stay. Some sort of contract
with him we must have. We can-
not escape his influence. We did not
escape it when he was a chattle slave.
The "institution" powerfully affec-
ted our civilization. Despise him
as you please, he is still
among us. We could not, if we
would, bar him from all civil privi-
leges. Little enough does he get
from the public schools; but it is
something. It would be a
misfortune to take it from him.
Yet more serious is the fact that
such a distribution of the school
fund is a virtual attack on the prin-
ciple underlying the entire system.
If it is sound policy to divide the
school fund between the races ac-
cording to the amount paid in, then
we have only to go a step further
and divide among individuals ac-
cording to the amounts paid in—in
other words, abandon public schools
altogether."

HARRISON'S WILL.

Bulk of His Estate Left His Wife During
Her Life.

Indianapolis, Ind., March 19.—
The will of General Harrison was
filed for probate today. He bequeaths
to the Union Trust Company, as
trustee, \$125,000 to be invested, the
interest to be paid to his wife during
the term of her life. To his wife he
also leaves \$15,000, to his daughter
Elizabeth, \$10,000, to be paid to his
wife as trustee. He leaves \$10,000
to be invested for his grandson,
Benjamin Harrison McKee. To each
of his grandchildren, Mary Lodge
McKee, Marthaena Harrison and
William Henry Harrison, he leaves
the sum of \$2,500.

The will provides that if another
child should be born it shall receive
\$10,000. If a boy he shall bear my
name, and my sword and sash shall
be given to him instead of to my son
Russell."

Russell Harrison's debts to his
father are remitted. The residuary
estate is equally divided among the
children of Russell Harrison and
General Harrison's two daughters.

PRESERVING THE BIG TREES.

Efforts to Prevent the Destruction of the California Forest Giants.

The women's clubs of this state are persevering in their efforts to save the Calaveras grove as a legacy to posterity. Mrs. Emma Shafter Howard has opened correspondence on the subject with many influential men in Washington. Senator Hoar, of Massachusetts, suggests in a letter written to the subject that California ought to have intelligence and public spirit enough to save her wonderful trees, says the San Francisco Chronicle.

The suggestion is pertinent, but the nation as well as the state has an interest in their preservation. The senator adds that his state would not ask any help of the federal government if she had them, which is probably true; but Massachusetts has a larger permanent population and greater wealth than California, while the proximity of the grove to a national park in this state naturally suggests their union and their subsequent care under one patrol. Mr. Hoar promises, however, to aid the senators from his state in their efforts to secure favorable action by congress.

Another letter of special value on the subject has been received from the secretary of the American Forestry association, in which the cooperation of the women's clubs of California with that organization in all kindred projects to that of the preservation of Calaveras grove is cordially invited. In this letter there is a friendly intimation that heroes should supplant hysterics in the work of saving the forests of the country from destruction, and the hint will probably not be thrown away.
