

8,000 Farms Given Away.

Butte, Montana, March 7.—Some 8,000 persons had an opportunity to obtain a 160-acre homestead each in "Rocky Boy Indian" reservation, which was thrown open to settlement last week in accordance with the orders recently issued by the department of the interior. The tract comprises the choicest lands in Valley county, and is easily accessible to Colburn and Bainville. The tract comprises 1,400,000 acres, which is considerably more than the combined area of the Flathead, Spokane and Coeur d'Alene reservations which were opened to settlement last summer. Most of the land in the Rocky Boy reservation is rolling prairie and is said to be unusually fertile.

Slemp Not Worried.

He Believes Republicans Can Hold the District Against Stuart.

Washington, D. C., March 9.—The nomination of Henry C. Stuart for Congress in the Ninth Virginia District by the Democrats has started considerable political gossip. When asked to-night concerning Strother's interview in The Times-Dispatch, Congressman Slemp said: "Mr. Strother's statement was made doubtless under a misapprehension of certain facts connected with the distribution of Federal patronage, all of which will in due time be explained and straightened out."

Mr. Slemp did not seem to be worried about Mr. Stuart's candidacy. He believes that Mr. Stuart will secure the Democratic vote, and no more "The Democrats," he said, "all ways begin their campaigns as if they were going to win but it does not last. The Ninth is Republican and I have no doubt the Republicans will line up to a man and really fight harder than ever."

Wroug Views of Census.

No Harm Can Come to Any Person Who Answers the Questions.

Washington, D. C., March 9.—Letters from the census supervisors to the United States Census Bureau show the erroneous apprehension of a considerable element of the population that their answers to the enumerators' questions in the next census, beginning April 15th, this year, will cause increased taxation, legal entanglements, or injurious consequences to their persons and property.

In order to quiet such unfounded fears, which would, unless removed, materially affect the accuracy of the census, the bureau has prepared an official statement relative to the decennial census, its origin, purpose, and uses.

This statement should furnish complete assurance to those concerned that information given the enumerators is held by the Census Bureau in the strictest confidence with reference to the identity of the informants, as required by the policy of the bureau and commanded by the law of the United States.

The bureau earnestly hopes that clergymen, priests, physicians, school teachers, employers, and other public-spirited citizens who come in contact with large numbers of people, will co-operate with the bureau by telling persons who are believed to entertain erroneous opinions of the census the real facts and urging them to give full replies to the enumerators. Teachers are particularly requested to speak of the census to the school children and ask them to tell their parents about it.

The statement issued by the bureau explains that the Constitution requires a census of the population to be taken every ten years in order to re-appoint State representation in the National House of Representatives. It is the means also to ascertain the increase in the population, agriculture, industries, and resources of the nation since the last census.

It is emphatically declared, by the statement, that the information sought from the people of the United States is used solely for general statistical purposes. It will neither be published nor used in any other way to disclose facts regarding any individual or enterprise. The census, it goes on to say, is not never has been, and can not be employed to obtain information that can be used in any way in the assessment of property for purposes of taxation or the collection of taxes, either national, state, or local; or for deportation proceedings, extraordinary measures, army or navy conscription, internal revenue investigations, compulsory school attendance, child-labor law prosecutions, quarantine regulations, or in any way to affect the life, liberty, or property of any person.

It points out that replies to the enumerators are and must be held by the Census Bureau in strict and absolute confidence. All the bureau officials, supervisors, supervisors' clerks, enumerators, and interpreters, before entering upon their duties, are obliged to take a solemn oath not to disclose any information they may obtain, except to the Census Bureau, and a violation of the United States law in regard to this oath means a \$1,000 fine or imprisonment for two years, or both, in the discretion of the court.

The Fight in the Night.

Indications That It Will Be a Momentous Contest.

The Richmond Times-Dispatch has the following in connection with the coming campaign in the Ninth district:

Probably one of the most momentous campaigns in the history of the Ninth district, which has been the scene of so many stirring contests, will be the result of the nomination of Mr. Stuart. The mountain district, so long neglected as to its natural resources, and now by far the richest in the State, has always been debatable ground. Even in the seventies it was necessary for the Democrats to fight to send a representative to Congress.

In the memory of men who are not yet old in the campaigns waged by Fayette McMullin are remembered with the greatest interest. Those were the days of accusations and re-accusations, and when the code duello had not vanished from the Old Dominion.

When the power of the Readjuster-Republican organization had been broken, the Democrats of the Ninth took a lawyer, a man who had served his country in battle and who had distinguished himself in the courts, and sent him to the House of Representatives. He served two terms and despite the protests of the people, declined renomination. He said that politics did not suit him and he did not suit politics.

After the retirement of Judge Buchanan the nomination was won by "Cyclone Jim" Marshall of Craig. It was the Democratic year of 1892, and his majority over the late Major Henry Clint Wood, who has been buried only a few weeks, was the largest ever recorded in the district, exceeding 5,000. It seems strange to say that only two years later the Republicans carried the Ninth.

They were led by General James A. Walker, the grizzled commander of the Stonewall Brigade, who had been a Republican only a short time. He defeated one of the strongest men in the district, the late Judge H. S. Morrison, of Scott. Two years later in another Republican year, he secured 2,000 majority over Judge Samuel W. Williams, the present Attorney-General.

General Walker met his Waterloo in 1898, when he was defeated by Judge William F. Rhea, now a member of the State Corporation Commission, by about 1000 majority. This was doubled two years later. Judge Rhea retained his seat both times only after strenuous contests.

In 1902 Colonel Campbell Slemp entered the arena. The Democrats were over-confident, for it was the first election under the new Constitution, with the negro eliminated. They did little work, with the result that Colonel Slemp was elected by a few hundred votes. He defeated Joseph C. Wysor, of Pulaski, in 1904, and Robert P. Bruce, of Wise, in 1906.

On the death of Colonel Slemp, his son, the present Congressman, was nominated to succeed him. The Democrats made no fight, many of them supporting the independent Republican candidate, David F. Bailey, of Bristol. However, the mistake of this policy was fully apparent at the election, for Mr. Slemp was overwhelmingly elected.

A majority of nearly 4,000 was registered for Mr. Slemp in 1908, when J. Cloyd Byars, of Bristol, was the Democratic nominee.

Montague's Argument.

Appears for Republican Contestant from the Fifth District.

Washington, March 7.—Argument was heard before the House Committee on Elections last week, having under consideration the Parsons-Saunders contested election case involving the right of Judge Saunders, the sitting member, to retain his position from the Fifth Virginia district Ex-Governor Andrew Jackson Montague was the center of attraction because of the rather novel sight of a Democratic Ex-Governor trying, for a fee, to unseat a man of his own political faith and to put a Republican in his stead.

The committee room was pretty well crowded with Republican auditors, most of them from Virginia. Congressman Slemp was on hand, as was also Green Proffit, who failed to get the marshalship. The only Democrats present to hear Mr. Montague were Representatives Flood and Glass.

State Senator Parsons, the contestant, seemed pleased with the Ex-Governor's argument against the validity of the Virginia statute transferring Floyd county from the Danville to the Lynchburg district.

Sleep to Be in the Race. Contradicts Published Rumor as to Bad Health and His Probability of Retirement.

Washington, March 5.—Yesterday Representative C. B. Slemph, of the Ninth Virginia district, had his attention called to the published rumors that he would not be a candidate for re-nomination and election to Congress, this summer and fall, and that his health is, and long has been in such a precarious condition as to render it impossible to make a vigorous campaign.

STARTLING NEWS TO HIM. "That is all rather startling news to me," said Mr. Slemph. "The report that I will not stand for re-nomination is totally without authority from me. I have said nothing, directly or indirectly, to warrant any such announcement.

"Will you be a candidate against Stuart, the Democratic nominee?" was asked. "If the Republican party nominates me, I shall be," was the response, "and I shall put it up to the Republicans of the Ninth district to say whether or not they regard me as the best man to wage the fight. It all rests with the Ninth district Republicans."

"Then you have not said you would not be a candidate?" "I have not said so, nor have I directly or indirectly authorized any one else to say so."

AS TO HIS HEALTH. "Is it true that your health is bad?" "If it is I don't know it," laughed Mr. Slemph. "I have not consulted a physician for years. I am a fine trim physically and quite capable of making a vigorous campaign, I think."

Continuing, Mr. Slemph said he had not seen the publications referred to by the newspaper representatives and expressed some curiosity to know what the meaning of them could be. "I would be obliged to the papers if they will contradict the rumors for me. I have not declined to run again for Congress, and I was never in better health."

Colonel John Dietrich, a friend of Abraham Lincoln, Stephen A. Douglas and General Grant, died in his home in Plainfield, N. J., of general debility, aged 89 years.
