



### "Dry" Bill Introduced.

Richmond, Va., Feb. 8.—The expected State-wide prohibition bill went into the Senate lime-light last Saturday through Senator Strode, of Amherst.

The State-wide bill carries the provision of a call for an election on petition of one-fourth of the qualified voters, who voted at the last election. In its previous it restricts the sale of whiskey to medicinal and scientific purposes only.

The entire bill covers twenty pages. It is expected to become the most important measure that will be considered at this session of the Legislature. The fight will be bitter. Though the bill was expected, no one knew who its patron would be, or when it would be offered. Hence, the attention of the voters in the State will be immediately attracted to the bill until the question is settled.

An important provision of the bill, if passed, is that there shall be no further election on the question until four years after it goes into effect.

### Virginia to Pay Pensions.

House of Delegates Appropriates \$65,000 For Last Year.

Richmond, Feb. 7.—The House of Delegates last week unanimously passed the bill appropriating \$65,000 to pay pensions for the year 1909 to those who did not receive their money because the pension fund had become exhausted. The most important bill which passed either House was the measure increasing the license taxes on dealers in intoxicating liquors. It went through the Upper House without opposition.

### Politics in the South.

Representative Morehead Believes the Field is Ready for Harvesters.

Washington, Feb. 7.—Representative Morehead, of North Carolina, one of the Republicans unexpectedly elected to Congress from that State in 1908, is trying hard to impress the President with the ripeness of the political field in the South for the Republicans.

"North Carolina is more fertile ground for the Republicans to-day than Indiana," declared the young North Carolinian. "We have a splendid chance to elect six Republicans to the House this November, and we are sure of five under proper conditions. The business and middle classes of the South are looking favorably to the Republican party from a national point of view. They sympathize with its purposes and promises. Then, too, they are tired of the ring-ridden Democratic organizations; frequently with the boss controlled Republican organizations. They want independence and reform in politics in the South, and they will go to any good party that presents these features."

### Local Optionists Win.

The House of Delegates Against State-wide Prohibition.

Richmond, Va., Feb. 5.—Local option against State option analyzed and discussed until fundamental principles were reached was thrashed out last week on the floor of the House of Delegates. The question under debate did not concern the sale of liquor, was whether a community should be allowed to settle an important matter for itself of whether the State should interfere upon the hypothesis that the people of the whole Commonwealth might ultimately be affected. When the smoke of the battle cleared away, the local optionists were on top by a vote of seventy-one to fifteen.

### Postal Receipts Grow.

December Business in Virginia Larger Than Any Month in History.

Judging from reports received last month by Cashier Marriott, of the Richmond Postoffice, postal receipts in Virginia for the month of December were larger than for any month in the history of the State. Richmond is depository for the surplus funds of all the first, second and third-class postoffices in Virginia, and Mr. Marriott considers it quite remarkable that these figures for January, which include the December business, should have reached \$115,107.32. Of this amount \$72,000 will be used in paying rural mail carriers, and the rest will be sent to Washington as the State's contribution to government funds from the conduct of its postoffices. The receipts in the Richmond office for January were \$56,236.65, which is a slight increase over the corresponding period in 1909.

Farmers are now receiving better prices than heretofore, and they are living in better houses, wearing better clothing, supporting better schools, building better roads. They are buying automobiles and are directors in banks—they are the producers of all the food except such as comes from the waters, and they earn not only the daily bread for themselves, but for all other people by the sweat of their brows, and they are entitled to live on the fat of the land and have the pleasant things of the world about them.

The conductor then stopped the train and told her to get off and she did so. This was in the night time and the place was nearly a mile beyond the station and Miss Hagy was a stranger in that community. Her action is for \$5,000.

The other case is in the name of DeWitt Lane, who sues by his next friend, Robert Land, against S. L. Logan, J. M. Thompson, George Hill and James Buck. This action grows out of a battle fought with sky rockets during Christmas. The plaintiff was struck in the eye and the sight destroyed. The damage claimed is \$3,000. These cases are brought to the first March rules and will mature for a hearing at the next term of the court.—Abingdon Virginian.

Asbury has so far eluded the officers. A sheriff's posse is hot on his trail, but at a late hour the fugitive has not been captured.


