

DEATH OF THOS. H. FRANCIS

Foreman of Marion News 24 Years

Thomas H. Francis died Monday evening at the Southwestern Hospital, where he was taken a few weeks ago to be treated for tuberculosis. He was 47 years old and unmarried. He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. James H. Francis and is survived by five brothers, F. F., L. P., W. S., and P. R. Francis, of Marion, and C. B. Francis, of Glade Springs and two sisters, Mrs. J. W. Mort of Bristol and Mrs. Carrie Thompson of Ohio.

Tom or "Toby" as he was familiarly called was one of the towns best known citizens. He had a host of friends and no enemies. The quiet and unassuming life was his, always attending strictly to his own personal affairs rather than bothering with the conduct and business of others. For thirty years he was connected as an employee and foreman in the Marion News office. Few men were more faithful to the trust of service than "Tom" Francis. Always at his post of duty he could be counted on to fullest extent. He was frugal in his habits and made little pretension to the ways of the world. His high sense of duty and honesty were characteristics in his every day life. While unassuming in an outward capacity he was a man of fine intelligence and good judgment. During the twenty-four years of service with the News, under the present ownership, no words of contention or strife ever took place. To his reliability and faithful performance of duty, the paper owes much. He stood by his post to the last and even after his strength failed him he persisted in sticking to his work. He was a self trained printer and possessed more than ordinary skill in his trade. His familiar form will be missed from our streets and his friends and this office will know him no more but his kind and friendly manner will linger in the memory of many.

HARDING ON LEAGUE

Harding On The League at St. Joseph Missouri.

The St. Joseph auditorium was crowded to capacity when Senator Harding arrived there at 2 p. m. It was said that this was the first time since it was constructed that the building was filled. There were at least 8,000 present and every demonstration was of the most friendly nature. The Senator was greeted by the street crowds in a long automobile parade to the hall. He was presented by Mayor Marshall. After appealing for the re-election of Senator Selden Spencer and Representative Charles Faust, Mr. Harding approached the League of Nations subject.

"The League of Nations," yelled a man in the audience.

"I accept the amendment," said the Senator.

"I want to be fair," he continued. "I will not say that the League did not come in a fine and idealistic spirit. I did not object to the President going to Europe, but I did object that he did not take anybody with him. America ought to lead the world. It is ours to continue as an example to the best democracy."

"I want America safe for democracy and safe for America. I don't believe in one man government here or anywhere else. Washington was not big enough to run America alone. Lincoln was not. Roosevelt was not. I ask you to turn back, back I say, to constitutional government. Senators and Representatives are entitled to be something more than rubber stamps. When I am President (and at every reference to this the crowd applauded in delight) I am going to be as zealous of the powers and the authority of the executive as I was of the constitutional powers of the Senate. The Senate today is representative of the intelligent, deliberate thought of America. The Senate saved America to you. I would rather have America the outstanding nationality of the world than submerged in a super-government."

This reference to a super-government pleased the crowd. They apparently were in accord with the speaker. After turning to other subjects he returned to the League subject.

"I am not in favor of going in. This brought forth the greatest demonstration of the afternoon. 'You are not alone,' said a voice.

Some Association Inevitable.

"There is no doubt about the devotion of St. Joseph to the United States," said the Senator. "He continued."

"I believe it inevitable that there will be some association of nations for the preservation of peace. I think it is likely and desirable. But it must be based on justice rather than force and on the principles on which nations are founded. The Wilson League creates a military alliance of the five great powers to recognize conditions existing at the time of the Paris conference and guarantees to maintain this situation for all time fundamental principle of national freedom. It is the biggest threat for continued warfare ever proposed to mankind."

He spoke of the nineteen battle fronts now flaming in the old world and said:

"The league has not amounted to a continental in the old world. It has failed and waits for America to assume the burden.

"Men ask me for a specific plan. I have none, because it was the specific plan and insistence on it that brought about the scrapping of the Wilson covenant. It is too big for one man to determine what the plan is going to be. It is my task to so harmonize the views of America that when we do take up a plan all of us can be back of it. I do not want a commitment for America that is going to involve us in every petty quarrel of the old world. If we do make such a commitment there will never be a month or a year when Americans of foreign birth are not arrayed against each other. There is only one safe course to live and exalt and pray for America first, and stay on our own side of the world."

ABSTRACTS FROM VIRGINIA ELECTION LAWS.

Sec. 152, requires that all elections by the people shall be opened at each voting place at sunrise and close at sunset.

Sec. 159, provides how and when ballots are opened. That the ballots shall be delivered to one of the judges in sealed packages. That said package of ballots shall be opened in the presence of the judges and clerks of election, when they shall be carefully counted. For opening any sealed package of official ballots, except as above provided, a fine of \$200 and imprisonment one month in jail shall be imposed.

Sec. 160, requires the electoral boards to provide for voting places, booths, etc.

Sec. 162, gives the method of voting. After being furnished with a ballot the voter must retire to the voting booth where he shall draw a line with the pen or pencil through the names of the candidates he does not wish to vote for, leaving the title of the office and the names of the candidates he does wish to vote for unscratched. No name shall be scratched unless the pen or pencil extends through three fourths of the length of said name, etc.

Sec. 163, provides that no ballot shall be carried away or copied. It further says "except as provided by section 166 no person or judge shall advise, council, or assist any elector, by writing, word or gesture, as to how he shall vote or mark his ballot after the same has been delivered to him by the judges of election." Penalty a fine of not less than five hundred dollars nor more than one thousand dollars and confined in jail six months.

Sec. 164, time allowed for voting is not more than two and one-half minutes.

Sec. 166, provides that judges may assist voters who registered prior to January 1st, 1904 and gives the right for the voter to call the judge of his choice. No judge has a right to assist any voter, male or female who registered since January 1st, 1904 unless the voter is blind or physically unable to mark his or her ballot. This section says: "but the judge shall not enter the booth unless requested by him for violating any of the provisions of this section, confinement shall not exceed more than one hour."

The Electoral Board provide for double booths at most of the precincts in this county as the population has been about doubled.

The impression has gone out that invalids and sick persons can vote by mail when they are present in their precincts. This cannot be done. Sec. 202 says "any voter, on any day when required by his regular business and habitual duties to be absent from the county and precinct in which he is registered may vote by mail."

As to residence all who vote must have resided in the state 2 years, in the county 12 months and in the precinct 30 days prior to the election. A voter who has moved within 30 days of the election from one precinct to another in the same county, can return to his former precinct and vote, but he cannot do this if the move is from one county to another. The law requires residence in the county 12 months.



A PHILIPPINE TRAVELOGUE

THE ROMANTIC ISLANDS OF THE FAR EAST. PICTURES OF THEIR NATURAL BEAUTY AND HISTORIC SPOTS—BECOMING A MECCA FOR TOURISTS AND A POPULAR WINTER RESORT.

All aboard! Let's go! We're starting from Manila, the great picturesque, Americanized Oriental city, and will travel by automobile 200 miles to the north to Baguio, the summer capital of the Philippines. The trip can also be made by train.

We have ahead of us one of the most scenic, spectacular and thrilling automobile trips in the world. We will have excellent roads all the way. The Philippines are, in fact, a paradise for motorists, possessing 3,500 miles of fine macadamized roads.

The first part of the trip is through typical small towns and then across the central plain of Luzon and through several rich and fertile provinces, where tropical vegetation is seen at its best. Here one is impressed with the great agricultural wealth of the Philippines, which represents one of the East's greatest producing areas, with the advantage of immense natural resources for the development of further production. It is regrettably true that even in the United States there is far from any real understanding of the

trip to Baguio within the means of hundreds of thousands of Filipinos. Not only is there sufficient power in this river to electrify a line from Manila to Baguio, but to operate the street railways of Manila, light the city and furnish power for manufacturing concerns.

But we have now arrived at Camp One. From this point the scenery rapidly changes as the elevation increases. We are traveling over the famous Benguet road, the construction of which through the mountains is a most remarkable engineering triumph. At places the road is blasted out of the solid granite. Riding on the edge of a 100 foot precipice makes one feel like

the distance like the greenest of green lawns, stretch away as far as the eye can see. If you want color, if you want to feel the romance and mystery of an Oriental twilight, pass this way as the red eyed sun at the end of the dying day is slowly sinking behind the unending expanse of green fields. At first you cry out in ecstasy at the gorgeous scene. But as you ride along, your eyes fastened on the panorama of tints and colors, and with the impenetrably black Oriental night coming on fast, you become enthralled. You no longer try to express your feelings. You cannot. You realize that those now fast changing, colorful masterpieces in the heavens and on the landscape are pictures that no man can adequately describe nor human hands duplicate. So what's the use of trying!

True, these are but impressions, but the traveler considers himself justified in mentioning them, for they are a part of the trip to Baguio and return. Indeed, the gorgeous sunsets in all parts of the Philippines leave an impression on the mind of the tourist that is everlasting.

We leave the palms and tropical foliage and enter the zone of rugged pine. We pass from the soft, incense laden air of the warm lowlands to the crisp, invigorating ozone of the temperate zone, all within a few hours' time.

For mile after mile the road now follows the tortuous course of a river, the road lying in the bottom or on the rocky sides of a granite canyon.

The Philippines are rich in hydro-electric possibilities. This power is the cheapest power on earth. And it is everlasting. Your travelogue is neither a prophet nor the son of a prophet, but he predicts that one day there will be innumerable Philippine government owned hydro-electric plants in this canyon we are now passing through. Think of the possibilities of such a project! Today the trip from Manila to Baguio is too expensive for the average Manila worker and his family, many of whom may live and die without beholding the wondrous beauties of their own island of Luzon. Think of what a blessing it would be to Filipino mothers and children to feel upon their fevered brows the cool, invigorating breezes of the mountain tops now so near and yet so far! With the Philippine government owning its own electric railways and hydro-electric plants it would be possible to bring

he is on the rim of the world. Some of the turns are so sharp it is impossible to see 20 feet ahead, and we seem to be perilously near the jumping off place. We wonder if it is safe to lean out and peer into the canyon far below, and when we do we are perfectly satisfied we are flirting with death. Yet the trip is a safe one, providing our driver has better nerves than our own. All too soon we reach the outskirts of Baguio, a city among the clouds, and are rather surprised at the modern city we find it to be. In ten years Baguio has grown from a village of huts to the now justly famed mountain resort of the Philippines, sometimes called the Philippine Simla. It is undoubtedly destined some day to become a large city.

Baguio ranges in elevation from 4,500 to 5,500 feet and is surrounded practically on all sides by high mountain ridges and "hogsbacks" towering into the skies at a height of almost 8,000 feet.

Aside from the scenery, which is noteworthy, the great blessing of Baguio is its temperate climate, which is indeed a godsend to those impoverished by the tropical temperatures of the lowlands. Not only is the mountain air rich in ozone, but it has been demonstrated to be extraordinarily free from germs of all kinds.

Each year during the hot season the school teachers of the entire archipelago are enabled by the government to spend a month at the teachers' camp in Baguio for recreation and conference on school work. American army officers and their families also go to Baguio for the hot months.

And now that your travelogue has you in Baguio, he believes he will leave you there, for there are many interesting side trips to take, and, besides, Baguio is the most delightful place for a vacation in the entire Orient.

He saw an Andrew Jackson inaugurated in 1822. Later he became a Methodist minister.

"If President Harding is as big a success as Editor Harding he will go down in history in the Hall of Fame," writes J. Gabbert of Riverside, Cal. In an article just published on his return from Marion, where he visited Harding's paper.

The League of Nations! and Peace! Progress! and Prosperity.

"This was a war to make similar wars impossible, and merely to win this war and stop at that is to make it certain that we shall have to fight another and a final one. I hear opponents of the League of Nations say, "but this does not guarantee peace." No; nothing guarantees us against human passion and error, but I would like to put this proposition to you: If it increases the possibility of peace by, say 10 per cent, do you think it worth while? In my judgement, it increases it by about 99 per cent."—PRESIDENT WILSON.

"The reason for Article X is the protection of weaker nations against stronger ones. Great nations are seldom attacked except in case of conspiracy like that of the present war, and when such conspiracy exists, all of the members of the League will be anxious to join in its suppression. Article X is one of the great steps forward provided in the League for the securing of General Peace."—WILLIAM H. TAFT.

"The argument against Article X which have been most pressed are those directed to showing that under its obligations the United States can be forced into many wars and burdensome expeditionary forces to protect countries in which it has no legitimate interest. This objection will not bear examination."—WILLIAM H. TAFT.

Voter Justified in Leaving His Party to Support League, Says Taft.

"I consider the moral effect of Article X on predatory nations would restrain them from war as the declaration of the Monroe Doctrine has done, and that the requirement of the unanimous consent by the representatives of the great powers in council, before League action, would safeguard the United States from any perversion of the high purpose of the League. Moreover, I believe that the issue of the League (of Nations) transcends in its importance any domestic issues and would justify and require one who believes so to ignore party ties and secure this great boon for the world and this country."—WILLIAM H. TAFT.

"The one permanent move for obtaining peace which has yet been suggested with any reasonable chance of attaining its objects is by an agreement among the great powers in which each should pledge itself not only to abide by the decision of the common tribunal, but to back with force the decision of the common tribunal. The great civilized nations of the world which do possess force, actual or immediately potential, should combine by solemn agreement in a great world League for the peace of righteousness.
