THE Senate has refused to confirm C.W. Button as postmaster at Lynchburg, the vote for his rejection being an almost solid one. There were only four votes for his confirmation, Riddleberger, of Va., Colquitt, of Ga., Pugh of Ala., and Whitthorn, of Tenn. Only three Democrats were for confirming him. This is a severe rebuke to the editor of the *Virginian*. The Democratic papers in the State are very severe in their criticisms upon the Senate for its action in this matter. They hold the Democratic members of that body equally responsible with the Republicans. They seem to think that it is a piece of presumption in the Senate to protect its dignity by declining to endorse one who has denounced in a most scandalous and scurrilous manner honorable members of first House of Congress. Too long has the custom prevailed with newspapers in the land to reflect upon men who had committed no crime except that of differing in opinion with the man who writes for the newspaper. This rejection of Button will perhaps serve a good purpose in warning such writers in the future.

THE workmen of Richmond have brought out a ticket for the municipal officers of that city, in opposition to the ticket recently nominated at the Democratic primary. There has been one very serious mistake made by the workmen, that is the placing on their ticket for certain of the offices the names of parties who are also run as the nominees of the Democratic party. Such a course is likelier to bring defeat than victory to the workmen.

MANY honest men who have heretofore had unlimited faith in the Democratic party begin to question both its honesty and ability. The promises made and broken are now growing so numerous that men who are not blind must see and believe.

After wards she took to teaching, her family being in straightened circumstances, and impaired her health by hard work in a school in San Jose, Cal. Subsequently she renewed her struggle to attain distinction as an actress and was assisted in her efforts by Mrs. Hearst, and finally went abroad. During the last season she played a most successful engagement at the Hay market Theater, but her health again suffered in consequence of the severe strain of her duty, and her physicians ordered rest. It is stated that she will remain with Mrs. Hearst until she returns to London next season, when she will present a new play.

**Jumps From a Bridge**  
PITTSBURG, May 17.—At 10 o'clock this morning as William Staughton, a Chicago fireman, was walking across Smithfield bridge he was accosted by a stranger who, in plaintive tones, said: "Oh, sir, I once had a happy home in Camden, N. J., but family troubles drove me away." With that the stranger vaulted to a parapet and before Mr. Staughton could interpose, dived into the Monongahela river, which is high and running very swiftly, 40 feet below. The body never came to the surface. The suicide is described as being about 38 years of age, dressed in good dark blue clothing and presented no appearance of destitution or despondency.

**President Arthur's Condition.**  
Ex-president Arthur's condition has been steadily growing worse during the past week, but he has not relaxed so far as to have lost all the ground gained during his unexpected rally of about ten days ago.

Dresses for a Royal Bride.

PARIS, May 10.—It was a *grande premiere* to-day for the world of fashion.

The princesses of the Orleans family and hundreds of the *grandes dames* of France assembled at one of the most famous *couturiers* in the Rue de la Paix to admire and criticize the royal toilets for the wedding of the Prince Royal of Portugal and Princess Amalie d'Orleans, which comes off at Lisbon on May 25.

The dress to be worn on the wedding day by Queen Maria Pia is an exact copy of the one in Ruben's famous picture, *Le Triomphe de Marie de Medicis*. It is of sky blue velvet, rich Louis Trieze embroidery. It is covered with cascades of pearls and sheaf-like clusters of diamonds. A royal blue sovereign's coronation mantle hangs from the shoulders, embroidered with massive silver wreaths on an azure ground. This is, perhaps, the most superb dress made in Paris since the coronation of the Emperor of Russia. It is whispered that it cost, inclusive of the old lace and diamonds and pearls, over 300,000fr.

The dress to be worn on the wedding day by Mue. la Comtesse de Paris is of magnificent velours trappe, ibis red. It has an immense train of Genesee velvet and the front of the dress is covered with dazzling white jet.

The Princess Amalie's wedding dress is white silk, with a lace marriage veil. It is very simple, but exquisitely made and thoroughly graceful. These three royal ladies have between them ordered forty toilets for the coming wedding festivities. Each dress is accompanied by all the appropriate accessories, such as hats, sunshades, silk stockings, handkerchiefs, fans, &c.

The gloves ordered by Queen of Portugal are very much admired. They are of cream-colored kid, very long, and the manchette of each glove is embroidered with her Majesty's initials, "M. P.," surmounted by a royal coronet.

I am told that Princess Amalie's wedding dress has served as the model for the one already completed for Miss Folsom, which is to be worn on the occasion of her marriage with President Cleveland.

A Live Snake in a Boy's Stomach.

LEWISTON, ME., May 13.—The almost incredible story recently printed about the death of a boy near Grand Falls from hemorrhage caused by pulling from his mouth a live snake which had grown to his flesh proves to be literally true. The lad's name was George Marjosee, and his age eight years. He was a bright little fellow, and lived with his parents on a farm about four miles from the town. Early last winter the boy began to act strangely sick. He had a most voracious appetite and it was impossible for him to get enough to eat. His friends got alarmed about him and sent for physicians, who began dosing him for worms. As the winter wore on the boy grew worse and worse. One day he felt something crawling up from his stomach into his throat. He almost choked to death, for the crawling creature tried ineffectually to come out by the nasal passage. In a short time the snake (for such it was) forced his way up the boy's throat and stuck its head out of his mouth. The lad's sister, who was near by, saw the head of the serpent just before it drew back into the boy's mouth. Very soon the snake stuck his head out a second time, and his little sister made a grab at it and pulled from the boy's mouth a live snake fourteen inches long. It had a piece of flesh attached to its tail nearly as large as a hen egg. The boy lived a short time only after the snake was taken from him, dying of violent hemorrhage. It is supposed that the boy had gone to sleep in some field and that the snake had crawled down his throat. The reptile has been preserved in alcohol.

The Strawberry Boycotted.

The State Non Partisan Association has issued a circular, to be distributed throughout the State, which contains the following fulminations: "The strawberry crop of California is raised and picked almost exclusively by Chinamen. The Executive Committee and anti-Chinese leagues have made every possible endeavor to induce the employers of these Chinamen lessors of strawberry lands to confer upon the subject of substituting white help. These offers have been rejected. In response to the earnest appeal of the Santa Clara County Boycott Committee, fortified by the resolutions of the Federated Trades and District Assembly No. 53, of the Knights of Labor, and the anti-Chinese leagues of San Francisco, we appeal to your league and all who sympathize with the anti-Chinese movement, to boycott all strawberries not known to be picked by white persons. By the firm application of this peaceful but effective remedy, we can show the people of this coast that the problem of relieving them of Chinese serf labor will be solved."

The President has vetoed the bill establishing a port of delivery at Springfield, Mass.

A Terrible Affray.

SHOT DOWN IN THE STREETS OF MARTINSVILLE.

A Bloody Fight Between the Terrys and Spencers—Ten Men Shot—The Killed and Wounded—The Cause of the Difficulty.

MARTINSVILLE, VA., May 17.—Just as the sun was setting this evening the most fearful tragedy that ever enacted in this county took place on Fayette street.

The shrill whistle from the steam engine of Spencer Brothers' factory rang out on the clear and balmy evening air, and ere its sound had died away in the distant hills Fayette street was alive with rollicking factory hands and employes. There had been some slight suspicion that a disturbance would occur between the Messrs. Terry and Spencer. Among the surging mass of the gaily enchanting employes were seen going in the direction of Spencer Brothers' factory Messrs. Ben, Jake, and W. K. Terry. Coming in the opposite direction, meeting the Terrys, were Colonel P. D., J. D., and G. O. Spencer. They met about half way between the Mountain View Hotel and the said factory—a distance of about 200 yards. Colonel P. D. Spencer was called into the middle of the street by W. K. Terry, and was asked to apologize for an insulting circular issued yesterday reflecting on Mr. W. K. Terry. At this juncture all the Terrys and Spencers had gathered in a group, together with several other friends of the parties. J. D. Spencer insisted that that was no place to settle the matter, and asked that a time and place should be designated where the trouble could be settled without jeopardizing the lives of others. Several police officers appeared on the scene and tried to effect the arrest of all parties. The difficulty seemed almost certain to be amicably settled for the time being, when some indiscreet person fired a pistol.

A TERRIBLE FUSILLADE.  
Thereupon followed a regular fusillade. At least a dozen revolvers flashed in the air. The death dealing missiles whizzed about and rarely missing their prey. Every man stood his ground with nerve and grit that would do honor to the Romans. In the space of two or three minutes nine men hit the earth. All fell in a radius of ten feet. At least three dozen shots were fired. Jake Terry was shot in the side and killed.

The wounded are: Colonel P. D. Spencer was shot in the right side, the ball striking a rib and following it around and coming out at the back. T. F. Brown, shot painfully in the thigh and seriously in the shoulder. W. K. Terry, shot in the left shoulder near the spinal column. The ball is supposed to have passed into his lung. His wounds are very serious. Ben Terry, shot in the bowels and neck. Wounds very serious. B. L. Jones, painfully wounded in the thigh. Hugh Dyer, shot in the thigh. Both of the Gregorays were shot in the back accidentally. Sandy Martin, colored, was shot in the thigh. The wounds of the Terrys and T. F. Brown, are of the most dangerous character. All the parties are being cared for, and their every want is gratified.

HOW THE TROUBLE BEGAN.

The trouble began Friday night. A circular letter was gotten up then and circulated the following day, headed "Martinsville Tax Bill." There were some rough allusions in this article to the mayor and some of the council. Mr. W. K. Terry was thought to have something to do with it. Sunday morning a circular was issued, in which Mr. W. K. Terry's name was not used, yet the inference was strong and the language was very insulting. This morning W. K. Terry posted a card denouncing the author as a contemptible scoundrel. The noon train brought up his brothers Ben and Jake, and the three demanded of our newspaper man the names of the parties. This was given with the above results. This affair is deeply deplored.

The Terrys are among the best people in Virginia. They are high minded, honest and inoffensive citizens. The Spencers are also of the best families. They are splendid business men and highly esteemed, honorable citizens. All this we grew out of a little rough fun or joke. Our town is bowed down with grief at this most terrible sequel to a little feud. A coroner's inquest will be held to-morrow, and warrants will be issued for outsiders who took part in the shooting.

A man who couldn't shoot an ordinary unharmed subscriber would stand a poor show when the editor of his contemporary came in with a gun a yard long.

Just think what a spectacle it must have been! The leading Democratic editor of this great, broad Territory jumping around and yelling, "Unhand me! Stand back traitors! I will have the villain's life! B-b-b-l-l-o-o-d-b-b-gosh friends and Romans!
