

THEY ARE COMING.

There are many persons who have but little confidence in the intelligence and integrity of the masses of the people. They draw their conclusions of rather from their opinions of the people from the mistakes that the masses frequently make in the choice of representatives or in placing power in the hands of unworthy and incompetent political factions. The people, it is true, makes mistakes very often. They too frequently are led to commit serious mistakes by men who are seemingly fair but who are thoroughly corrupt and irresponsible. Such conduct is the foundation upon which the doubters base their lack of faith in the people. But we are not of those who disbelieve in the people. We believe that our masses are both intelligent and honest. They are likely to be misled and make mistakes collectively in political matters just as individuals make mistakes in other transactions. The body of the people are sometimes slow in finding out that they are given over to folly: it is frequently difficult for them to see that they have been made the victims of duplicity, and that they have been giving their votes to a party that cannot or will not advance the public interests. Though the people may be slow often times to take in the situation, they are very prompt to act when they do get an accurate view of the situation.

We believe that just such a time has arrived, the time for a great political revolution or reformation among our people. They have adhered with unflinching devotion to a party that was Democratic in name only. Believing that it was still the same party of the people the masses have listened to its oft repeated false promises and waited patiently for the great good results that were to follow the restoration of the Democratic party to power. Though deceived once or twice by professions of the Democrats of this section as to the attitude of the National party on the Blair Bill they still gave the party their support, hoping that a Democratic House of Representatives would pass that beneficent measure. The "good times" promised in "the near future," so often promised, were still hopefully looked for and faith in the old party zealously cultivated. But the people are at last awakened. They find that they have been giving their confidence to a party that was devoid both of integrity of purpose and ability to unite intelligently upon great questions of National importance. They find that the Democracy of the Ninth district is not in accord with the National Democracy; that the National Democracy is opposed to every thing that the Ninth district Democracy claims to be for; that the National Republican party is for all the good measures, the Blair Bill, a protective tariff, the abolition of the Internal Revenue &c. and that the Ninth district Republicans are in harmony with their National party in these questions. They begin to see that National Democracy is not what the people of the Southwest want. The eyes of the people are opened; a great political reformation is at hand and the people are going to assert their new convictions in November. "They are coming!"

THE CONVENTION.

On next Wednesday, the 1st prox. the Republicans of the Ninth district will hold their Convention at this place to nominate a candidate for Congress. From all accounts there will be a good delegation from each of the fourteen counties in the district. Only two or three of the counties have instructed their delegates, and we are not informed as to who will be presented to the Convention as candidates for the nomination. Hon. Henry Bowen, who represented the district in the forty-eight Congress is most prominently spoken of and is likely to be nominated. If he is selected as the candidate of the party we confidently predict that he will defeat Maj. Henry by a large majority. But if he should not be selected the Convention will choose some other good man, who will carry our flag to victory.

The citizens of Marion will greet most cordially the delegates to the Convention, and try to make their visit here pleasant and profitable.

THE Democratic, so-called, sheets of the Ninth district are trying very hard to reconcile the conflict between the National platform and that adopted at Wytheville. If their candidate, R. E. Henry had not planted himself squarely on the platform they would not be in such a bad fix. But the Democracy of the Ninth district will take any position, no matter how inconsistent, with the hope of winning. The people, however, are beginning to see what a fraud the Ninth Democracy is.

We hear that the friends of Hon. C. F. Trigg say that he would not run upon the platform adopted by the Wytheville convention, even if he had been nominated by that convention. They declare that it is in direct conflict with the National platform of the Democratic party, and is, in fact, a Republican platform.

SOME of the Democratic journals of this Congressional district are pitching into the Louisville Courier-Journal for its criticisms upon the Wytheville platform. We ask these same journals to say that the Wytheville platform agrees with the National platform; and then we dare them to prove it.

A Boston policeman has performed the perilous feat of swimming the Whirlpool at Niagara Falls. A few years ago Capt. Webb, an Englishman, undertook to accomplish the feat but lost his life in the effort; but Scott of Boston did the act successfully on Sunday afternoon, and won \$3,000.

CONGRESSMAN Brady, of the Petersburg district declines to be a candidate for renomination. This is very sensible in him, as he could not harmonize the Republican party in the district.

THE CONDEMNED ANARCHISTS.

They Pass a Sleepless Night--Will They Get a New Trial.

CHICAGO, August 21.--With the decree of death stamped upon their features, and locked in a little six by eight cell, last night was filled with the terrors of remorse and despair for the condemned Anarchists, and it is doubtful if any of the eight slept at all. Guards paced up and down Murderer's Row where the men were confined, and occasionally during the long watches a moan or cry was heard from the eight bloody heroes. All night they tossed about on the couches or paced the floor with heavy steps.

Most of the prisoners have maintained the bold, defiant front when before the eyes of their fellow men, but they were all affected last night, and Ligg, is said to have broken down completely. At intervals during the night the guards were started by moans or a cry of anguish from his cell. He lay on his couch with his eyes straining to penetrate the vision that came to him, and failing he gave way to tears. The prisoners were up at 5 o'clock and asked for the papers, and for the next hour they read the approval of their sentence by the public. The counsel for the defense are determined to contest the verdict. Nothing will be done for a month or two, however, and the defendants will remain quietly at the jail while their counsel prepare for the next step. There will be a motion before Judge Gary for a new trial, and the defense entertain no doubt but that it will be promptly refused. Then the case will go to the Supreme Court and it is here that the defense base their hopes. The trial of the eight men has been a costly one for the defendants.

None of the prisoners, with the exception of Neebe, who is said to be worth two or three thousand dollars, have any money, and they have depended upon sympathizers for the wherewithal to bear their expense. The cost of maintaining the defense was about \$7,000, not including attorney's fee. If the case is taken to the Supreme Court \$4,000 more will be required, and a few hundred dollars of this is available. An appeal will be made, most probably to the working men of the city, and the friends of the convicted.



HOME AND FARM.

DAIRY NOTES.

Bran cools the blood of the cow. Running the cows may make bloody milk.

A little milk and meal will keep the calf growing.

Resting and talking should be done between milkings.

If you want to raise "stunts" keep the calves in the patching with the pigs.

A cow is a milk producing machine and an exceedingly complicated and sensitive one at that.

Heating curd to suddenly causes the pores to contract that the whey and gas are not sufficiently liberated.

A tablespoonful of clear lime water, or a raw egg put in the milk at every feed will cure scours in calves.

You cannot make good butter from poor food any more than you can make a silk purse out of a sow's ear.

Make your butter and cheese as good as possible, and then make the same effort to sell them to the best advantage.

Souring cream too much before churning, causes a separation of the butter fats and does not add to the quality of the butter.

All profit from a dairy cow comes from the food over and above that which is necessary to sustain the mere functions of life.

Grass is of the first importance in dairying operations. The quality and quantity of butter and cheese is largely traceable to the pasture.

An inferior animal will make an inferior use of the food she eats. A good animal will make a more profitable use of the same or a greater quantity of food.

Muddy corrals will cause the milk to fall off. When cows are compelled to stand knee-deep in mud, with their bodies plastered over with it, dirt will find its way into the pail, while additional food will be necessary to supply that lost from cold and exposure.

Haunted to Death.

About three months ago a woman named Eva Hebron died at Bound Brook, N. J. Just previous to her death she obtained a promise from her husband that he would never marry again. He soon forgot his promise, and his wife had been in her grave scarcely six weeks when he sought to soothe his sorrows by wedding Mary Chandler, a buxom widow of some forty years. She was a Roman Catholic and Hebron immediately renounced his connection with the Methodist church and embraced Catholicism. Shortly after his second marriage his acquaintances began to notice that he acted queerly. He seemed ill at ease, and had the appearance of a man haunted by some secret trouble. He said himself that he was troubled with insomnia. One night he arose from a troubled sleep to watch the burning of the Episcopal church in that place which was on fire. Suddenly, while watching the flames he started back with an exclamation of horror, and in spite of all his wife could do to arouse him he appeared as though held by strange fascination. Then he shrank back, placed his hands before his eyes as though to shut out some horrible vision, all the while trembling in every limb. He called upon his wife to see the spirit of his dead wife, which had come to haunt him and remind him of the broken promise he made her in her death bed. He also declared that she brought an army of ghostly creatures to end his life—ten thousand devils—who jeered and jibed at him. He then fell to the floor in a dead faint. From that time Hebron believed he was doomed man. His dreams were hideous, and his wakeful moments frightful. One morning he came to some of his friends with a countenance more ghastly than ever, and told them of a dream he had during the night. He said he thought the skeleton of his first wife lay beside him, and when, in terror, he sprang from the bed, the specter followed him. At length it pitched him to the wall with one of its long, ghastly fingers, and he felt his life blood ooze from his pierced heart and drip to the floor. Then,

he said, the specter licked up his flowing blood, screaming: "So I stop the vitality of my false husband!"

This story convinced Hebron's friends that he was insane, and they were taking steps to place him in the asylum, when one morning of last week he was found dead in his bed. He had died from fright.
