Justice Harlan Dead.

Washington, Oct. 16.—Associate Justice John Marshall Harlan, of the United States Supreme court, died at his home here last Saturday morning of bronchitis, aged seventy-eight.

Justice Harlan was a member of the Supreme court. He was the foremost constitutional authority. He was prominent in the Presbyterian church. Justice Harlan was ill less than a week. He sat on the bench a week ago when court heard arguments in the coal trust cases. On Tuesday, Chief Justice White announced that Justice Harlan was "slightly ill." His condition was more serious than his colleagues realized. Wednesday Justice Harlan was worse, but his alarming condition was unknown at the Supreme court. Friday night he grew worse and death came Saturday morning. Justice Harlan's service on the bench extended over thirty-three years, ten months and twenty-five days. His service was longer than any other justice except Marshall and Field.

John Marshall Harlan was born in Boyle county, Ky., June 1, 1833. He graduated at Center college in 1850, and in the law department of Transylvania University in 1853; was an unsuccessful Whig candidate for Congress in 1859; raised the Tenth Kentucky infantry for the Union army, and was commissioned its colonel in 1861; Attorney General in Kentucky, 1863-67; defeated for Governor in 1871-1875; member of Louisiana Investigating commission in 1877; appointed Associate Justice of the United States Supreme Nov. 29, 1877, and was one of the Arbitrators on the part of the United States before the Bering Sea Tribunal, May 31, 1892.

California Won for Woman Suffrage.

San Francisco, Oct. 16.—Woman suffrage has triumphed in California. Late returns have wiped out the majority previously recorded against the amendment, and since this turn the margin in favor of the amendment has increased steadily.

The totals are: For suffrage, 119,086; against, 117,408. Majority for the amendment, 1,678. These figures represent the returns from 2,717 precincts out of a total of 3,121 in the State. Virtually all of the remaining precincts are in counties which have given suffrage majorities and they will increase the majority for the amendment to more than 3,000.

Climbs to Top of Mt. Baker Extinct Volcano.

The Grayson Gazette, of Independence, Va., prints the following: Bow, Washington.

Dear Virginians:—You never see an everlasting snow-capped mountain in the Old Dominion, and since I have had the pleasure of spending some time upon the slopes of one, please allow me space in your paper for a brief description of our trip.

We left the little town of Belfast, Wash., twenty-three miles East of Puget Sound and traveled in a north easterly direction for thirty miles until we came to Deming, Wash., and there we got a glimpse of the mighty mountain which we expected to climb. Here we supplied ourselves with provisions, blankets, colored glasses, face paint and other necessities, and loading a one-horse wagon, made for the jungles. At two o'clock we came to the end of the baggage trail and packing the horse with our baggage began the ascent.

The way was rough and dangerous, only a narrow path leading around the mountain side. We passed cliffs which made one dizzy to look down and once our horse came near going over.

Tired and weary, we stopped for the night six miles back in the mountain. Trees of fir, spruce and balsam, whose trunks have never been touched by the woodman's axe surrounded us on every hand.

The night was spent in sound slumber upon the ground, and next morning the camp was merry with songs and laughter of the inexperienced mountain-climbers.

We had fifteen miles yet before we came to the snow line, and being eager to see something new, started from the camp at six o'clock. The way was not so dangerous as the day before, but much steeper. At two o'clock we came to Mazana Park. Here the trees are very scarce and dwarfed in growth, and some grass springs up during the absence of snow. Just above us towers the peak of Mt. Baker, and away to the south stands the Twin Sisters, whose summits are crowned with perpetual snow and ice.

The remainder of the day was spent around the camp-fire recruiting our tired muscles and planning for the most exciting part of our trip the next day.

These mountains are in a stage of decay and rocks of immense size can be seen bounding from their beds on the slopes of these precipitous peaks and avalanches of snow and ice are no uncommon thing.

Next morning two of our party and the horse were left in camp and four of our party started for the top. None of the party had ever had any experience climbing mountains of this size, and you can easily imagine our feelings when we ran upon a glacier at seven o'clock.

Now that we were in the snow it was necessary to paint our faces to keep the sun from burning, put on our colored glasses, bind our little packs firmly to our shoulders and tie ropes around our bodies.

A glacier is something awful; vast fields of snow and ice slowly

creeping down the mountain side. These rivers of ice are filled with crevices ranging from six inches to twenty feet in width and from ten feet to miles in length. Snow? Yes, plenty of it always, and how deep? I cannot say. One can look down into these crevices as far as the eye will allow without seeing any bottom.

With great difficulty we crossed over these places, or went around them, and slowly made our way up the mountain side. The great danger is that many of these chasms are covered with a thin scale of ice and snow and it is next to impossible to tell when standing over one of them.

I'll leave off many interesting features of the journey and hasten toward the crater. Mt. Baker is a dormant volcano. As we were laboring up its steep slopes sounds like distant blasting could be heard, and when the crater was reached we found that these concussions came from within. Imagine yourself standing upon the edge of this mighty opening, about forty by forty feet, and gazing into the awful depths below from which poured volumes of smoke and sulphurous gases. Words cannot describe the feelings of the writer at that time.

We must hasten on, for it is getting late in the day and we are yet quite a distance from the top. The air is light—we are breathing with difficulty.

Petty soon it became so steep we had to cut steps in the ice with an axe taken along for that purpose.

Ascending quite a ways from the first crater we stopped to rest. On looking around the mountain side some two hundred yards we discovered a still larger crater smoking more profusely than the first.

Huge cliffs, almost perpendicular, stood above us. The snow and ice was melting and giving way, great streams of water came rushing down to meet us, and stones of great size were breaking and bounding down the slopes. We had been cutting our way step by step through the ice for some time, but at last our object was accomplished—the top was reached—we stood above the clouds, over 10,000 feet above the sea.

6th. Chicken Taken Off Army Menu.

Washington, Oct. 18.—The elimination of chicken from the army menu, the limitation of turkey to Thanksgiving and Christmas, the substitution of so-called field bread for hard tack and abolishment of the field ration's sum up the important changes in the army ration for the American soldier made during the past year, according to the report of Commissary General Henry G. Sharpe. The elimination of the chicken has resulted in a yearly saving to the government of \$52,000.

It cost the United States 16.14 cents a day more to feed the American soldier in Alaska than it did those stationed in the United States. This is declared to be due principally to the cost of beef and its transportation to the isolated posts in the territory. The daily average cost of the rations issued during the year in the United States alone was 22.75 cents; Alaska, 38.89 cents; Hawaii, 24.10 cents; Porto Rico, 28.72 cents; aboard transports, 23.52 cents; American soldiers in the Philippines, 24.56 cents, and the native soldiers in the Philippines, 14.57 cents.

Even the Philippine Islands show a greater average cost per diem per man. The report shows the average cost per year per man in the United States to be \$105.96, and in the Philippines, \$114.21, or an average cost per diem in the former of 29.03 cents, and in the latter of 31.29 cts. It is interesting to note the report says that out of a total of \$11,864,894 spent during the year for subsistence, only four-fifths of one per cent, or \$96,906 is accredited to losses from such causes as ordinary wastage in issue and transportation, deterioration from climatic causes, left and property worn out.



Government May Purchase Land.

Bristol, Tenn., October 16.—For more than a month representatives of the Forestry and Geological Departments of the Federal Government have been busy looking into merits of a part of the White Top and Iron Mountains in Southwest Virginia and East Tennessee with a view to purchasing the boundary for the purpose of forest reserve, as provided for in the Weeks bill. There are about seventy-five thousand acres in the lands thus far investigated and the tracts include the lands owned by Douglas Robinson and the Roosevelts and also lands owned by the Sheafers of Pennsylvania; the Massingers, Whitesell, Reese and others. As much of these lands have been cut over for merchantable timber, it is stated that all are for sale, and the government, having completed all preliminary work has now only to negotiate with the purchasers.

The lands lie about two-thirds in Washington, Smyth and Grayson counties, and one-third in Johnson county, Tennessee. Representatives of the government have been here, Abingdon and Damascus for several weeks and from these points have looked the land over. If the lands is purchased it will be provided with telephone stations cleaned up to prevent disastrous fires and the bare places planted in trees. It would make one of the most attractive spots in all the Southern Appalachian region. White Top is one of the most elevated spots in the South, and from its summit one may look into many counties of Virginia and Tennessee and such a panorama of mountains and upland scenery would be hard to find elsewhere in the South.
