### Panama Canal Business During First Six Months

Panama, March 29.—During the first six months of operation the Panama Canal earned a total of \$1,136,482 the period ending February 15, 1915. In the same period there was transported through the waterway a total of 2,367,244 tons of freight of which slightly more than 41 per cent was cargo handled between ports of the United States, chiefly carried in American bottoms. Prior to August 15, when the canal was opened to traffic, freight was handled through the waterway on barges and from this source \$11,610 was collected which added to the tolls collected from ships makes the total revenue of the canal to date \$2,138,442. More than 500 ocean-going craft of all kinds used the canal since it was opened of which 496 were merchant vessels either carrying cargo or in ballast.

Of the traffic through the canal the coastwise shipping furnished 992,711 tons of cargo the remainder of the total tonnage being divided between the other chief trade routes through the canal. ### To Send 87,000 Horses Through Norfolk Port

Norfolk, Va., March 30.—Announcement was made today that no less than 87,000 horses would be handled through Norfolk in the next thirty days, consigned to France and intended for use in the French and English armies. Actual contracts for the handling of 20,000 have already been signed and agreements for the shipment of 67,000 more will be closed within the next 12 hours. The handling of the horses will begin immediately.

The contracts for the reception, feeding, stabling and loading of the horses were secured by local stablemen through C. G. Dodge, of New York, and will represent cash transactions. It is estimated that it will bring \$1,500,000 to Norfolk, as well as supplying work for hundreds of men. The horses are to be shipped from Texas and Oklahoma ranches.

The postoffice at Glade Spring, Washington county, has been advanced from the fourth to the presidential class, with an annual salary of \$1,200.

At a meeting of the Trustees of Oak Hill Academy last week, of which every member was present, Rev. J. C. Cox was unanimously re-elected principal of that school for another term. The patrons of this good school fully appreciate Mr. Cox as a principal worth while, and all regret to learn that he has figured on leaving the county. Every effort will be made to keep him at the head of that school.—Grayson Journal

She is survived by her husband, who is quite ill, and three sons, Messrs. Geo. W. Porter, Andrew J. Porter and David R. Porter.

He had been ill only two days and his death came as a great shock to his relatives and friends. He is survived by five children—C. ### Obituary

German Baker Ashlan was born in Smyth county, Va., Oct. 11, 1839, and died near Sugar Grove, March 26, 1915, aged 75 years, 5 months and 15 days. The deceased was never married. He made his home with his sister, the widow of the late Capt. R. C. Williams.

He was baptized into the membership of Sugar Grove Baptist church by the Rev. James A. Davis when 18 years of age, of which church he remained a devoted member until he was called to join the church triumphant above.

When the Civil War between the States began in 1861, he volunteered in the Smyth County Dragoons, Capt. J. P. Sheffey's Company A. Eighth Virginia Cavalry. He served his country bravely and faithfully until the last year of the war when he was so severely wounded that he was no longer able for service.

He was a worthy member of Marion Lodge No. 31, A. F. & A. M.

He lived an exemplary life. He was a firm believer in and a faithful follower of the meek and lowly Christ.

Toward the close of his life he often talked with the family and friends about his approaching death. He expressed himself as being ready and willing to go whenever the Captain of his salvation should call him home. He became more and more devoted as he drew nearer the end of his earthly pilgrimage. Just before he expired he said to his niece, "I am going home this time." And soon "he fell asleep with his fathers."

Funeral services were conducted in the home of his sister, Mrs. Williams, by Rev. H. W. Bellamy, his pastor, March 27, after which the remains were taken charge of by the Masonic Fraternity and borne to their last resting place. H. W. B.

### Sends Child from Florida to Virginia by Parcel Post

Savannah, Ga., March 29.—Wearing a placard, on which was her name and destination, and 15 cents in parcel post stamps, six-year-old Edna Neff passed through the Terminal Station here on her way from Pensacola, Fla., to Christiansburg, Va., where her father is awaiting her. Little Edna weighs just under the fifty-pound limit.

The land assessors, Troy Black, R. F. Cornett, and the commissioners of the revenue, Messrs. S. T. Morton, E. L. Robins and A. S. Lawson, held a conference here Monday at which they agreed upon a uniform rate of taxation for the county. The rate they fixed upon was 33 1/3 cents on the \$100 worth of property. This will increase the taxes on land perhaps 15 cents, but the Board of Supervisors can lower the levy. This will make a better showing for our county.—Grayson Gazette.

The Fredericksburg Delegate has not been informed, he said, as to when the first meeting of the special committee would be held to begin the investigation.


