

Deed Farm to College.

Bristol, Tenn., July 20.—The Rev. S. B. Vaught, field secretary of Emory and Henry College, the historic Methodist school at Emory, Va., reports a unique gift which he has just secured for that institution. Mr. and Mrs. Harvey Phipps, of Mouth of Wilson, Grayson county, have deeded their fine farm, valued at \$10,000, to Emory and Henry. The deed is now ready to be spread on record.

Mr. and Mrs. Phipps, each about seventy-five years of age, are without children. They are to have the benefit of the farm while they live, but the trustees of Emory and Henry College may use it as collateral in securing money for the institution.

Up to this time Mr. Vaught has secured in subscriptions and donations for the school nearly \$40,000, besides conditional subscriptions from Carnegie and Rockefeller, amounting to \$75,000.

Hams 100 Years Old.

Providence, R. I., July 22.—The recent discovery of several choice 100 year-old hams in an underground passage near a historic old colonial mansion on Prudence Island has started Prof. David Greenberg, of Columbia University on a systematic search of the old cellars on the island. Prof. Greenberg has been on the island several months studying the soil and the peculiarities of the natives. The hams heretofore found are packed in wood ashes. Their flavor is so excellent that they have been readily marketed at \$1.00 a pound.

Abingdon to Install a \$35,000 Sewerage System.

Abingdon, Va., July 20.—Several months ago the question arose as to whether Abingdon should have a first-class sewerage system. The question, after having the work estimated and placed at \$35,000, was submitted to the people for voting last Tuesday, the result being it was carried by a majority of thirty-five votes. There was strong opposition to it, however, owing to the fact that those citizens desiring to see the Abingdon dispensary put out of business, thought that with the passage of the issue, the dispensary would have to run several years to pay this debt, as it did when it started by paying a debt of a few thousand on the city.

Vote Buying Cases.

Roanoke, Va., July 22.—Mr. W. E. Beverly, a newspaper man of Clintwood, passed through Roanoke several days ago. Mr. Beverly had just returned from Clintwood, Dickenson county, where he was summoned as a witness in the investigations being made there by Judge Skeen concerning the bribery cases in last fall's elections.

Mr. Beverly was an election officer at that time and for that reason was wanted as a witness. When he left Clintwood Judge Skeen had tried about fifty cases, six of which resulted in acquittals, with 100 cases on the docket yet to be tried. Those who were found guilty were fined \$100 each and disfranchised. Among the guilty were some wealthy farmers and leading church members.

Making Medal for Jezebel Goad.

The handsome gold medal which is to be given to Miss Jezebel Goad, as the heroine of the Hillsville tragedy, is being prepared in Richmond, and will be ready for presentation by September. On one side the memorial will bear the seal of Virginia, and on the other will be inscribed a sentence written by Mrs. William Hodges Mann, wife of the governor. Miss Goad distinguished herself by supplying her father, Dexter Goad, with revolvers and ammunition during the fusillade of shots which took place in the Carroll county courthouse when Floyd Allen was sentenced by Judge Thornton L. Massie and refused to accompany the officers of the court to jail. Dexter Goad was clerk of the court and the only officer of the court who escaped with his life.—Richmond News-Leader.

Have Cost the State More Than \$40,000.

What will the Allen case cost the State of Virginia? This question has been asked several times since the notorious affray at Hillsville last March.

Detective Baldwin's bills—for secret service, guarding, etc.—will reach close to \$16,000. Then there is the transportation of the men, the guarding since they have been in jail, transportation to and from Hillsville and to Roanoke and to Wytheville, the jury trials, the fees for witnesses, the costs for the prosecution, and many other items which will carry the total to more than \$40,000. It is hard to get real information because of the fragmentary bills which are coming in. One for \$1,400 came to the Auditor to day for court expenses in April.

Radford Normal School Contract Awarded.

Bristol, Va., July 22.—The building committee of the Radford State Normal and Industrial School, which is to be established at Radford, Montgomery county, met last week and awarded the contract for the construction of the administration building of this school to J. C. Curtis, of Denbigh, Va.

Mr. Curtis' contract calls for an expenditure of more than \$90,000, while the contracts for heating and lighting will make the building cost in excess of \$100,000.

The committee in charge of this work is composed of W. D. Smith, of Gate City, Va.; L. L. Scherer, W. T. Baldwin and J. P. Jones. This committee will later award the contract for heating and lighting.

Mighty Principle at Stake.

This campaign will soon be waging on lines of principle and there is a mighty principle at stake, namely the Protection of American industries. The Democratic platform declares for Tariff "for revenue only," and the American people know from bitter experience what that means. Increases Coal Production

Virginia increased her production of coal in 1911 by 356,670 short tons according to a statement by Edward W. Parker, just made public by the United States Geological Survey acting in co-operation with the Virginia Geological Survey.

The production in 1911 was 6,864,667 short tons, as compared with 6,507,997 tons in 1910. The value of the 1911 production was correspondingly greater, being \$6,254,804 as compared with \$5,877,486 in 1910 a gain of \$377,318.

All the important producing counties in Virginia, except Lee county, showed increases, the principal gain being due to the developments in Russell county following the completion in 1910 of the Carolina, Clinchfield and Ohio Railroad and the opening of transportation from the mines to the South Atlantic Seaboard. Russell county in 1909 produced only 440,000 short tons; in 1910 it produced a little less than 750,000 tons and in 1911 its production exceeded 1,050,000 tons.



Taft Men Are Confident.
 Not in three years have old-line
 Republicans generally been so in-
 spired over the political outlook as
 they are at this time. Whether this
 hopefulness will keep up after the
 campaign opens remains to be seen.
 President Taft himself is decidedly
 in the same frame of mind. His
 friends say that if he had been pick-
 ing the nominee of the Baltimore
 convention Woodrow Wilson would
 have been his selection. The Presi-
 dent has told some of his friends
 that Wilson's nomination will make
 the square between radicalism
 moderate progressivism, and
 he believes the conservative peo-
 ple of the country will repeat their
 work in every presidential election
 since 1896.
 The Taft manager believes that con-
 servative Democrats in large num-
 bers will flock to the Republican
 nominee, while the radical Demo-
 crats and radical Republicans will
 split their strength between Wilson
 and Roosevelt.

White House callers made much
 of the serious effect the writings of
 Wilson will have upon his campaign.
 It was asserted that these writings
 are so judicious in some respects
 as to array against Wilson some of
 the big voting elements of the coun-
 try.
 Representative Rodenburg touch-
 ed upon this as he was leaving the
 executive offices: "I came to con-
 gratulate the President upon his
 practically sure re-election," said
 Mr. Rodenburg. "We will shoot
 Woody Wilson so full of holes next
 November that he won't know what
 struck him. If there is nothing else
 to do it, his fifth volume of 'The
 American People,' pages 212 to 213,
 ought to do the job. In this he
 practically says that a Chinaman is
 far better than the people from
 Southern Europe, and compares the
 Irishman to the Chinaman, to the
 disadvantage of the sons of Erin.
 Wilson is impractical.

"There is little doubt in my mind
 that President Taft will be re-elec-
 ted in November," said Senator Burn-
 ham. "The good sense of the Ameri-
 can people will assert itself. Presi-
 dent Taft's great experience in gov-
 ernmental business will cause the
 voters to hesitate before voting for
 a man with virtually no experience
 and without the knowledge that Mr.
 Taft has. President Taft is so much
 better equipped to head the govern-
 ment than Mr. Wilson there is no
 comparison. The sense of fairness
 of the people will have much to do
 with the result in November. Mr.
 Taft deserves vindication, and that
 will play largely in voting."
 "Taft will carry New York by
 more than 100,000 majority," said
 former Representative Bennet, who
 is a candidate for the gubernatorial
 nomination in New York. The peo-
 ple of New York have more money
 in banks, building and loan associa-
 tions and other institutions than
 any other people in the country.
 Stability is essential to the majority
 here New York has never gone off
 her nostrums and never will. This
 is merely another Bryan campaign.

 tive C. B. Slomp, of the Ninth
 Virginia district, who was here on
 Tuesday morning, en route from
 Washington to his home at Big
 Stone Gap, said, relative to appoint-
 ments: "I have a vacancy at West
 Point and an alternate place at An-
 napolis, with good chances for prin-
 cipal places. I would like for any
 young man in the district, between
 16 and 21 years of age, who is qual-
 ified to enter, to correspond with me
 on the subject." I hope to get well
 qualified young men for the appoint-
 ments. Applicants should either be
 graduated from a high school or
 have spent some time at a prepara-

 expect to prepare some plan of ex-
 amination as a means of selecting
 the best qualified.

Will Not Join Third Party
 Chicago, July 24.—Illinois poli-
 tics were declared by Roosevelt lead-
 ers to have been "much cleared" by
 Governor Charles S. Deneen's an-
 nouncement in Springfield several
 days ago that he would not adhere
 to the third party movement in the
 coming presidential campaign, but
 would support President Taft.

Will They Be Fooled?
 "Veteran," writing to the New
 York Sun, points the dilemma in
 which the Free-Trade presidential
 nominee will find himself, thus:
 If Governor Wilson is going in for
 Free-Trade in farm products he will
 have to do something to win over
 and hold the farmer vote.

Already his heart is dripping sym-
 pathetic gore for the wage earners
 who are suffering in consequence of
 the high cost of living, which he
 proposes to see about as soon as he
 can find time.
 But dear food products mean pros-
 perity for the farmers and cheap
 food products mean poverty for the
 farmers.

If Governor Wilson recommends
 Free-Trade to help the wage earners
 he will lose the farmer vote. If he
 does not recommend Free-Trade in
 farm products he will lose the votes
 of the wage earners. He seems to
 be between the devil and the deep
 blue sea.

The Free-Trade candidate tells
 the farmer that the cost of the ne-
 cessaries of life is going to be re-
 duced without lowering the price of
 farm products, and he tells the wage
 earner that his wages will stay as
 they now are while the prices of all
 he has to buy will be reduced, in-
 cluding the largest item, food prices.
 The question is, will either the far-
 mer or the wage earner be fooled by
 any such self-contradictory proposi-
 tion?

Let it Not Be a Personal Campaign.

And that issue is whether the policy of Protection to home industry shall be continued or abandoned.

And there is no other domestic question at issue. So far as can be judged, there is nothing else, progressive or unprogressive, that has any national importance upon which issue is to be seriously raised in this campaign.

The Democrats openly avow their intention to destroy every vestige of Protection whenever they have the power to do it.

There is a contingent of alleged Republicans ready to join the Democrats on that issue if in any way satisfied as to their personal ambitions or enmities. Let them go. If we are not much mistaken, they will have a very light following.

The Republican party stands pledged to maintain Protection. It also stands pledged to remove any inequalities or abuses which bipartisan investigation may show to exist. President Taft is the candidate of that party.

On that issue, whatever they may claim, ninety-nine hundredths of the electors will vote according to what they think their personal interests, which is right. There are no electors wise enough to know what is for the interest of other people, even if they would vote to help others than themselves, which they will not. When each has voted, as he will, for his own interest, as he sees it, we shall get the honest opinion of the voters.

When a Democratic government shall set out to revise the Tariff, about the first schedule they will raise will be the agricultural, in which our most important interests are bound up.

There is a great deal of froth on the surface of the political pool just now, and glib-tongued half-anarchist orators are blowing it hard.

But the froth will disappear and the people will be brought face to face with the fact that the bread and butter of the most of us depends on the success of the Republican ticket.—San Francisco Chronicle.

Children Cry for Fletcher's




