

to the official forecast of the International Apple Shippers' Association, which closed its annual convention here last week, the United States and Canada will have a bumper apple crop this year, exceeding last year's crop by at least thirty-five per cent, or 5,500,000 barrels. Of the four big commercial apple States, New York shows an increase of fifty per cent over last year, Pennsylvania thirty-five per cent, Michigan one hundred and fifty per cent, while Virginia shows a decrease of fifty-five per cent.

The New England, Southern and Pacific coast States show slight decreases. The Eastern section of Canada shows an increase of at least one hundred per cent. The crop is reported to be generally of good quality.

Abingdon, Va., Aug. 14.—Fully believing that his spirit will pass away on the 3rd of September, John Vesti, of Meadow View, a few miles from Abingdon, has had his burial robe made and his grave dug.

"I will die within thirty days," was the startling statement made by him on last Thursday, while calmly talking to friends. Soon after this, Vesti went out and superintended the digging of his own grave. If his predictions are correct it means that he will die on September 3rd.

Vesti, who was a soldier in Southern ranks during the Civil war, has twice been married. He had his grave beside that of his first wife, in a cemetery along-side the Norfolk & Western railway between Meadow View and Emory. He has had the grave lined with cement and informs his friends that he does not want his body placed in a coffin, but prefers the bare grave for a resting place.

Vesti is sixty-one years old and is apparently in his usual health. He is quoted as saying that fate has decreed that he must quit this life at the time indicated and for this reason he has made every preparation, fully believing that death is at hand and that the remainder of his days are few. Vesti is known by many in Abingdon.

MANY NOTABLES TO BE AT APPALACHIAN EXPOSITION

Opening Day Promises to Be One of Unusual Interest.

Gov. Ben W. Hooper, of Tennessee, will press the button that will open the gates of the Appalachian Exposition at Knoxville, Tenn., on September 11. The exposition will continue to October 1. In addition to Gov. Hooper, many other notable men will visit the Appalachian Exposition. Among these may be mentioned Hon. Champ Clark, speaker of the United States house of representatives; Col. William Jennings Bryan, Gov. Woodrow Wilson, and Gov. Judson Harmon. These gentlemen will deliver addresses, which will be the occasion of no little moment in the exposition program.

\$4,000 IN PREMIUMS FOR APPALACHIAN HORSE SHOW.

The premier social event of this year's Appalachian Exposition, at Knoxville, Tenn., will be the horse show, to be held on the nights of September 12, 13 and 14. One of the most interesting premium lists ever competed for is offered, totaling, as it does, near \$4,000. This amount is fairly distributed among the different breeds and types of horses, popular at the present time.

The horse show arena is especially attractive. The show ring is one of the best in the country, being oval in shape, 250 by 125 feet. It is exceptionally well lighted, and affords good footing. It is surrounded by seats in the form of an amphitheater, so that the 15,000 spectators may see to the best advantage.

The patronage for the horse show last year was drawn from nearly every state in the southern Appalachian region, and this year spectators are coming from a still wider region.

The exposition dates are September 11 to October 1. Mr. Jacob is chief of the horse show department.

HYDROPLANE A BIG FEATURE.

Among the many fine amusements at the Appalachian Exposition will be the Hydroplane, a new form of aerial craft, which will be seen in the south for the first time. This has been secured by the management at great expense, and will be an absolutely free attraction.
