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Can't Kill Robins.

Richmond, Va., February 2.—Little doubt exists that the Senate will concur in the House bill providing that robins shall not be killed in the State of Virginia at any time, the ground assigned being that it is an insectivorous bird and that it also comes within the purview of the law that it is a song bird, but the legislators are few who can aver that they have ever been thrilled by the notes of this species of the feathered singer. The matter of prohibiting the shooting of wild turkeys for sale at any time was discussed at length in the committee, and the sentiment seems to be to forever prohibit the shooting of turkeys and partridges and to prohibit their sale and shipment from the State at any time. The sportsmen of the city and of the State are unanimous in this position, and they are represented in the hearing by the best lawyers of the city and State. The charge is that during the open season there is a class of men who neglect whatever work they may have to do in order to kill wild turkeys and ship them for sale.

The Ninth District to Lose Three Counties.

Richmond, Va., Feb. 4.—Revision opinions as to what should be done in the way of re-arranging the lines of the Ninth district were presented to the House Committee on Privileges and Elections yesterday afternoon. At the previous hearing, the representatives of that section wanted it let alone or else to have Smyth taken out, but there seemed to be general objection to this, and opening of the question was agreed to by the committee, both as to this district and as to the Sixth and Fifth which would necessarily be affected. Coming officially from the Ninth District Democratic Committee, a request was made yesterday afternoon of the House Committee on Privileges and Elections that the counties of Giles, Bland and Tazewell be taken from the Ninth and put in the Sixth district. Although this was opposed by some of the representatives from the Sixth, it seems morally certain that it will be done. Halifax is apparently as sure to be taken from the Sixth and put in the Fifth.

Revenue Officers Make Capture.

Martinsville, Va., Feb. 3.—Several days ago Revenue Officers Floyd Gray, Shepherd, Stultz and Morgan, captured George Waggoner and another white man on the public road east of Horsepasture. Waggoner was walking along by the side of the wagon; the other man was driving, and when going up a hill the revenue officers called to halt, and both ran. Waggoner was shot and ran two or three hundred yards before he fell, while the other man gave himself up. The wagon, to which was hitched two mules, was brought to Martinsville, together with two barrels of liquor. The revenue officers got a buggy, placed the wounded man in it, and brought him to Martinsville, arriving here shortly before dark. The man was taken to the office of Dr. E. M. Hundley, where he received medical attention. The wound is a serious one, the pistol ball entering the side. From the physician's office he was taken to the Broad Street Hotel, where he is now under the care of a trained nurse. Only one shot was fired. Officer Shepherd doing the shooting. Both men, it is said, had pistols. The injured man's home is in the Shooting Creek neighborhood; he is married and gave Edicott as his home.

Was Insane, Says Jury.

Wytheville, Va., Feb. 5.—Wythe County Circuit court, Judge Fulton Kegley sitting, was engaged all of the week in the trial of Stephen Pauey for alleged robbery of Charles J. Appleby about two years ago. The jury, after being out only an hour, brought in a verdict of not guilty by reason of the insanity of the accused at the time of the assault and robbery.

Grayson Men to Get Their Money.

It will be recalled by readers of the Southwest Times that some time last fall a prominent cattle dealer of Grayson county by the name of John M. Ring, succeeding in fleecing a large number of farmers in that section by means of shipping their cattle with the promise to pay them at a later date. Mr. Ring disappeared and for a long time no one knew of his whereabouts, leaving the Grayson farmers to mourn, as they thought, the loss of about \$10,000.
Mr. Ring passed through Pulaski last Thursday morning, on his way from Maryland to his old home in Grayson, where he is returning, according to his statement, to make restitution for the full amount to which he is indebted in that section. He stated to Mr. E. W. Cornett, of this city who is also a former Grayson man, that he had been living in Maryland since he left and has purchased a farm in that State; that it was not his purpose to swindle the Grayson people, but he had become temporarily embarrassed financially and left in order that he might have an opportunity to realize on his financial prospects.
He says that he is now doing what it was his purpose to do when he left, and that he did not intend for his old friends to suffer because of their confidence in him.—Southwest Times.

Washington, Feb. 5.—Vice-President Sherman at the White House Friday said that Mr. Taft will be re-nominated and re-elected. Mr. Sherman said: "I never have had any doubt as to Mr. Taft's re-nomination. The Republican party wins its victories in November and not in February. History will repeat itself this year."

Busy on State Highway from Bristol.

D. Tucker Brown, chief locating engineer of the Virginia Highway Commission, and his assistants, who have been enroute in Washington county since early in January, came to Bristol Saturday afternoon, and spent to-day at the Hamilton.
Having completed the three different surveys proposed between Bristol and Abingdon, Mr. Brown and his men are now continuing the survey for a State road from Abingdon eastward to the Smyth county line. They have advanced as far as Glade Spring, and it was from that point that they came to Bristol Saturday. They will soon complete the survey across Washington county, following which they will take up the survey of proposed routes across the county of Smyth.

Convicts will be brought to Bristol in May, when the actual work of construction in Washington county will be commenced in earnest. Those most directly interested in this work expect to see a new stone road in existence between Bristol and Abingdon before the end of the present year.—Bristol Herald Courier.

Contract Awarded.

Killed Instantly by Train.

Roanoke, Va., Feb. 3.—Edgar Lawrence Helm, of Roanoke, a traveling salesman for the Baltimore drug firm of Hollander & Koshland, was struck and instantly killed by the Memphis Special at Vickers about noon Wednesday. He was forty-one years old and though he traveled out of Baltimore, he made his home with his family in this city.
Reports of the accident say that Mr. Helm was visiting customers in Vickers and that he was killed while on his way from one side to another. He was walking west on the left track of the Norfolk and Western as an east-bound freight train was approaching. The freight train was pulling hard on the grade at that point and the noise drowned out the sound of the Memphis Special, which was running down grade on the other track.

Mr. Helm, to avoid the freight, stepped to the opposite track and was struck by the west-bound passenger train, which was running at high speed. The back part of his skull was badly crushed and death instantaneous.

Ninth Dist. Convention.

Abingdon, Va., Jan. 15, 1912
TO REPUBLICAN COUNTY AND CITY CHAIRMAN AND ELECTORS OF THE NINTH CONGRESSIONAL DISTRICT OF VIRGINIA:
Responding to the call of the Republican National committee, the Republican District committee of the Ninth Congressional district of Virginia hereby directs that a District convention of delegated representatives of the Republican party of the Ninth Congressional district of Virginia, be held in the City Hall, Bristol, Va., on Wednesday, Feb. 21, 1912, at 1 p. m., for the purpose of selecting 2 Delegates and 2 Alternates to the Republican National convention which will convene in Chicago, Ill., on June 18, 1912, to nominate candidates for President and Vice-President of the United States. One Elector for the Ninth Congressional district of Virginia, to be voted for at the election to be held on Nov. 5, 1912. One member of the Republican State Executive committee and the transaction of each other business as may properly come before said convention.

The Republican electors of the several counties and cities of the Ninth Congressional district of Virginia, and all other electors, with out regard to past political affiliation, who believe in the principles of the Republican party and endorse its policies are cordially invited to unite in the selection of delegates to said District convention. Said District convention shall consist of one delegate for each 50 votes (and one delegate for each fraction of 26 or more votes) cast for the party candidate for Governor on Nov. 2, 1909. For each delegate elected to this convention an alternate delegate shall be chosen, to serve in the absence of his principal.

Credentials of delegates and alternates, with any resolutions or instructions adopted at the meeting, must be forwarded to the Republican District Chairman, Abingdon, Va., at least five days before the date fixed for the District convention for use in making its temporary roll. Such credentials must be signed by the permanent Chairman and Secretary of the County and City convention or mass-meeting, and bear the counter-signatures of the County and City Chairman.

Hon. J. H. Wissler Offers Road Bill.

To amend Section 11 of Chapter 74, Acts 1908, approved Feb. 25, 1908, entitled an act to amend and re-enact Chapter 184 of the Acts of the General Assembly of Virginia, 1890, entitled "An act to provide for the working of and keeping in repair the public roads and bridges of Smyth county, approved Feb. 6, 1890."
Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia, that Section 11 of Chapter 74 of the Acts of 1908 approved Feb. 25, 1908, entitled an act to amend and re-enact Chapter 184 of the Acts of the General Assembly of Virginia, 1890, entitled "An act to provide for the working of and keeping in repair the public roads and bridges of Smyth county, approved Feb. 6, 1890, be amended and re-enacted to read as follows:
11. The Board of Supervisors of the county shall, for the purposes of this act, annually levy, along with the county levy, a road tax, upon the property, real and personal, assessed for taxation in the several Magisterial districts of the county, but the rate of levy shall not exceed \$1.00 on the \$100.00 in any Magisterial district.
This bill leaves the matter of road tax with the people through the Board of Supervisors. Some of our people object to a bond issue and prefer to raise road revenue by direct taxation, or adopt the "pay as you go plan." Under this bill all the revenue needed can be raised if the levy is increased to an amount not exceeding the rate mentioned in the bill. It is only an extension of the law as it now stands.

Confederate Re-union.

Macon, Ga., Feb. 6.—(Special)—"Several years ago," said a Confederate veteran, of Macon who will be a prominent figure at the Re-union to be held May 7th, "I met a Federal officer, a major, who was in the headquarters of General W. T. Sherman when the order was sent to General Stoneman to take a picket command, march on Macon and liberate the six thousand officers in prison at Camp Oglethorpe. Had the order of General Sherman been carried out to the letter, had General Stoneman not camped within ten miles of Macon a four o'clock in the afternoon, had he marched into Macon in the afternoon he would have been victorious in his endeavor. He would have found a defenseless and unprepared city.
Well do I remember the excitement which prevailed among we Confederates here when we learned that Stoneman had rested within two hours march of our homes. Clearly do I recall how boys in knee trousers, old men and even women, helped haul the cannon up East Macon hill through the darkness.
When morning dawned and Stoneman marched on the city, which he thought was still sleeping, he found a defiant and prepared, if undisciplined and untutored, army of men, women and almost children awaiting him to defend their homes with their lives. Probably six thousand people were on the alert for him.
Dismayed, he then made what I consider to have been his fatal and salient blunder. He threw out a skirmish line, boat a retreat, and, unprotected in this retreat, fell into the hands of Wheeler's brigade, if I remember rightly, in Jasper county. Sherman had instructed him to equip the released officers with small arms captured in Macon, take all of the cannon here and proceed to Andersonville and release the 30,000 prisoners there. Then proceeding to the coast he was to board the transports in waiting there.

Gen. Weaver Dies in Iowa.

Des Moines, Ia., Feb. 7.—General James B. Weaver, populist candidate for President in 1892, died at the home of relatives here yesterday. He was eighty years old, but had been ill only a few days.

The New Republican Congress Committee.

Washington, Feb. 6.—Republicans in Congress caucused last night and named the committee which will conduct the coming congressional campaign.

The leaders were enthusiastic over the outlook for victory in the coming struggle to wrest from the Democrats the control of the House. Woods, of Iowa, a leading "insurgent," was among the first to hold out the olive branch of peace. He introduced a resolution extolling the work of Representative William H. McKinley, of Illinois, as chairman of the committee and urging that he be re-elected to that position.
Hon. C. B. Sloop was elected a member of the committee from Virginia.

N. & W. Station at Dublin Burned.

Pulaski, Va., Feb. 4.—The large freight depot of the Norfolk & Western Railway at Dublin, in this county, was completely destroyed by fire this morning about 2 o'clock.

The fire is supposed to have started from a stove in the office or waiting room or from defective flues. The building was of pine and burned fiercely.

When the fire was first discovered flames were bursting from the roof. No estimate has been made of the total loss but it must be something like ten or fifteen thousand dollars.

The only thing saved from the building was a crate of cackling chickens.
