Ms. Judith Griffith Takes Poison in Railway Station in Roanoke.

Roanoke, Va., Nov. 14.—Miss Judith Griffith, nineteen years old, committed suicide at the Norfolk & Western Railway station last evening by taking poison. Her father and mother live here. Her suicide is attributed to despondency, occasioned by the death of her sweet heart, a prominent business man.

Miss Griffith was a handsome girl of the brunette type and had many friends. Her tragic death has caused general regret here.

State Hospital for the Inebriates.

Dr. J. C. King, Superintendent of the Southwestern State Hospital at Marion, recommends the establishment of a State hospital for inebriates and victims of the drug habit. Dr. King states that recently a great number of patients of this class have been sent to the State hospitals for the insane and that their number is increasing so rapidly that the time has come for the State to make some provision for them.

Dr. King is of the opinion that such an institution should be devoted exclusively to the curing of the drink and drug habits and that patients should be committed to it for a period of not less than two years, on the application of relatives or friends. He would remove the penal feature as far as possible, but thinks for the good of the patients that they should be compelled to perform some kind of manual labor.

It is expected that this question will be presented to the consideration of the next legislature.

An Accidental Discharge of Gun Tore Out His Heart.

Bristol, Tenn., Nov. 14.—Tate L. Earnest, cashier of the Unaka National Bank, of Johnson City, Tenn., and for many years prominent in Tennessee banking circles, was accidentally shot to death while hunting last Saturday. He fell while crossing a barbed wire fence and his gun was discharged, a heavy charge of shot tearing out his heart. His tragic fate brought deep gloom to the people of his home town. He was forty-eight years of age and is survived by five children, his wife having died two years ago.

He was a brother of the wife of R. Walter Dickenson, a former State Senator and wealthy resident of Virginia.

Every Southern State shows an increase over 1909, the largest increase in any State being that of Texas.

The District Lines May Be Changed.

Inasmuch as the next Legislature will be called upon to re-district the State as to Congressional representation as a result of the Federal census of 1910, there is some discussion in political circles of the probability of re-arranging the lines of the Fifth, Ninth and probably other Virginia districts. No accurate forecast of just what will be done can be ventured until after Congress shall have designated the basis of representation. It is probable that this matter will be taken up at the coming short session.

RIVAL OPINIONS.

Two factions present contending opinions on this point. One wishes to increase the membership of the House so as to leave the apportionment of voters to population as at present, while the other would require that more people elect each Congressman and leave the total membership as at present. Whatever may be done, it seems certain that the House chamber must be enlarged if the membership is to grow, since it is now crowded to what appears to be the limit.

Among the speculations which may be indulged in as to Virginia, it is possible that the lines of the Ninth district must be changed. The population of that section has grown at such an enormous rate within recent years, largely because of the industrial development, that a re-arrangement may become a necessity. Should the State still have ten Congressmen, as at present, under the new arrangement, some of the counties must be taken from the Ninth. It is estimated that this district contains sixty per cent. more people than does the Tenth, which which is second among the Virginia districts as to population.

POSSIBLE CHANGES.

With ten Congressmen, it would be necessary to take Giles and Pulaski, and perhaps Bland and Wythe, away from the Ninth. These counties constitute the Fifth Senatorial district, and gave Stuart a majority of about 450 last Tuesday. Giles is always Democratic, and Pulaski is close, while Bland is about a tie, and Wythe has been largely Republican of late years. Of course, this arrangement would incidentally make the district hopelessly Republican.

In the event, however, that Congress decides to cut down the number of members of the House, and if this should result in the loss of a representative from Virginia, the district might not be changed at all. However, it would then be likely that some counties would be added to the Fifth, which would probably be Democratic, perhaps solidifying that district. It would be the natural thing to do this, as the logical county to add is Halifax, which is heavily Democratic.

It is exceedingly improbable that Carroll or Grayson would be placed in the Ninth. To do this would require taking away a great many of the Ninth's counties, and, besides, their population is needed in the Fifth to make up the required number for a Congressman.

As before said, nothing approaching an estimate can be made until Congress acts, these deductions being speculative.

May Appoint Postmaster This Month.

Now that the election is over it is highly probable that the appointment of a postmaster for Bristol will be made this month or almost any day after President Taft returns from his Panama trip. The contest over the office, as to whether it shall go to Bristol, Va., or remain as Tennessee patronage, will be re-newed and fought over again. Congressman Slemm won over the late Congressman Walter P. Brownlow and had President Taft nominate Gaylord F. Goodell. This time the fight is between Mr. Slemm and Congressman Sells, who takes his seat March the 4th.

The friends of both are confident. Mr. Slemm had Goodell nominated and his friends believe that he can have his nomination released by President Taft and put through the Senate while the Sells people seem to have no doubt but that their representative can name the postmaster for Bristol for the term of four years. Anyhow the job is a nice plum—paying about \$3,200 annually, and there will be a lively fight between Sells and Slemm for it. It may result in two Congressmen measuring strength with President Taft and Postmaster General Hitchcock.—Bristol Herald Courier.

Treasurer's Lists.

The democrats have discovered a fresh mare's nest up in Smyth county. It is in shape of a large number of voters whose names appear on the qualified list and also on the delinquent list. The same condition exists in this (Washington) county where we have a democratic treasurer. In some instances the error is due to a double assessment, but in the great majority of cases, it is simply a matter of bad bookkeeping. An examination of the two lists in this county will reveal more errors, precisely of the same kind, than is reported from Smyth county. A voter fails to pay his poll tax and his name is recorded on the delinquent list. Afterward he pays up and takes a receipt which entitles him to have his name on the qualified list. In the rush of business, it often happens that no note is made on the delinquent list that this particular voter has paid up, and his name appears on both lists. There is nothing criminal in this, for the State gets the money. It is simply a matter of neglect, a case of bad bookkeeping.

If those panic stricken people of Smyth who discovered this harmless irregularity will come to this county we will show them similar conditions by the score, and still no one here has been silly enough to raise a howl about it.—Virginia Republican.

The facts as above stated will no doubt appear in most every county in the State. For comparison's sake the last voting list of our former Treasurer, George W. Wright, was checked up with the delinquent list for the three years 1904, 1905 and 1906 and was found to contain 145 names that were on the delinquent books for these three years. Now we do not charge anything improper or wrong with Mr. Wright's list, but it is clear proof of how these discrepancies and errors may get through an office during a period of three years here more than 12,000 assessments are handled. As a rule county officials do their work with ordinary care but put detectives on their tracks who are stimulated by partizan zeal and looking for political capital and they will find, as a rule, something wrong with the most upright and honest official our State affords.

When such papers as the Abingdon Virginian, which is bitterly partizan, and the Southwest Times, Stuart's chief organ in the district, conceded the election of Mr. Slempp it is time for the other fellows to quit chirping.

Returns give Saunders 67 majority in the 5th District. The Democratic press say this is a safe majority, but 231 in the 9th District is not safe. A strange kind of reasoning but it is in keeping with democratic logic.

Bob Taylor was defeated in Tennessee for Governor by more than 12,000, and Stuart was defeated in the Ninth district by more than 200. These are not safe majorities and you hear talk of contest in Tennessee and in the Ninth district. Over in the Fifth district Sanders wins by only 67, but that is a safe majority. Such is Democratic consistency.

Wise County Roads.

On November 22d Wise county is to vote on a proposed issue of \$700,000 good road bonds and the action of the county is of interest throughout the State, not alone on account of the large amount of the proposed issue, but because should it carry it will serve as a stimulus to the other counties to take similar steps. The eyes of all good road advocates in the State will be turned Wise-ward on next Tuesday.

POPULATION.

"Between 1890 and 1900, the county's population increased one hundred and ten per cent; that is from 9,300 to 19,653, and since that date the increase has been very rapid; so that in all probability, the population is now largely in excess of 30,000. At any rate, the new census soon to be made public will no doubt show Wise county to be among the most progressive in the county.

REVENUES.

"A few years ago Wise county's revenues were insufficient to pay her own criminal expenses, and she had to draw upon the State treasury for help in this regard. Now her assessed values, about half or less of her actual values, is near \$12,000,000; and she has all the money she needs for schools and public improvements. She has built at a cost of \$40,000 one of the best court houses in Southwest Virginia, and one of the largest and best jails. She has built eight or ten steel bridges over her rivers, and there are now eight more under contract in the county.

Beef and Pork Prices Tumble.

Chicago, Nov. 16.—The prices of beef and pork are falling. Within the last week the price of beef has been reduced between four and five cents a pound by the meat packers. The price of pork has declined about three cents from the price of eighteen and twenty cents a week ago, and wholesale meat dealers say that mutton and veal and other products of the packing houses will take a downward turn within the next few days.

"Prices of first grades of beef have been falling for about a week," said Frank A. Froehling. "They did not go off all at once, but the packing houses have been coming down about half a cent at a time until now the price of prime beef is bringing four and five cents lower than it was last week at this time and that of the best grades of pork is from two to three cents lower.

"This applies, of course, to the fine roast beef and steaks, for the ordinary quality has not fallen off, and I do not think it will."


Baptists Meet.
