"Bob" Taylor Dead.

Washington, April 1.—Senator Robert L. Taylor, of Tennessee, died at Providence Hospital, this city, shortly after nine o'clock yesterday morning following a protracted illness and a severe operation three days ago for gallstones. The remains were taken to Nashville for burial.

With the passing of Senator Taylor, one of the most remarkable political characters of his time has gone. His whole life was romantic. By his lectures, his light hearted campaigns for office and his happy view of either victory or defeat he won the title of "Apostle of Sunshine." Throughout the mountain country from which he came he was in his youth known as "Fiddling Bob," and this name he carried with him even to the halls of the United States senate.

Senator Taylor was born in Happy Valley, Tenn., July 31, 1850, at the place on the Watauga river where the first fort was established by Jno. Sevier. His father was Nathaniel G. Taylor, Congressman and Commissioner of Indian affairs under President Johnson. His mother was Emily Haynes Taylor, sister of Landon C. Haynes, Confederate senator, and perhaps the greatest orator Tennessee ever produced.

Engineer Killed in Wreck Near Wytheville.

Engineer Patti, whose home was at Pulaski, was killed and several others were injured when a double-header freight train on the Norfolk and Western railroad struck a huge boulder that had fallen from a cliff near Wytheville, Va., at five o'clock Monday morning. Fireman Frank Hughes, of Bristol, was scalded and had one foot seriously injured, necessitating amputation. Engineer Chas Mason, of Bristol, was scalded, but was not seriously injured. Reed Corvin, a fireman, was scalded but not dangerously injured.

The wreck occurred in a deep stone cut and nine freight cars left the track, while the engines fell against the side of the cut. It is believed that the injured will all recover. The body of the dead engineer was taken to his home at Pulaski.

It took nearly two days to clear away the wreck and all trains were delayed for hours.

Over 300 Indictments.

Freeling, Va., April 1.—Judge Skeen's court at Clintwood has adjourned, after being in session for nearly two weeks. Friel Allen Captured at His Father's Home.

Hillsville, Va., April 1.—Friel Allen, blue eyed stripling of seventeen, the youngest of the eight of the Allen gang, each indicted for the five murders in the Carroll county court house, a fortnight ago, was taken last Friday evening in a carriage shed at the home of his father, Jack Allen, eight miles from here. He cheerfully submitted to arrest, and was taken to Hillsville jail and occupied the cell with his cousin, Claude Swanson Allen, who surrendered without resistance to the detectives several days ago.

Friel Allen deserted the two men still at large and brought back their ultimatum of defiance—both are prepared to resist until death.

The mountaineer of slender build and boyish face was unhandcuffed and cantered into town with smiles and nods to those who recognized him. He showed, however, the effects of two weeks with little food or shelter.

In the dialect of the mountains he told his story, heeding interruptions and answering all questions.

"Uncle Sidna told me," related the boy with unrestrained frankness, "that he never expected to see his family again." He hopes the detectives will get discouraged so that he can get away, but if they keep after him, I think he will shoot while trying to kill them. He will never surrender. He did not like it when I left him, and told me I was making a mistake, but I was tired and hungry.

"Uncle Sidna said he shot his pistol empty three times. He always was angry with Judge Massie. He said he shot Judge Massie, and that Wesley shot Mr. Foster. Uncle Sidna said that he intended to get as many of the court officers as he could. When he was shooting at the people in the street, he really did not know he was firing at any of the jury. He said he saw men running and thought they needed shooting at.

"The day after the shooting, Uncle Sidna, Cousin Wesley and I went to the mountains. Wesley had two pistols and Uncle Sidna had a revolver and a shot-gun, and we all had plenty of shells. We got plenty of rations for awhile. We were on the ridge and were hidden under a ledge of leaves. From there we moved to another rock and saw the officers raid my Aunt Albert's house.

"Some of the detective came within 15 or 20 feet of us. I wanted to leave, but Uncle Sidna said if the detectives came closer he would fire.

"Uncle Sidna was shot in the arm at the court house and the same bullet went into his side and back, and it is still there. His hurts were fixed by one of the family, no doctor saw him so far as I know. At daylight Monday, Uncle Sidna got some food in a sack. We had plenty of crackers, butter and sugar, and we shacked in the ivy and laurel bushes for ten days, but with nothing else to eat except crackers. Several days ago I decided to leave and we separated. I was just started out. I left them on the mountain three miles from Piper's Gap road.

Will Be Held Late.

Bristol, Va., April 1.—Republican leaders in the Ninth Virginia district are authority for the statement that the Republican convention to nominate a candidate for Congress in the district will not be held until after the national convention in Chicago. The district committee has yet to name the time and place for the convention. It is accepted as a foregone conclusion that Representative C. B. Slemp, who is also State chairman of the party in Virginia, will be nominated to succeed himself.

Claude Allen Captured.

Hillsville, Va., March 30.—Starving, sleepless and fatigued, Claude Swanson Allen, the name-sake of a United States senator, came out of the laurel thicket in the Blue Ridge yesterday, pointed two six-shooters toward the sky, and gave himself to the posse which for two weeks has hunted him. Complacent and almost happy he sat last night, sheltered from a driving storm by the little brick jail a stone's throw from the Carroll county court house, where on March 14th, the Allen gang venally killed the judge, the prosecutor, the sheriff, a juror and a bystander.

In the presence of a detective, Young Allen described his own part in the court house tragedy, admitted that he had seen Sidna Allen shoot and that he himself had aimed for Clerk Goad's head four times. He told a graphic story of the assassination.

"I don't know who started the shooting," said Allen. "After it began I shot four times at Clerk Goad and aimed for his head every time. I saw Uncle Sidna shoot at somebody, but don't know who. When the shooting in the court house had ended, I then went outside and saw Uncle Sidna on the ground shooting at Clerk Goad, so I shot at him, too. My brother, Victor, called to me to stop, but I had shot all my cartridges. Then we all went away."

It has developed that Allen was really taken in North Carolina, probably one hundred and fifty yards over the line.

The young mountaineer swung in between the men of the posse and they started back to Hillsville. His pained eyes and roughened face confirmed his plea of exhaustion, but his broad shouldered form towered above the men who had taken him.

"I could have shot you," said Allen, as he smiled and nodded toward Detective Lucas, "but I was a little excited at having you come upon me so soon. Anyway, I did not want to have to kill anybody."

Some bread and a casket of water were found hidden in the thicket, and Allen said it was all he had been living upon for several days. His capture gives re-newed hope of the capture of the three remaining fugitives—Sidna Allen, his nephew, Friel, and Wesley Edwards.

A movement has been started among Virginia women to present a gold medal to Jaz-bel Goad, the daughter of Clerk Goad, who ran to his side when he was under the fire of the Allen gang and brought a freshly loaded pistol for her father to continue the battle. Mrs. Wm H. Mann, wife of the governor, is heading the movement.

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Ohio Committee Endorses Mr. Taft.

Columbus, O., April 1.—With a control of 15 to 21 members, the Republican State Central committee endorsed the President's administration, promised to support his candidacy, defeated a plan to give Colonel Roosevelt a complimentary resolution and voted to choose Ohio's 42 District delegates to the National convention by a primary. The delegates at large, it was decided, will be chosen at the State convention.

The only victory accorded the Roosevelt supporters was in the adoption of the direct primary plan for the selection of the forty-two district delegates. The resolution which passed fifteen to five said:

"Be it resolved, That we hereby approve and endorse the splendid administration of President Taft. He has been true to the people, faithful to the principles of the Republican party, courageous and impartial in the enforcement of law, wise and patriotic in the administration of affairs at home and abroad. We proudly proclaim our allegiance to the Republican party and standing on its principles, heartily and without reserve or qualification pledge our earnest, continuous and united support for the re-nomination and re-election of Ohio's great son, William Howard Taft."

Charged With Murder.

Charles Scott, the 23-year old son of H. H. Scott, the latter proprietor of Hotel Belmont, Abingdon, is in jail at Titusville, Fla., charged with murder. Young Scott has been denied bail and will be given a hearing at Titusville next Wednesday.

The alleged murder occurred several days ago and H. H. Scott, the father, and Attorney Henry Widener, of the firm of Falkner, Page and Widener, are now at Titusville preparing for the young man's defense.

It seems that a farmer and citizen of the county in which the town of Titusville is located, was robbed and murdered. His body was found and shortly thereafter suspicion fell upon young Scott, who was promptly arrested. The news of his plight was sent to his father and the latter hurried to Florida, taking with him Attorney Widener. The attorney returned this week, but left the following day for Florida again.—Bristol Herald Courier.

A Flood of Oil.

Rev. T. W. Clark, of Rugby, Va., in a letter to the Pearisburg Virginian, subscribing himself "Prophet, alias Victorious Fili Dex," gives warning of a great flood of coal oil that will burst in the county of Wythe or Smyth on or near the head waters of the middle fork of Holston river in the year 1912 or 1913. He declares it will be like the Johnstown flood and the only hope of escape for the people will be to flee to the tops of the hills. Fortunately in the event of this catastrophe there are a plenty of hills in that locality. This great flood of oil was enacted in a vision and was seen by the prophet as it will occur. Speaking of it in the past tense he says:

"Please state that the bulk or head of that cloud burst in Smyth or Wythe was forty-five fathoms deep to the best of my judgment. I was there in person and by keeping men ahead on horses saved most of the people on the river at the noted shallow ford in Washington county. It was half way up the knobs. It kept with the meanders of the river."

A coal oil flood will be a very interesting occurrence. Instead of reporting to the Pearisburg Virginian he should have notified John D. Rockefeller. It may not yet be too late.—Richmond Journal.

Bristol, Va., Postoffice is Assured.

A. P. Crockett, private secretary to Congressman C. B. Slemm, was a visitor in the city Monday on his return to Washington from a brief trip to Wise county. Mr. Crockett is a prominent Republican and one of the delegates from the Ninth Congressional district to the Republican National convention at Chicago.

Speaking of the Bristol, Va., postoffice, Mr. Crockett said that the office would have been established by this time but for a temporary hitch in the arrangements. He said that the matter would be worked out and that the office will soon be in operation with G. E. Goodell in charge as postmaster. He said that he felt absolutely confident that it would be established before the Chicago convention in June.—Bristol Herald Courier.

Parcels Post.

Country is Awakening to the Great Advantage That Such a System Would Bring.

Most people do not know that in carrying packages by mail our government actually discriminates against its own people in favor of other nations. But such is the case and here are the facts:

Our Postoffice Department at Washington has "conventions," or agreements, with twenty-nine other nations by which it carries packages weighing up to eleven pounds from any postoffice in this country to any postoffice in those countries for twelve cents per pound. For twelve cents a pound you can mail from your postoffice packages weighing eleven pounds to London, Berlin, Vienna, Stockholm, Rio Janeiro, Valparaiso, Jerusalem, Melbourne, Tokio, Peking, Mukden and to more than 10,000 other foreign postoffices scattered all over the globe. But a package mailed from your office to the next in the United States must not exceed four pounds in weight, and the carrying charge is sixteen cents for each pound. As though these discriminations were not enough, our Postmaster-General has made arrangements with the British postoffice authorities recently, whereby mail packages up to eleven pounds are carried from any postoffice in England, Scotland, Ireland or Wales to any postoffice in the United States for the following charges: Up to seven pounds for 55 cents; up to eleven pounds for 76 cents. By this agreement a British subject can send eleven pounds in one package from his postoffice to your postoffice for 76 cents, while you wishing to mail matter weighing eleven pounds to your nearest postoffice in this country, must break it up into three packages of not over four pounds each, and pay \$1.76 postage, a discrimination of 100 per cent. against you. As allowed by law, the Postmaster-General is steadily extending these special privileges to foreign nations, which is best and right for all concerned. On the other hand, the only change Congress has made in carrying parcels for our own people, during the last fifty years, is that in 1875 it raised the postage on parcels from eight to sixteen cents per pound, that is just doubled the cost. Several Parcels Post bills are now before Congress, and the Senate committee on post-offices and post-roads, of which Jonathan Bourne is chairman, is hard at work gathering all available information on the subject. It is reasonable to believe that ere long, when the data have all been gathered and duly considered, the Senate committee will announce a new bill acceptable to all who desire a Parcels Post. Congress should provide a Parcels Post service somewhat as follows:

1. Carry packages originating and ending on the same Rural Route at a nominal cost, because the income therefrom would be nearly all profit to the government.
2. Establish Parcels Post zones, or circles of 50, 200, etc., miles radiating from each postoffice; make a low carrying charge within the first zone, because of the short haul, and the large volume of business that would result.
3. Enlarge the weight limit on parcels carried on Rural Routes to not less than twenty-five pounds, and

elsewhere to not less than eleven pounds. With a low carrying charge on Rural Routes and within the first zone, the farmer will be able to order by telephone or postal card, and quickly obtain from nearby places of business tools, hobs, small implements, plow points, parts of machinery, seeds, plants, dry goods, groceries, medicines, drugs, bread, etc. In turn he can send to merchants in towns and villages many of the smaller products of the farm, garden, poultry yard, etc. There are now 42,000 routes serving 20,000,000 farmers, operated at an estimated cost of about \$42,000,000 for the year 1912. The stamps canceled, the mail matter taken from the rural mail boxes the present year will amount to rather less than \$8,000,000, leaving an apparent deficit of over \$34,000,000 for the year 1912. It is hard to call the latter sum, the real loss, because the Rural Routes should be credited with part of the postal receipts on mail the farmers receive emanating on same route. If each Rural Carrier could earn 10 cents daily by carrying packages the total returns for the 42,000 carriers would be about \$1,250,000 annually. They should earn many times this small sum, besides benefiting all parties concerned. The average outward rural mail load is about twenty-five pounds and the return about five pounds—it could and should be ten or fifteen times that. The rural mail carriers have petitioned the government to let them render greater service. No other business is conducted on such narrow lines. The adoption of the Rural Mail Service was one of the most beneficent acts ever placed on the statute books by Congress. To round out and complete our postal system there is needed a Parcels Post service.



FEED FOR INCREASED WEIGHT

Where it is intended to Place Sheep on Market Following Spring Grain Should Be Corn and Oats.

If the sheep keeper is feeding to increase weight, that is, feeding to place the sheep on the market the following spring, writes an Iowa breeder in an exchange, the grain ration should be corn and oats, when alfalfa or clover are provided as the roughness. If the roughness is corn fodder and straw, considerable bran should be added to the supply of rations.


Usually about a month or so after harvest, if there is a good crop of wheat, the price of bran is lower than at any other time of the year, and it is then that I lay in my supply.

If the breeder has none but breeding ewes, then the ration should be oats and bran, or bran, oats and peas at the rate of two parts oats, one part bran and one part peas. If fodder is to be the principal part of the forage a small supply of oil meal should be laid in.

FORM FOR A CONCRETE TANK

One Shown in Illustration That Will Not Break and Will Come Out Easily.

I have found an inside form for building concrete tanks that is a great improvement on anything that I have yet seen. You cannot possibly break it, and it comes out easily 24 hours after the tank is poured, says a writer in Farm and Home. The form is made

in four pieces, but instead of being cut at the corners, the cut is made just around the corner in each case, as shown in the illustration.

The best way to make it is to build it of the required size, then take a saw and cut down the sides a few inches from each corner, as at A. Make these cuts diagonal, so the form will pull apart easily. Then nail a board, B, securely over each cut, and allow the nail heads to project slightly, so that they can easily be pulled with a hammer.

Good Fodder for Fodder.
While fodder when given out of doors should be fed in racks and not on the ground, it is imperative for the ground surrounding the racks to slope away in all directions, and often it would be better still if the drained.

Dry Shed for Sheep.
Sheep should have a good dry shed to sleep and rest in during the fall of the year and preferably should be shut in in such shed over night to assure against their not straying out during rains, as they often do if they are not shut in.

Hog's Thin Covering.
It should be remembered that a hog's coat of hair is not heavy nor of the kind to keep out extreme cold. Consequently it feels the change in temperature most keenly.
