Taft Will Be Told He is Nominated August 1

Washington, July 15.—President Taft will be officially notified of his nomination at the White House on August 1st. This was decided today by Chairman Hilles, of the Republican National Committee, and Senator Root, Chairman of the Committee on Notification, appointed at Chicago.

It was President Taft's wish that the ceremony of notification be performed in Washington because of the ease with which members of the committee could get here and because of his desire to entertain them. The notification will be given in the morning and the committee men will be the President's guest at luncheon in the White House.

In keeping with the announcement that he does not expect to make any campaign trips this fall, the President told visitors that he expected to go to Hot Springs, Va., late in the fall and it is possible that he will be there on Washington election day.

Summers Not a Candidate.

Bristol, Va., July 13.—Commenting upon recent published reports indicating that Congressman C. B. Slemm might not be a candidate for Congress from the Ninth district this year, and that the Hon. L. P. Summers might therefore be the choice of the Republicans for the nomination, Mr. Summers, who was here this week as a member of counsel in a case in court, said: "I am not a candidate for Congress now, nor am I seeking any other office. While Mr. Slemm is not anxious about making the race, I am satisfied that the Republicans of the district will compel him to take the nomination. As for myself I am not now, and will not be, a candidate for the nomination for Congress, even in the event Mr. Slemm does not run."

Asked concerning the report that he was to be made district chairman to succeed Peter J. Davenport, who has headed the committee for a number of years, Mr. Summers said: "I do not want the chairmanship, and should I be selected for that position, I would be compelled to decline the honor."

"While I am out of office and not seeking it," replied Mr. Summers in answer to the question of what part he expected to play in the campaign this year, "I expect to canvass every county in the Ninth Virginia district this fall speaking for both the national and district tickets."

Although Mr. Summers, who resigned the collectorship recently in order to go to the Chicago convention in the interest of Mr. Taft, was loyal to the President, he is being complimented by the Roosevelt people for the stand which he took as a member of the credentials committee of the national convention. His sense of fairness would not permit him to vote against the Roosevelt delegates from California and other States where it seemed to him that these delegates should be seated, and in such instances he voted to seat the Roosevelt delegates.

Prominent Men in Organization.

Emory, Va., July 15.—About one month ago the State of Virginia granted a charter incorporating "the Appalachian Educational Foundation." This is one of the most significant movements ever launched in this section of the country. For some time men prominent in business, educational and professional circles have been considering the promotion of this work. Realizing the educational needs of the Appalachian region, and the urgent nature of these needs, these men met at Emory on Tuesday, July 9th, and perfected the organization and outlined the policies of the above named corporation.

The purpose of this institution is to promote the educational and industrial life of the people of the Appalachian region. The managers of this corporation have taken steps to secure scholarships in all of the leading educational institutions in this part of the country, which scholarships will be given to young people who will agree to teach in this section of the country during a specified number of years under the direction of the promoters of this work. For the educational and social betterment of the people, Lyceum attractions will be given in the various high schools and rural communities throughout the Appalachian region, and many other things will be done to enrich the life and promote the general welfare of the people of this section of the country.

The incorporators and trustees of this movement are Judge John A. Buchanan, of the Supreme court of Virginia; Hon. R. T. Irvine, Dr. John Lloyd, of Big Stone Gap; Hon. Hugh Powers, of Bristol; L. C. Harsinger, of Konarock; H. E. Widner, of Abingdon; Prof. J. R. Hunter and Dr. J. P. McConnell, of Emory.

The officers as selected for the ensuing year are Dr. J. P. McConnell, president, and Prof. J. R. Hunter, secretary and treasurer. The executive committee is composed of Dr. McConnell, Prof. Hunter and Judge Buchanan.

Low Assessment from Carroll County.

Richmond, Va., July 15.—Auditor C. Lee Moore said last week, when asked regarding the miserable poor showing which commissioners of the revenue are making in their reports of personal property assessments, what he intended to do in the matter, declared that there was nothing left for him to do but to send the books to the circuit judges and ask that a special grand jury be empaneled to review the work of the commissioners of the revenue. The newspaper men had been granted permission to scan some of the books and they picked up Carroll county as a specimen. Naturally the desire was to see what the Sidna Allen county was doing and they found out. The books for the southern district of that county, for which A. M. Towe is the commissioner of the revenue, shows that the State will receive, in case all the taxes are collected in that district, just \$164.86.

Fell from His Train.

Pulaski, Va., July 15.—A white freight brakeman named William Taylor, who was running on the train known as "shifter," was by some unknown means knocked or jerked from his train last Friday afternoon about four miles west of here and received injuries from which he died shortly afterwards.

Atlantic City, July 15.—The Prohibition National Convention Friday night concluded its labors here with the nomination of the party standard bearer of four years ago—Eugene W. Chafin, of Arizona, for President, and Aaron S. Watkins, of Ohio, for Vice President. In each case the nomination was made by acclamation after a single ballot and indicated the preference of the delegates.

Jury Disagrees in Allen Case.

Wytheville, Va., July 15.—The first Washington county jury in the case of the Commonwealth versus Claude Allen on the charge of killing William M. Foster on March 14 in the court-house at Hillsville, failed to agree and were dismissed at 11:30 o'clock Saturday morning. The case was given to the jury last Friday evening at 5:30 o'clock at the conclusion of Mr. Wisor's speech. The jury deliberated until 9:30 without being able to agree and were then locked up for the night. After taking the case under consideration again Saturday morning they filed in about 11:30 and announced that they were helplessly divided and there was no indication that a verdict could be agreed upon. Judge Staples then dismissed them.

The failure of the jury to agree upon a verdict came as a great disappointment. According to the best information obtainable there were eight for murder in the first degree and four for acquittal. It is now thought that Friel Allen will next be placed on trial and will have to answer the charge of having killed W. M. Foster. The case will be called on Wednesday this week, several days were taken in the Allen trials. Judge Staples, the presiding in the case, suggested to the attorneys that the remaining cases consolidated to expedite matters, but upon the suggestion the attorneys were unable to agree.



Election May Be Up to Congress.

Washington, July 15.—The best constitutional hair splitters in Congress admit that they are at sea over the question that has arisen as to whether the States should elect 490 representatives to the electoral college, or 531, on the basis of representation in the next Congress. The question is one that is puzzling the best minds everywhere.

As compared with the number of electors—483—chosen in 1908, the number to be chosen in November—531—shows an increase of 59. This becomes particularly interesting, because Woodrow Wilson, the Democratic candidate, must only get as many electoral votes—162—which Bryan received in 1908, but to be elected he must get 104 in addition, for in the next electoral college 266 will be necessary to a choice. Mr. Taft may lose 121 of the electoral votes received by him in 1908 and yet be elected in November.

But there is a possibility that with three candidates in the field—Wilson, Taft and Roosevelt—neither will receive a majority of the electoral votes, and that would throw the matter in the House. That body is now so constituted that with each State having one vote, in case it should be put up to the House, nothing could be accomplished for the reason that although the Democrats have a majority, with each State having only one vote, the situation would result in a tie—the Republican States balancing off those that would vote for the Democratic candidate. Therefore, should the matter go to the House nothing would be accomplished there. The Senate would then be the body to take hold of the situation and the most interesting developments would follow. While that body could unite on a Republican candidate it probably would not do it—the Taft and Roosevelt men fighting each other to a final death and both elements opposing anything the Democrats may attempt to do. Therefore, with neither Taft, Roosevelt or Wilson being the choice of the Senate, after the House had deadlocked and given up the fight, what would happen?

When the electoral college fails to give a candidate a majority of its votes, and under conditions just described in the House and Senate, the law automatically declares that the ranking Cabinet officer—the Secretary of State—shall be the President of the United States. This would make Philander C. Knox the President.

The law on this subject is mandatory. It is based on the theory that when the electoral college, then the House, and lastly the Senate, have failed to agree upon a candidate, when there is no other way for the matter to be settled. Automatically, as stated, the Secretary of State, then becomes President. The whole situation is one of the most interesting that has ever arisen in the country's history.

Ninth District Convention Called for August 28th, 1912.

The Republican district committee of the Ninth congressional district of Virginia, met in Bristol on Monday and called a convention to be held in Bristol August 28th, to nominate a candidate for Congress. Congressman Slemm is willing to make the race for another term, but he is not a candidate in the sense of running for the nomination.

The meeting was well attended and Hotel Bristol, where it was held, was the mecca for a large gathering of prominent Republicans from all sections of the Ninth district. The only business transacted was the calling of the convention. The meeting was called to order by the Hon. P. J. Davenport, of Abingdon, district chairman.

Congressman C. B. Slemm was at the meeting and conferred with the visitors at length.

A rumor has been current that Mr. Summers was slated to make the race for Congress, but no statement to this effect was made Monday, and it is believed that he will not be a candidate for the nomination and will support Slemm.

Dr. J. M. Dougherty, of Nickelsville, Scott county, Va., a leading Roosevelt supporter, who made a speech in the Republican State convention at Roanoke for the Colonel, and who attended the Chicago convention in his behalf, being an alternate delegate from the Ninth district, was also present and conferred with party leaders from over the district.

Put Both Names on the Ticket.

Chicago, July 17.—A plan to put the name of Theodore Roosevelt on the regular Republican ticket in Illinois along with that of William H. Taft, in defiance of decision of the Republican national convention, has been suggested by leaders of the various warring factions of the party here. The plan is a compromise of fear to prevent putting a third State party in the field.

According to the plan, the names of Taft and Roosevelt will be printed under the Republican emblem. A square will be placed in front of each and the voters asked to indicate their choice by a cross.

The electors, according to the scheme, will be pledged to vote for the candidate receiving the highest vote under this plan. The plan could be legally carried out according to the Illinois election laws.

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

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

POULTRY

NESTS CAN BE KEPT CLEAN

Detailed Instructions With Illustration Showing How Nests are Made More Comfortable.

In order to make "easy to clean" nests, first take a sixteen-inch board (A), one inch thick and whatever length you desire to make your nests. Then fasten lings (B) on bottom side and fasten bottom to wall with hinges. Then make your partitions twenty by sixteen inches by twelve inches deep. Put a four-inch board in front of nest, carved out slightly as in illustration. The partitions, top and bottom (A), are fastened to nests with leather straps (C) hooked on nails. Another four-inch board (D), which is fastened to partitions, is placed in front of nests for the hens to fly on before entering the nests. When you want to clean nests unhook straps (C) and let bottom fall down. I find this an easy way to keep nests clean, writes E. H. Schulte in the Farm and Fire-life.
