Mans Convicted of Buchanan County Murders Made No Confession.

Richmond, Va., February 12.—Howard Little, who killed the Meadows family and Mrs. Bettie Justice in Buchanan county, paid the penalty for the sextuple murder in the electric chair yesterday morning.

The execution was without feature. Every detail was carried out efficiently.

Little did not make any confession so far as can be ascertained. Though charged with his minister the latter has not given out any statement as to the confession.

Little confessed night before last night to the Rev. J. R. Johnson, pastor of Venable Street Baptist church that he killed George McKinney, in Eastern Kentucky, several years ago, and to several other crimes for which he had not been tried, the nature of which Mr. Johnson would

Fletcher Bill Passes Senate

Richmond, Feb. 11.—The Fletcher bill providing for equalization of real estate taxation was taken up in the Senate to-day and passed by a vote of twenty-six to five, being carried by a strictly party vote, the five Republicans present voting against the measure.

This bill is in line with suggestions of a special message from Governor Swanson that the assessment of real estate should be under the direct supervision of the auditor of public accounts.

In Race for Governor.

"Second, I am and will continue to be in the race for the Governorship in 1913."

Boutell on the Tariff and Prices.

We quote the following from a recent speech of Representative Boutell, of Illinois:

"The Payne tariff act must justify itself or the Republican party must go out of power. (Applause.) The satisfaction in the applauding of that sentiment by those who hope to succeed us is as near as they will come to the enjoyment of the succession (laughter and applause), because the Payne tariff act has justified itself, is justifying itself. When it had been in operation about six weeks the President of the United States said that it was the best tariff act that had ever been enacted in this country. That statement met with criticism, but most of the criticisms were profitless, owing to the ignorance of political prejudice—even descending to partisan bigotry—or the self interest of those who differed with the President.

"We shall have to meet the charge that the Payne tariff has raised the prices. This charge, as I stated, has its origin in three causes—ignorance, political prejudice degenerating into partisan bigotry, and pecuniary self-interest.

"Let me give you three illustrations of self-interest. A few weeks ago some lumber dealers met in a Western city and said they regretfully must raise the price of common boards on account of the Payne tariff. Think of it, Mr. Chairman and gentlemen! They must raise the price from 50 cents to \$1.00 a thousand on account of the Payne tariff! Why, we reduced the tariff on common boards 75 cents a thousand, and these men meet in convention and attempt to deceive and bunco and hoodwink the people and tell them that on account of the Payne tariff they have got to raise the price of common boards \$1.00 a thousand. When any man puts that up to you, ask him this conundrum: If the lumber dealers have to raise the price a dollar a thousand when we reduced the duties 75 cents a thousand, how much will they have to raise the price when we put lumber on the free list? (Applause and laughter on the Republican side.)

"Mr. Chairman, it was the same way in reference to hides. We were told that the price of hides would come down if we would put hides on the free list, and that then the price of shoes would be reduced. I have here Dun's Review of last week giving the wholesale prices in New York of all staple commodities, and all kinds of shoes have gone up in the wholesale market—not one reduction quoted in Dun's. One of the ablest writers in the United States on economic subjects, in his letter to the Record-Herald and other papers last September, said that the Payne tariff law was the best and most scientifically adjusted tariff law that had ever been passed.

"Then he calls attention to the fact that the woolen dealers had got together and said they must raise the price of wool on account of the Payne tariff.

"He then goes on to say that is a trick that was attempted under the McKinley law in the same way. There is not in the Payne act one change made in the wool and woolen schedule except two minor ones, and both of those were reductions. I give these three illustrations of how men who had pecuniary self-interests at stake are going to attempt to discredit the Payne tariff law, and I say to you gentlemen—

"I am very sure that I am facing men on the other side of the House who will agree with me—that that sort of criticism, that attempt to discredit a statute law of our common country for base, selfish, pecuniary gain is little short of moral treason. (Applause on the Republican side.)

"Mr. Chairman, I said that there was a second cause for the charge that the Payne tariff had been the cause of rising prices, and that was

The Senate has agreed by a vote of 25 to 5 to the House resolution which amends section 110 of the Constitution, dealing with the election of Treasurers and Commissioners of the Revenue of the counties. The Constitution at this time prohibits these officers from succeeding themselves if they are elected by themselves when appointed by the judges. The effect of this will be to permit the election of many Republican Commissioners of the Revenue. The Treasurers are already chosen by the people, so that the matter of having them succeed themselves is involved. The amendment will be voted on by the people of the State when the next Legislature is chosen.

## Tariff and Prices.

About three hundred articles of food are dutiable under the present and former tariff laws. A careful comparison of the several paragraphs of the tariff acts of 1897 and 1909 shows very few changes in the rates on such articles. They are a few as to be negligible. There are increases on only eight commodities—viz., pineapples, chicory, figs, dates, grapes in barrels, lemons, split peas and buckwheat flour. There are decreases on sixteen articles—viz., salt, starch other than potato, sugar above No. 16, lard, butter, bacon, hams, fresh beef, mutton, veal and pork, lard, cream, cabbages, green peas in bulk, dried peas in bulk, barley and corn meal.

It will be noticed that the increases are, with one or two exceptions, on comparatively unimportant articles, while the decreases are on standard articles of diet. But what is most remarkable is that the prices on all of the commodities on which the tariff has been increased have remained substantially what they were a year ago, while on substantially everything on which the tariff has been lowered the prices have greatly increased. Just what satisfaction the tariff wreckers can gain from this state of affairs it is hard to conceive. It certainly disproves the aim that the tariff is responsible for the prevailing high prices.—American Economist.

## Mr. Roosevelt's Return.

Washington, Feb. 12.—John A. Stewart, president of the New York State League of Republican Clubs, and a representative of the Republican Club of New York City, arrived in Washington several days ago and will confer with President Taft regarding the home-coming celebration to be planned in honor of former President Roosevelt.

A cablegram has been received in New York from Mr. Roosevelt accepting the proposition of the Republican Club of that city to form a National reception committee with representatives from all over the country to meet Mr. Roosevelt on his arrival in New York harbor sometime between June 15th and 21st next.

President Taft was the first man to know of the dispatch of a cablegram to Mr. Roosevelt, and was also among the first to learn of the reply. The President is giving his hearty support to the plan for a Nation-wide reception and his wishes and ideas will be consulted and taken advantage of in the formation of the program. It has not yet been determined whether or not President Taft will be able to take any part in the reception. He has promised to go to Alaska the latter part of May provided Congress has adjourned by that time, and if he should take the trip he would not return to the States until some time in July.

Mr. Stewart, who is a close friend of Mr. Roosevelt, in a statement regarding the former President's future said to-night: Before he left for his African hunting trip Col. Roosevelt told me he would not be a candidate for United States Senator from New York; that he would not think of becoming a candidate for mayor of New York; that he would not be a candidate for President in 1912. Unless he has changed his mind in the last few weeks he is as strongly in favor of the re-nomination of President Taft as he was of his nomination in 1908. His friendship for the President is as close and as cordial now as at any time.

"The former President's only ambition is to become a useful private citizen and to exercise the inestimable privilege of a private citizen to speak his opinions and voice his convictions."

## Bibles to Cost More.

Tariff on Leather and Paper Blamed for the Advance.

Chicago, Jan. 20.—The price of Bibles will go up March 1st, according to an announcement to-day by a large Bible publishing house. The cause is the new Tariff on leather and paper.

"Bibles are now about twenty per cent. higher than they have ever been before," said a member of the firm. "The materials for the best Bibles have gone up so high in price on account of the Tariff that we can not afford to sell our output at the prices now listed."

### THE FATE OF TARIFF LIARS.

It has become quite the fashion nowadays for dishonest merchants to blame the Tariff for any increase in the price of their wares. The following from New York "Times" is the latest:

A gentleman to whose attention the article was called, and who happens to be familiar with both the Tariff and the Bible, exclaimed: "The publisher had better read the new Tariff law or the book which publishes." It might not be amiss if he should read both. The new Tariff provides a lower rate of duty on paper suitable for printing newspapers and books, except in the highest grades of paper, on which the duty is the same as in the Tariff acts of 1897 and 1894, and lower than in the acts of 1890 and 1883. The new Tariff makes the duty on all kinds of leather suitable for book binding twenty-five per cent. lower, and on skin for morocco tanned but not finished fifty per cent. lower than the Tariff acts of 1897, 1894, 1890 and 1883. ## Lincoln's Birthday Widely Honored.

Washington, Feb. 14.—The anniversary of Abraham Lincoln's birth was more generally observed this year than ever before. The anniversary was celebrated throughout the Union and in the dependencies of the United States. In twenty-two States, California, Colorado, Connecticut, Delaware, Florida, Illinois, Iowa, Indiana, Kansas, Michigan, Minnesota, Montana, Nevada, New Jersey, New York, North Dakota, Pennsylvania, South Dakota, Utah, Washington, West Virginia and Wyoming, the day is observed as a legal holiday.

In the schools throughout the country memorial celebrations were held, all banks and public offices remained closed and everywhere political organizations and patriotic societies held exercises in honor of the great war president.
