WISE, WOOD, BLAIR and BARNES are for Free Education, Manhood Suffrage, Good Times, Good money, Free Politics, and they are opposed to Bourbonism.

AFRAID TO HEAR.

Bourbonism is afraid for its adherents to listen to Republican speakers. Ever since the canvass began in Virginia every effort has been made to keep thinking men away from Republican meetings. They fear to have their people hear the truth upon the real issues. This has been the policy of the Bourbon party in Smyth, and it is being kept up till the last.

As soon as it was published that Governor Foraker would speak at Marion on the 30th the Bourbons began to circulate the report that he would not be here. They even said that he had been called back to Ohio from Staunton. This was done to keep the people from coming out to hear Foraker tell the truth.

We hear that a lot of cattle were shipped to Baltimore a short time ago by a Rich Valley farmer. They weighed about one thousand pounds each, and netted only fifteen dollars a head after they were sold and expenses of shipping paid. The Cleveland boom has given the cattle market a boom, but it is a kind of boom that hurts.

"The State Board of Education is still in the hands of a majority of our superintendents are Republicans and all the wise financial measures devised by the Republicans for the protection of the school fund are still actually in force; so that to the Republican party is due the present prosperity and efficiency of the schools, and the Bourbon party is clearly chargeable with all the ills that have befallen them in the past year."

Again he says: "While the Bourbon Democratic Legislature, doubtless through their fear left the Republican Legislature affecting the finances of the schools intact, the action of their financial agent, the Auditor of Public Accounts, virtually and in effect did repeal the law and in effect did and left the teachers of the money shavers."

And what a crushing judgment is this, pronounced by the State Superintendent of Public Instruction upon the Bourbon Usurpers: "This year, which is the first year since 1882 that the Bourbons have controlled our school funds, the teachers' salaries are unpaid and their warrants are being shaved at a heavy and ruinous discount and to their serious loss in nearly every county of the State."

It had been announced for several days that Governor-elect Foraker, of Ohio, would speak at Marion this (Friday, the 30th inst.) and notwithstanding the very bad weather, high waters and muddy roads, a large crowd gathered in town to hear Ohio's distinguished son. The people were disappointed by Judge Foraker being absent from Providential causes, but they were more than satisfied with the distinguished gentleman, Gen. Nathan Goff, of West Va., who came to fill the place of Judge Foraker.

We had heard Gen. Goff highly spoken of, and seen him greatly applauded in the papers as a speaker, but we will say that no man has ever before appeared before our people who gave such unbounded satisfaction. His speech was logical, powerful and eloquent. For more than two hours he spoke to the large audience of at least seven hundred, and no one grew weary or seemed to lose interest. He spoke first upon the school question, then upon the tariff question, giving most of his time to these two important subjects. We haven't the time or space to devote anything like a full or just account of Gen. Goff's great speech, but it is sufficient to say that it was a most complete vindication of the Republican party and policy, and a calm but fearful arraignment of Bourbon Democracy. The people were made wild with delight and enthusiasm. At the conclusion of Gen. Goff's speech Wm. C. Pendleton presented him with a handsome bouquet, a gift from the Republican ladies of the town and county. The bouquet was accepted in the happiest style by Gen. Goff.

Capt. F. S. Blair, our gallant candidate for Attorney General was then called for by the happy and enthusiastic crowd. He responded in a speech of about one hour, and it was in his usual happy and forcible style that he spoke. So frequently and loudly was he applauded that he had to ask them to desist. Blair has always been a favorite with our people, and to-day's reception shows that he is still dear to them.

We have had a grand day for Republicanism in Smyth. We are made not only hopeful but absolutely certain of the result in the county by the spirit manifested by our people. Now to work, Republicans of Smyth, and do not stop till the polls are closed on the 3rd of November.

A MISERABLE FAILURE. The People Decided.—Curses Loud and Deep Heard on Every Side.—The "Nephe" Cold Reception.—A "Man" not a "Nephe" the People's Greatest Want.

PETERSBURG, VA., Oct. 24. "The mountain has labored and brought forth a mouse." The greatest humbug of the age was practised upon the people of this city and adjoining counties to-day by the leaders of the Bourbon democracy. It had been heralded far and wide that the "nephew of his uncle" and the "manga car" would address the people of this city to-night, and they were employed to turn out and also to decorate their houses and places of business. The invitation was extended to the people of Prince George Dinwiddie, Chesterfield, and adjacent counties, as the following notice from the Index Appeal will show: "The reception committee call upon the citizens of Dinwiddie, Prince George, Chesterfield, and adjacent counties and citizens of Petersburg to assemble at the depot of the Norfolk and Western railroad at 3.30 o'clock p. m., either on foot, horseback or in carriages, where a grand procession will be formed under the supervision of marshals."

When the train arrived there were not more than two hundred to meet the speakers, all told. When the procession was formed it was announced that old Massey did not come. The parade was the most lamentable failure ever seen, and those who got it up are ashamed and disgusted with it, and it is pronounced by every one as a miserable fiasco. There were only 76 mounted men exclusive of the marshals and their assistants. Some were in carriages; the balance on foot. Among the latter a few negroes and many boys. One of the most noted features of the whole proceeding was the sombre appearance of the Democratic headquarters in this city, which was not decorated with a single piece of bunting of any kind, while nearly every house in the vicinity of their headquarters was gaudily decorated. Many of those from the country are entering curses loud and deep about the deception that was played on their veridancy by the city people giving Lee the cold reception they did, as they were led to believe there would be an immense outpouring of the people, and besides telling them that Massey would be here when they knew that he was at home sick. Lee was escorted to his hotel which had many flags displayed, but there was another hotel in the city kept by a gentleman (Mr. Newton) who was in the Confederate States army and who had a leg shot off on the battlefield and is maimed and disabled for life. His hotel was given the go-by.

The "nephew" is now addressing a large audience at the Academy of Music, but will make no converts from our ranks. The results of to-day's registrations is highly satisfactory to our people.


