Employers' Liability Act Wins in Court.

Bristol, Va., Nov. 6.—Perhaps the largest judgment for damages ever given under the recent act of Congress known as the employers' liability act has just been given by a jury in the Circuit court in Blountville, in the case of W. N. Showalter, administrator, against the Carolina, Clinchfield and Ohio railway. Judgment for \$15,000 was given on account of the death of Robert K. Showalter, who was killed in a wreck near Clinchfield, Va., Dec. 3, 1910, when the engine of the train on which he was riding struck a boulder and rolled down the mountain side. Three were killed, Showalter being one of them.

It is anticipated that this case will be made a precedent when it goes to the Supreme court. A motion has been made for a new trial. Special Judge Edward K. Buchanan heard the case.

The State Mineral Taxes Increase \$7,000,000

A large increase in the taxable value of mineral lands in Virginia is set forth in the annual report of James A. Stone, assessor of mineral lands, just made public.

Last year's assessment of this class of property showed a total valuation of \$25,000,000, while that for 1911 shows a value of \$32,000,000. This is a gain of \$7,000,000, with a net increase in taxes to the State of \$24,500. The mineral taxes payable to the State for 1911 amount to \$106,000.

The report of the second auditor of Virginia is in the hands of the Governor, who will review it and forward it on to the public printer that it may be put into type.

Family Starve Themselves to Purge Their Souls

Chicago, Ill., Nov. 6.—Details of a ghastly suicide compact involving a whole family were brought out by the police last Saturday night following the discovery of the emaciated forms of Herman Letsch, his wife and their 13-year-old son. All had been dead several days. Followers of a religious creed, self-promulgated, the parents had forced themselves and their son to do without food to "purge their sinful souls of lust" until starvation wiped out the whole family. From physicians' examinations it was evident the boy had been the first to die.

On a bed was a black shroud bearing a note as follows: "This gown is for our son, Herman, when he is dressed for the coffin." Apparently, the parents had been too weak to put the gown on the starved form of the boy when death came, but weakened by hunger had lain on the floor near each other waiting for the death which came several days later for the mother, and a week later, apparently, for the father.

A long and rambling letter written in German criticized churches and church people and named a Chicago church and pastor. This pastor told the police that until about four months ago the family attended church each Sunday, always contributing \$1. They ceased coming and when the pastor asked Letsch about it he shouted: "All right; I'll get out of the church, but a new appearance of God will blast you for it."

The rambling letter said no minister was to appear at their funerals, the determination to die, it said, ran back for three years, and last March 17th was the day first selected for their taking off. An illness of the boy, neighbors said, must have delayed the suicides.

Father of 32 Children.

Cape Charles, Va., Nov. 6.—John W. Guy, who is the father of more children than any man in the country, lies dangerously ill in his home near Melfa, Accomac county, Va.

Mr. Guy, who is 79 years old, is the father of 32 children. He has been thrice married.

Marriages of a son by his first wife and of a daughter of a second wife to a brother of Mrs. Guy have made him brother-in-law to two of his children.

Guy's first marriage was with Mary Ann Redfield, a farmer's daughter, in 1855, both bridegroom and bride being in their twenty-second year. To this union seven children born.

Guy's second marriage was the romance of his life. It was an elopement with pretty Miss Margaret Elizabeth Ayres, 21 years old, whose objections to her love affair with Guy. To this union eighteen children were born.

Lola Crockett, a beautiful girl of 16 years, became Guy's wife when he was in his sixty-fifth year. To this union seven children were born, including a boy and girl, twins, which arrived when Guy was 76 years old.

Of Guy's thirty-two children—twenty-one sons and eleven daughters—twenty-three are still living, the oldest, a son, being 56 years old. All of his sons are fathers of large families. Guy is a prosperous farmer.

Package Containing \$20,000 is Missing.

Lynchburg, Va., Nov. 6.—A registered package containing \$20,000, remittance from a Bluefield, W. Va. bank to a New York correspondent, is said to have disappeared from the mails last Friday night between Bluefield and Charlottesville, Virginia.

The pouch containing the remittance came here last Friday night over the Norfolk and Western railway and was handled through the mail transfer to the Southern railway at the West End station. Soon leaving Lynchburg the clerk on the Washington train telegraphed a report that he was short the package and that his way bill did not correspond with the number on the registering lock attached to the pouch. Four or five postal inspectors are working on the case here.

The Republicans, of Smyth county, have won another signal victory electing their entire county ticket except Sheriff. We regret the defeat of Sheriff Rouse, who has made a most excellent officer, but have nothing to say against his successor, our friend Mike Cassell, the Sheriff elect.

Captain Wissler was re-elected over his democratic opponent without even leaving his home. This is the fourth successive time Captain Wissler has represented this county in the Virginia Legislature, an honor never before accorded to any of her citizens. We congratulate him on his deserved popularity. The county never had a finer gentleman and cleaner citizen to represent her interests in Richmond than Hon. J. H. Wissler.

While Hon. A. T. Lincoln was defeated for the Senate we congratulate him on his splendid vote in Smyth county. His majority of 240 was an approval of his record and standing as a citizen in our county. He was not an aspirant for the nomination and would have declined it but for his loyalty to his party and the Smyth-county people who insisted that he should accept the nomination. His record as a consistent "dry" man seems not to have done him much good in Washington county where they have been clamoring for "dry" legislation. Mr. Lincoln is not chagrined in the least and accepted the result without even a frown, hoping that Judge Cummings will give the "dry" people of Washington county and the city of Bristol what they want.

The Democratic Record.

It is useless to recite the particulars of the Democratic record when the rule of the party in power with respect to the administration of the State may be set forth with simplicity and absolute conviction. That record is based upon the settled policy of the party that never writes into its platform more of its actual purpose than it can possibly avoid. The policy of the Democratic party is to perpetuate itself in office. As long as this is accomplished, the Democratic party is willing to render some service to the people in the way of legislation. This, however, is a secondary consideration. One of the features of the perpetuation of the party is the satisfaction of the host of Democratic officeholders, the crew of the pay rolls and of the contracting jobs. Hence, it is that for the privilege of getting through measures the people, and especially those interested in legislation, have to pay in one or another way tribute to the extravagant and in many respects reprehensibly wasteful Democratic administration. The sessions of the legislature are marked by a veritable sluiceway of easy money for hosts of unnecessary employes is but one of the thousand and one methods by which the Democrats in power make the people pay enormously beyond the needs of economical government for every measure passed.—Baltimore American.

Returns From Other States

Elections held Tuesday in many States and cities throughout the country resulted in the election of democratic governors in Massachusetts, Kentucky and Mississippi, a Republican governor in Rhode Island, a Republican assembly in New York, which will challenge the continuance of Governor Dix's policies, a new Jersey Legislature (with majorities probably not in accord with Governor Woodrow Wilson, of that State; with results of the State elections in Maryland and New Mexico in favor of the Republicans.

DEMOCRATIC GAIN IN KANSAS.

Kansas City, Nov. 8.—Joseph A. Yagart, a Democrat, was elected to congress from the Second Kansas district by a majority estimated at 1,200 votes over his Republican opponent. Ulysses S. Quyer, to fill the unexpired term of the late Republican Congressman A. O. Mitchell. Mitchell carried the district in 1910 by 3,330 over John Caldwell, Democrat.

KENTUCKY GIVES 30,000 MAJORITY.

Louisville, Nov. 8.—Kentucky, for years considered in the balance between the Democrats and Republicans, went back into the ranks of the former in a landslide victory. Returns to 9:30 o'clock indicated that James B. McCreary, Democratic candidate for governor, had been elected from 20,000 to 40,000 majority. His opponent was Judge Edward C. O'Rear.

DEMOCRATS CARRY BIG OHIO TICKET.

Columbus, Ohio, Nov. 7.—The Democrats were swept into power in the three largest cities of Ohio today Columbus, Cincinnati and Cleveland returning democratic pluralities. In Toledo, Brand Whitlock, independent, has apparently been elected for a fourth term by a plurality in the neighborhood of 2,000. The big feature in the municipal contests throughout the State is the large socialist vote, eight cities electing socialist mayors. These cities are Lorain, St. Marys, Martins Ferry, Fostoria, Mt. Vernon, Barberton, Salem and Cuyahoga Falls. In Canton it will take the official count to decide whether the socialist candidate or Turnbull, Democrat, is elected, as unofficially Earnball wins by three votes.

MARY GIVES A REPUBLICAN GAIN.

Baltimore, Nov. 7.—Thirty-nine precincts in Baltimore of 321 give Goldsborough, Republican, for governor, 4,473; Gorman, Democrat, 3,813. Compared with the vote of four years ago the Republicans have increased their majorities in the Republican counties and have made gains in the democratic counties. The American, Republican, in an extra covering the election situation to midnight, says that the early returns from Baltimore and estimates for the counties that Goldsborough, Republican, has been elected governor by about 5,000 plurality.

REPUBLICANS WIN IN NEW JERSEY.

Trenton, N. J., Nov. 7.—Returns at midnight indicate that the Republicans will control both branches of the Legislature next winter. Gloucester county, which, according to early returns, was in doubt, elected a Republican Senator and this will make the senate stand eleven Republicans and ten Democrats. The assembly will be made up of approximately 38 Republicans to 32 Democrats. Last year's assembly consisted of 42 Democrats and 18 Republicans. The election for assemblymen showed gains for the Republicans in a number of counties that last fall elected Democrats that were carried through by Governor Wilson in connection with his candidacy for the governorship. The counties that last winter had democratic assemblies, but next year will be represented by Republicans are Bergen, Essex, Gloucester, Morris, Somerset and Union. The election is significant in the defeat of a number of men whose election was specifically advocated by Governor Woodrow Wilson in the tour he made of the State during the last few weeks.

Result of Election in Several Va. Counties.

Abingdon, Va., Nov. 8.—The returns indicate that Campbell, democrat, has defeated Baumgardner, republican, for Commonwealth's attorney; that Miller, democrat, has defeated Fleenor, republican, for sheriff; that Bradley, democrat, has defeated McConnell, republican, for treasurer; while the vote is close between Davenport, republican, and Stuart, democrat, for clerk of the Circuit court, with the indications that Davenport is elected.

Gate City, Va., Nov. 8.—

Scott county gave a majority of 250 for John H. Catron, for Senator, and indications are that Catron has defeated Ezra Carter, of Scott; for the Senate from the counties of Scott, Wise and Lee.

Wytheville, Va., Nov. 8.—

Because of the unusually large ticket, complete returns from yesterday's election are impossible at this hour. All precincts but three in Wythe county are heard from, which is sufficient to assure a democratic majority of 100 to 150 for the entire ticket.

Pearisburg, Va., Nov. 8.—

W. R. Thompson, independent democratic candidate for Sheriff of Giles county, has been elected over the regular nominee of the party by 70 votes.

Tazewell Court House, Nov. 8.—

Greever, the independent republican, has been elected clerk of the court over John T. Barnes, regular republican, by 400 majority. Royal, republican, for the Senate from Tazewell, Russell, Buchanan and Dickenson, has been elected by 600 majority over C. R. Brown, democrat. The fight between W. C. Payne, democrat, and S. O. Mustard, republican, for the House, from Tazewell and Buchanan counties, is extremely close. Others on the ticket were without opposition.

Christiansburg, Va., Nov. 8.—

The election here resulted in a landslide for the republicans yesterday, their entire ticket being elected by majorities ranging around 300. Charles Percy was elected treasurer and R. I. Roop, Commonwealth's attorney. A rather heavy vote was polled.

Buchanan, Va., Nov. 8.—

Complete returns from Botetourt county show that Bahrman, republican, for treasurer, has defeated Dr. R. H. Latane, democrat, by 150 majority. Lunenburg, democrat, for the House, has defeated the republican candidate, Hyde, by a good majority. Democrats have elected all other officers.

Harrisonburg, Va., Nov. 8.—

After the hardest fought battle in the history of the valley, former State Senator George B. Kezell, democratic candidate for county treasurer, went down in defeat in a four-cornered contest against two independents and one republican. P. W. Reherd, who for thirteen years was the republican treasurer, won. T. L. Williamson, the independent democrat, who insisted that the Kezell machine bulldozed him out a direct primary, polled a fair vote.

Next in interest was the fight for

State Senate between George N. Conrad, democrat, and John Paul, republican. Paul is elected. For the House, Dr. C. H. Holston and C. L. Hedrick, democratic, and Dr. W. F. Payne and G. N. Earman, republicans, were the candidates, with C. D. Harnsberger, independent. Holston and Hedrick will probably win, but the official count will be needed to decide.

For Commonwealth's attorney, R.

Switzer, democrat, is defeated by C. D. Harrison, republican.

Norfolk, Va., Nov. 8.—

Alvah H. Martin, republican national committeeman from Virginia, after a bitter fight was re-elected yesterday clerk of the circuit court of Norfolk county by a majority of 600 over his democratic opponent, C. W. Coleman.

Seven Good Roads Commandments.

1. Don't fill up the holes and ruts in the dirt road with brush, with rocks on top; and a little dirt to cover the rocks; but fill up the hole with dirt of the same character as the balance of the road.
2. Don't throw all the refuse from the ditches into the middle of the road; thus softening the surface and destroying the solid, firm bed that you have obtained by previous work; but throw this material out on the opposite side of the ditch.
3. Don't leave the center of the road the lowest point; but make it the highest and give the surface of the road a slope about one in twenty to the side ditch.
4. Don't carry the water across the surface of the road from one side to the other; but carry it by means of culverts underneath the road.
5. Don't have grades on your road over 4 1/2 per cent; for if you do, it will be necessary to build V-shaped surface ditches or "Thank-you-mam's" across the road.
6. Don't in working out the labor tax on the roads, try to make a holiday of it; but give an honest day's work on the road. Let us eliminate what is often seen in those sections where the roads are maintained by the labor tax—10 to 12 men and an overseer, a little gray mule, a small plow, six dogs, three or four guns, and a few tools which often are not considered worth using at home.
7. Don't reject the split-log drag because it is a cheap road machine, but use it constantly, for it is the most efficient road machine that we can use in maintaining the dirt road.—Joseph Hyde Pratt.



Cattle Dealer Fleeces Farmers.

Mr. John Ring, a well-known cattle dealer of this county, living at Elk Creek, has fleeced the farmers of Carroll, Grayson and Alleghany counties to the tune of about \$10,000 and perhaps more.

Last week over \$6,000 in checks he had given various parties were protested. The amount of the checks protested, since we are unable to say, but we are informed will reach the \$10,000 mark.

Mr. Ring, having heretofore made his obligations good to parties he purchased cattle from, his checks dated fifteen days ahead on the Bank of Speedwell was accepted by the farmers, this gave him time to ship and sell the cattle on the Lancaster, (Penn.) market, pocket the money and skip to parts unknown before his checks were presented for payment.

Before leaving Lancaster, Mr. Ring wrote to the Bank of Speedwell informing the bank that he was "busted" and could not meet his obligations, and that he was leaving for Klondike and did not expect to come back until he could face his creditors and meet his obligations.

It is thought that Mr. Ring has not gone to Klondike, but that it is a ruse to throw the people off his track. One reason for the step he has taken is that he is heavily in debt and a deed of trust is hanging over his farm for \$5,000.—Galax Post-Herald.

Beverly, democrat, is elected sheriff of Wise county by sixteen majority. The republicans claim that W. B. Hamilton is elected Clerk of Wise by eight. This is not conceded by the democrats. Cost \$3,000 to Convict H. G. Beattie.

The proper fixing of the expenses in the trial of Henry Clay Beattie, Jr., has for some days past held the attention of the Governor, and certain State officials and other officers of the law have held one or more conferences with his excellency in regard to this matter. Among those interested in this matter, besides Judge Walter A. Watson, who of late has been a frequent caller at the gubernatorial offices, is L. L. Scherer, who took entire charge of the accumulating of evidence against Beattie to prepare the case for the prosecution.

It is the expressed opinion of Mr. Scherer that the expenses in the Beattie trial will fall from \$500 to \$1,000 below those in the trial and conviction of Sam'l J. McCue, which latter expenses, according to Governor Mann, approximated about \$3,800.

In recognition of his singular abilities, Lawyer Wendenburg was elected to the State Senate from his district in Henrico county, without even so much as ever starting a campaign.

In the case of Mr. Scherer that officer tendered his services without cost to the State, the Chesapeake & Ohio railroad consenting to allow him all time necessary from his duties as their General Claim Agent that he might prosecute the gathering evidence in the Beattie case.

Mr. Scherer said that the McCue case at Charlottesville lasted about three weeks, and cost the State about \$3,800. The Beattie case, which lasted sixteen days, will, in the opinion of Mr. Scherer not total in expense above \$3,000.00.—Richmond News Leader.


