RE-UNITED VIRGINIANS.

To show that the compromise effected by the Republicans in Virginia is all that could be desired by either faction and that the party will go into the fight this fall with solid ranks we reproduce the following special telegram from Washington to the New York Press:

The Republican Virginians, who, during the past week, thronged the national capital, have for the most part departed to their homes to arrange the details for the State convention, which meets at Norfolk Aug. 22d. Whereas, two weeks ago the party was apparently hopelessly divided by factional strife, to-day, through committee and mutual concessions, it is thoroughly united. General Mahone and General V. D. Groner and Colonel James D. Brady have clasped hands and are determined to nominate a ticket which will demolish Bourbon misgovernment in the old Dominion.

Just before their departure General Groner and Colonel Brady, who until recently had been fierce in their opposition to the compromise, the correspondent of the Press that they would heartily support the "Little Wizard" should he consent to accept the nomination for Governor. They said further that the colored men would vote solidly for Mahone, as well as thousands of white Democrats. Virginia was the home President Harrison's sire, and the magic of "old Tippecanoe's" name, they declared, was alone worth thousands of votes to the Republican ticket. The cordial treatment colored representatives have received from the President was also a great element of strength.

If General Mahone is named for Governor it is thought that Wyatt M. Elliott will be given the second place on the ticket. Elliott left the Democrats when the readjusters organized. He is now a representative from Appomattox county, which is included in what is known as the black belt of the State, and is an ardent advocate of the protective tariff. James A. Walker of Wythe county seems to be the most likely candidate for Attorney General. He left the Democratic party on discovering that it was rapidly developing into a free trade machine, has repeatedly denounced the debt repudiation policy of his former colleagues, and has tremendous influence among the moneyed interests in the iron regions of Southwest Virginia.

MR. WISE'S SIDE.

The Democratic papers in the State are publishing, what purports to be an interview between John S. Wise and the President, in reference to the recent compromise. The whole report is an exaggeration and with but little truth in it. The Richmond Dispatch-telegraphed Mr. Wise for his version of the interview and received the following from Mr. Wise in reply:

NEW YORK, August 5, 1889.

To the Editor of the Dispatch: The Sun's report is highly sensational and in many particulars absurd. I would be incapable of disrespect to or vehemence with the President. He has been too kind to me personally to admit of such conduct on my part. Our interview left us as friendly as ever, and I saw him again in the afternoon. I am sorry the names of Brady and Grubbs were lugged into it. Brady has been true to me throughout, and it is a pity if Grubbs, who is so much more fit than any other person named and who is the choice of so large a majority of both parties, is to be prejudiced by such a publication. The current year is notably an "off year" in general politics. Only eleven States elect State offices this year. Kentucky held a general election for State Treasurer on Aug. 6. Elections in ten other States will take place on November 5. On that day: Iowa will elect Governor and Lieutenant Governor. Maryland will elect Controller and Attorney General. Massachusetts will elect Governor and State officers. Mississippi will elect Governor and State officers. Nebraska will elect a Supreme Court Judge and two Regents. New Jersey will elect Governor and State officers. New York will elect State officers, except Governor and Lieutenant Governor. Ohio will elect Governor and Senate officers. Pennsylvania will elect State Treasurer. Virginia will elect Governor and State officers.

Political interest this year accordingly is centered in the elections of the newly-admitted States—North Dakota, South Dakota, Washington and Montana—which are now framing their constitutions, and will elect full which will "chase" eight "new" U. S. Senators. Each new State will also elect a Representative in Congress, except South Dakota, which will elect two.

ANXIOUS BOURBONS.

Virginia Democrats Taking Serious View of the Republican Compromise. WASHINGTON, August 1.—The Democrats are no longer claiming that the compromise which has been made between the Republican factions in Virginia is a failure. Bourbons in that State who are candid, and who are well informed, admit that the compromise is effective, and that the result is awaited with the greatest apprehension by the leaders of the Democratic party. The latest resort of the Democracy has been to insist that none of the anti-Mahone men are satisfied with the compromise, except General Brady, who for his reward has been appointed Collector of Internal Revenue in the Norfolk district, but John S. Wise and General Groner, who the Democrats have insisted, would never consent to any compromise which should in any manner whatever recognize General Mahone, have been here for two or three days. General Groner has been regarded as one of the most implacable of the anti-Mahone men. Yet he has informed the President that he is entirely satisfied with the compromise, and that he proposes to use his best efforts to promote Republican harmony throughout the State and to contribute to the success of the Republican State ticket whoever may be nominated for Governor.

And now comes the conservative Baltimore Sun, and in a statement from its careful correspondent at Richmond, Va., makes these admissions: That General Mahone's army can not be regarded as a disorganized faction, and that he is a first-class organizer, whose capacity the Bourbons have good cause to fear, and that the Democrats will need to exert themselves to escape defeat.

VIRGINIA COMPROMISE.

Groner and Harrison Have a Conference. A Deer-Park letter in the Baltimore Sun says: General Groner called at the cottage and had a long and cordial conversation with the President relative to the recently effected Virginia compromise. The object of this visit was to assure the President the anti-Mahone faction accepts the outcome of the compromise in good faith, and they are willing to believe that General Mahone and his followers are willing to do likewise. The whole situation in Virginia was gone over thoroughly, and the President

said he was very much gratified at the conclusion that has been reached. He said he was convinced from what General Mahone and others interested in Virginia politics had said to him that all hands acquiesced in the settlement of what promised to be a very ugly dispute. He assured General Groner that, so far as the Administration is concerned, the terms of the compromise will be upheld in good faith. General Groner said the anti-Mahoneists accepted the situation with good grace, as they have accomplished nearly every thing they have been contending for these many years. He also urged the President to allow John S. Wise to have voice in the selection of the postmaster at Richmond, as the latter, while temporarily residing in New York city, still retains his residence in Richmond, and is an important factor in the Republican party there. It is understood that Mr. Wise's choice is Mr. Grubbs.
