

### Shawsville Depot Burned.

Shawsville, Va., Dec. 15.—Fire originating in the Norfolk & Western station at this place Sunday totally destroyed that building and practically all its contents entailing a loss to the railroad company of about \$6,000 from that source while several thousand cross ties near the building were burned at a loss of \$1,000. About 217,000 feet of lumber of the Mountain Grove Lumber Co., which company is owned by the White Brothers of this place, was destroyed at a loss of between four and five thousand dollars. The fire started from the furnace in the depot. The total loss to all parties concerned will not fall short of \$12,000. It is understood that work will be begun immediately on a new station.

### Expert Visits Our Public School

Dr. Taliaferro Clarke, of the United States public health department, delivered an interesting and instructive address here last Friday morning before the public school on the work of the public health department. Dr. Clarke is at present investigating health conditions in Southwest Virginia, and is on the lookout especially for trachoma, a new disease of the eye. According to Dr. Clarke, 75 per cent of the people afflicted with this terrible disease finally lose sight in both eyes. It is also an extremely painful affliction. Dr. Clarke found several cases in Bristol, and also two in Abingdon. No cases were found here. All the children in the public schools were examined.

Dr. Clarke graduated from Emory and Henry in the class of 1886 and referred to the fact that he was a school mate of the Postmaster and Dr. J. D. Buchanan, of our town.

A petition for a local option election in the town of Damascus, Washington, Virginia, was presented at Abingdon Thursday to Judge F. B. Hutton, of the Circuit Court of Washington county. The petition was gotten up under the local option law and is signed by requisite per cent of legally qualified voters of the town of Damascus. The voting population of Damascus, as shown by the returns of the last election, is 74 and 24 of that number have signed the petition. The "drvs" have engaged counsel to fight the petition.

### Kick from a Dead Mule Fractures a Man's Leg.

Big Laurel, Va., Dec. 18.—Edward Gardner, a farmer near here, had an old mule which died a few days ago, and with the help of a hired man, started to haul the carcass to the bone yard. They larded it on a sled and to get it to stay on they pressed its legs down between the standards. The hired man was driving the team that was hauling the dead mule and Gardner was walking behind. The sled struck a stone in the road with such force that the mule's foot was dislodged, straightening out violently, striking Mr. Gardner on one of his legs and breaking it below the knee.

Walter S. Phipps, son of Joseph Phipps, died the latter part of last week at his home near Independence. His death was due to complication and pneumonia. He is survived by his widow, who was Miss Ella Cox, and three small children.

Bristol, Va., Dec. 15.—It was announced here last night as positive that Peyton St. Clair, of Giles county, has withdrawn from the contest for the collectorship for the western district of Virginia.

This has put the politicians to guessing. The Ninth district Democrats will still hope to win. Prominent among those mentioned as compromise candidates are General R. A. Ayers, of Big Stone Gap, and Captain S. V. Fulkerson, of Bristol.

Theodore Oswald Grandstaff, the eighteen-month-old son of Theodore Grandstaff, of Beans Gap, in the Blue Ridge, is dead from drinking concentrated lye. Lye, dissolved in water and used for cleaning purposes, had been left in a cup, and an older child gave it to the baby when he wanted water.

Houston, Dec. 18.—A hundred and sixty-five persons perished, twenty thousand people were driven from their homes, and property was damaged, to the extent of six million dollars, by floods that have torn through several sections of Texas during the last ten days. This was the estimate compiled from reports received from the afflicted territory.

The editor of a newspaper published at Bristol, Pa., has given his readers a graphic statement of the effect of the tariff upon the industries in his town. He does not argue the tariff question from a theoretical standpoint, but says bluntly that the Underwood bill already has affected Bristol's mill interests. By the first of the year, when the new textile schedules go into effect, he says, the indignations of the havoc the bill will work are sure to be apparent to everyone.

Shorter hours will mean less pay, and the merchant will be hit hard because collections will be more difficult and longer credit must be given the wage earner. He tells the shoe merchant, haberdasher, butcher and grocer what they already know and fear—that the question which looms up large upon the horizon is the pay envelope. The goods made abroad and sold here displace just so much of the domestic product. The money to pay for foreign goods goes abroad and never comes back. The money paid for goods made here goes to the American wage earner and by him is paid for living expenses to the local merchant.—American Economist.

### How One Man Got Rich Buying Coal Land.

Bristol, Va., Dec. 16.—Charles F. Hagan, of this city, as trustee for the large estate of his father, Colonel Patrick Hagan, the Southwest Virginia land baron of Scott county, who recently sold to the Clinchland Timber Corporation, represented by Attorney R. T. Irvine, of Big Stone Gap, the timber rights on a boundary of 23,000 acres of land in Scott and Wise counties, at a cash consideration of \$200,000.

This tract has been owned by Patrick Hagan for many years. Only the timber rights were sold, as the coal rights on it are estimated to be worth considerably more than \$2,000,000.

Patrick Hagan settled in Scott county many years ago, after coming to America from Ireland, and became one of the most brilliant lawyers in this section. He stuck close to his profession and made money, which he invested in Southwest Virginia mountain lands, buying much as low as 10 cents per acre. He added to his holdings until at one time he could get on a horse at his home in Scott county and ride to Letcher, Kentucky, without getting off his own land. He has sold off much of the property, but has a vast area left. He sold one tract of 114,000 acres for as many dollars, that is now worth several millions. He sold a large area to George J. Carter and another to the Virginia Iron, Coal and Coke Company. When he purchased the land it was not known that it was underlain with a wealth of coal.

Mr. Hagan is now eighty-six years old, and is in retirement at his palatial home in Scott county. He has turned all of his business affairs over to his son, Charles F. Hagan, as trustee. He is reputed to have the largest income of any man in the State of Virginia, and the responsibility of his large estate rest upon one.

### Wife-Beater Slain Near Tazewell

Bluefield, W. Va., Dec. 18.—A tragedy was enacted on Cavitt's Creek about one o'clock Saturday morning when a became necessary for Deputy Sheriff Geo. B. Fuller, in defense of his life, to shoot and kill D. W. Wyrick, a man with an unsavory reputation and for whose arrest a warrant had been issued charging him with beating his wife. A coroner's inquest was held immediately and the officer was completely exonerated; it being proved conclusively that he shot in self defense.

Wyrick left a widow and three small children.

The charge struck the infant child of Mr. Williams, it is not hurt seriously.—Lee County Sun.

Mr. E. M. Reppas and family who resided about 2 miles North of Marion, have moved to Grosecove.

Extending over a period of eight weeks, there have been thirteen cases of smallpox in and around Blacksburg. These are of the mildest type. All of these cases are now out on quarantine except three small children in one family.

The China agency of the American Bible Society reports issued for the first six months 905,416 Bibles, Testaments. If this rate of issues continues during the year it may be expected to reach 2,000,000,000 copies. The agent adds: "Notwithstanding the sending out of this enormous number of scriptures were unable to supply all that were called for."

### Sold Bitters; Gets 30 Days.

Lebanon, Va., Dec. 15.—David Munsey, a prominent merchant in the lower part of the county, was indicted and convicted of selling bitters in violation of the revenue law and given thirty days in jail.

A criminal case that has attracted much attention here is the case of the Commonwealth against H. S. Bales, of Wythe county. Mr. Bales bought some thirty-five hundred or four thousand dollars' worth of cattle from prominent cattle men in this county and his check went to protest Deputy Sheriff C. W. Hunt went to Wythe county and brought him here and he was bonded to answer to the indictment found against him at this court in February. He is being prosecuted under the recent act of the Legislature in regard to passing of fraudulent checks.

### Bristol Office Again in Danger.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 18.—The Bristol, Va., postoffice is again threatened with extermination. It is learned on the best of authority that a clause has been inserted in the postoffice appropriation bill now being prepared by the house committee to prohibit the use of any funds set aside by that bill, for the maintenance of any postoffice which is within a certain distance of another postoffice located in a federal building.

Representative Slemm learned of the obnoxious provision in the bill and immediately asked Chairman Moon to grant a hearing on the matter. When the hearing is set he will have a delegation from Virginia Bristol come to Washington and present arguments against the proposition.
