

Pulaski Lady Attacked by Man.

Barren Springs, October 28.—The eberiffs of Pulaski and Wythe counties accompanied by a score of deputies have been scouring the country all last night and today searching for a white man, who attempted to commit an assault upon Mrs. E. W. Harkrader, wife of the Norfolk and Western station agent at this place.

The attempt was committed last night at o'clock, while Mr. Harkrader was at the station. The man, who wore a mask, went into the house and walked up, behind Mrs. Harkrader and attacked her. The agent's wife was alone, but in spite of her fright, she screamed frantically. The man attempted to choke her, but was frightened away by Mrs. Harkrader's continued screams.

When Mr. Harkrader returned to his home he found his wife prostrated from exertion and fright.

Mr. Harkrader immediately gave an alarm and neighbors and officers soon gathered and took up the trail of the man. Evidently fearing that bloodhounds would be used, he dropped a trail of red pepper, or some other powder, with a view of breaking up the dogs, should they be sent after him.

The officers who ate the man have an idea who he is, although the name is not mentioned. Mr. Harkrader lives about a half mile from this place and has been employed by the Norfolk & Western for some years.

Emory, Va., Oct. 28.—President Weaver is just in receipt of a letter from Mr. J. C. Fischer, who left this college last year and accepted a position as a teacher in the public schools for the United States government in the Philippine Islands. COMMONWEALTH'S ATTORNEY SUMMERS SENDS OUT WARNING!

In response to the sentiment prevailing throughout our County and State, and at the suggestion of numerous citizens, I publish this warning, as I do not want to witness a repetition of the humiliating spectacle presented to the world by Adams county, Ohio.

I wish to say that I will ask the Judge of the Circuit court for this county to empanel a special Grand Jury on Monday, November the 27, 1911.

At that time I'll ask the Judge of the Circuit court of this county to charge the Grand Jury as to their duty to investigate the conduct of the election to be held in this county on November 7, 1911.

I will have summoned before that Grand Jury to answer questions:

- 1st. All the Judges and Clerks of Election engaged in holding the same.
- 2nd. Every candidate voted for at said election.
- 3rd. Every active worker, for either party, at every precinct in this county.
- 4th. The known purchasable votes in each precinct in this county.

For the benefit of parties interested, I will enumerate a few of the acts prohibited by the law:

1. To buy or offer to buy, sell or offer to sell, a vote for money or any other thing of value.
2. To buy a voter under the guise of hiring him to work for a candidate or candidates.
3. To corruptly allow a man to vote who is not registered, and whose poll tax is not paid and shown on the Treasurer's list, unless exempted from the payment thereof by law.
4. To corruptly refuse to allow a duly qualified voter to exercise his privilege of voting.
5. To mismark a voter's ballot.
6. To interfere with the ballot or ballot box.
7. To enter the voting booth, or to mark, or offer to mark, the ballot of any voter until requested so to do.
8. To under any circumstances mark, or assist in marking, the ballot of any voter registered after January 1, 1904.
9. To sell or to give away any liquor on the day of the election, on the election ground or elsewhere within this county.
10. For any officer of the election to neglect his duty, or to perform it corruptly.

The punishment prescribed for an officer of the election convicted of corrupt conduct in the execution of any of his duties is a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, and confinement in jail not exceeding one year.

Section 3848 of the Code of Virginia, provides:

It shall be the duty of every Justice, Sheriff, Constable or Special Policeman, if he knows, or has cause to suspect, that any person intends to commit, or has committed such an offense, to arrest and hold him for examination according to law.

I call upon every officer of this county, and every good citizen, to assist me in this effort to purify our elections and elevate our citizenship. Give me all the information you can obtain, and I will not unnecessarily expose you. Respectfully,

Children Cry FOR FLETCHER'S CASTORIA.

A Unique Character.

Bristol, Va., Oct. 30.—With a record of having peddled whiskey under the very nose of the Federal court while waiting for trial on a similar charge, James Davis a young man of Cocke county, Tenn., is esteemed among revenue men as the brightest and most unique of mountain characters that peddle whiskey in the mountain districts of the State. Davis has been active for a number of years, and is well known to the revenue men, who have at times run him in on the charge of boot-legging among the mountain people. Revenue men say he has been conspicuous in furnishing the drinking set of Newport, the thriving county seat of Cocke county, with ardent spirits. As told by a revenue man who is acquainted with Davis, he orders large quantities of whiskey from dealers in the cities, and peddles it out among his acquaintances, and he is said to have made handsome profits in this way.

In order to better suit his convenience, Davis had a stit of corduroy made in which are concealed pockets and in these, it is claimed, he can carry twenty quarts of whiskey.

It is told of Davis that on one occasion he was under bond to appear in the Federal court in Greenville, Tenn., to be tried on the charge of boot-legging. He was on hand the day set for his appearance, but finding that his trial would be postponed for a few days, he ordered a case of whiskey, which he peddled out in the town of Greenville, while the court was in session, and revenue officers and deputy marshals were numerous in the town. This, revenue men regard as one of the boldest and most unique occurrences in the history of the revenue service in Tennessee.

Davis is twenty-six years old, and is said to be very popular among the mountain girls, most of whom look upon him as a type of hero. One in particular is fond of him, and this one recently posed for a picture with Davis, the two being in the attitude of an affectionate embrace, Davis wearing his corduroy boot-legging suit.

Cotton Ginning Beats the Record

Washington, D. C., Oct. 30.—Cotton ginning throughout the South since the picking of the 1911 crop began has been carried on with greater activity this season than any year in the history of the industry. 7,740,634 running bales of cotton being ginned to October 18th. The census bureau showed greater quantities ginned during the season in every cotton state except Oklahoma. In Texas the ginning surpassed previous records by more than 609,000 bales; in Georgia, by 428,000 bales; Alabama, 138,000 bales; in North Carolina, 129,000 bales, and South Carolina, 132,000 bales.

The above ballot contains the names of all the candidates to be voted for next Tuesday. This is not the official ballot, however, and the arrangement may be different, but it will serve as a guide to all who have registered since 1904, and are required by law to mark their own ballot. You must mark out the name of the candidate you do not want to vote for. You can vote for three Justices of the Peace and consequently leave three names unmarked under that head. The proclamation follows: "The people of this land having, by long enactment and practice, set apart toward the close of each passing year as a day on which to cease from their labors and assemble for the purpose of giving praise to Him who is the author of these blessings they have enjoyed, it is my duty, as chief executive, to designate at this time the day for the fulfillment of this devout purpose. "Our country has been signally favored in many ways. The round of the seasons has brought rich harvests. Our industries have thriven far beyond our domestic needs; the productions of our labor are daily finding enlarged markets abroad. We have been free from curses of pestilence, of famine, of war. Our national councils have furthered the cause of peace in other lands, and the spirit of benevolence has brought us into close touch with other peoples, to the strengthening of the bonds of fellowship and good will that link us to our comrades in the universal brotherhood of nations. Strong in the sense of our own right and inspired by as strong a sense of the rights of others, we live in peace and harmony with the world. Rich in the priceless possession and abundant resources where-with the unstinted bounty of God has endowed us, we are unselfishly glad when our people pass onward to prosperity and peace. That the great privileges we enjoy may continue, and that each coming year may see our country more firmly established in the regard and esteem of our fellow nations, is the prayer that should arise in every thankful heart.

"Wherefore I, William Howard Taft, President of the United States of America, designates Thursday, the 30th day of November, next, as a day of thanksgiving and prayer, and I earnestly call upon my countrymen and upon all that dwell under the flag of our beloved country then to meet in their accustomed places of worship to join in offering praise to Almighty God and give devout thanks for the loving mercies He has given to us. "In witness thereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed. "Done at the City of Chicago, this 30th day of October, in the year of our Lord one thousand, nine hundred and eleven, and of the Independence of the United States of America the one hundred and thirty-sixth. "P. C. KNOX, "Secretary of State."

Death of Joel F. McLean.

During the early morning hours of Saturday, Oct. 28th, Mr. J. F. McLean entered into the rest that remaineth to the people of God. For many months he had been in declining health, and on Friday had not been quite as well as usual, but when he retired that night there was no indication that the end was near. Mr. McLean was a brother of the late John M. McLean, of Elk Creek, and was the last of a family of fourteen children. He was one of the first to respond to the call of the Confederacy, and enlisted in Co. F, 4th Va. Regiment, Jackson's Brigade, for twelve months. Before the year expired he re-enlisted in the Cavalry Co. G, 14th Va. Regiment, Walter R. Preston, captain. With this company he served the remainder of the war and surrendered at Appomattox.

A little over three years ago he left his old home at Elk Creek and came to Marion, so he could be near his daughter, Miss Nannie, to whom he was unusually devoted. Since then he had made his home with Mr. and Mrs. H. P. Copenhaver.

He was a member of Royal Oak Presbyterian church, having joined by letter from the Forest Methodist church of Grayson county. His pastor, Rev. M. M. McFerrin, conducted a short service before leaving with the remains for Elk Creek, where they were laid to rest in the presence of his old friends and neighbors. His gentle manner and unselfish, Christian spirit endeared him to all who knew him.

Boston, Mass., Nov. 1.—Rev. Clarence V. T. The grand jury reported its finding to Judge Geo. A. Sanders in the Superior Criminal court after hearing more than thirty witnesses during four days' consideration of the case. It is understood that the jurors were unanimous in ordering the indictment.

Mr. Richeson appeared in the lower court yesterday, but the case was continued formally without action, and the clergyman taken back to jail immediately. By a co-incidence Oct. 31st had been fixed for the marriage of Rev. Mr. Richeson and Miss Violet Edmonds, of Brookline.


