

TO VOTE FOR HUGHES.

He Says Wilson Has Failed to Enforce Pure Food Law.

"I favor the election of Mr. Hughes to the Presidency for entirely different reasons than those held by most of his supporters. It is not because of the Mexican policy nor the foreign policy of the Administration nor by reason of its domestic policies. It is because of the apparent indifference of the Administration of President Wilson to the cause of pure food and drugs. Practically all of the abuses which were injected into the Pure Food Law by the preceding Administrations are still in force. Benzene of soda is still rampant. The fumes of burning sulphur are marching along undisturbed. There is evidently a lull in the activities of the Administration of the law. A well-known beverage, declared by the Supreme Court misbranded and amenable to the Food Law has not been molested. No attempt has been made to enforce the law in regard to the bleaching of flour. The repeal of the mixed flour law, that splendid safeguard to the purity of our bread has been tacitly approved by the Treasury Department.

"Mr. Hughes in his activities on the Supreme Court has stood like a stone wall for the proper Administration of the Food Law. I believe his election would see a radical change in the attitude of the government towards pure food and pure drugs, so vital to the welfare of our people. For this reason, I sincerely hope that Mr. Hughes may be chosen as our next President.

"I should expect Mr. Hughes as President to have the same attitude toward the pure food and drug law that he had as a judge on the bench and to appoint a secretary of agriculture with subordinate officers who would be enthusiastic and earnest in the enforcement of the pure food law for the benefit of the physical, mental and moral welfare of our people."





LIES SPLIT ON CAMPAIGN

Wilson Supporters Will Take Stump For Gov. Hughes.

ERTING CAMPAIGN PHASE

Washington.—Families are being divided by the present political issues. There are a few examples. J. A. Hopkins of New Jersey is treasurer of the Progressive (genuine) national committee, and has announced that personally favors the re-election of Wilson. Mrs. Hopkins is a member of the Woman's party and will take a stump and do all she can to prevent the election of Wilson.

Gifford Pinchot is for Hughes and the militarism Hughes and his clique can secure. Amos Pinchot, his brother, is a member of the American Union Against Militarism and will support Wilson as the lesser of two evils. Rep. William Kent of California is a wild-eyed enthusiast for Wilson and is heading a Wilson partisan league, while Mrs. Kent is a member of the Woman's party and will stump for the defeat of Wilson.

George Middleton has allied himself with the group of writers who have denounced themselves for Wilson, hile his wife, Fola La Follette, is one of the members of the Congressional group who will hold Wilson responsible for the defeat of the Susan B. Anthony amendment. Meredith Nicholson is a Wilson supporter, but Mrs. Nicholson will write and stump against Wilson on account of his attitude toward the federal suffrage amendment. Mrs. Louis F. Post is a member of the Woman's Peace party and an ardent Tolstoyan pacifist. Louis F. Post, assistant secretary of labor, is for the Administration's "reasonable" program of preparedness.

POPULAR HUGHES CAMPAIGN FUND.

The plan adopted by Cornelius N. Iss, Jr., treasurer of the Republican National Committee, to raise money for the campaign and increase the force of active workers for the election of Charles Evans Hughes to the presidency has peculiar merit. Mr. Iss asks every one who favors the election of Mr. Hughes and wishes him to have the support of a Republican senate and House to contribute \$10 and become a sustaining member of the Republican party. All such will receive a certificate of membership. If the money will prove a good investment is patent. It will help to secure for the country a more efficient administration of our national affairs, which is necessary if the prosperity and influence of the nation is to increase.



Scott & Bowne, Bloomfield, N. J.

Corn Chowder.

One can corn, four large potatoes, two onions, one-half pound bacon or ham, one tablespoonful butter, three tablespoonfuls flour, one pint milk, six crackers, one egg yolk, one-half pint boiling water. Cut potatoes into dice and put in frying pan until nicely browned. Put in kettle and simmer 20 minutes. Add milk and stir into boiling chowder. Add crackers and beaten egg and serve piping hot.

Shaking Cleanses.

To wash delicate or tender faces, put the lace in a fruit jar with shavings of some good soap, cover with warm water, let soak for a while, then shake, using if necessary several waters, then rinse in same manner, spread between pieces of muslin and roll up if desired to iron them, or roll on a bottle or jar and leave to dry. They will not be torn in this way, and will look like new.

Preventing Cakes From Sticking.

In baking cakes, gems and muffins, which are very apt to stick to the bottom of the pan, try cooling the bottom of the pan quickly on ice or by folding over it a wet cloth which has been soaked in cold water. This does not fail to bring out the cake in perfect condition.

One three-pound, with a quarter teaspoonful salt, one-eighth teaspoonful pepper, five cupfuls milk, one cupful flour, one tablespoonful minced parsley, two eggs, one-half cupful butter, three-quarters cupful of dry bread crumbs, one-half tablespoonful grated onion. Steam the dish till tender, remove the flesh from the bone and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Scald one quart of milk and thicken with the flour dissolved in the remaining milk. Season with the onion and parsley, and then pour onto the eggs, beaten; add the butter in bits, whisking it in. Butter a baking dish and put in a layer of fish and then one of sauce, alternating till all is used. Cover with the breadcrumbs and bake 45 minutes in a moderate oven.

Folding a Tablecloth.

The best housekeeper I know insists on having her tablecloths folded three times lengthwise before any cross folding is done. This prevents the ugly hump that invariably comes in the center of the table when the cloth is folded in the usual squares. Not only does the linen set better when thus cared for, but it wears longer, as breaks first come in the creases, and the heaviest threads in a tablecloth are the horizontal ones. Few housewives know this, but they may investigate for themselves. Of course these heavier threads are better able to withstand the crease of the iron.—Mother's Magazine.

Orange Ice Cream.

Boil for 20 minutes a cupful of water, the juice of three oranges and a cupful and a half of sugar. Beat the yolks of four eggs until creamy and lemon color, and slowly pour over them, beating all the time, as you would for biscuit torton, the hot sirup. Add a pinch of salt and heat over hot water, on the fire, for three minutes. Then remove from the fire and beat until cool. Then add three cupfuls of rich cream, turn into a freezer and freeze.

Lemon Cream Pudding.

Beat yolks of four eggs and four tablespoonfuls of sugar (I use more sugar). Add juice of one lemon and the grated rind and two teaspoonfuls of hot water. Cook in double boiler until thickened. Remove from fire and stir in whites of four eggs beaten stiff with two tablespoonfuls of sugar. Eat cold.

WITH MACARONI

Nutritious and Appetizing Dish That May Be Prepared at Comparatively Small Cost.

Two pounds of shank (or any preferred cut). Have saucepan very hot, fry out a piece of fat or grease bottom with butter, cut up meat and place in pan, allowing to fry until seared on every side. Salt and pepper, dredge with flour, pour on boiling water to just cover meat, cover closely and simmer slowly until nearly done. Do not add more water unless there is danger of going dry for you only want enough for gravy and not a stew. Twenty minutes before serving pare potatoes and add whole with small pieces of onions. At the same time put macaroni to cook in rapidly boiling water and allow to boil 15 minutes, stirring often with a fork so as not to break, then drain and add to meat. Cook all together until potatoes are done; take out thick part on deep platter, thicken gravy with tablespoonful of flour dissolved with little cold water, beat very smooth, then pour contents in platter and serve very hot. Dumplings can be added, but we never eat them. We like it made of round steak, but cheaper cuts are just as good, and really it is a delicious dish.—Boston Globe.

GOOD THINGS TO KNOW

When ironing table linen, iron with the selvage and not across the grain.

To clean bamboo furniture use a brush dipped in warm water and salt. The salt prevents the bamboo from turning color.


Salt rubbed on tea cups will remove tea stains, and discoloration on crockery or china will respond to the same treatment.

To clean collars apply benzine and after an hour or more, when the grease has become softened, rub it or remove with soapsuds.

A little clear coffee can be added to starch for tan or cream materials, and this is better than pure white starch in many colored things.

For black garments black starch is sold that is quite satisfactory. White starch is almost sure to give unsatisfactory results on black material.

Iron saucepans should be cleaned as soon as possible after use, and if anything greasy has been boiled in them put in some soda and boil up.

HUGHES FOR ARBITRATION.

He Would Be First to Accord to Labor All Rights Found Just After Consideration.

In his Maine speeches Mr. Hughes made it plain that he was not attacking labor or the equity of the proposed increase of wages for the railroad men. He was simply contending for the all important principle of arbitration as the right means of settlement of such questions. Speaking at different places in Maine, Mr. Hughes dwelt upon this question, saying:

"I deeply deplore, in the name of labor, in the name of justice, in the name of American ideals, the surrender of the Executive and of Congress to force, instead of permitting reason to reign.

"The measure to which I have alluded was not, properly speaking, an eight-hour measure. It was a wage measure. It was a plain proposition for a change in the wage scale. I do not speak of the equity of that. That is a matter to be fairly considered. I want what is just and right with respect to wages. I am for the arbitration and the peaceful settlement of these industrial controversies. We can settle everything in this country if we approach those matters with a fair and open mind and an examination of the facts.

"This particular measure shows on its face that it was legislation in advance of the investigation, instead of investigation in advance of legislation. It is said that there was in its favor the judgment of society. The judgment of society in this country has never been passed in favor of legislation without knowledge of the equity and regardless of the facts of the case. There was no judgment of society in favor of the roads which were excepted from its provisions. If there was a judgment of society, why not apply the rule to electric or other kinds of roads or roads less than 100 miles in length? I say, away with such pretense! It was a surrender to force instead of a clear, candid, faithful framed examination of the facts, and then action in accordance with American principles.

"Autocracy represents force; tyranny represents force. Democracy represents the rule of the common judgment after discussion, after an opportunity to know the facts."

During his two terms he has signed fifty-six labor laws, including among them the best labor laws ever enacted in this or any state.

"He also urged the enactment of labor laws in his messages to the Legislature, even going so far as to place the demand for a labor law in one of his messages to an extra session of the Legislature.

"Only 162 labor laws have been enacted in this state since its erection in 1777—in 133 years. One-third of these, exceeding in quality all of the others, have been enacted and signed during Gov. Hughes' term of three years and nine months."

Let organized labor take to heart what the Chicago Tribune says on this point: "Mr. Hughes is no demagogue and no visionary. He is a man of courage and conscience, and if labor cannot confide in his cause to his rock-bottom Americanism there is something wrong with its cause."—Boston Herald.
