NOTICE. The Southwestern Lunatic Asylum. AN ACT.

To provide for the establishment of a Lunatic Asylum in Southwest Virginia. (Approved March 18, 1884.)

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia: That Samuel H. McFerris, of Buchanan county; Richard H. Cox, of King William county; Ferdinand Rorer, of Roanoke county; E. W. Nickels, of Lexington; Emory Burns of Portsmouth; C. W. Stratton, of Lynchburg; Thomas Goode, of Mecklenburg; and Dr. E. Black, of Montgomery county, be, are hereby, constituted and appointed a Board of Commissioners for the purpose of selecting a site for another lunatic asylum, to be known as the Southwestern Lunatic Asylum, for the accommodation of white females, so that such site shall be selected at some point in this State west of New river having reference to eligibility of site, healthfulness of location, facility of construction, and local assistance; provided the county or corporation in which such site is selected shall donate to the Commonwealth sufficient lands or lots for the purpose of such site.

A majority of such Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. It shall be the duty of the said commissioners to meet at Central Depot, in Montgomery, on the 4th day of June, 1884, or as soon thereafter as practicable; and they shall, after selecting a president and secretary from among their own number, proceed forthwith to execute the duty required of them by this act, and report to the Board of Public Works. It shall be the duty of the secretary to the Board of Public Works at least four weeks before the meeting of said commissioners to give notice of such meeting by publication in at least one newspaper published in each of the counties interested, stating in said notice the object and nature of the act, and inviting upon the properly constituted authorities of any such county or corporation desiring the location of said asylum to indicate what inducements they offer in order to secure the location of the same. The actual and necessary travelling and other incidental expenses of the said commissioners shall be paid out of the sum hereinafter appropriated.

2. When the said commissioners shall have made the selection of a site for the asylum in pursuance of the foregoing section, and shall have secured a deed conveying to the Commonwealth a good and valid fee-simple title to the land selected as aforesaid, they shall make report to the Governor, and thereupon he shall convene the Board of Public Works, who shall forthwith take the necessary steps to procure from competent architects plans, designs, and specifications for buildings to be erected upon the site selected as aforesaid, and the sum of \$1,500 is hereby appropriated for the purpose of carrying out the provisions of this act and the preceding section to be audited by and paid on the order of the Board of Public Works. And it shall be the duty of the Board of Public Works to select from the plans to be submitted to them a plan for the said asylum buildings.

3. It shall be the duty of the Governor at the next meeting of the General Assembly to submit to it the report of the commissioners made to him, and the plans, designs and specifications selected by the Board of Public Works.

4. This act shall be in force from its passage.

Farm and Garden.

Plan your work and save worry. Let tool borrowers be sorrowers. Make manure fine before using it. Yellow corn is surest for cold land. The best hired help is the cheapest. Plant beets, peas and potatoes early. "Good fences make good neighbors." Fight stock vermin and plant insects. Keep dirt, etc., out of the wool-sacks. Chopped beets are good for milch cows. Sowing impure seeds brings evil weeds. Keep all farm tool, etc., in good repair. Sow fresh ground plaster with grass seed. Plaster is "no good" on damp, mucky soils. Bluegrass clover make the best pasture for hogs. It takes only one season to grow horse-radish in perfection. Wood-ashes is an excellent fertilizer for onions; none better. Use a currycomb on the cows to take out the loose hair. A good farmer may be known by the way he cares for his manure. Excessive and late cutting will help to run down an asparagus bed. By pinching back the buds of your oleander you may make it bloom in a pot next winter. The Virginia creeper is a fast grower as a vine around the house. In autumn it is of a beautiful color. Sugar of lead rubbed on the eruption caused by poison ivy is beneficial. It is a poison if taken inwardly. Give your hens pieces of old cabbage by a limb and so near the ground that they can peck at it. An English authority feeds to cows only the bottom of the turnip after the crown has been cut off, thus preventing the turnip flavor.


