New Orleans and Mexico.

New Orleans has her commercial eyes fixed on Mexico, and this is not without fair results. That city sold \$637,000 of the \$900,000 worth imported by Mexico through the port of Matamoros in 1879, and of the \$1,100,000 received at Matamoros during the year 1880 from the United States New Orleans merchants sold \$723,645 worth. A line of steamers run all the time to Matamoros from New Orleans; consequently the trade is large and growing year by year. Two lines to Vera Cruz are established and making trips regularly. The Morgan Company dispatch direct. The Cromwell Line make several ports along the upper Gulf coast of Mexico before reaching Vera Cruz. Each of these has a rich and populous country back of it. Tampico port is the entrance port for Southern Tamaulipas. San Luis Potosi and much of the State of Zacatecas. New Orleans merchants are now traversing all parts of Mexico, and are exhibiting an enterprise which is well worthy of success.

The Methodist Bishops.

Of the six Southern Methodist Bishops, only two are able to do active duty. Bishop McTear and Keener. Bishop Wightman is ill at Charleston. Bishop Paine, though feeble, hopes to be able to attend the Memphis Conference, which meets at Bolivar November 9th. Bishop Kavanaugh, who has been on the Pacific coast for nearly two years, will be present at the Denver Conference, which meets at Denver, Colorado, this week. Bishop Pierce, who has been attending Western conferences, has gone to his home in Georgia, on account of ill health. Bishop McTear presided at the Holston Conference, at Wytheville, Va., in the place of Bishop Wightman. The former has several very important stations to fill, on account of the death of ministers.

An Imported Beauty.

Mrs. Cornwallis West, who accompanies her kinsman, the Hon. Lionel Sackville, to Washington, is a beautiful and brilliant Irish woman—a piece of the Marquis of Headfort, her maiden name Fitzpatrick. She is lively and spirituelle, like Erin's bright daughters in general, and became by those qualities alone one of the leaders of London society. Opin-

tions were divided as to the place she was entitled to hold in respect of beauty; for her rival was powerful and found her claims to the first place as "professional" supported by the taste expressed by royalty; but concerning the superiority of intellect there was not the slightest difference of opinion. Ruthin Castle the seat of Cornwallis West, has always been envied with all sorts of dramatic entertainments, in which the lady of the castle takes the leading part with the greatest talent and ease, while her low-browed classical rival could never sustain a conversation with any degree of interest. She is still young enough to justify pretension to watch the world with her loveliness, having been born during the Crimean war, and christened by the odd name of Eupatorea. Her style of beauty is in direct contrast with that of her rival—laughing, sparkling, blonde and piquant. Her arrival at Washington will be an event at that city, and serve not only to waken up the diplomatic corps from the droming ennuie of its commonplace routine, but will serve to protect her honorable kinsman during the siege which he will surely have to sustain against the American "gunnills," always on the watch and ready to pounce upon a diplomatic bachelor.—Dublin Telegraph.




