Filling Up With Boomers.

A Little Rock (Ark.) telegram says: Reports from the Indian Territory represent that Oklahoma is filling up with boomers, despite the efforts of the United States authorities. Couch is desirous of precipitating a contest between Government troops and prospective settlers, with the hope that Congress when it assembles will side with the latter and take steps to open the Oklahoma country to settlement. Nearly all the invaders are well armed, and, if disposed, could give the troops much trouble. The Indians are very restless. The loss of cattle, the invasion of the country, and the cessation of further payments under the lease with the cattlemen have all created bad feeling. The agent however, is not anticipating any serious trouble with the Indian tribe unless there should be delay in getting out the intruders. In that event it is believed the Indians themselves would attempt to clear the Oklahoma country.

A St. Louis telegram says: A dispatch from Red Fork, Indian Territory, says: "Commissioner Atkins and party, consisting of Congressmen Hulman of Indiana, Ryan of Kansas, Cannon of Illinois, and Peol of Arkansas, and Post-Surgeon Ewing, of Fort Leavenworth, and escort, arrived here yesterday afternoon. They were reticent concerning their views of the present management of both the wild and the civilized tribes. In the cases of both they will recommend radical changes. Concerning the wild tribes they said very little. For the five civilized tribes they will urge the establishment of a territorial government, with one or more Federal courts established therein. They left on a special train for Muskogee.

The Chinese Government decided finally a few days ago to adopt a "forward course" in the construction of railroads. A contract has been signed for the making of a line from Taku to Pong Chow, the contracting firm to furnish the material and rolling stock and labor.

New Tricks of Swindlers.

A Boston special says: As a wealthy lady was driving in Milton recently her coachman discovered a tramp by the road side with blood-flecked lips, who declared that he was dying from hemorrhage. To her offer to give him shelter and medical treatment he replied that he was walking to his home in Lewiston, Me., to see his wife and children before he died. She gave him several dollars, and on conversing afterward with friends, found that they had met the same man under the same circumstances and filled his pockets for him.

It is explained that this is the latest trick of impostors. "Hemorrhage blood" has become a regular article of commerce. The plan of the swindler is to go out upon a road and, on the approach of a carriage, burst a little sack of fluid in his mouth, fall down, and leave the rest of the kind-heartedness and credulity of his victims.

A Trusted Clerk Jailed.

A Boston special says: Timothy F. Gorman, well and favorably known to the community for many years, was arrested to-day for the bezzlement of \$10,000 from John A. Lowell & Co., prominent art-dealers in this city. He had been in the employ of the firm for the past six years and was promoted from time to time until he became confidential clerk. The firm had been doing an extensive business, until about six weeks ago, when they failed. An expert was immediately put to work on the books, but they were in such a state of confusion that the expert has not yet been able to ascertain the condition of the firm's finances. The examination thus far made shows that the books have been falsified, bills entered as paid, discounts allowed where they were not authorized, and the pay-roll of the concern, amounting to \$800 per week, tampered with. Gorman married an estimable young lady about three years ago, and in order to live in good style he appropriated the firm's money. He holds several important positions in various societies.

A Queer Colony.

A correspondent says that nine miles from Walla Walla, Washington Territory, is situated a colony of Daviste Mormons. They call their organization the Kingdom of Heaven on Earth. They believe that spirits return and take upon themselves new bodies, and that the spirits of Jesus Christ, John the Revelator, John the Baptist, St. Peter, and about half the other apostles, King David, Moses the Lawgiver, Abraham, Isaac and Jacob have returned, been born over again, and that they have those sacred children in that colony, and are only waiting for them to grow up, when they shall conquer the whole world. They have a sacred corral in which these children play, which none can enter without taking off their shoes. Davis had a daughter about nine years old, who, it is claimed, is the great eternal mother of spirits, and is to be mated, by her father, to her brother in flesh. Davis claims to have the power over life and death; that he and all who believe faithfully in his doctrine may live as long as they please. Members of this colony do not shave or cut their hair, and seldom comb it. They hold their property in common, but Davis holds the deeds, titles, etc. They do not believe in marriage, but are to be mated by Davis to suit himself. Davis is a Welshman, and the rest of the colony are English, Irish, Scotch, Scandinavians, and a few backwoods Americans.

Various lines of telegraph are to be constructed in Corea under the superintendence of Chinese officials. The preliminary surveys have already been commenced between Gensan and Seoul at several points on the Chinese-Corean frontier. The length of the lines actually undertaken is over 500 miles.

Ferric sulphate decolorizes indigo in the same manner as ferric chloride of potassium ferrihydrate. In preparing iron mordants by the action of nitric and sulphuric acids upon copperas, indigo cannot be used to show the disappearance of the nitric acid, as the mordant formed acts itself upon the coloring matter.

The treasurer of the French Association, at the meeting held recently in Grenoble, announced that the organization had a funded capital of \$100,000 and an annual subscription of \$12,250. This Association is to be amalgamated with the Association Scientifique, founded by Leverrier. The next meeting will be held in Nancy.

It is reported from North Central Sweden that this year migratory birds have left in large numbers at an unusually early date. Between August 16th and 18th thousands of wild fowl were seen passing over Stockholm, their progress lasting for several hours at a time. A severe winter is anticipated in the North of Europe. The autumn has been very cold in Norway.

Boss Wiman isn't taking London exactly by storm. Truth speaks of him as "a person of extraordinary effrontery," and alludes also to his "stupid arrogance."

BIG FIRE AT PITTSBURG.

Fatal Accident to Bridge Builders - The Western Chinese War-Interesting Resume of Yesterdays Events.

The Galveston Strike Ended.

SAN ANTONIO, TEX., Nov. 9.—Mr. Young, general southern passenger agent for the Mallory line of steamers, has received a telegram stating that the great strike at Galveston and Houston was ended this morning, with satisfaction to all parties concerned.

Fire in Pittsburg.

PITTSBURG, Nov. 10.—A fire this morning destroyed the buildings of the Duquesne Furniture Company, the foundry of Fisher, Thomas & Co., and damaged slightly the adjoining lumber yard of Schuelte & Co. Loss \$60,000. About half covered by insurance.

Petroleum in Wyoming.

DENVER, COL., Nov. 10.—Information from a reliable source has reached here of the discovery of a remarkable flow of Petroleum from the rocks in the Big Horn country in northern Wyoming. Quite a lake of oil extends for nearly 500 feet along the side of Rocky Bluff.

Railroad Accident.

VICKSBURG, MISS., Nov. 10.—Sunday night while a freight train on the Memphis, Selma & Brunswick railroad near Lapillville, was running at full speed, it struck a cow, ditching several cars and tearing up the track badly. Charles Collins, conductor, had his neck and right leg broken. Several other trainmen were seriously injured.

Fatal Accident to Bridge Builders.

KEITHSBURG, ILLS., Nov. 10.—Yesterday while the men at work on the Keithsburg bridge were working on a temporary scaffold, attempting to raise the iron stanchion, preparatory to ironing a section of the long span of the bridge, and when about an angle of forty-five degrees had been obtained, the corner post of the traveller gave way and, with a crash and roar like thunder, the whole staging, with the men, machinery and ponderous iron columns fell into the deep water. Four men were carried down and buried under the debris.

Capture of a Devil-Fish.

A payton (Pern) letter says: For some days past the quiet harbor of Poyta, Pern, has been infested with immense numbers of huge fish, and speculation being rife as to the exact classification of the monsters, Lieutenant Commander J. J. Price, of the United States steamship Iroquois, on the morning of October 10th, armed with a stout harpoon, pulled away in the dingy, hoping to capture and bring back one in order to find out what particular family they belonged to. When distant about one mile from the Iroquois he was seen to lean forward and let go the harpoon. The blow struck home, and immediately there was seen a great commotion in the water. The monster travelled away from the boat, rope, being immediately paid out, taking boat and crew along at terrific speed.

This continued for about two hours, at times pursued and pursued being distant from the ship quite six miles. All this time the dingy's crew had been backing water, and as there seemed to be no hope of bringing the brute in, one of the cutters, having on board two midshipmen armed with Springfield's, proceeded to the scene of excitement. The fish was soon quieted with cold lead and towed to the Iroquois, where it proved to be a fine female specimen of what fishermen generally call "devil fish," a cartilaginous fish of the ray family.

The outline was nearly an isosceles triangle, the apex at the tail, the altitude of the triangle or length of the fish being about half the breadth from tip to tip of the pectoral fins. The skin was thin and rough like that of a shark, color slaty-black above, creamy-white beneath, but darker along the edge. Its length was 19 feet; breadth, 22 feet from tips of fins, and weighed upward of four tons. The head was slightly protuberant along the base of the triangle and retracted, the mouth being very large and cavernous.

The large number of these huge fish in shallow water at this season of the year leads to the belief that this is their breeding season. The monster being too large to take on board, it was slung on the mainyard carefully examined, measured, photographed, and finally cut adrift.

Royal Garter Fees.

(London L. wh.)

I am sorry to hear that, in accordance with the usual discreditable practice, an application is to be made to Parliament for the amount of the fees charged for admitting Prince Henry, of Battenberg, to the order of the Garter. The vote will certainly be opposed, and it is to be regretted that the Queen should have been so ill-advised; for I hear that her Majesty was disposed to pay the amount herself, but that some wooden-headed officials about the Court persisted that this would be creating an inconvenient precedent. It strikes me that it will be considerably more inconvenient if the vote be rejected by the House of Commons. Within the last two years over £1,000 has been paid for the Garter fees of the Prince of Wales's sons, and including the cost of special missions, upward of £100,000 has been paid by the public during the present reign on account of the "extra" (royal) knights of this order. When the Queen came to the throne there were only five or six "extras," but now there are not less than twenty eight, the blue ribbon having of late years been scattered about Europe with a very ill-judged profusion. Nothing is more absurd than the custom of invariably presenting a royal knight with the full trappings of the State costume, which cost some £500, and are never worn. There is only one case known during the last thirty years of a knight having arrayed himself in his full dress, and this was a certain German princelet who desired to have his portrait painted in this quaint garb.

General McClellan's mother is still alive at the age of eighty four.

Mr. Cleveland's regular contribution to church collections on Sunday is a crisp one dollar bill.

Bishop Whitehead has asked the clergy of the Episcopal diocese of Pittsburg to preach on temperance to-day.

Hon. Robert Johnston, judge of the county court of Rockingham, died Friday, aged about sixty-nine. He was for many years Auditor of the State before the war, and was a member of the Confederate Congress.

From his observatory at Colmar M. Faye has noticed the phenomena of crepuscular lights at an altitude far higher than that of the terrestrial atmosphere. Without deciding on the merits of the different theories advanced to explain the origin of the afterglows, he considers that electricity alone would be capable of retaining at such an altitude the particles of matter producing the effect, whether these particles had a terrestrial eruptive source or had come from interstellar spaces.


