Origin of Republican Party Dates from Feb., 1856.

Pittsburg, Pa., Feb. 25.—Fifty years ago, on the 23rd inst., the Republican party was born in Old Lafayette Hall on what is now the site of the Columbia Bank building, in the heart of the financial district. Three venerable pioneers only are the survivors of the meeting at which the party was organized. A movement has been started in Pittsburg for the erection of a tablet on the site of Old Lafayette Hall to commemorate the birth of the party and it is probable that subscriptions will be received.

The surviving members of the committee of delegates which organized the party are Col. Archibald Blakeley, of this city; Col. Jacob Weyand, of Beaver, Pa., and General Rosell Brinkerhoff, of Mansfield, Ohio. The call for the meeting held in Lafayette Hall was issued January 17, 1856, from Washington. The meeting was in session February 23d and 24d. An Executive committee with Senator E. D. Morgan, of New York, as Chairman was appointed and it issued the call for the Republican convention held June 15th for nominating candidates for President and Vice-President.

The County fairs.

There will probably be more County and District fairs held in Virginia this year than ever before in the history of the State. This is just as it should be, except that three times as many ought to be held. It is not too late for those counties which have not yet arranged for a county or community agricultural and industrial exhibition to make a good start. Of course, it is not expected, nor is it absolutely necessary, for the first one attempted to be a tremendously big thing. Even a small fair would be a starter. It is sometimes better to start small and then grow as the years come and go. It would be a glorious thing for this good old State if there should be held every fall just one hundred County fairs, one to each county. They would in no way conflict one with the other, nor with the big District and State fairs that take place in the larger towns and cities, nor would the latter interfere with the County fairs. Smyth county is making preparations to fall in line and hold her first fair this fall. The location, a good one, has been secured and it is partially graded and is being equipped for the first exhibition. Let our people, and especially the farmers, keep this in view and get ready for a good exhibit of Smyth county products at our first fair. Anyone interested who desires to see the fair ground, can call on Mr. J. E. Thomas, the secretary, and he will take pleasure in driving them to the location, on the Sprinkle farm, and they can see what a fine track we have and how the work is progressing.

EDITOR MARIÓN NEWS:

As I am interested in good roads I attended the meeting in Marion Saturday. We all want better roads and as you know, some are in favor of making them by raising our taxes now and paying as we go, while others favor a bond issue for \$300,000 and making the road in a hurry. I favor the latter plan but not in extreme haste. When the United States undertook to build the Panama canal it was not wise to try to build it in a hurry. So a reasonable time was calculated for the work. Though this canal was a big undertaking and of great importance to the United States. This road making is a bigger undertaking for us and of greater importance to each of us. Some of the nearby counties have voted for big bond issues and its going to take a great deal of road machinery and men to do this work as hurriedly as they have arranged for. I claim that if we spend \$300,000 on roads it will be wise to plan to use five years instead of two to do it in. There will be many plans offered in this undertaking. I offer mine but will vote for anything better. I favor the issuance of \$300,000 in bonds within the next five years, arranging to get on these bonds \$60,000 each year. This would save some interest and give some the belief that there would be graft if the whole amount was available at once. That there be a rock-crusher, roller and grader put in each district and so worked as to complete about \$20,000 worth of road yearly. That the road shall be built according to specifications by which, road just west of Seven Mile Ford was built, except the rock road in this district between Wythe and Washington counties. That this road shall be put in first-class condition but that not more than \$40,000 shall be used on it. That the balance for this district shall be used on the cross-roads. That the committee shall in making this apportionment consider the lengths of cross roads. The number of people and the amount of travel likely to be done on same. That though a road may not be located properly for a first-class McAdam road. The committee shall recommend an allowance for it the same as though its location and conditions were ideal for road. By this the people may have road re-located and get their part during the five years. But in case they should not be properly located, then this money to be used where people would give most to have it used in making the same kind of rock road. That all cross road McAdamizing shall connect with main McAdam road. This will give every person in this district an interest of which they should be proud. As to putting a tax on our children, our fathers put a tax on us and we are paying it. Let these roads be built so they will be as good practically thirty or forty years from now when they are paid for as when completed. Though we want to do all we can for our children it should give them some satisfaction to know their paying for road was a great thing for us as well as themselves.

Roanoke voted Tuesday on a bond issue of \$230,000 to purchase site and erect a public building, and \$120,000 to buy the beautiful Terry place of eight acres in the heart of the city for a public library, play grounds and park. Only freeholders could vote. The result was: Site and public building, 762 for and 192 against; majority for the proposition, 570. Terry property, 816 for, 136 against; majority for 680.

New Electoral College.

The new electoral college will consist of 529 members. The States that are surely Democratic will have 160 representatives in the college, while the States that are almost, if not quite, so surely Republican will have 238 representatives. Virginia will have twelve electors. The doubtful States will have 131 electors. There are twelve of these States—Colorado, Idaho, Indiana, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Jersey, New York, Utah, West Virginia and Wyoming. The Democrats, to be successful in the next Presidential election, must capture 105 votes from the doubtful column, as 295 votes will be necessary to elect. They must carry New York, New Jersey, Indiana, Missouri and West Virginia, and at least two of what are called the "sage-brush" States. If they lose one of the doubtful larger States, they will lose the election, unless they can capture some of the States which are regarded as certainly Republican.

It is generally admitted that the Democratic victories at the recent elections were the result of Republican disaffection rather than of actual Democratic strength. In New York State, for example, 25,000 Republicans stayed away from the polls altogether. In Ohio not less than 100,000 Republican voters sulked in their tents, and so it was in nearly all the States where the Democrats won. The party is on trial, and it must make good now or be prepared for defeat next year. At the Baltimore meeting, Mr. Clark and Senator Bailey and the other speakers made this point very clear.—Richmond Times-Dispatch.

The important elements of plant food are Nitrogen, (also expressed as Ammonia), Phosphoric Acid and Potash. The principal sources of the elements are as follows:

NITROGEN:
Tankage, 2 to 12
Dried Blood, 13 to 15
Nitrate of Soda, 15 to 17
Sulphate of Ammo 20 to 23
Bone Meal, 1 to 5

POTASH:
Muriate of Potash, 48 to 58 actual
Sulphate of Potash, 47 to 52 actual
Manure Salts, 20 actual
Kainit, 12 actual

PHOSPHORIC ACID:
Acid Phosphate, 10 to 18
Steam and raw bone meal, 20 to 30
Tankage, 1 to 20

It will be seen that a complete fertilizer containing Nitrogen, Phosphoric Acid and Potash, such as 10 per cent. Phosphoric Acid, 2 per cent. Amonia, 4 per cent. Potash, or Phosphate and Potash mixture such as 10 per cent. Phosphoric Acid and 4 per cent. Potash may be made from materials of different analysis. Therefore, a brand that would require a filler if high grade material were used would make up complete, without filler, from lower forms of material. For example, 1,250 lbs. 16 per cent. Kainit would make an even 10-4 mixture without any filler. Since, therefore, none of the materials carrying plant food are pure Nitrogen, pure Phosphoric Acid or pure Potash, the impurities in the materials used from which these plant foods are derived are fillers or dilutants.
