We note that Hon. R. Tate Irvin, of Big Stone Gap, differs in opinion from Senator Chase as to the result in the Ninth district this fall. This calls to mind that this prominent Democrat has predicted Democratic success in every contest during the past eight years in this district. Our Democratic friends always win before the election whether the facts and conditions warrant such prediction or not. Each Democratic candidate is also greater than the former until after the election.

About the smallest politics we have noted is an indirect criticism of Congressman Slempp for using his franking privilege in sending out agricultural and other useful documents to his constituents. These things are published for the people, and why not the Ninth district voters have this information as well as other people? This is about as little as a Democratic paper in Tazewell that attempted a criticism of Mr. Slempp for sending a "Good Roads" lecturer through the Ninth district. It is difficult to measure the smallness of some Democratic politicians.

The Democratic slogan this fall will be "high prices." Well, if Democratic rule is to mean lower prices, won't it also mean lower wages? How do Democratic farmers, who compose the rank and file of the Democratic party in the Ninth district relish the idea of fifty cent wheat, thirty cent corn, five dollar calves, fifty dollar horses, ten cent wool, ten cent butter, five cents per dozen for eggs, etc.? How do the laboring classes relish the idea of going back to Democratic rule when millions were out of jobs and received no wages at all. There are two sides to the question of "high prices" and the people will consider before they are carried away with the old-time worn tariff talk of the Democratic press and leaders. Too many Ninth district voters remember the only four years of genuine Democratic rule we have had in this generation.

The Democratic tariff talker does not seem to realize that when we open our ports to the importations of cheap foreign made goods, that an equivalent amount of American made goods must always be displaced, and that the result must be a closing of our factories and millions of idle men. Some of these Democratic orators, if not all, would increase our free list so as to include lumber, wool and woolsens, cotton goods, agricultural implements, boots and shoes, and all other products of leather, and hundreds of other products which could not be made in this country without adequate protection. This would soon mean putting American labor on the same level with that of the poorest paid countries abroad. It would mean that we would have to compete not only with continental Europe, but with Japan and other Asiatic countries.

Democrats at Old Tricks.

Alex. Stuart Exercises Authority and Names Election Judges Against the Wishes of Republicans.—Buhman Resigns.

Abingdon, Va., June 2.—The Electoral Board for Washington county had a meeting at Abingdon on last Saturday to select the Judges and Clerks of Election for the contest to be held in November next. It turns out that the meeting was far from harmonious. One of the board, A. W. Buhman, accused Alex. Stuart of having Republican judges and in some cases Democratic judges of election removed without cause. One thing that adds interest to the case is that Alex. Stuart is a relative of the Hon. Henry C. Stuart, who is a candidate for Congress in the approaching campaign.

We publish below Mr. Buhman's statement as it was given out:

"Yes, we have had some differences in the selection of the Judges and Clerks of Election for the coming year. I feel aggrieved that Alex. Stuart immediately upon his appointment as a member of the Electoral Board of this county should undertake to select every Judge and Clerk of Election in this county.

"I have served on the Electoral Board of this county for two years with A. C. Honaker and A. J. Huff and during that time our elections have been without friction, and every man in the county, so far as I know, was satisfied with the judges and clerks selected to hold their elections, and I believe and so stated to Mr. Stuart that we could not improve on the men then in office.

"Mr. Stuart then produced a list of names and stated to us that he had been making some investigations and suggested a number of changes, particularly among Republican judges and his suggestions were followed absolutely in view of the fact that he had a greater interest in the matter than the other members of the board.

"Every removal of an old man was at the suggestion of Mr. Stuart.

"When we came to the selection of judges of election for the towns of Abingdon, Glade Spring and Damascus, the old judges for Glade Spring were re-appointed; the Damascus judges were changed, because some of the old judges were running for office. I insisted that the old judges for Abingdon, Messrs. Eldridge S. Clark, Hugh G. Bradley and Mike F. Crabtree, be retained because they were men of character in whom the people had confidence and wanted.

Mr. Stuart insisted upon a change giving as a reason his desire to give the wet faction a representative, and suggested the appointment of R. C. Craig and others.

"I insisted upon my right to the selection of the officers at my home precinct, in view of the fact that Mr. Stuart had selected every judge in the county, but Mr. Stuart insisted upon his objection, and upon the suggestion of A. J. Huff, Judge Page and Mr. J. L. White were selected to take the place of Clark and Braley.

"I want it understood that I do not object to either Judge Page or Mr. White, but I am advised that neither are eligible to act, and I wish to add that I apprehend further trouble along the line.

"In view of the fact that Mr. Stuart had selected every judge in Washington county and refused to allow me to select the judges of election in my own home precinct, I then and there tendered my resignation to Judge Hutton and it was accepted, telling him that I would not do the work of a member and clerk of the Electoral Board when I had no voice in making the appointments.

"Anticipating the refusal of Page and White to serve as judges of election, I subsequently withdrew my resignation and am still a member of the board and will insist upon my rights and the rights of the people stronger than ever.

Mr. Slempp Introduces Bill

To Erect a Monument to Commemorate the Battle of Cloyd's Farm, Pulaski Co., Va.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, that the Secretary of War is hereby authorized and directed to cause to be erected on a suitable site on the battlefields of Cloyd's Farm, in the County of Pulaski, State of Virginia, a monument suitably commemorating the battle of Cloyd's Mountain, or Cloyd's Farm, fought on the ninth day of May, eighteen hundred and sixty-four, between Union and Confederate forces, in which battle two former Presidents of the United States, William McKinley and Rutherford B. Hayes, participated, and the sum of five thousand dollars is hereby authorized to be expended therefor out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated: Provided, that no expense for the care and maintenance of said monument shall be borne by the Government of the United States.

Bristol, Va., June 1.—As yet President Taft has not "delivered the goods" with reference to a postmaster for Bristol. Acting Postmaster John M. Fain, who succeeded Postmaster Warren, removed, may be permitted to remain in charge until after the November election, according to current rumors. The President nominated G. E. Goodell, a Virginian, for the position, but at the urgent request of Mr. Brownlow the President withheld the nomination, pending an agreement. The impression now is that the President as a means of not injuring either Brownlow or Slempp politically, will not name the man until after the November election. The friends of Goodell still feel that he will win, as he is an exceptionally popular man.
