News From the Old World.

BAPTISING A BABY.

The New Monarch of Spain Christened—Imposing Ceremonies Mark the Interesting Event.

MADRID, May 22.—To-day set for the baptism of the new monarch, was all that could be desired. The weather was brilliant and everything passed off quietly. At daybreak crowds of the populace filled the galleries and courts of the palace and the Plaza De Oriente, which is situated on the west side of the city facing the royal palace. The procession towards the royal chapel started at precisely 1:30 o'clock. It slowly and solemnly wended its way through the galleries which were beautifully draped with tapestry and national colors. Halberdier guards preceded the procession and the passage of the baptismal party.

After the guard, came the government official. Then followed seven grandees, carrying silver salvers, on which were salt, towel and a basin and other implements used in the baptismal ceremony of the Roman Catholic Church. Next came Goupernante with the King. On her right walked Papan Nuncio, representing the godfather, his holiness, the Pope, and on her left the infant, Isabel, and the godmother.

The procession was followed inside the chapel by the ladies of court, diplomats and others who waited through the baptismal ceremonies. The young King was christened on the spot that Saint Domingo was christened cardinal. Archbishop Toledo officiated. The child yelled as lustily as his little lungs would permit. The ladies of court wore white mantilla. At the conclusion of the baptismal rites a Te Deum was rendered and this brought the ceremonies to a close.
