

Desperate Fight of Mountaineer.

Independence, Va., May 29.—A shooting affray occurred at Cherry Lane, N. C., about twenty miles southeast of this place last Saturday morning, in which one man was shot to death and another was mortally wounded. The wife of the dead man also was shot through the breast, above the heart, but it is thought that she will recover.
Chas. L. Young, the slain man, has the reputation of being a bad man and a warrant was issued for his arrest some years ago, for carrying concealed weapons. He has been away and recently returned to his home at Cherry Lane. The officers were notified of his return, and Deputy A. J. Brook went to make the arrest. Brook deputized William R. Woodruff to assist him.
They found Young at the home of his brother-in-law, Rufus Crowds. When the officers notified Young they had come to arrest him, he immediately showed fight and drawing his 44-Cal. began firing on them. They returned the fire.
Young was instantly killed, being shot a number of times and stabbed twice. Woodruff was shot twice through the abdomen, and the physicians say he cannot recover; while Young's wife, who is said to have been acting as peace-maker, was shot only once.
The shooting has created much excitement in the community.

Power Co. a Gets Charter.

Richmond, Va., May 27.—A charter with an authorized capital of \$25,000,000 was issued here several days ago by the State Corporation Commission to the Appalachian Power Co., of this city, though the promoters are Chicago and New York capitalists, and the plant of the company will be located on New River and will operate in the section known as Southwest Virginia. The towns of Pocahontas, Bluefield, Graham, Princeton and Bramwell will be afforded opportunities to get the benefit of power, lights and utilities of the company, which can build railroads, construct power plants, build dams, operate mines, conduct stores and do any and all things which are not repugnant to the statutes of the State. H. M. Bylesly, president, Chicago; M. A. Wells, vice-president, New York; Elmer Dover, secretary, Chicago; and R. J. Graf, treasurer Chicago. The charter empowers the company to extend its lines and to furnish power and lights to practically all the counties east of Bristol and to the City of Lynchburg. The State received a fee of \$1,500 for the charter.

Statehood Bill Through House.

Washington, May 29.—The joint resolution admitting Arizona and New Mexico to immediate Statehood, but withholding approval of the constitutions of both States until the people have voted on certain proposed amendments to them, passed the House of Representatives last week by a viva voce vote. No roll call was demanded on the final vote. On a preceding motion to recommend the resolution made by Republican Leader Mann, thirty-one Republicans voted with the Democrats, defeating the motion 214 to 57.
The resolution requires Arizona to vote on an amendment removing the recall provision as it applies to judges and requires New Mexico to vote on an amendment making its constitution more easily amendable in the future. Neither State is required to adopt the amendments proposed by Congress. Whether they are approved or rejected by the proposed referendums, the constitutions of the New States will stand finally approved when the respective votes have been taken.

Postal Savings Banks.

Washington, May 29.—Fifty additional postal depositories were designated last week by Postmaster General Hitchcock, making the total number announced to this date 276. The depositories designated will begin operations June 25, 1911. Among them are Pulaski, Va.; Mannington, W. Va.; Henderson, Ky.; Murfreesboro, Tenn., and Letonia, Ohio.

Progress of Negro Race.

Kittrell, N. C., May 29.—"The negro leaders, whether they be preachers, politicians or what not, who dream that the negro's ambition is for social equality or supremacy over the white race, whether it be industrial, commercial or educational supremacy, are blind leaders of the blind. The white people of this country who have been led to believe that the negro seeks social equality or a position in which he may dominate the white race are equally blind as to the negro's aspirations. The negro only wishes to contribute his part with the other races of the world in the general uplift of humanity."
The above was the deliverance of Rev. A. L. Gaines, D. D., pastor of Trinity A. M. E. Church, Baltimore, Md., in the commencement oration delivered last week before the trustees and student body of Kittrell College, Kittrell, N. C., an institution founded and fostered by the Second Episcopal district of the African Methodist Episcopal church, which district embraces Maryland, the District of Columbia, Virginia and North Carolina.
Rev. Dr. Gaines said: "The negro is free, and his freedom was brought about largely by his own burdens. The negro then took up his burden as a freeman, and though the wind has been in his face and the current against him, he has been moving forward and upward. He has wiped out forty-six per cent. of his illiteracy and has 1,600,000 boys and girls enrolled in our public schools, with over 40,000 in the higher institutions of learning, 30,000 negro teachers, 21,000 youths learning trades, 12,000 pursuing classical courses, 1,300 scientific courses and 18,000 graduates. The negro has 450 newspapers by which he pleads his own cause; \$10,000,000 in school property attest his own efforts for education; \$20,000,000 for church property speak of his loyalty to God; 130,000 farms, 150,000 homes and \$56,000,000 worth of taxable property tell of the pride which he takes in his own home."

Maphis, president Charlottesville; Oscar L. Shewmake, Burkeville; and E. E. Worrell, Roanoke.

Threatened to Use Shot-Guns.

Norfolk, Va., May 29.—The service of a squad of policemen was required last Friday afternoon to enable the Electoral Board of Norfolk county to go into executive session for the purpose of naming clerks and judges of election. Feeling between the straightout Democratic faction and that favorable to fusion between Republicans and Democrats in the county is bitter, and the former, charging that the judges to be appointed were those selected by the Republicans, appeared in large numbers at the place named for the meeting of the Electoral Board and demanded that the session be an open one, the straightouts threatening the use of shotguns if the board insisted upon an executive session.
Commonwealth's Attorney Marshall then secured the services of policemen, who, however, were not required to make arrests in order to clear the room.
When the shoe gets on the other foot we see how obstreperous our Democratic friends get. They want a say. It is alright to close Republicans out, do their work in a corner, but shotguns must be resorted to when the "regulars," as they style themselves, demand recognition in Norfolk county. If we mistake not, the law requires that all judges of election for the coming year be selected during the month of May. We have seen no lists yet published in the Ninth district.

Fine Record for Richmond

There are now only two cases of typhoid fever in the City of Richmond; a week ago there was not a single case. The death rate last year from this cause was fifty-seven to the 100,000 of population; the death rate this year has been twenty to the 100,000 of population. The type of the disease, so far as there has been any manifestation of it, has been of the mildest form, only two of the cases having proved fatal, and they only after the patients had been in the hands of the surgeons for other treatment than that necessitated by this malady. Good water, improved sanitation, active work by the health officers and the adoption of preventative measures have practically driven the disease out of this town.

The above from the Richmond Times Dispatch, of last week shows the result of the efforts of the State Board of Health to stamp out the dread disease of typhoid fever in the State. The City of Richmond has heeded the advice of the Health Department of the State by looking after sewerage where possible, and the sanitary closets where the sewerage could not be reached, and they have already profited by their labors.

This disease is caused by typhoid germs, and scientists claim that the filthy house fly and mosquito do more to spread the disease than any other pest. It is therefore to the interest of every citizen to do all he can to prevent its spread in the community, by providing proper sanitary closets, and aiding in every way possible to destroy the pests and the germs of these diseases. With the good, pure water we have and the proper sanitary precautions, the health of our town would be unsurpassed.

Policy Wrong Says Bryan

Washington, June 1.—William J. Bryan yesterday took exception to the program of his party in the House and criticised sharply the majority of the Democrats who have agreed to support the revised tariff schedule on wool and woolen goods. The criticism is contained in a statement made public through Representative, of New York. Chairman Underwood, of the Ways and Means Committee, entered himself with the declaration that despite Mr. Bryan's stand the revised tariff would go through the Democratic caucus with a two thirds majority.

"The Democratic voters," said Mr. Bryan, "know that all needed revenue can be raised in less oppressive ways, and they know the argument that the tariff on wool is proposed as a revenue tariff is a mere subterfuge employed because those who employ it are ashamed to say that they favor protection.

"The Nebraskan warned against the drift of Democrats towards a protective policy which, he said, is most marked in those Democrats who have 'among their constituents influential beneficiaries of his system' "The Republicans want protection on wool because they believe in the principle of protection," he declared. "Let no Democratic advocate of a tax on wool masquerade behind the pretense that he is voting for a revenue tariff; let him not add hypocrisy to the sin which he commits against his party."

A Million a Day.

Washington, June 1.—A million dollars a day for good roads is the record that will be established in the United States soon, according to Logan Waller Page, director of the Federal office of Public Roads. In 1904 expenditures for the construction and maintenance of roads and bridges totaled only \$80,000, while this year about \$140,000,000 will be spent.

"Every State in the Union," said Mr. Page yesterday, "seems at last to be thoroughly aroused to the benefits derived from investments in improved highways. Of the \$5,000,000 bond issue recently authorized in Maryland, over \$1,250,000 will be available this year; in North Carolina over \$2,000,000 is available from county bond issues and the legislature has authorized the construction of 425 miles of road from the coast to the Tennessee line; various counties in Tennessee will spend \$1,500,000 and \$2,500,000 will be available from Virginia county bond issues.

Statesville, N. C., May 30.—Confessing to the murder of his sixteen-year-old wife to whom he was married four months ago, Reuben Combs, a young farmer of Stonepoint, Ireland county, was committed to jail without bail to day by a coroner's jury. Combs contended that his wife wandered from her room while asleep and that he found her dead body on a lot. Strychnine was found in the stomach.

Texas Governor Defies Church.

Galveston, Tex., May 31.—Governor Colquitt refuses to resign his membership in the Methodist church although requested to do so by the local religious body. Instead he will carry his case to the International conference. The trouble was caused by the governor's stand on the liquor question. He is anti-prohibition. At the time of his election, however, the proposal to change the State constitution by submitting a prohibition amendment also carried. This was strongly favored by the Methodists and since the election they have openly criticised the governor because he opposed it.

In his defensive declaration the governor says:

"A change in the Texas constitution as embodied in the proposed amendment is a political question, and I deny the right of preachers to take the Methodist church into politics or to allow their pulpits to be used by politicians for political discussions, in the course of which they may seek to vilify and malign those who do not agree with them. I challenge you to show me anything in the discipline of the Methodist church or rules and regulations of the society which commits the church to prohibition.

"My forefathers in Georgia labored to establish the Methodist church, and some of them had much to do in prescribing its rules and regulations, and they did not put prohibition into the Confession of Faith nor did they establish it as one of the rules governing the society. I certainly shall not concede that my pastor or members of the Methodist church have any right to control my convictions on political questions, and prohibition is not a religious issue."

Washington, May 30.—For the first time in the history of the service, it is said, the deficit in the Postoffice Department has been entirely wiped out and \$1,000,000 surplus for the current fiscal year, ending June 30th, next, is in the treasury to the department's credit.

Postmaster General Hitchcock has signed a warrant returning to the Secretary of the Treasury \$3,000,000, the last of the amount set apart from the public funds to assist in defraying the expenses of the postal service for the present fiscal year. Reforms in the financial system, it is stated, have made the refund possible.
