the Anti-Saloon League of Virginia, Broad Street M. E. Church, South, Richmond, Va., Jan. 18-20, 1910.

REPORT FROM SOUTHWEST DISTRICT.

The Anti-Saloon League sub-division of the State, known as the Southwest district, is comprised of the twenty-six counties in Southwest Virginia, a territory bordering on North Carolina and Tennessee, in a direct line from east to west, a distance of 225 miles. Its greatest width from the south of Henry to the north of Rockbridge is more than 110 miles, and following the hypothesis of the triangle from Allegheny on the northwest to the extremity of Lee on the southwest, bordering on West Virginia and Kentucky a distance of about 300 miles.

The Southwest district in shape is like one-half of the head of a great barbed spear, thrust in between North Carolina and Tennessee on the south, Kentucky and West Virginia on the north and west. As though Providence would protect the Mother of States in the days of her prodigality when she was lavishly giving away her territory to all comers, there is reserved in these twenty-six counties the greatest depositories of wealth of all her territory, past or present.

The foundations of her everlasting hills are laid in imperishable granite. Their framework is built of iron, the joints of which are soldered together with lead and zinc. On the north and west each elevation of their ten to fifteen stories has a floor laid in black diamonds. On the east and south their walls are of limestone. The pockets of these hills are lined with copper and filled with silver and gold. In one vast pocket, for use in emergency, is carried a vast deposit of arsenic. Bursting from their breasts and leaping laughingly down their sides are innumerable healing and refreshing springs and rills. Over their ample proportions is a covering of the finest limestone soil on earth. From their bosoms wave the sturdy oak and the stately poplar, and upon their cool heads sigh the evergreen balsams. Upon their backs they wear a robe of bluegrass, and upon their sides rustle the laughing corn and the golden wheat. Once a year from their plateaus rain a shower of Albemarle pippins, Virginia beauties and Winesaps, that do not stop going until they reach the tables of the epicures in all parts of the world.

From Wythe and Smyth they furnish heads (cabbage heads) for all the rest of Virginia, as well as to many other States north and south.

High Living the Cause.

Secretary Wilson Comments on the High Cost of the Necessities of Life.

Philadelphia, Jan. 29.—"It costs more to get the common necessities of life in the United States to-day than in any other country in the world." This startling statement was made recently by James Wilson, Secretary of Agriculture, in an address delivered before the Manufacturing Club of this city.

"Some people," he said, "tell us that if we repeal the present tariff law and let in foreign products free of duty, the present difficulty will cease. I do not believe it. Eggs are thirty-five cents a dozen in Canadian cities and sixty cents a dozen in some American cities—duty is three cents a dozen. What difference would it make whether you took off that three cents or not?"

He further stated that he believed the American people are suffering at present, not so much for the high cost of living as from the cost of high living.

Secretary Wilson pointed out that the fundamental difficulty was that the people are leaving the farm to such an extent that there are not enough remaining to produce the food of the increasing population.

From their blue grass pastures are marketed the best beef and mutton raised in the United States, and their Thanksgiving Day and Christmas turkeys have gobbled around the world.

Every saloon that remains to disgrace the civilization of the Southwest district is there against the protest of the majority of her uncorrupted, incorruptible citizenship.

Bristol went wet by an apparent majority of twenty-seven, but it was based entirely upon the technicality of "constructive citizenship," by which wet voters from Bristol, Tenn. were allowed to vote in Bristol, Va., largely in excess of this apparent majority.

Intoxicated With Onions.

Strange Plea of Man Taken Before Pittsburg Magistrate.

Pittsburg, Jan. 31.—One George Pruner, haled before a local magistrate on the charge of intoxication, laid the blame for his "jag" on onions, saying: "I was going to call on a friend who has consumption, and my doctor advised to eat some onions first to avert contagion. I did. They went to my head and things began to whirl. I don't remember what happened after that. I didn't know onions ever affected folks like that."

Pruner was released and was importuned to tell where the kind of onions he had eaten can be found.

A majority of ninety-nine votes in communities with a combined population of some 50,000 should be allowed to dictate to the 350,000 people living in the surrounding dry territory. They think if Richmond and Roanoke are allowed to shoot jugs into their territory, they should be allowed to shoot votes on the liquor question back at them.

During the seven months of my connection with the League, I have spoken in seventeen of my twenty-six counties, from one to twelve times each, and taken collections in cash and subscriptions amounting to \$2,556.79, beside spending two weeks in the Bristol campaign; one month as manager of the Roanoke campaign, rendering assistance in Rocky Mount, and spending several Sundays in other sections of the State. Two weeks were spent at the National convention in Chicago. In this work I have traveled considerably, about 1,000 miles per month.

The sentiment of our people in

these twenty-six counties is overwhelmingly for "State-wide Prohibition." But one man from this entire territory has expressed any doubt as to the time being fully ripe for such a movement, and he says he is not sufficiently informed to express an intelligent opinion, but his personal views are "that we should delay a little longer."

The only difference of opinion that exists among our people on the subject of State-wide is that some want it quick and others want it double-quick.

A careful compilation of the opinions of leading men from the several counties of the Southwest district show a probable majority for State-wide of 14,500 votes. And this estimate is re-enforced by thousands of signatures to our petitions, secured within the last ten days.

Because of its corrupting influence in politics, its ruthless disregard of the rights of others, its studied violation of the law, as well as for the protection of our homes, for the love of God and native land, the people of the Southwest district believe the time has come to demand that the beverage liquor traffic take its departure from the Commonwealth of Virginia.

The High Prices.

House of Representatives is Going to Find Out the Cause.

Washington, Feb. 2.—The cost of living in the United States is to be thoroughly inquired into by the House of Representatives through its most powerful committee—the Ways and Means. Late yesterday, Representative Payne, of New York, chairman of that committee, and majority leader in the House, introduced his resolution providing for an investigation along the broadest lines.

Prior to introducing his measure, Mr. Payne conferred with Representative Champ Clark, the minority leader, who had been designated with him by the committee to draft the instrument authorizing the investigation.

The committee is to inquire into any alleged increase in the cost of the necessities of life, some of which, such as clothing, fuel, furniture, meats and food stuffs are enumerated. Wholesale and retail prices and rates of profit are to be investigated. The question of whether the tariff is responsible for the alleged high cost of living is covered in a general provision as to "whether prices are affected, increased or otherwise, by any laws of the United States."

The hearings of the committee will be open to the public. It may sit anywhere in the United States and summon and swear witnesses. The resolution, which will be referred to the Ways and Means Committee, and doubtless reported back for passage.

Bluefield, W. Va., Feb. 2.—Four men were killed and sixteen injured last Friday night sixteen miles south of St. Paul, on the Carolina, Clinchfield and Ohio railroad. The men were part of an extra force which was returning to camp after its day's work. The wreck was caused by a large derailed car, which fell on the track on a sharp curve, into which the train of flat cars backed.

10,000 Workmen Get 15 per Cent. Advance.

Pittsburg, Pa., Jan. 31.—Fifteen per cent. advance in the wage scale over the scale signed last July was agreed by representatives of the National Window Glass Manufacturer's Association at a conference with a committee of workmen today. The advance becomes operative from the time the schedule was signed this afternoon, and will affect 10,000 workmen. The manufacturers' committee, represented from the Kansas Gas Belt to Pittsburg.

To Compel Payments.

Senator McAlexander Wants Officers to Collect All Poll-Taxes. Senator McAlexander of Franklin, wants the county and city officers to get busy and collect the unpaid poll-tax tickets. He declared that there were, in his belief, considerably more than half a million dollars owing to the State at this time, and he knows of no reason why the officers do not get busy and bring in the money. In order to ascertain what each

county and city owes on whites and blacks, he offered a motion calling on the Auditor of Public Accounts for a full statement of all unpaid poll-taxes, by counties and cities, whites and blacks, since 1905. 

Little Now Faces Death.

Supreme Court Refuses the Writ of Error to Buchanan County Murderer.

Executive clemency is now the only hope of Howard Little, who is under sentence of death by electrocution for the murder of George Meadows, his wife, and three children, and Mrs. Betty Justice, in the mountains of Buchanan county a few months ago. Last Friday in the Supreme Court of Appeals a writ of error was refused Little. He is to die on February 11th.

The murder of which Little now stands convicted was one of the most horrible in the history of the State. If Little is the guilty man he deliberately murdered an entire family for the purpose of obtaining a sum of money with which to fly to the West with a woman with whom he was infatuated, deserting his own wife. However, it is striking that the man has a number of friends who are by no means powerless or insignificant, and it is likely that their resources are not as yet exhausted.

The attorney and friends of Little went to the penitentiary several days ago to apprise him of the decision of the court. He was at first much affected, but soon recovered his equanimity, and said he preferred death to a life sentence. He desires that his body be buried at his former home in McDowell county, W. Virginia.

New Comet May Split.

Seattle, Washington, January 29.—According to Prof. J. E. Fould, head of the department of astronomy of the University of Washington, comet A, 1910, which is visible in the western sky just after sunset, shows signs of splitting in two. "I notice a peculiar feature of the comet's tail," said the professor last night. "It was not as continuous as such tails usually are. This is to be attributed to certain electrical disturbances which have been noted in comets just before they split in two."
