



David B. Hill Dies at Home

Albany, N. Y., Oct. 24.—David B. Hill, former United States Senator and former Governor of New York, died at his home here last Thursday morning.

He was born Aug. 29, 1815. At twenty-one he was admitted to the bar and became Mayor of Elmira. In 1870 he was elected to the Assembly, and again in 1871. During the first term he made a memorable fight to abolish convict contract labor. For many years he was a member of the Democratic State committee, and was elected Lieutenant-Governor on the ticket with Cleveland and became Governor when Cleveland became President of the United States. He was elected two other terms. He was United States Senator in 1891, and was a candidate of the New York Democrats for President in 1892, but Cleveland was nominated.

World-wide Advance.

While Democratic politicians are charging that the new tariff law is responsible for the present prices of food stuffs and the cost of living, they should explain how it is that even greater advances, the last few years, in prices are shown in foreign countries, in fact, the world over. They are certainly not foolish enough to take it for granted that the people believe that the United States tariff is operative the world over as to food-stuff prices and the cost of living.

What does this country's present tariff law have to do with the prices of food stuffs and the cost of living in Canada as described by the Labor Gazette issued by the Department of Labor of Canada? The Labor Gazette says:

"For some years past one of the most important features of the general industrial development and economical situation in Canada, as in several other countries, has been an advance in prices and the cost of living."

In the United Kingdom, in 1909, the wholesale price of bacon was 31.5 per cent, fresh beef (according to description) up to 38.9 per cent, mutton (according to description) up to 46.6 per cent, wheat 5.2 per cent, and corn 25.3 per cent higher than here. In Germany and Austria the prices of meats, at the present time, are much higher than here.

Thus are seen the conditions that prevail in several in several other countries, in some of which low wages by virtue of free-trade and other opposition to labor force the people to do without meat altogether. These conditions abroad are positive exposures of the falsity and error of the Democratic charge.

Arguments That Will Influence Voters.

When the arguments that will influence voters in the approaching Congressional elections are sifted down to an irreducible minimum this fact of the country's prosperity is going to show up large. Singularly enough, endeavor is being made to create dissatisfaction with the new Tariff in the South and Central West. The South is getting sixteen cents a pound for its cotton—nearly three times the price prevailing under the last Democratic tariff—and the West is getting \$1 per bushel for its wheat and sixty-five cents for its corn, or just about double the prices obtained under the Wilson-Gorman tariff. The Republican party in the campaign that is ahead will stand upon the policies and the record of the party and will win. It is only a question this year, as it was two years ago, of how large the Republican majority in the next House is going to be.—Capitol Hill (Okla.) News.

Wysor Condemns Stuart.

Having been led to believe that, and we having received our commissions under that state of affairs, we are bound as honorable men, to comply with our contract. How are you going to get around it? Here is the way: You say you had a recess, and you went home during the recess, and had a little mass-meeting and the mass-meeting told you to proclaim the Constitution; therefore I am going to vote contrary to the will of the people as expressed at the polls; I am going to violate my commission; I am going to exercise a power not given to me."

Mr. Wysor said, and truly: "We are bound as honorable men to comply with our contract." Stuart squirmed out of complying with his contract.

Is he an honorable man? Is he a man worthy of trust and honor? Not according to Mr. Wysor.





Now the Payne schedule, which we have before us, admits diamonds, but (not set), at ten to twenty per cent. Jewelry and diamonds, set ready for the market, sixty and eighty-five per cent. Boots and shoes, made of leather, ten and fifteen per cent. Now, with such misrepresentation, how can the people believe what they see in the Democratic papers. We have the comparative schedules of both the Dingley and Payne bills in our office, and will be glad to exhibit them to any one. The duty on boots and shoes is ten and fifteen per cent less under the Payne than under the Dingley bill. So the tariff is not responsible for any increase in the price of shoes. The Democrat further misrepresents by saying: "You voted to admit hides free of tax and voted then to increase the tax on shoes and leather goods." The Payne bill lowered the duty on boots and shoes, and on practically all leather goods, from ten to fifteen per cent.

Stuart's Campaign is a Campaign of Deception.

Editor Bristol News:
Henry C. Stuart spoke at Wise, Va., last Monday, Oct. 10th. He made many reckless statements, some of which I noted at the time, and if you will allow me the space in your paper I will mention a few of them.
Speaking with uplifted hand, he said: The schedules of the Payne-Aldrich bill increased the price of EVERYTHING you have to buy." I know he said this, for I was there and heard him; otherwise I might have doubted that a man of his reputation would have uttered such a palpably indefensible statement. But he did say it, and he said it right in the teeth of the fact that there were decreases in schedules involving 654 commodities, while the free list was so greatly enlarged that the official statements show that more than half of our total imports enter the country absolutely free of duty. To say that a decrease in the tariff causes a rise in the price is about as logical as it would be to say that the heavier an object is the easier it is blown away by a gust of wind. That prices have advanced on articles on which the tariff was reduced, is an undeniably fact, as in the case of leather and shoes, but to claim that the advance was caused by the Payne tariff law is preposterous, and worthy only of an ignoramus or a demagogue.

Another statement he made was that "every time you buy a pound of sugar the Payne tariff takes two cents out of your pocket and puts it in the pocket of the sugar trust." This is one of Swanson's, and Stuart is now repeating it. Let us see about this. The tariff on sugar of the standard of seventy-five per cent. purity is less than one cent a pound and on sugar of one hundred per cent. purity less than two cents a pound. But for the sake of argument, suppose it is two cents a pound. Who asks for that duty on sugar? Louisiana Democrats. For, while much has been said and written about beet sugar, the fact remains that seventy per cent. of the sugar produced in this country is of Louisiana production. Now it is not fair to accuse the Republican party of neglecting Southern interests and then criticize it for fostering them. Now as to whether the tariff goes to the trust or not is easily shown. All the cane sugar and all the beet sugar produced in the country still fall far short of supplying the American market, and millions of pounds are annually imported from Cuba and other countries. Now when the importer lands his sugar he pays the tariff (supposedly) two cents a pound. The government gets that now sure, although it is said that a flim-flam game used to be worked on it. But it gets that duty now, wherever it is, and Stuart says it is two cents a pound. Then Stuart says the trust gets two cents a pound. Two and two make four. Now I bought sixteen pounds of sugar at retail the other day for one dollar, which made it cost at my door six and two-third cents a pound. What this sugar cost at the refinery, I do not know; certainly not more than five cents a pound. So, according to Stuart, there is only one cent a pound left to pay the producer and to pay freight and cooperage, the cost of refining and packing and the profits which every business concern is compelled to have and is entitled to.

When such rank statements as these are examined, it is perfectly plain that Stuart's campaign is one of deception this year, just as it was back in the days when he deceived the people of Russell county about the provisions of the new Constitution and its proclamation.

The Cost of Living.
"Advances in the cost of living are only the local reflection of a tendency that is world-wide and cannot truthfully be said to be due to the present tariff."—From Mr. Roosevelt's Saratoga platform.
Roosevelt is right and no Democrat can "truthfully" show that the present tariff law is the cause of the general rise in prices. If you buy an article and your merchant tells you that the tariff is the cause of the advance, demand that he give you the rates of duty on such article under both the Dingley and Payne law. You will find in about nine cases out of ten the duty is the same or lower under the Payne bill than under the Dingley bill.

Lying on Slemm.

But Yarns Are Being Told in a Way That Counts.—Fake Tobacco Yarn.
Saltville, Va., Oct. 25.—Some Democrats have been industriously circulating a report in this section that Congressman Slemm obtained the passage of a measure requiring the growers of tobacco to secure a license in order to retail their tobacco at their homes. The fact that this is an absolute lie was thoroughly known, but as a matter of precaution an inquiry was addressed to Hon. R. E. Cabell, commissioner of internal revenue, at Washington, upon this question and the following is his reply, bearing date Oct. 21st:

THE LIE NAILED.
"The allegation that Mr. Slemm, or any other congressman, has had a law passed by Congress requiring growers of tobacco to procure a government license to enable them to retail tobacco of their own growth is without foundation in fact.
"Farmers and growers of tobacco have long had the privilege under the law to sell their leaf tobacco in any quantity desired, at any time and at any place, without any restriction whatever. They are not required to pay any tax on leaf tobacco so sold, and no books showing such sales are required to be kept by them.
"Mr. Slemm voted for the act of August 5, 1909, in Section 35, of which it is provided, 'that nothing in this act shall be construed as imposing any restrictions whatsoever upon the farmers or growers of leaf tobacco in regard to sales of their tobacco.'
"This same act, for which Mr. Slemm voted, provided for the retail dealers in leaf tobacco, who are authorized to purchase leaf tobacco from farmers and retail the same to consumers, thus furnishing a good home market for tobacco growers, which in a measure relieves them from the necessity of hauling their product to market.
"From the foregoing it will be seen that the interest of tobacco growers has been taken care of in the very best manner possible. This lie is 'nailed,' and from the reports in the newspapers, it is only one of many that have been started by the Democrats in the frantic endeavor to discredit Mr. Slemm locally in various communities. These dirty and infamous campaign methods will undoubtedly prove disastrous to the Democratic party and candidates, as all men of the better sense of honor and integrity will be thoroughly disgusted at such tactics, and it is certain that they will strongly evidence their disapproval at the polls, by not only their votes but their active personal assistance to Mr. Slemm's cause."

Beveridge on Democracy.
The Democratic newspapers and Democratic speakers, especially Mr. Stuart, have been quoting from Senator Beveridge and lauding him to the skies. Note what Senator Beveridge recently said in a speech commenting on the character of Democratic leadership in Nation and State:

"The Democratic party in the Nation is controlled by Tammany Hall in New York, which is 'concerned only in the enormous and purely local loot of the great cities of the empire State,' by Roger Q. Sullivan's machine in Illinois, which is 'allied with all the evil interests,' by Tom Taggart's machine in Indiana, 'which prostitutes every consideration of public welfare to its own ends.'
"Consider with these the Martin-Swanson machine in Virginia, and among other things, its absolutely unfair election laws, its disfranchisement of thousands of poor white men in the Ninth district that were stamped out with force a few years ago, its rotten primary corruption that has been unearthed by thoroughly aroused citizens in the Second district this fall and last, but not least, the enormous tribute that poor families pay through the medium of exorbitant prices that must be paid for school books, and the frequent changes of the books, that keep poor families continually buying school books at these exorbitant prices. This hits your pocket-book.
"Continuing, with reference to these Democratic machines, Senator Beveridge said: 'It is such elements, together with the solid South, which dominate the Democratic party today, and the Democracy of the South would break to pieces within a year but for the South's local race problem and appeals to sectional prejudice—appeals which, thank God, are losing their power.'
"As a Republican I do not rejoice in this plight of the Tammany-controlled and misnamed Democratic party of today. With all my heart I wish its elements, purpose and record were otherwise. Were it a party which honest men men who differ from us could trust and vote for, knowing that this faith would not be betrayed, it would be easier to fight for righteousness."

Stuart says Beveridge is a patriot and a great man, so what he says about the Democratic party must be so.

A Display of Democratic Ignorance.

Although the tariff question is by far the most important one dividing the two great parties in this country, it is absolutely astonishing to see the gross ignorance which the Democratic press and speakers are constantly displaying on that all important subject. They do not seem to comprehend even its most elementary principles: For instance, we have frequently seen the following and similar paragraphs in the columns of the low tariff newspapers:
"Mr. Slemm says in his circular, which bears his portrait, that the average ad valorem on dutiable exports under the Payne law, for which he voted—is 41.73 per cent. and under the (Democratic) Wilson law, 42.82 per cent. and under the McKinley law 47.10 per cent. Now if the Wilson bill closed all the factories and brought on the country with a tariff of 42.82 per cent., what will the Payne law do with a tariff of only 41.73 per cent? We ask our Republican friends to consider this."

Instead of there being any contradiction in the figures as given above every one who understands the subject can understand them at a glance. The 41.73 per cent. is calculated on the entire amount of imports and the reason the per cent. is so much lower is because of the very large amount which has been added to the free list, which of course reduces it on the whole amount of imports. It is the amount of tariff which is placed on the imports which come into competition with those articles which are produced in this country which determines whether it (the tariff) is protective or not.

only 41.73 per cent. may be immense more protective than one which amounts to 42.82 per cent; for the duties may be, and in this case are so adjusted as to afford ample protection to the industries of this country, while the per cent. on the total amount of imports is very much reduced because so very many articles did not need protection which have been added to the free list.—Bristol News.

Eighteen years ago the Democrats preached tariff for revenue and denounced the Republican doctrine of protection to American labor, just as they are preaching and denouncing now. Some Republicans—a number sufficient to make a majority—were convinced and the Democratic tariff for revenue was tried.


