When asked what he thought of the political situation in this country, he said: "I don't see how the people of this country, remembering the record of Theodore Roosevelt, can do otherwise than to retain him in his present position. I think he is the very man to protect the interests of the people in general."

## Tom Watson Makes Another Speech.

The people's party held a convention in Atlanta, Ga., September 5th to form their electoral ticket. An immense crowd was present and Mr. Watson delivered the following speech:

"In this campaign the democratic national leaders have prostituted the name of democrat, and are demanding that they shall be blindly followed in spite of the fact that they have renounced every principle of democracy. Will the real democrats follow the name rather than the principle?"

"In the south we are told we must submit to the surrender to Wall St. because of the 'nigger.' What a blessed thing it is for democratic leaders that they always have the 'nigger' to fall back on. For thirty years they have been doing business on 'the nigger' and to-day he is their only stock in trade."

"Note the hypocrisy of it. In their national platform of 1872 they solemnly protested their allegiance to the doctrine of 'equality' regardless of race or color, and pledged themselves to maintain the emancipation and the enfranchisement of the blacks."

"The democratic leaders who talk this stuff, and the editors who write it, laugh and wink at one another as they pass, they know what a bribe it all is, and how it is being used to make the people forget, or condone, the inglorious surrender to Wall street which they made at St. Louis. In the West Virginia democratic nominee for vice president, the 'white supremacy' resolution was voted down and on August 1, 1904, Judge Parker himself in writing to the negro, James A. Ross, addressed him as 'My dear sir,' just as though Ross had been a white man."

"The south should demand to know the facts about Judge Parker. How does he stand upon this alleged question? Is his position at all different from that of Roosevelt? If so, in what respect? The south should demand explicit reply to the following questions before it votes for him upon the assumption that he differs from Roosevelt on the negro question:

(1) Would you refuse to eat at the same table with Booker Washington?

(2) Would you refuse to appoint negroes to office in the south?

(3) If elected will you refuse to receive on terms of equality at the White House, such negroes as Bishop Turner, Booker Washington and T. Thomas Fortune?

(4) Do you approve the mixed schools of New York, inaugurated under Grover Cleveland—in which social equality is practically made a matter of compulsion?

(5) If such schools—wherein black children and white children are educated together are a good thing for Georgia and South Carolina? If not, why not?

"Why did national democratic leaders surrender to Belmont and Wall street?"

Senator John W. Daniel, of Virginia, let the cat out of the bag, when he declared in the committee on resolutions that he was 'tired of being in the minority! Not afraid of Roosevelt's militarism? No. Not afraid of Roosevelt's niggerism? No. All is fudge and subterfuge. 'Tired of being in the minority,' there was the milk in the cocoanut.

"Not tired of being in the wrong. No; he did not even pretend that he had been in the wrong. Simply because they have been in the minority they are ready to drop the principles which they have sworn for eight years were right; and to adopt those which even now they do not dare say are right. Great God! what an attitude for the leaders of a great national party."

"Is public morality dead? Is honor a thing of the past? Have we no longer leaders whose creed is of the ancient mold, and which is dearer to them than life?"

## "Wasn't it a southern statesman—

Virginian by birth like John W. Daniel—who thrilled his times and after times, by the declaration that he would rather be right than president? Wasn't it Alex. Stevens who said, 'I am afraid of nothing on earth except to do wrong.'"

"Wasn't it Robert E. Lee, richest flower of southern manhood that ever blossomed, who said, 'The sublimest word in the language is duty!'"

"As a southern man I am ashamed of hearing the world say that the south can't help herself, that she must crouch to New York whether she wants to or not, and that she would 'vote for a dead dog on the democratic ticket.'"

"I am ashamed of it, tired of it, and revolt against it."

"Has truth no defenders who can stand the test of defeat? Are we so eager for office that we stand ready to sell our birthright for a mess of pottage?"

"Let each choose for himself—but let him understand that if he do violence to his sense of right, the whips of outraged conscience are as certain as fate."

"Better far to stand in the minority—in the outer darkness, with the stars of heaven smiling down upon you, and the infinite peace of God in your heart—than to hold a guilty seat in the banquet hall of the victors whose triumph fills your soul with the damning conviction that you have helped at the victory of wrong."



REGISTER! REGISTER!! It has been decided, according to the decision of the Attorney General, that young men who have not heretofore been assessed, can pay the Treasurer \$1.50, get his receipt, and then register.

If you can meet the democratic requirements, register and get ready to vote for President and Congressman this fall.

Eight years ago the democratic theory was that the price of Silver and Wheat ran together. How is it now, and how has it been during the past six years. Verily these democrats are false profits.

If you moved in the county six or eight months ago, you have been here long enough to pay taxes this fall but not long enough to vote. Who does this law strike? The poorer and laboring class of people.

The Democrats abused McKinley four and eight years ago just as they are abusing Mr. Roosevelt now. They dubbed him Emperor William the III &c. After he was dead he was a great and good man.

If a democrat says anything about Col. Slemp and the negro, just ask him if every democrat in this district didn't vote for Col. Fulkerson a few years ago against Capt. Henry Bowen a confederate soldier? Then ask him if Col. Fulkerson was not chairman of the caucus that nominated the negro, Geo. Cook, for door-keeper. He will drop his head just like you would a hot potato.

This week we had elections in two States, Vermont and Arkansas. One a republican and the other a democratic State. Up in Vermont, according to the press dispatches, the democrats lost 10 per cent. Down in Arkansas the republicans made substantial gains.

We Were Not Mistaken, Mr. Wysor to the Contrary.

Mr. Wysor in his speech at Wytheville last Saturday, denies statements published in the NEWS of his speech he made here at our August court. We said Mr. Wysor criticized the action of the confederate veterans in allowing the Republican chairman to announce their meetings. He followed this up by saying, "Such men as Col. We have gone to the trouble to call the attention of the matter to a prominent democrat who was in the meeting, a man who heard Mr. Wysor and who is his supporter and he says it is recollection that Mr. Wysor uttered the remarks that we published. It was not our purpose to misrepresent Mr. Wysor and we have not done so. We would like for Mr. Wysor to name that one-legged confederate veteran in this county who requested him on that occasion to make any announcement whatever. We don't know of but one, one-legged confederate veteran who was in Marion Aug. 15th. He is a republican, and says he never spoke to Mr. Wysor. Mr. Wysor's sarcastic and critical remarks will do him no good with the old veterans in in Smyth for the majority of them are republicans and will vote for Col. Slemp.

The last democratic administration has become so identified with the word "Soup House" that the democrats have gone and nominated a candidate from "Esopus" which is a strong reminder to the people of the old Soup House times under Cleveland.

The Hon. J. Taylor Ellyson, chairman of the State Democratic Committee, gets himself interviewed about six days out of every week and he always reports all districts safe in Va. except the 9th. The latest interview gives this, "I am satisfied that Col. Slemp will be defeated unless a certain thing occurs." Of course one "certain thing" may not occur again, but being hauled out of a "certain" town in a "certain" Jim Crow Car one time is enough isn't it Mr. Ellyson? What a pity that the astute State Chairman wont disclose the secret and let us know what that "certain thing" is.

Every prediction the Republicans made relative to the late constitutional convention has come literally true. Republicans warned the voters that the new instrument would not be submitted for their ratification or rejection. They told them not only negroes, but thousands of white men would be disfranchised. They told them that democrats would laugh in the faces of the thousands of white voters who would be disfranchised in 1904. All these charges the democrats stoutly denied and said that "Republicans were simply lying to the people." "That no white man should be disfranchised," "that the constitution would be submitted to the people &c." Now what have the voters got to say about these same people? What do you hear them say about the white men who have been so unfortunate as not to get their taxes paid 8 months before the election? With scorn on their faces and sarcasm in their voices they now laugh at this large class of people, and just like the Republicans told you, say you did it yourself and deserve no sympathy from any one.

We refrain from saying more, for this great democratic party is the party of honor, the party of truth and of course the undying friend of the "poor man."

Roosevelt or Parker, Which?

On the 8th of November the people will be called upon to elect one of these gentlemen as president of the United States. Which will you have? The one has been tried; the other untried. Mr. Roosevelt has been president of the country for more than three years and during this time many of the greatest and most perplexing questions which ever engaged the attention of our government have been passed upon and settled. It has all been done so successfully that even democrats have acquiesced and approved the President's course.

Under Roosevelt the country has enjoyed three of the most successful years she has ever seen. Nothing has been done to disturb the general business conditions of the country. The President has shown himself to be a man of great energy, wisdom and courage. He has been tried in most every public avocation of life. In all he has been eminently successful. 
