Program for the day is as follows: Lincoln Theatre at 10:30 a. m., program in charge of Rev. R. H. Anderson, D. D., of Lynchburg; invocation by Rev. C. A. Honeycutt; address of welcome, Mayor F. M. Hoge; music by the Marion College Glee Club. The installation service and presentation of college representatives greetings from Miss Emma Clark, student body president of the college; Mrs. W. C. Hounshell, alumnae representative; Miss Mae Scherer, faculty representative; Dr. Dabney S. Lancaster, president of the Virginia association of colleges; Dr. Curtis Bishop, vice-president of the national association of Junior Colleges.

Dr. Charles R. Brown, dean of Roanoke college; Dr. P. E. Monroe, Lenoir Rhyne college president; Dr. J. F. Scherer, president of the Lutheran synod of Virginia; Dr. Mary Markley, of Washington, board of education of the United Lutheran church; Hon. William N. Neff, Abingdon, board of education of Virginia; a number by the college Glee Club. The greetings are to be followed by president Rhyne's address.

After the meeting the guests will adjourn to the college for luncheon where a short program will be given. It was announced that the alumnae will assemble in the Lincoln Hotel lobby; the Board of Trustees and pastors in the Hotel Marion lobby; college representatives will assemble in the parlors of Hotel Lincoln. Marshalls will direct the formation and procession.

## Partial Reports of Workers Show County Short of 1000 Goal

Mrs. Hugh Smith, roll call chairman of Red Cross in Smyth county, announces that incomplete lists turned in by drive workers indicate a falling short of the one thousand member goal set for the county.

## Contracts Awarded For New Chilhowie And Marion Mills

Bids were opened and contracts awarded Monday, the 21st, for the construction of three new Southwest Virginia hosiery mills, two of them in Smyth county at Chilhowie and Marion.

Construction of the three mills, the third being at Salem, will be begun early next week and they will be completed between February 1st and 15th.

Fiske-Carter Construction Company of Spartanburg, S. C., was low bidder on all three jobs when the bids were opened by T. J. Wallner, of the Wallner Mills at Pulaski; William Armfield, of Ashboro, N. C., representing the Burlington Mills; H. V. Biberstein, Charlotte, the architect, and representatives of the three towns. These were Col. James D. Tate, Q. A. Eller and Aker Williams for Chilhowie; W. A. Wolfe, B. L. Dickinson and Robert Lane Anderson for Marion; Furman B. Whitescarver, C. C. Massey and G. G. Dobbins for Salem.

There were five bidders. The buildings will be practically duplicates of each other with overall dimensions of 114 by 158 feet, giving a square footage of 18,012.

Fiske-Carter's low bids were as follows:

Chilhowie plant, \$33,838.67; Marion plant, \$34,478.67; Salem plant, \$33,201.67. Differences in grading made the figures vary. The total bid for the three was \$101,519.

Not included in the contracts were air conditioning equipment, sprinkler systems, electrical work, and heating. These will amount to about \$15,000 for each building, it is estimated.

Each mill will be built by a local group of bond holders who will form corporations capitalized at approximately \$50,000, and each mill will be operated by a corporation, owned jointly by Mr. Wallner and the Burlington Mills, and capitalized at \$200,000.

The Chilhowie mill will be built on the Chamber of Commerce lot in the eastern section of the town. The Marion mill will be built on a 4 acre tract of the Sprinkle property adjoining the old fair grounds on Fair Grounds Hill.

Names of the local corporations which will build the mills are: Chilhowie Industrial Corporation, Marion Industrial Corporation and Salem Industries Inc.

The operating companies will be: Town House Hosiery Mills Inc., of Chilhowie; Royal Oak Hosiery Mills Inc. of Marion; Salem Full Fashion Silk Hosiery Mills Inc.

The plants will employ about 150 persons to start, with an eventual employment of about 300. Jobs will be divided about evenly between the sexes.



## Even a Pet Alligator Was Shown







**TO THE CREDIT OF THE CHAMBERS**

The awarding of contracts yesterday whereby Fiske-Carter Construction Company of Spartanburg, S. C., will start work next week on two \$50,000 hosiery mills at Marion and Chilhowie marks another forward step in the industrial progress of Smyth county. Without the respective Chambers of Commerce of both towns we doubt if either mill would have been secured.

Chilhowie's Chamber of Commerce has been working quietly for several years to secure an industry suitable to the town. With rare foresight they acquired an industrial site within the town limits. When opportunity knocked, they were ready, and Chamber and town turned in one of the most remarkable performances on record in oversubscribing by \$8,500 a bond issue of \$50,000 to build the building, raising the entire amount in a day and a half.

Chilhowie, abounding in good industrial sites, a center of heavy rural population, and with plenty of room physically for town expansion, is not through building yet, we predict.

Marion's Chamber of Commerce, which has been building up into a strong and well-knit organization for the past four years under the leadership of Q. A. Calhoun, first president, and Ralph Killinger, second president, will have a real report to make to its members this year end.

Harwood Manufacturing Corporation's new plant, built by that company with the assistance of a \$10,000 grant from citizens raised by the Chamber, is rapidly nearing completion up the creek and will soon employ 500 workers.

The new hosiery mill, to be known as Royal Oak Hosiery Mills Inc., will start operations on Fairgrounds Hill soon after the first of the year and will employ about 150 people at the beginning.

Plans have been prepared and transfer is expected within the next week of the 50-some acre Copenhagen cedar grove tract west of town, now owned by local business men, to the Women's Missionary Union of the Baptist churches of Virginia, and construction will start immediately on a summer camp for Baptists and other denominations in Southwest Virginia. Eventually it is hoped that the camp will be built into something approaching Massenetta Springs, in the valley, which draws thousands weekly all during the summer. Summer visitors are summer spenders, and as the camp grows its growth should be reflected in substantial business increases in Marion.

The Chamber of Commerce of Marion Inc. played a strong hand in this matter, too, stepping in when Wytheville and Roanoke were interested in securing the camp. First a suitable site was located and "sold" to the Baptist ladies, then, in order to make the camp a reality, a \$1,000 sum to aid in the purchase of the land was quickly raised among local citizens and business interests.

With signs pointing to increased national business next year, which should be reflected in continued activity by established local plants, with Harwood in Marion greatly expanding employment, with the two new hosiery mills at Marion and Chilhowie going into action, and with the new Baptist camp a-building, 1938 should bring real results to the business men who have so loyally supported their Chambers of Commerce.

**"MIRACLE MAN"**

The term is used so often in the sports pages of our contemporaries that it has ceased to mean much. We won't apply it to Shelburn Carmack, Marion high's new athletic director and coach, preferring something a bit more substantial in testimonial to the work he has done in his three short months at his new job.

The miracle is there all right. The football team which a couple of years ago disbanded in mid-season, and which a year ago was kicked around by most opponents with ease, bounced back to life this fall. The Scarlet Hurricane, so named back in '30 and '31 when it was the big wind of state class B football circles, blew harder as the season progressed and the boys began to play the sound, fundamental game that Carmack teaches. In all, wins were registered over Chilhowie, Rich Valley, Hillsville, Lansing, Pearisburg, Damascus and Mt. City—seven victories all told—against defeats by Saltville and Pulaski. Best of all, a squad which in past years never had enough second team men to scrimmage against, finished the season three deep in most positions with something like 35 young athletes in uniform and every one of them getting into the game at some time or other.

Another minor miracle was contained in Carmack's recent report that all equipment had been paid for and the Athletic Association had a slight balance. This is the first time we have known the local Association to be solvent after a football season.

Carmack has large plans for boys' and girls' basketball in the new high school gym. He also hopes to introduce interschool boxing. We hope the state board of education grants permission. The sport will be popular here.

"Miracle man"—no. Shelburn Carmack has been something a bit better than that. He has shown Marion what wise leadership, coupled with a whole lot of plain hard work, can accomplish. More power to him!



Dr. Stuart Staley was welcomed back from a Chicago visit, Clay Church's new son was celebrated, and Leon Beville congratulated on being out again after illness.



**Marion Loses to Pulaski 14 to 7 In Final Game**

Packed with thrills Marion high dropped a close decision to Pulaski high in the final football game of the season Friday, the 18th, by a score of 14 to 7.

So closely matched were the two teams and so hard fought was the game the large crowd was kept in a frenzy from the opening kick off to the final whistle. It was by far the best game of the season and was a tough one for the locals to drop especially in view of an early score which was nullified by a clipping penalty.

The game closed the most successful season Marion has had in several years, winning seven and losing only two under the direction of their new coach, Shelburn Carmack.

The two teams exchanged kicks early in the first quarter with Marion taking possession of the ball in mid field. After several line plunges, Jim Groseclose suddenly broke through tackle to run the fifty yards for a touchdown. However, Anderson was caught clipping on the 14 yard line and the team penalized to the 29 thereby nullifying the score. Unable to gain through the line,

Marion took to the air with Henegar pitching. On fourth down he tossed a beautiful pass to Anderson who was all by himself in the end zone only to let the ball slip through his fingers to end the scoring threat. The first quarter ended with Marion having the ball on their 30.

Groseclose opened the second quarter with a nice 17 yard run that put the ball on the 47 but Marion was forced to kick after unsuccessful attempts to gain. Groseclose kicked a beautiful punt against the wind that was returned to the 25 by Ward, Pulaski safety.

Run and passes with Ward doing most of the work brought the ball to the 50. Ward took off tackle and showing plenty of speed out distanced the Marion team to run 50 yards for the score. Sexton kicked the goal to make it 7 to 0 in Pulaski's favor.

In the remaining minutes of the half and the entire third quarter Pulaski had the upper hand but were unable to score through the stubborn Marion line.

The exciting fourth quarter opened with Pulaski on Marion's 25. Ward and Jones were unable to gain so with fourth down and still 10 yards to go for a first down Ward pitched a strike into the arms of Haislip, Pulaski's star end, who gathered in the ball as he stepped over the goal. Sexton again kicked the extra point to put the score 14 to 0.

Hopelessly beaten up to this point the Marion boys came back with a rush when Robinson passed to Wright from mid field, Wimpy going to the Pulaski 30. Robinson drove to the 12 and Marion was in a position to score. Robinson picked up six more yards and Groseclose dove over for the score. Robinson plunged for the conversion to put the score at 14 to 7 with only four minutes left to play.

Despite all efforts to hang onto the ball Pulaski was forced to kick and Marion took the ball in mid field. Passes and runs which had the crowd nearly crazy brought the ball to the 17 yard line with 15 seconds left to play. A Robinson to Anderson pass fell incomplete and on the final play Robinson threw to Wright, who because of darkness misjudged the ball, the ball falling incomplete in the end zone.


