Patrick Henry's Grave.
Every now and then there comes the query, "Where is Patrick Henry buried?" and tourists in Richmond, Va., constantly ask to be shown his grave, with the mistaken idea that it is in that city, where much of his public career was passed. Few persons, comparatively, know that the man who acquired the title of "The Tongue of the Revolution," lies in a quiet grave on the estate in Charlotte county, where he formerly lived. Over him is a marble slab inscribed with the one line: "His Fame His Best Epitaph."

The estate lies on the Staunton river, thirty-eight miles from the city of Lynchburg, Va., near the border line which separates Charlotte and Campbell counties. It derived its name of Red Hill from the peculiar color of the soil in that vicinity. When Patrick Henry bought the place it comprised about 3,500 acres. The land is rich—there was a saying in the neighborhood that poor land and Patrick Henry could never be mentioned together—corn grows there as high as a man on horseback, there is a general air of smiling fields and abundant prosperity.

Hed Hill is now owned by Henry's grandson, William Wirt Henry, a gentleman of the "old school." He has in his possession some interesting relics of his celebrated grandfather, including the desk he always used, which still contains his letters from Lafayette, Washington, Madison and other great men of early days; the large round-backed chair in which Patrick Henry died, and a portrait of him by the elder Sully, under which hangs a yellow slip of paper signed by Chief Justice John Marshall and several others of his friends testifying to the faithfulness of the likeness.—Kansas City Star.

Reapportionment Passes Senate.
Washington, Aug. 5.—The House of Representatives reapportionment bill, which passed the Senate Thursday by a comfortable majority, increases the membership from 391 to 433. It is so drawn, that no State loses a representative.

In some cases there will be decided increases. New York leads the list with an increase of six members; Pennsylvania, four; California and Oklahoma, three each; Illinois, Massachusetts, New Jersey, Texas and Washington, two each; Alabama, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Idaho, Louisiana, Michigan, Minnesota, Montana, North Dakota, Ohio, Oregon, Rhode Island, South Dakota, Utah and West Virginia, one each.

The bill's passage culminates a vigorous fight waged since the last census figures became available. The measure will take effect on and after March 3, 1913. With the admission of Arizona and New Mexico, the House will have 435 members.

"Can't Prove it on Me," Says Beattie.

Richmond, Va., Aug. 8.—Henry Clay Beattie, Jr., talked to Jailor Garrett of his own plight yesterday morning. He said:

"It looks like a protracted trial, but they will never prove it on me," said Beattie to his jailer, repeating the exact language he used at the conclusion of the inquest, when he chatted calmly with a reporter and viewed with indifference Beulah Binford, who was lying on the floor in throes of hysterics.

"A number of alleged interviews with me have been printed," said Beattie, according to Mr. Garrett, "and they have been a pack of lies. I did not tell the barber who was shaving me that if the trial went against and if an appeal to the supreme court went the same way, I would then take poison sooner than go to the electric chair. I am innocent of the crime they charge against me, Mr. Garrett," Beattie continued, "and the trial will clear me."

"The only thing in the purported interview with the barber that was true was that I expressed the hope that my baby is doing well, and that I would like to see it. The rest of the stuff was untrue."

Beattie has a slim chance, indeed, to see his infant. Its grand-parents will never bring the child within vision of the man who they believe slew its mother, their daughter.

Jailor Garnett secured Beattie a safety razor when the barber Beattie had been employing "stood for" the interview which Beattie repudiates. The razor is kept in Mr. Garnett's possession when Beattie is not using it, and when the prisoner is shaving the jailer is at hand to see that the blade is not slipped out the holder.

Wise Republicans Select Delegates.
Norton, Va., Aug. 7.—The Republicans of Wise county met in mass-meeting Saturday at Wise and elected delegates to the convention, which will be held at Big Stone Gap on August 19th, for the purpose of nominating a candidate to represent this Senatorial district in the Virginia legislature. 

Spratt to the chair to preside. The delegation repaired to separate rooms and each district named the number of delegates and alternates allowed. The meeting passed resolutions endorsing Hon. J. Powell Royal for the Senate and Hon. S. P. Mustard for the Legislature. Mustard thus far has no opposition and it is believed the nomination of Mr. Royal is assured. Dickenson county has instructed for Mr. Chase, but it is believed when the time comes to name the candidate the Tazewell lawyer will have sufficient votes to elect him on the first ballot. The meeting was harmonious and well attended and the county leaders see no reason why the usual Republican majority will not be piled up in the November election.—Bluefield Telegraph.
