



Boy Shoots His Cousins.

Sixteen Year-Old Edward Wright, of Wise County, Under Arrest.

Bristol, Va., August 8.—Edward Wright, the 16-year-old son of Paris Wright, of Virginia City, Wise county, was captured Thursday night at Dante, in Russell county, to which place he hastened after waylaying and shooting his cousins, Cowan Wiley and Cowan Wright. Young Wright used a shotgun, discharging its contents with the muzzle aimed at the heads of the men. Cowan Wright is in a serious condition with his face and head badly torn by the shot. Wiley received five shots but is not seriously hurt. No reason has been assigned for the shooting.

Main Expo. Building

Commodious Structure Stands on Elevation Overlooking the Pretty Lake.

The main building of the Appalachian Exposition, to be held in Knoxville, Tenn., Sept. 12 to Oct. 13, next, stands on an elevation overlooking the upper lake of the exposition grounds. A wide driveway extends along the lake front, and approaches to the building are formed by three flights of steps, two of them twenty-five feet and one fifty feet wide, running from this driveway over terraces that add much to the natural beauty of the location. The building is 150 feet wide and 250 feet in length, two stories, giving about 30,000 square feet of exhibit space. The lower floor will be agricultural products and displays that will be made by the cities and towns of the Southern Appalachian region. The upper floor, a section of which rests on solid ground—a terrace formed in grading the site—will be filled with exhibits of all kinds, from heavy machinery to the most delicate art work. In appearance the main building will surpass in beauty of architecture and finish the most costly exposition building that has been erected in this country. It is built with a view of housing permanent exhibits, and is, therefore, superior to any temporary exposition structures.

The horticultural and woman's building, the forestry building, the cattle and live stock and pet stock building, and other buildings are being arranged for.

McKinley Optimistic.

Makes Enthusiastic Prediction in the Coming Election.

Beverly, Mass., Aug. 8.—Representative W. B. McKinley, of Illinois, Chairman of the Republican Congressional Campaign Committee, went to Beverly Saturday afternoon with optimism of the rosiest possible hue and gave President Taft an enthusiastic forecast of the coming Congressional election.

Big Stone Gap, Va., August 8.—Prof. John A. Letter From R. Walter Dickenson.

To the Bristol Herald Courier.

Since so much has been said about my Abingdon speech, I feel that it is due you, it is due Henry Stuart, it is due me, and especially it is due the public that they know what I said on that occasion.

In the course of my remarks I referred to the fact that my home county, Russell, was also the home of Henry Stuart, the Democratic nominee; I referred to greatness of Russell; of how proud we were of our blue grass hills and fertile valleys, of our coal mines and our "cattle on a thousand hill," that we were proud of our Republican supremacy and did not propose to surrender it without a struggle, that we were proud of Henry Stuart, that he was one of the biggest and bravest men in the State, that above all, we were proud of our citizenship, proud that we are citizens of Russell county, a distinction that which there was none greater and that in view of this we fail to understand why Henry Stuart, with his good sense, his patriotism, his love for Virginia, and with his great wealth, would "declare" his wife and daughter non-residents instead of citizens of Russell, that were I as wealthy as Henry Stuart I would pay ten thousand dollars in tariff tolls rather than have my wife and daughter classed as foreigners; that I would prefer to have my wife and daughter recognized as plain citizens of Russell than citizens of Paris.

And this is the extent of my sinning along that line, and now Mr. Editor, lest we forget, I deliberately and dispassionately say it all again. If this be treason make the most of it.

Now, Mr. Editor, if you will stick to the text you may preach from now until November 8th, remembering always that misrepresentation and abuse do not constitute argument.

Now I want to say that no man in Virginia is a greater admirer of Henry Stuart than I; I regard him as one of the biggest, brainiest and best men in Virginia, and I expressed my intention more than once last year to vote for him for Governor had he been a candidate.

I am opposed to him for Congress, because I, with a great majority of the people of this district, believe that the progress and development of every interest in this district is contingent on the maintenance of the policy of protection and sound finance; the Republican party stands for and is committed to their maintenance; the Democratic party stands opposed to them.

I am for Bascom Slemple because he stands for Republican policies and is the equal of Henry Stuart in intellect, in culture, in morals, in social standing, in business capacity and in everything that goes to fit a man for the honorable position of representing the great Ninth district in the Congress of the United States. Pleases Hitchcock.

Has Brought About \$10,000,000 Reduction in Postal Deficit.

Washington, Aug. 8.—Postmaster-General Hitchcock was gratified when he returned home last week from Europe to learn of the fulfillment of his prediction of a \$10,000,000 reduction in the yearly postal deficit. The report of the auditor of the department showed the saving for the fiscal year to be \$11,573,000. The total amount of the deficiency for the twelve months ending June 30th was \$5,980,000, as against \$17,480,000 for the preceding fiscal year.

The savings for the year averaged nearly \$1,000,000 a month, a record never before attained. The Postmaster-General stated that during the coming year he hoped to make such further reductions in the cost of the postal service as would wipe out entirely the annual deficit and place the department on a self-supporting basis.

Figures for First Quarter of 1910 Show Big Increase Over Last Year.

Washington, August 9.—A considerable increase in the number of persons killed and injured on the railways of the United States during the months of January, February and March, 1910, is shown over the corresponding period of last year. The total number killed during the quarter was 1,100 and 21,232 were injured. This was an increase of 466 killed and 6,110 injured.

known citizens of Russell county, which recently appeared in the columns of the Lebanon News, of that county. Mr. Dickenson made a very strong point against Mr. Stuart in his speech at the Abingdon convention by pointing out the inconsistency and lack of patriotism and loyalty to his county and State in Mr. Stuart's efforts to register his wife and daughter as residents of a foreign country, which gave rise to his famous customs troubles. This is a thing calculated to affect both disagreeably and unfavorably every loyal and patriotic son and daughter of the Old Dominion, and the Lebanon paper has sought to retaliate on Mr. Dickenson by making a vicious and slanderous attack on him.

The Lebanon News has always been considered the personal organ of Mr. Stuart. It is through the columns of that paper that he has usually given principal publicity to his own views and position upon public questions. The public dislikes to think of Mr. Stuart in such a mean and despicable role as this of his local paper in making a vicious and malignant attack upon a private citizen of his own county; and especially in the light of the fact that Mr. Dickenson has, both in his address at Abingdon and in published letter since, spoken in high terms of Mr. Stuart personally.

If Mr. Stuart allows this thing to stand, the people of the Ninth district will hold him responsible for this villainous and unwarranted attack upon a man who stands as high as Mr. Dickenson does. Every voter in the Ninth district will expect him to compel a complete retraction by his local editor; otherwise, he must be the subject of the universal scorn and disgust that is always due a mere slanderer and villifier of personal character. There is nothing more vile, nothing that the people hate and despise more than such a cowardly and vicious attack upon a private citizen, and Mr. Stuart will be despised all the more from the fact that Mr. Dickenson is openly his personal friend, even though they are politically far apart.

Judgment upon Mr. Stuart will be suspended until he can have opportunity to set this matter right. If he does not prove his willingness to do so, he will be condemned by every fair-minded man and undoubtedly deserve, under the circumstances stated, all the opprobrium that can be heaped upon him. Few will doubt, however, that he will have entire retraction and reparation made.

Such a remarkable and unwarranted personal attack upon a private citizen, who is not involved in the campaign, is about the most disgraceful and uncalled-for thing that has arisen in a Ninth district campaign, and will be considered a significant and harsh evidence of Democratic campaign character and methods.

The Tariff and the Cost of Living.
 "To change the high cost of living on the present tariff bill is as unfair and inaccurate as any statement ever made by any public man in the history of politics."—Captain Lamb, in his speech Thursday night, August 4, 1910.

After making this statement Capt. John Lamb won the Democratic nomination over Judge Wickham in the Richmond district last Tuesday. Here is a Democratic member of Congress who voted for a tariff on lumber, and who boldly announces that there is nothing in the Democratic charge that the high cost of living is due to the present tariff bill. He says "it is unfair and inaccurate" to make such a statement. The voters of the Third district say you are right. How does this sound to the Democratic leaders in the Ninth district who are making the "high cost of living" and the tariff their chief issue? Captain Lamb denies their contention flatly and abruptly. He is sustained by his people, although he announced that he would have voted for a tariff of \$1.80 or \$1.75 on lumber.

Being admonished that his speeches would injure Stuart in the Ninth district, Capt. Lamb declared "that Mr. Stuart could not win on a platform of free trade and approximate free trade, and had too much sense to try it. He said he knew the people of that district, and that a free trade campaign would overwhelm the Democrats there."

"Approximate free trade" or "tariff for revenue" is what the Democratic leaders in the Ninth are clamoring for. This is their campaign, and just as the Third district Congressman predicts they will meet with overwhelming defeat. Democrats who believe in protection should be consistent and vote for Slemp, who stands by the party that believes in protection.

Gaynor is Shot.
 New York City's Chief Executive Falls by the Hand of an Assassin,
 Hoboken, N. J., Aug. 10.—William J. Gaynor, Mayor of New York City, was shot in the head and seriously wounded yesterday as he stood on the promenade deck of the steamship Wilhelm der Grosse, by James J. Gallagher, a discharged and disgruntled city employe. Gallagher was almost instantly overpowered and arrested.

The shot was fired at 9:45 o'clock yesterday morning, fifteen minutes before the steamship was due to leave her pier at Hoboken, N. J., and the Mayor was receiving God speed from a group of friends preparatory to a vacation trip to Europe. The bullet struck him behind the right ear and ranged downward, inflicting a dangerous, though not necessarily fatal, wound. Unless blood poison develops surgeons are hopeful of the Mayor's recovery, although at his age—59 years—such a wound is essentially grave.

Gallagher made a statement to the police, in which he said that he came over to Hoboken yesterday morning, went to the pier, where he had a clergyman point out the mayor to him, and then fired. He said he knew that the mayor was going to Europe to enjoy himself after depriving him (Gallagher) of bread and butter, and he was irritated to the point of committing the act.

and the last shall be first.—Matt. 19:30.

The main industries of the days of the Great Tribulation of Palestine were once terraced and irrigated. On our recent visit we noted with interest the survival of this custom, as one of the evidences of the Holy Land.—Acts 3:19-21.

The Father is the husbandman." "Herein is my Father glorified, that I bear much fruit;" "Every branch in me which beareth fruit he pruneth that it may bring forth more fruit;" "Every branch in me that beareth not fruit he taketh away."

Our present Study, the Parable of the Laborers, is in full accord with the foregoing, but shows the matter from a different standpoint. It shows how each one of the Lord's consecrated Church, each heir of the Messianic Kingdom shortly to be established, is privileged to be a co-laborer with his Lord and Master and with the Heavenly Father in the vineyard work—tending the vine, looking out for the injurious pests, keeping the soil in good condition, assisting every way in the production of "much fruit" and of fine quality. Evidently many Christian people do not appreciate the privilege of being laborers in the Church of Christ—"building one another up in the most holy faith" until we all come to the full stature of a man in the Anointed One.

St. Paul appreciated this privilege greatly, saying, God hath made us qualified servants of the New Covenant. So then we, as ambassadors for God, beseech men. Be ye reconciled to God. (2 Corinthians 5:20.) Whoever is negligent of his opportunities to serve others who manifest a hearing ear, a humble heart and a teachable spirit shows his own lack of appreciation of God's message. He thus indicates that he has not come to a knowledge of God nor to a knowledge of the Truth respecting the Divine Plan. And indeed the Scriptures declare that a deep knowledge of God, his Word and his purposes, is attained only as a gift of God, bestowed only upon those who are in a humble, faithful, zealous attitude of mind—"To you it is given to know the mysteries of the Kingdom of God."


The things pertaining to God's Kingdom, in its future operation toward the world for a thousand years, will be openly manifested to every creature, shortly. But now it is appropriate, and is the Divine will, that these things should be known only to the Church, the consecrated, the spirit-begotten sons of God. Likewise there are important truths pertaining to the Kingdom class, the Church, which is being prepared to be the Bride of Christ and his joint-heirs in the Kingdom. And these things are likewise intended to be comparatively secret—to be clearly and full understood only by such as have made a covenant with the Lord by sacrifice. (Psalms 50:5.) "The secret of the Lord is with them that reverence him, and he will show them his Covenant." (Psalms 25:14.) All such in close sympathy with the Divine purposes will be anxious to serve the Lord, the Truth and the brethren. And such from time to time will be specially sent into the Vineyard, and will be specially used of the Lord for the assistance of his consecrated people in various ways.

The word "penny" here is from the Greek *denarius*, a silver coin of about 17 cents value. But the value of money has so changed in recent years that today a laborer's wage in proportion to other things would be considerable more. The *denarius* was the Roman standard of that time, as the *lira* is the Italian standard, the *mark* the German standard, the *franc* the French standard, the shilling the English standard and the dollar the American standard. It is worthy of note that in one of the fine old English cathedrals the records show that its excellent chisel work, superior to anything of today, cost "A penny a day and a bag of meal for each laborer." The parable of our lesson is evidently intended to teach that God will give all that he has agreed to all who labor—that he may in generosity give more than he has stipulated.

At the close of the day, we read, those first hired murmured against their lord. We cannot suppose that any who would be counted worthy of a share in the Kingdom would murmur against the Giver of all Good. The rewarding is to be expected at the close of the harvest day and the murmuring may be expected there also. The "penny" or reward would thus seem to be something of the joys, blessings, honors and privileges of God's people in the present life, at the close of this age. Those who murmur that they do not receive a sufficiency of honor and distinction and of Divine acknowledgment will be thereby proving themselves unfit for the future service "beyond the veil," as members of the Church in glory. This would seem to point a warning to those of God's people who have been long in the Truth and who have had great privileges of service, that if they murmur against the blessings and rewards coming to them, it will mean that they were laboring for the reward merely and not appreciating the privilege of being laborers with Christ and with the Father; it would imply that they had failed to enter into the spirit of the wonderful privileges granted them of serving the Lord, the Truth and the brethren. The right spirit, the proper interest in the Father's work and in the brethren should prompt all to rejoice with every new laborer and to be glad that all such should receive of the Lord's favors, blessings and enlightenment as fully, as freely, as themselves. Surely any who have not this spirit have not the spirit of Christ on this subject.

The general lesson is that God is so just, so generous, so bountiful, in his dealings that all those who appreciate matters from his standpoint will rejoice in the blessings which overflow upon others. A failure to appreciate the Lord's generosity was one cause of stumbling to the Jews eighteen centuries ago—they were offended that the Gospel message should go out beyond them to the Gentiles. Similarly today some Christian people are stumbling over the fact that the Word of God shows that, whereas Divine blessings are now confined to the Church, "the elect," the servants and handmaidens of the Gospel Age, yet the time is near at hand when "God will pour out his spirit upon all flesh," and when all the families of the earth shall be blessed.

All who have the privilege of bearing the labor and heat of the day in the Lord's service must be glad of the privilege, in order to be worthy of participation in the Kingdom. Thus some who seem to be first in their promptness to respond to the Lord's call for laborers may be amongst the last to receive special blessings of grace and Truth and this may serve as a special test upon them—as respects their loyalty, and the motives which actuated them in engaging in the Vineyard work.



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
