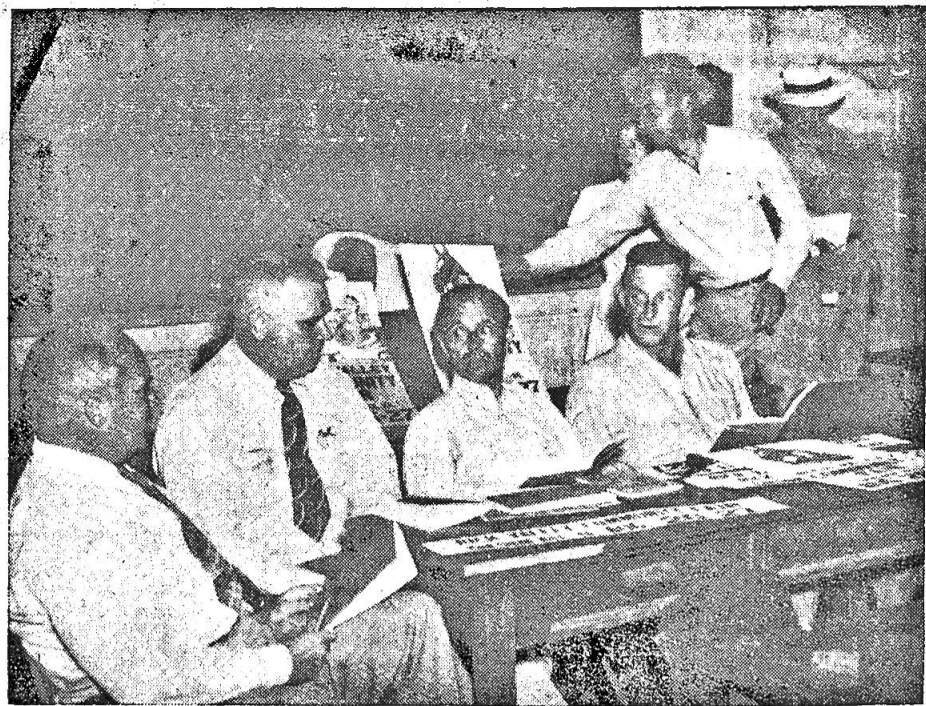

LIFE IN SMYTH COUNTY



FUNERAL SERVICE for Jack Lawrence McGlothlin, 18 — co-captain of the 1949 Marion High School football team and president of the school's monogram club — was held Monday afternoon from the Marion Baptist Church.

He was killed at 1:45 Saturday afternoon when thrown from an old convertible driven by James Walter Severt, also 18 and also of Marion, when the car wrecked off Lee Highway near the Gammon Farm at Groseclose.

Severt received a brain concussion and cuts of the head. At Lee Memorial Hospital Monday his condition was reported good and he was expected to be able to go home within a few days, Dr. Dick Hutton said. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. A. H. Severt.

The two boys were driving to Wytheville to bring back a car for Severt's sister. The top on the convertible was down when they ran into a shower which made the road slick. Evidence at the scene of the accident was that Severt attempted to pull to a wide place to his left to stop and put the top up. The car spun on the slick road and hit a phone pole. McGlothlin was thrown from it and into some rocks. The injury which killed him was a puncture at the side of the head which entered his brain.

Young McGlothlin was center on last year's football team but Coach Leon Noel expected to use him as a fullback in the coming season. He was an outstanding forward on the basketball team, played left field in baseball and ran the 100 and 220 yard dash for Marion High School. He was the best prospective dash man in several years. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. B. McGlothlin of Pendleton Street. Also surviving him are two sisters, Mrs. Paul Harrington and Jane McGlothlin, and one brother — also a football player — W. B. McGlothlin Jr., all of Marion.

The final service was conducted by the Rev. Primitivo Delgado and the Rev. Ralph Noonkester. School mates were the bearers.

Community Center Assured

Goal Reached; Work To Start Very Soon

Work on Marion's new community center will begin in the very near future, Chairman R. E. Moore has announced.

Amount raised in cash, notes and pledges reached \$14,691.40 this week. The money goal was \$14,650 with the expectation of some extra gifts of materials. About \$2,000, mostly cinder block, has been pledged in this way.

A few contributions are still expected. It is the hope of many who have gone over the plans for the building that it can be made 40 by 80 instead of 40 by 70, the size on which the cost estimate was made.

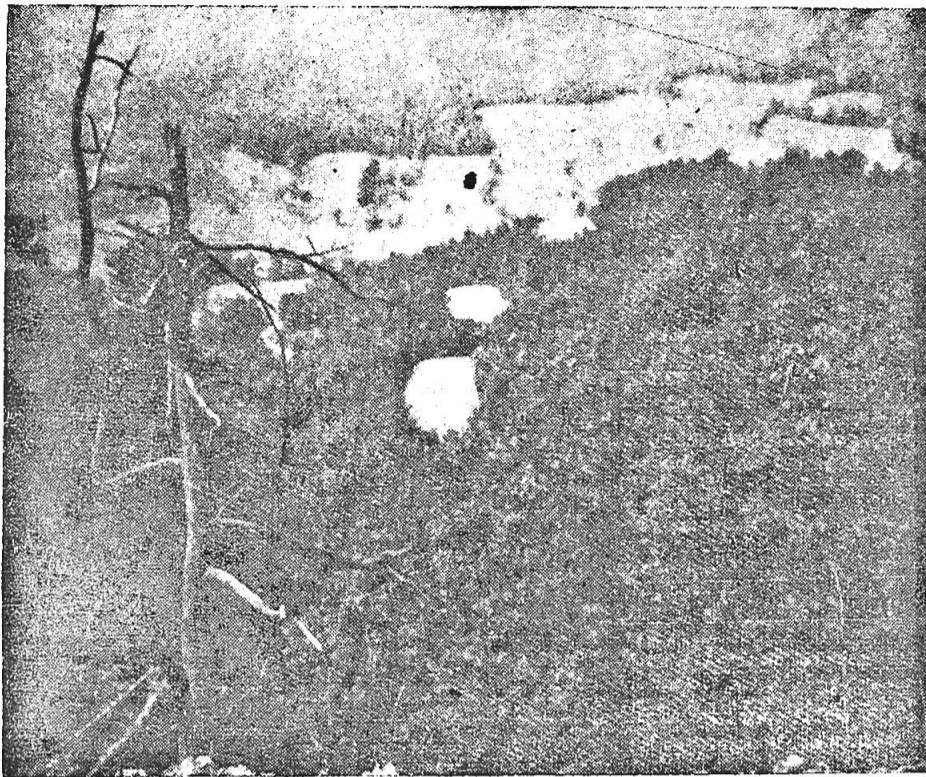
When the ground breaking takes place, some contributions of free labor will probably be asked to help make the additional length possible, Mr. Moore says.

The Lions Club plans soon to put on some sort of public entertainment to make money to meet its good sized pledge.

Q. A. Calhoun, Henry Durrschmidt and Glynn Barranger make up to building committee. They were empowered to go ahead as soon as possible at a meeting of campaign workers Tuesday night.

The recreation center, a two story structure, will be located on 100 feet of the town parking lot. The title to the building and land will be held by the town of Marion. A three man recreation commission is to be appointed to be in charge.

The Junior Woman's Club has offered to continue its work of supervising the operation of a teen age center in the building.

ONLY A BRIDGE is lacking to complete an easily traveled grade and connection by new route 16 north of Marion to the "One Way Mountain" road to Tazewell at Asberry's in Freestone Valley, and that bridge will be completed by December.

Doubters said it couldn't be done, but state highway department engineers and a convict road force have cut a grade down the north side of Brushy Mountain into Freestone Valley. The grade is wide, safe and easy.

A dip over the road, which is still under construction, was made last Friday by the three members of the Smyth County Board of Supervisors and O. T. Aichel, resident highway engineer.

They drove from Marion to the present end of construction at the foot of Sugar Tree Hollow in Freestone at a moderate pace in considerably less than an hour.

At Black Hill, where route 16 going north crosses east-west route 42, they saw a sign which gives the present mileage, "To Tazewell 27 miles," it said. That meant, since they had come 12 miles from Marion, that at present it is 39 miles to Tazewell by the so-called "near way."

Over the new road from Black Hill the mileage to Tazewell, instead of 27 miles, will be only 17. It is seven miles over the new grade up and over Brushy Mountain to Asberry's in the next valley, and from Asberry's to Tazewell about 10 miles over only one mountain.

The picture at the top gives some idea of the engineering feat in placing the grade. It was taken from the new grade of short distance below the top of the north side of Brushy Mountain looking north down into Freestone Valley, and shows at center right three loops of the road as it doubles back around a long spur. Just to the left of these loops and to the right of the old tree is a thin white line which is the final half mile of the road as it enters the valley.

The other picture shows the road as it tops Brushy Mountain and starts down the north side. The wide and easy grade is evident.

The three supervisors — Walter Jackson, Claude Stephenson and Ike Sturgill — were unanimously enthusiastic about the new grade, and joined in the comment that the next step is to get the grade on the south side of Walker's Mountain above Hungry Mother Park in shape to match the new road, then drive for a hard surface all the way from Marion to Tazewell.

The new grade has been driven north from Black Hill into Freestone Valley by convict labor using state highway department machinery and has been done at remarkably low cost. Only \$200,000 has been appropriated for grading this road, and — including the bridge — the grading job will be done for less than this total for the seven miles of new road.

Both men were trustees; Fair as hogmaster, Newton as cook.

Aid Requested For Judging Contest

A livestock and dairy judging contest for teams representing the F.F.A. chapters at High schools in the Smyth-Wythe-Bland Federation will be one of the features of the Rich Valley Fair this year, and J. T. Gardner, agricultural instructor at Rich Valley, has voiced a request for the co-operation and assistance of all chapters.

The contest will be held Friday, August 26, at 10 a.m. There will be two classes each of beef cattle, sheep and dairy cattle. The fair association will furnish the official judges.

Union Okays New Brunswick Work Contract

"Cost of Living" Clause is Feature

Labor and management have reached an agreement for a work contract at Brunswick-Balke-Collender Company of Marion which will be effective until July 31, 1950, and which features a "cost of living" escalator wage clause.

Company and union representatives met Tuesday morning and signed the agreement after it had been approved by union members at a meeting at the court house in Marion Monday night.

Negotiations had been in progress since May.

In the agreement, Local 1764, United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners, A. F. of L., and the company extended the present agreement with some changes.

Most important of these was the addition of the escalator cost of living clause. This provides protection to the employees against any raise in the cost of living. It is based on the cost of living index put out by the U. S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, and provides — in steps of three percent — for an increase in wages equal to any increases in the cost of living.

The contract does not carry any provision for a decrease in wages in the event of a decrease in the cost of living. The wage scale provided in the 1948-49 contract is the base.

The new agreement also provides for the payment of approximately \$20,000 in vacation pay to B-B-C employees during the remainder of the year.

The agreement was negotiated by the following:

For the company — J. J. Stefan, secretary and director; V. L. Holmstrom, home office personnel manager; J. B. Neel Jr., personnel manager of the Marion plant.

For the union — Lewis J. Hutton, international representative; Charlie B. Moser, president of the local; R. L. Vernon Jr., W. L. Comer, James A. White, Willard B. Blevins, union committeemen.

Commissioners J. E. Kelley and G. S. McCutcheon of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service assisted in the negotiations.

The new agreement was signed in the office of J. W. Sealise, works manager of the Marion plant. Mr. Sealise commended the union representatives for what he said was the gentlemanly way in which they had conducted themselves during the negotiations and on their sympathetic approach to the problems confronting the company.

"Our sales are definitely off this year and employment at the plant has been at a very low level, Mr. Sealise said. "However, we are making every effort to develop new products that will increase our sales volume and bring more work into the plant."

The union committee has indicated that they think the agreement is fair to all concerned and said the union stands ready and willing to assist the company in every way possible in maintaining a favorable competitive position and getting more work into the plant.

Collins Tops State as Vote Getter

His 193,641 Votes Highest in Primary

To Lt. Gov. L. Preston Collins of Marion went the honor of being the top vote getter in the August 2 primary, according to an official tabulation of the returns made by the State Board of Elections at Richmond this week.

His vote of 193,641 to succeed himself as the Democratic nominee led Attorney General Lindsay Almond's vote by 5,000. Collins' opponent, Mayor Nick Prillaman of Martinsville, got 90,621 votes and was beaten by more than 100,000. The Almond vote was 188,642 to 93,726 for Moss Plunkett.

Final official figures for the four way gubernatorial race were:

John S. Battle 135,426; Francis Pickens Miller 111,697; Horace H. Edwards 47,435; Rennie L. Arnold 22,054. That made the Battle plurality over Miller 23,729.

As evidence of the regard in which the workers held the results of their committee's negotiations, it is reported that the vote for acceptance of the contract was unanimous at Monday night's union meeting.

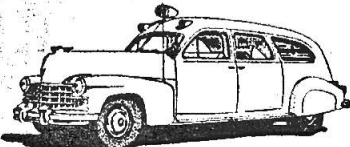

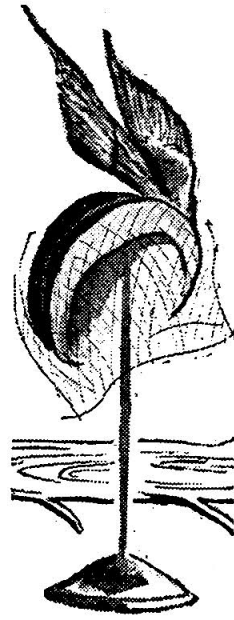

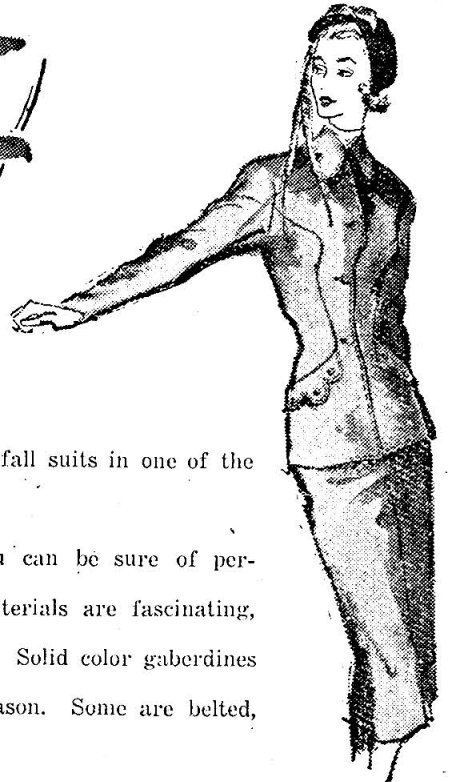

No announcement of the 1950 budget will be made until all items are complete.

Present at last Thursday's meeting were the Rev. Edgar Ferrill, president; Miss Leola Fields, secretary, and John S. Lipscomb, Quincy Calhoun, Mrs. Margaret Seaver, Cecil Greer, Forrest Deaton and Bob Anderson, directors. Mr. Greer, as first vice-president, will head the annual fund drive.

Cars Telescoped By Big Truck

No one was injured but two cars were damaged when telescoped by a large tractor-trailer on North Main Street in Marion Monday morning.

A coal truck driven by Samuel E. Sutherland of Cleveland had stopped preparatory to making a left turn into Lee Street, and behind it the cars of Clyde E. Oelschlager of Bridgeville, Pa., and James I. Catton of Whitefield, Md., also came to a stop. All were east bound.

Mr. Catton's car was struck from the rear by the tractor-trailer driven by William H. Moore of Roanoke, and bounced forward into the rear of Oelschlager's car.

In Marion mayor's court Monday afternoon Moore pleaded guilty to reckless driving and was fined \$10. The other drivers were acquitted of the same charge. A damage estimate on the Oelschlager car was \$125 and on the Catton car about \$200.

Witnesses heard included Chief Ralph Wolfe, the three drivers, and Charles I. Stone, Ralph Wassum, Mack Trail and O. M. Thomas, all of Marion. All agreed that Moore was not making excessive speed.

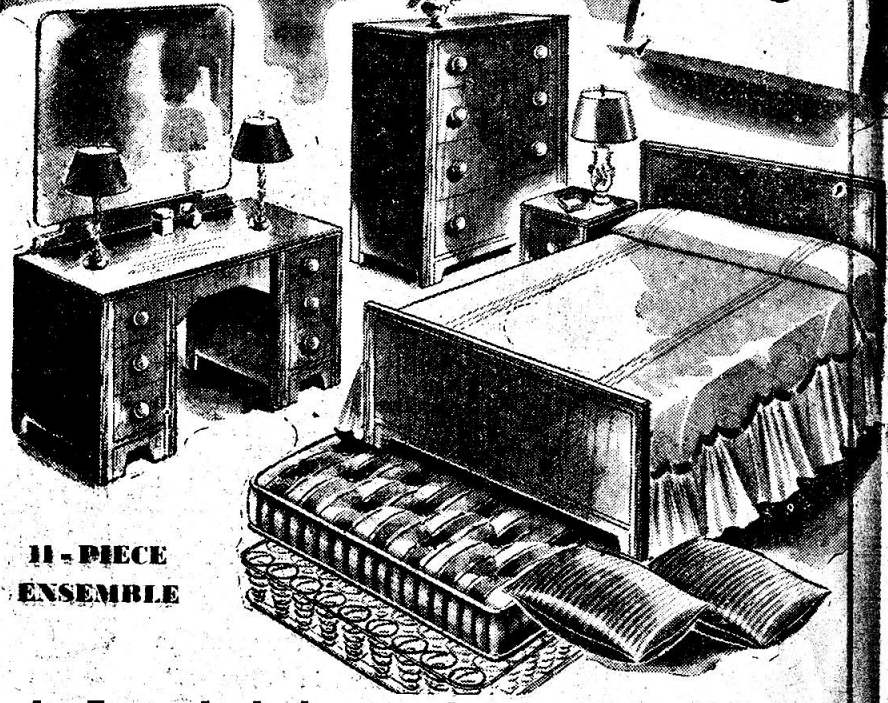

Mathieson Employees Get New Industrial Insurance

A new type of industrial insurance was proposed for the Saltville plant of Mathieson Chemical Corporation at a meeting Monday afternoon at Saltville Town Hall.

"The same type of insurance," said Ray B. Worthy, plant manager, "is being installed in all of the Mathieson plants. The advantages offered in this plan would cost \$500-\$600 a year per person if it were possible to buy this insurance outside of the Mathieson plan."

Mr. Worthy pointed out that Mathieson Chemical Corporation is paying 65 per cent of the cost of the insurance, leaving 35 per cent in the hands of the individual, to be deducted from the pay each month.

Mr. Worthy said that regardless of income, all employees receive the same daily hospital benefit, hospital fees and sur-

gical benefit. There is also a complete set up for dependents' benefits for hospital fees and surgical benefits.

Mr. Worthy pointed out that for the largest number of employees at Saltville the total cost of this insurance will be about \$3.61 a month, regardless of the number of dependents. The policy for this group carried \$3,000 of life insurance.

Mr. Worthy said that the plan would become effective in 30 days and that there is no physical examination necessary if employees take out the insurance within this period. There is also no age restriction during this time.

Mr. Worthy concluded that the Baltimore plant employees had subscribed to this insurance plan 100 per cent. He said that he hoped that Mathieson employees at Saltville would take full advantage of this opportunity.

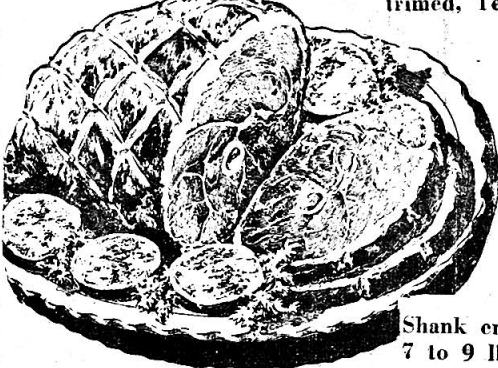
