Contents of an Ohio Mound.
An Ohio mound was recently explored. It is located near the centre of Morgan Township, is about fifty feet in diameter at the base and six feet high, the top being a level circle thirty-five feet across. The court holds that where a prisoner is in the custody of a State court of competent jurisdiction, and not illegally arrested, he cannot be taken from under that jurisdiction and discharged by the court of the United States on a writ of habeas corpus because he is not guilty of the offense for which he is held.

HE IS NOT AT ALL CAST DOWN OR DISTURBED BY THE RESULT.

The Defection of the Independents and the Intolerant Remark of Dr. Burchard Among the Chief Causes of Defeat.

BOSTON, Nov. 13.—The Journal's Augusta, Me., correspondent sends the following account of an interview had with Mr. Blaine yesterday:

I asked Mr. Blaine what he thought would be the result of the count in New York, and he replied that he had no more means of knowing it than the unborn child. He had from the first had no desire that a fair count should be made; so far as he was personally concerned, he would be content with either result.

"You really think, then," queried the reporter, "that you got a considerable Irish vote in New York?" "Oh, I had thousands upon thousands," replied Mr. Blaine, "and should have had many more, but for the intolerant and utterly improper remark of Dr. Burchard, which was quoted everywhere to my prejudice, and in many places attributed to myself, though it was in the highest degree distasteful to me.

I asked Mr. Blaine if he thought the Irish-American vote was organized at all or had competent leaders.

"Yes," said he, "I was deeply impressed by the ability, the earnestness and the sincerity of those whom I met. There, for instance is Patrick Ford, of the Irish World. He is a man of the most unselfish devotion to any cause he espouses, possessing a great faculty for organization, with marked ability and untiring energy.

"I said to Mr. Blaine that the Irish in Boston thought he understood the character of their people better than any other Republican leader. Mr. Blaine replied that it would be egotistic for him to assume that, but said there was, perhaps, a strong leaning of the Irish element toward him, because of the fact that on his mother's side he was of Irish descent.

"Not at all," he replied; "all in the West the Germans supported me nobly. How else could I have carried Chicago by 9,000, Cincinnati by 5,000, Cleveland by 5,000? Ohio, Wisconsin, Illinois, and Iowa have the largest German population in the West, and I carried them by splendid majorities.

I shall not soon forget. At different points in the West I found German and Irish clubs cordially uniting in public demonstrations.

Your correspondent brought the conversation back to New York by asking Mr. Blaine if he thought the Prohibitionists were honest in their support of St. John.

"I have never during the campaign, replied Mr. Blaine, "reflected upon the motives of any man, and I shall not do so. I content myself with saying that I think they were misled; that they did not correctly measure the possible result of their course. I received from many of them the assurance that my candidacy made their action difficult, because they really wanted to vote for me, but they seemed to be under the strange delusion that the temperance cause could be promoted by supporting their own Presidential candidate and by their course they influenced prejudicially the National issues which were really at stake.

"You attribute the close vote in New York then, Mr. Blaine, solely to the action of the Independents and Prohibitionists?" "No, not solely," replied Mr. Blaine. "According to numerous letters I have received from central and western New York, it would seem that the rainy day lost the Republican vote. The Democratic majorities lie in the cities, where, by a few minutes walk on a good pavement, a man reaches his polling-place. The Republican majorities are in the country, where large numbers live three, four or even five miles from the polling-place, which, on election-day, had to be reached over muddy roads and in a rain storm.

Mr. Blaine turned homeward at this point. He seems to be in perfect health, and as far as any one could judge, in the best of spirits. He told me that his long tour of forty-two days on the stump had not in the least fatigued him.

An Oregon Indian killed a large cougar near Point Defiance. He found the animal lying on a sand-bar in wait for deer, and at the first shot it jumped a distance of forty feet. Stonewall Jackson, the Teacher.

A former pupil writes to the New Orleans Times Democrat the following illustrating the eccentricity of "Stonewall" Jackson.

"Commencement day" occurred annually on July 4, and we had been drilling with much regularity and constancy for several weeks previous, in order to make a creditable display before the numerous visitors who flocked to Lexington upon that occasion. It was only a day or two before the "glorious Fourth," and we had been marched to the parade ground for artillery drill, and Prof. Jackson was our instructor in artillery tactics. We were dressed in "our best" from top to toe, as we expected many visitors to witness the drill. We had scarcely commenced operations before an ominous dark cloud made its appearance in the southwest, and soon a storm of wind and rain burst upon us with much sudden violence. The lightning flashed, the thunder rolled, and the rain fell; but the drill went on without stoppage or intermission, and commands could only be understood by the waving sabres and military signs. This was rather too much even for cadet forbearance, although subjected to the strictest military discipline, especially on drill and parade; and we soon concocted a plan to steal a march upon our grim-looking instructor, and to put a truce proceeding.

"Did he really not dismiss the drill?" you may again ask. Not a bit of it. "Old Jack" proceeded with the maneuvers with the same calm equanimity, as if it was a calm June morning and not a cloud above the horizon. But our indignity was equal to the occasion, and we hesitated not a moment. We had a regular code of private telegraphic signals, intelligible to none except the initiated; and the "word" was telegraphed down the line "to remove the linch pins" which order was executed in the twinkling of an eye. The next command from our commanding officer was "retreat march," which we executed with much alacrity and precision. The wheels of the artillery carriages being minus the linch pins each one, of course, assumed an independent direction; and the battery was placed "hors de combat," considerably out of line and scattered in various directions. This, of course, ended the drill for that day at least; and the satisfaction of "getting even" with "Old Jack" fully compensated us for our drenching by the rain.

As an instructor, Prof. Jackson appeared to be careful and pains-taking; but he fell far short of being a success in that line. But Jackson's fame does not rest upon his career as a professor; the latter is a mere episode in his life, and among his admirers is not taken into consideration at all. At recitations he shot out questions like words of command, and the student who answered quickly and rapidly was sure to receive a better mark than one who replied slowly and with deliberation. He tolerated no laggards, and was wont to take the cadet who might be negligent of studies or the proper performance of his military duties. He carried his soldierly manners into the class-room, and enjoined silence and close attention during recitations. Those at the blackboard were supplied with wooden pointers in demonstrating problems, and handled them with the same precision as they did their steel sabres on drill or dress parade, whilst those called upon for oral questioning took position apart from the rest of the class, and assumed the position of a soldier at squad drill.

There was little or no social intercourse between him and the cadets. If a student went to him in his private room, for some explanation or instruction in regard to his studies, the conversation was confined strictly to the subject in hand, and that through without further delay.

SLAVE SELLING IN TANGIER.

Traffic in Human Beings Carried on Openly in the African City.

Sunday I learned, writes a Nation al Republican correspondent, was the day on which these human chattels were generally disposed of; so on the first Sunday after my arrival in Tangier I went for a walk, and presently found myself in the crowded little market. Just ahead of my conductor was a tall, turbaned Arab, with fine face and long grey beard, whom I recognized as one of the auctioneers who patrol the High street of Tangier, carry piece of calico, horse-trappings, knives, or other articles on their arms, and crying the price at which they are offered to the public.

He was moving stolidly along through the crowd of market people, who were all too busy to spare so much as a glance at him. My guide pointed to him. "Viola!" he cried. "But where is the slave?" I demanded. "Viola, monsieur, viola!" he repeated, pointing to the auctioneer, and then I saw walking wearily behind him, pausing when he paused moving when he advanced, looking look with eyes of pathetic apathy upon the busy throng around her, a girl, a child of fourteen years or thereabouts, with uncovered face, clad in a single scanty garment of white cotton. She was black, but not incomely, and she had evidently been carefully prepared in her bath for the ordeal of this morning. There she stood, alone in the crowd friendless, dejected, travel worn, hardly to be distinguished in the outward appearance from the other girls around her, and yet deprived of the first of all the rights which our human nature claims for itself--a slave without even the commonest of the privileges of humanity. The little girl looked up with a dull curiosity on her features when she observed my European dress. Then she looked away with the same sad face of hopeless dejection. I asked her price, "Thirty-five dollars" (seven pounds was the answer. Seven pounds is the price of that little bit of humanity. She had been brought from Soudan, the auctioneer told me. She had been captured there by a slave dealer, who carried her to Mogador and passed her on to another dealer, by whom she had been taken to Tangier.

She was a pagan, absolutely ignorant, but she was healthy, she was active, she was good-looking, she was--but no, my pen refuses to chronicle the list of various qualities as they were glibly enumerated by the salesman. He might have been talking of a horse or a sheep; nay, he would hardly have talked so coarsely of either of those animals as he did of those fellow-creatures of mine. Presently he turned away disappointed finding that no bid was forthcoming from me. I followed him at a little distance along the narrow, winding street. The girl was ever preading closely in his footsteps. Suddenly a woman beckoned him to a door. He entered it, still followed by the girl, and when, a few minutes afterward, he emerged, he was alone. Through my conductor I learned that he had sold the girl to the woman of the house for £3.

Table Etiquette.

A boy once remarked that he wished his mother would not have company at meals, because "a fellow can't get enough to eat when people are staring at him." This led a writer in Harper's Young People to give a few rules as to behavior at table:

Perhaps the reason boys and girls do not feel so comfortable and at ease as they might on special occasions at the table is because they do not take pains to be perfectly polite when there is no one present but the ordinary house-folks. In the first place, we owe it to ourselves always to look very neat and nice at our own table. Boys ought to be very careful that their hair is brushed, their hands and face clean, their nails free from stain and soil, and their collars and ties in order before they approach the table. A very few moments spent in this preparation will freshen them up, and give them outward appearance of little gentlemen. I hope girls do not need to be cautioned thus.

Then there are some things which good manners render necessary, but about which every one is not informed. You know you are not to eat with your knife. When you send your plate for a second helping, or when it is about to be removed, leave your knife and fork side by side upon it.

It is not polite to help yourself too generously to butter. Salt should be placed on the edge of the plate, never on the table cloth. Do not drink with a spoon in the cup and never drain the last drop. Bread should be buttered on the plate, and cut a bit at a time, and eat in that way. Eating should go on quietly. Nothing is worse than to make a noise with the mouth while eating, and to swallow food with noticeable gulps.

Do not think about yourself, and fancy that you are the object of attraction to your neighbors.

The construction of the first street cable tramway in Scotland is just about to be begun on the north side of Edinburgh, where the gradients are very steep. The continuous iron cable, which will work both sections, will be about six miles in length. The capital of the company formed for working this new tramway is £200,000.

Egyptian Women of the Nile.

The only primitive costumes we saw was on the first day after leaving Assouan on the left bank--the country of the Kalabash--where the young ladies simply wore round the loins a fringe composed of thin leather strips. The married ladies were clothed to the feet. Curiously enough, the women on both banks hate or dread being looked at through a glass. One I saw run away, screaming as hard as she could; others at once cover their blanching faces with their hands. It is a fact not generally known that dark-skinned ladies blush white. Others again anatomize you according to a fashion extending all over the east, even among the Greeks of Constantinople, by holding up their hand, palm outward, and jerking it toward you. This, I am told, means, may five devils seize you! If they wish to emphasize the spell they put up ten fingers. Others say this is a protection against the evil eye. At some villages, encouraged by soldiers, who flung biscuits from the decks, lads and girls ran frantically along the banks screaming for them, to the great indignation of the land-owners, over whose crops they ran riot. In vain these colored gentlemen stood in the way, hugging mud and stones at them. They scrambled by, and continued the chase as long as biscuit was flung, or until dead beat.

A gentleman in Ware, Mass., recently let go a tame deer in the woods near the town. All the young bloods immediately started out with their firearms in spite of the protestations of the deer's former owner. They have as yet failed to bring down the game.


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Judging of Distance.
