One Wife Enough in Days of High Prices.

Washington, July 3.—Polygamy is no longer practiced by the Mormons and any man caught taking a plural wife, is promptly excommunicated, declared Joseph F. Smith, president of the Mormon church, in an interview several days ago. Smith says he still supports, but does not live with wives he married prior to the United States Supreme court decision that polygamy was unlawful, and before the church issued the famous manifesto forbidding plural marriages. Asked if he thought it best for man to have but one wife, the husband of five wives, and father of forty-three children, replied: "In these days of the high cost of living there is no doubt the average man would be much better off with one wife. If man cannot support one wife decently it would obviously be impossible for him to support more. The women of to-day demand that they be dressed, fed and housed as well as possible. The man with an average income would be in a terrible strait if he had several wives on his hands, all crying for the latest things in hats and gowns."

Emory, Va., June 30.—The Executive Committee of Emory and Henry College met here to-day. They attended to the regular routine of business and settled some important matters of special interest to the welfare of the college.

Rev. S. B. Vaught, pastor of the First Methodist church of Johnson City, Tenn., was elected financial agent for the college. Being a man of unusual business abilities and ripe experience, the college is to be congratulated on having him in charge of the material end of its affairs.

Plans for the immediate erection of a new college building are now on foot, and the completion of the college endowment fund will be made in the near future. The college farm is to be laid off in building lots soon and sold out to those desiring to erect homes here. The beauty of the scenery, the good water and the desirable environment of the community generally make this spot especially attractive, not only as a place of school residence, but also for summer homes will insure a desirable class of purchasers for this property. It is also rumored that the Peters farm, comprising about a thousand acres adjacent to the college property, will be broken up and sold in convenient plots to those desiring small farms in the community.

North Carolina Goes Dry.

Charlotte, N. C., July 3.—North Carolina is legally the driest State in the Union. Last Friday night the amendment to the State-wide prohibition law, putting out of business the "near-beer" saloons and prohibiting the dispensing of beer by social clubs, went into effect and now the thirsty can find no lawful means of satisfying their want, save by means of a doctor's prescription and at a drug store.

State-wide prohibition went into effect over three years ago, but the statute contained a loop-hole in the shape of high priced license to dealers in "near-beer." These have flourished in every city, town and hamlet, most of the dispensing the real article, and many doing a blind tiger business as well. The new law effectively puts on the lid and nails it down.
