Hooper Nominated.

Nashville, Tenn., Aug. 17.—Capt. B. W. Hooper, of Newport, Cocke county, was yesterday nominated for Governor of Tennessee by the Republican State convention. The name of Alfred A. Taylor, of Washington county, was the only other one presented to the convention, and immediately following the announcement of the result of the first ballot the nomination was made unanimous. The ballot stood: Hooper, 3829 1/4; Taylor, 2015 1/4. The convention also endorsed the candidacy of B. A. Enloe for Railroad Commissioner from West Tennessee.

The Independent Statewide Prohibition Democrats, who have fought Governor Patterson every step of his official career, are expected to support the Republican ticket as against the regular Democratic nominees, which include Patterson for reelection.

Senator Cummins on the Democratic Party.

Ninth district Democratic papers and leaders are eulogizing Cummins and Doliver and sending out their speeches, in this district, as campaign documents. They are doing this hoping to fool some one. What do they think when Senator Cummins says: "There never was a time in my whole life when I would have been willing to commit the destiny of the country to the Democratic party, and there is less reason now for doing so than ever before." In the face of this strong declaration Democrats are trying to use these Senators as arguments to induce Republicans to vote for Stuart. It shows that our friends are hard pressed for campaign material. They are trying to take consolation and aid from men who are holding them up with contempt and ridicule. Cummins says "stand shoulder to shoulder for Republican candidates whether State or National." Where would Mr. Stuart come in? Republicans believe in this Insurgent's advice and will continue to stand "shoulder to shoulder" knowing as Mr. Cummins says that the Democrats are "incapable of making or administering laws for a country like ours."

Hookworm Cases in Washington County.

Bristol, Va., Aug. 17.—Dr. W. L. Davenport, of Abingdon, has made the discovery of the most distinct cases of hookworm yet found in the State. These cases are in a family near Meadville, Washington county. Dr. Davenport called for the assistance of Dr. E. G. Williams, Commissioner of the State Department of Health, in making the diagnosis. J. Alex Waddell, an expert bacteriologist, accompanied Dr. Williams, and the tests made revealed cases of hookworm about which there could be no doubt. A microscopic examination of material secured from one of the patients, revealed fifteen eggs of the hookworm in a quantity not larger than a match head.

Dr. Davenport has sought the assistance of the experts with a view to discovering everything in connection with these cases that may be of value in the treatment of persons affected with hookworm.

Campaign Open at Jonesville.

Hon. C. B. Slemp and Hon. J. L. Gleaves, Jonesville, Va., Sept. 5th.
Hon. T. J. Muncey and Hon. L. P. Summers, Marion, Va., Sept. 5th.
Hon. C. B. Slemp, Hon. T. J. Muncey and Hon. J. L. Gleaves, Lebanon, Va., Sept. 6th.

Big Stone Gap, Va., Aug. 15.—Announcement is made at Mr. Slemp's office here to-day that he will open the forthcoming campaign at Jonesville, Va., on Sept. 5th. Hon. J. L. Gleaves will be with him on that occasion.

On the same day Hon. T. J. Muncey and Hon. L. P. Summers will speak at Marion, Va., thus inaugurating the campaign in two parts of the district simultaneously.

On Sept. 6th Mr. Slemp, Mr. Muncey and Mr. Gleaves will speak at Lebanon, in the home county of the Democratic nominee.

These are the only Republican speaking appointments made public at this time.

There was no foundation for the statement recently sent out by the Democratic Congressional committee, at Pulaski, that Mr. Slemp will open his campaign at Lebanon on Aug. 20th, the same day that Mr. Stuart opens at Gate City. Possibly this statement was issued from that source upon the basis of some irresponsible rumor. As no effort was made to verify such a rumor, there is some uncertainty as to the actual purpose of the erroneous announcement.

According to his itinerary given out from Democratic headquarters, Mr. Stuart is also to speak at Jonesville on Sept. 5th, and at Lebanon on Sept. 6th. Also that some Democratic speaker will be at Marion on Sept. 5th, the name of the speaker not being given.

The fact that the two Congressional candidates will speak on the same day both at Jonesville and Lebanon will insure probably the greatest gatherings at those two places ever recorded for either town, and Mr. Gleaves with Mr. Slemp, together with some prominent Democratic speaker who will be with Mr. Stuart, will lend their full share to the interest of the occasion.

Every Republican of Lee and Russell counties, who can possibly get to Jonesville and Lebanon, will be there to welcome and cheer their beloved young Congressman, who has been so vigorously, astutely and successfully leading them, for several years, in the battles against the common enemy. To a man, they will be present to assure Mr. Slemp that they are going to fight with and for him till the last ballot is correctly counted on the night of Nov. 7th.

It is certain that a great number of Democrats will be at the Republican meetings, for Mr. Slemp and Mr. Gleaves will tell of things accomplished, of steady and consistent efforts to conserve the greatest good of an entire nation. Men with good vigorous red blood coursing through their veins want to hear about men who have the courage, the ability and the character to "do things"—they have no patience with those others who merely talk, and never even attempt to actually do anything.

Such gifted speakers as Mr. Muncey and Mr. Summers will undoubtedly bring a record breaking attendance to the meeting at Marion, all anxious to hear both the splendid orators and what they will tell of the gallant and splendid young Republican standard bearer who has already proven himself so successful, efficient and faithful a Representative in Congress. Mr. Stuart will already have "shot his bolt" at Gate City, more than two weeks before, and interest therein will have ceased.

With these meetings, the campaign will be fairly and fully launched, and Republicans all over the district will be constantly interested to watch the growing volume of discredit to be accorded Democratic pretensions in view of the actual records of that party and its candidate.

THE GREATEST—THE SERVANT.

Matthew 20:17-34—August 21.
"The Son of man came not to be ministered unto, but to minister and to give his life a ransom for many."

AMBITION moves the world—selfish ambition. A certain kind of ambition—to please God and to have his rewards, is encouraged by the exceeding great and precious promises of God's Word. Think of the promise held out to the consecrated, self-sacrificing followers of Jesus—that, if faithful unto death, they shall receive the "crown of life," immortality, and attain a place with their Master in his Throne—as participants in the glories and honors of his Kingdom! There is no earthly appeal to ambition so strong as this, which comes from the Creator to such as have the hearing ear of faith. Nevertheless, the ambitions awakened by these promises, we are warned, might become our snares. The very condition upon which we may attain the Kingdom is our faithful endurance of shame, contempt, misunderstanding, and our demonstration to the last of humility and absolute loyalty to God and full resignation to his providences. Whoever would reign with Messiah in his coming Kingdom, for which we pray, "Thy Kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as in heaven," must humble himself under the mighty hand of God that he may be exalted in due time.—1 Peter 5:6.

The prospect of the Kingdom was bright before the minds of the apostles, even when Jesus was foretelling his ignominious sufferings and death; so that two of his beloved followers, James and John, through their mother, importuned a promise that they should sit, the one on the right hand and the other on the left hand of the Great King when his Kingdom should be established.

This request drew from the Great Teacher the suggestion that his loving and ambitious disciples had, perhaps, not fully counted the cost of such exaltation. He inquired if they were willing to drink of his cup of ignominy and reproach and if they were willing to be baptized with his baptism, into his death—the sacrifice of all earthly interests. They had counted the cost, and promptly responded as to their willingness. They had learned well the lessons of the Great Teacher. He assured them that with this willingness of mind the privilege would be theirs of sharing his ignominy and his death and of sitting with him on his Throne. But as respects the chief positions, they were not at his disposal. At the conclusion of the testings of his people, those positions of highest honor in the Kingdom next to himself will be given according to the just standards which the Father has prepared and established. How we can rejoice with those apostles in the fullness of their consecration and in the assurances of the Master! And we also should strive by faithfulness to attain a place with the Master in his Throne, as members of his Body, the Church.

The ambition of James and John was shown in their desire for places of special nearness to the Lord. Jesus did not reprove them specifically, but indirectly. When the other ten heard how these two had sought to bespeak the chief places of honor they were indignant. The Master took advantage of the incident to show how different is God's judgment from that of men. With men the aggressive and powerful hold the lordship and dominion over others, but in the Divine arrangement the order is reversed. God will honor most and put in the highest positions, the humble, the submissive, the meek. On this incident the Lord based a general instruction to his followers on the necessity for humility. We are to take the Divine standpoint and honor most in the Church those who most serve the Church, and not those who demand service and honors and seek self-exaltation. Our Lord pointed to his own course as an illustration; they acknowledged him as their Master and yet no one served them so much as did he. Indeed, he came into the world not to be served, but to serve others, even to the extent of laying down his life as the ransom price for the many, for the world, to be applied for their release from sin and death condemnation in God's due time—during the Messianic Kingdom.

Journeying on the Master had an opportunity of exemplifying his position as a servant. Two blind men, learning that he was passing, exercised such faith that they hailed him as the Messiah, the Son of David, entreating Mercy, Help, Relief. Instead of passing them by, saying, "You are only blind beggars, anyway, the Master stopped and called them to him and, in response to their request, touched their eyes, and immediately they received sight. Other Scriptures indicate that the Great Teacher's miracles were not performed without cost to himself. "Virtue (vitality) went out of him and healed them all." (Luke 6:19).

He who was rich, for our sakes became poor, humbling himself to serve the humblest and poorest unfortunates!
