



Tazewell Bonds Sold.

Tazewell, Va., July 24.—The first lot of Tazewell county road bonds, of the \$625,000 issue voted April 18th, were sold last Friday to John Naveen & Co., of Chicago, at five per cent., with a two per cent. premium. This company bought \$125,000 of the bonds, which is all that will be issued for the present, or until the amount is exhausted in the building of roads. Bids will be asked for at once, and work will begin on the road building. The expected levy of the Board of Supervisors, which was thought by some would be high on account of the voting of the bonds, was laid Friday, and is about seven cents less on the \$100 than last year.

New Postage Stamps.

Washington, July 24.—"Utility, art and harmony," according to the Third Assistant Postmaster-General Britt, will be combined in a new issue of postage stamps about to be authorized. The head of President Washington will appear on the first six of the series, while the last five will bear the likeness of Benjamin Franklin. All of the new stamps' denomination will be in Arabic, and this, as well as the use of a separate color or shade for each denomination, is expected to prevent the confusion of which two conventions of postal clerks have complained.

Newspaper Men Meet.

Detroit, Mich., July 22.—A feature of the sessions of the annual convention of the National Editorial Association of the United States was an address delivered by United States Representative Henry A. Barnhart, of Indiana, who declared that since "the people are sending more editors to each succeeding Congress the jaws of the legislative millennium is correspondingly nearer."

"The great duty of the newspaper man, he said, is to work for more possibilities, more health and more happiness for the people."

"In the great conflicts of public opinion for better things," said the speaker, "newspapers are a power for good or for evil, in proportion to the 'backbone' or the 'jelly' they show for public welfare."

"The newspaper that panders to unwholesome public thought is a deserter in the face of high public duty and the one that puts conscience above the counting room cash register builds mightily for larger blessings to civilization both here and hereafter."

He denounced the policy of newspapers which blindly support the candidates of their party, whether or not the candidates are worthy of public confidence and truth.

"Tell the truth and fear no man," he said, "is the only safe guide to editorial success in shaping the destiny of our country. And when we do this the golden age of just law enactment, bad law abolishment and wholesome law enforcement will make ours a mightier and happier people."

Bluefield Postal Saving Bank.

Bluefield, W. Va., July 24.—The Postal Savings Bank will be opened in Bluefield on July 29th. G. E. Newton, local postoffice inspector, left for Washington Friday to receive instructions on the method of doing business, and he will assist at the establishing of the banks here and in Williamson. The people who have hid and buried their money are expected to dig it up and bring it in.

The postmaster at Corinth, Miss., at which town there is a postal savings bank, has forwarded to the Postmaster-General a heavily corroded silver dollar, dated 1889. It is one of a number of coins which had been buried by their owner for many years, and probably never would have been placed in circulation so long as their owner lived, if the government had not gone into this phase of the banking business.

It will be an interesting statement if the government ever shows just how much money has been put to bankable and commercial use through this department. It may not be easy to determine the exact amount, but an approximate calculation can be made and that will suffice. The hoarding habit has caused more than one panic. Just when funds have been most needed, they have been withdrawn from circulation and put into hiding places. The postal banks will probably take the place of stockpiles for that class of timid capitalists who have not much to lose singly, but who in the aggregate control a very appreciable proportion of the national currency.

Charged With Murder.

Henry C. Beattie, Jr., Occupies a Felon's Cell. His Cousin is Implicated.

Richmond, Va., July 22.—Henry C. Beattie, Jr., now occupies a felon's cell in the city jail, charged with the murder of his wife, Louise Wellford Beattie, on last Tuesday night in the County of Chesterfield.

What is more, his cousin, Paul Beattie, is in a cell at the city home, charged with having been the man who less than a week ago purchased the gun with which the murder was committed. Paul Beattie is a man who is, so far as the law is concerned, a person of unsound mind. He was placed under arrest following the filing of a statement with the police as to the purchase of the gun with which the crime was committed. He is a raving maniac following his arrest, and he has been under the constant care and attendance of several physicians since his arrest.

The whole fabric of the defense has been shattered following the discovery of who sold the gun, to whom, when and for what sum. This information is in the possession of the police in the form of a signed document.

The debonair air of Henry C. Beattie, Jr., remains unchanged. He put on a bold front and baffled the lawyers in the case, making an excellent witness for himself.

While the coroner's jury was examining Henry Beattie the detectives were following a clue as to the owner of the gun. They picked up a clue and worked that to a finish. That finish was when they unearthed the fact that the gun was sold several days before the tragedy, to Paul Beattie, a cousin of Henry C. Beattie, and that Henry C. Beattie was present when the weapon was sold. The gun was bought from Sam Stern, a pawn broker, and involved the sum of two dollars and a half.

The wife of Paul Beattie has given out a statement regarding her husband and the purchase of the gun, in which she corroborated the statement which the police have in connection with the case. She is reported in a serious condition following the detention of her husband as an accessory to the crime.

Martin and Dixon Fight an Old Battle.

Washington, July 22.—Senator Dixon, of Montana, republican, and Senator Martin, of Virginia, democrat, brought their Civil war histories and an encyclopedia to the Senate several days ago to settle the question whether Virginia or North Carolina troops figured the more prominently in Pickett's charge at Gettysburg.

Senator Dixon was born in North Carolina and asserted in the Senate that the histories were all wrong about the charge of Pickett's "Virginians," that there were really more North Carolinians in the famous charge.

Senator Martin cited histories to show that Pickett's troops were Virginians; and Senator Dixon replied with citations to show that they were backed up by fifteen North Carolina regiments. Senator Dixon said North Carolina had been "first at Bethel, last at Appomattox and furthest at Gettysburg," while Senator Martin thought he could say the same thing of Virginia Confederates. The controversy was finally dropped when the Senate got uneasy over a threatened re-natal of the Civil war memories.

The Russell County Poll Tax Case.
 We have seen several notices in the Democratic press of the Russell county "poll tax muddle," as they call it. We now have before us a copy of The Bluefield Telegraph containing the affidavits of John H. H. deputy treasurer, and W. M. Browning, treasurer. Strange to say this testimony in the case has not been printed, as we have seen, in any of the Virginia daily papers. They have satisfied themselves by giving short notices, which generally reflect on the Treasurer of Russell county, and condemned his action in omitting the names from the voting list. The affidavits, however, make disclosures of a remarkable situation in Russell county. They show that "Democratic runners," and give their names, paid poll taxes in blocks of five, to as many as sixty; that they had what purported to be orders from the voter in an envelope, and this envelope contained the \$1.58, and in each envelope was a new \$1.00 bill, which showed that it was just from the bank and had never been handled; that the treasurer deposited one hundred of these bills in the bank on a certain day and marked them; that on the same day within three hours afterward fifty-three of these same marked bills were returned to the Treasurer's office by a certain Democratic worker for the payment of poll taxes of voters who lived miles from the Treasurer's office. The affidavit, which fills several columns, gives the facts in detail; it gives a list of the workers by name and the number each one brought in and from what district, making a total of 633. The Treasurer says he has followed the opinion of the Supreme Court as laid down in 109th Virginia, Page 510 to 516. Another fact developed in the case is that H. L. Kidd, the Democratic county chairman, who was wanted as a witness, has absented himself from the county, and although every effort has been put forth to find him, still he cannot be located. We have not seen where the judge has handed down his decision in this case and we await with interest to see what he will do in the face of the law and the Treasurer's affidavits. The Treasurer we note was represented by Messrs. Bullett & Worth, leading Democratic lawyers.

Senate Passes Reciprocity Bill.
 Washington, July 26.—The reciprocal trade agreement between the United States and Canada, embodied in the reciprocity bill that provided a storm center in two sessions of Congress passed the Senate without amendment by a vote of fifty-three to twenty-seven. A majority of Republicans voted against it. Of the fifty-three votes for it thirty-two were Democratic and twenty-one Republicans; of the twenty-seven against, twenty-four were Republicans and three Democrats. This action settled the whole Canadian reciprocity question so far as Congress is concerned and saved for executive approval and the Canadian parliament's ratification made the pact the law of the land.

Increase in Agricultural Wealth.

Washington, July 24.—The census bureau announces the latest general farm statistics of the United States, showing that land in farms more than doubled in value during the last ten years, having increased \$15,282,788,000, or 118 per cent.

In 1900 they were valued at \$13,051,033,000, and returns of the thirteenth census show they are now worth \$28,333,821,000. Farm lands, farm buildings and farm implements of the country are valued at \$35,858,553,000, compared with \$17,257,425,000 ten years ago.

The number of farms in 1910 was 6,340,120, as compared with 5,737,372 in 1910, an increase of eleven per cent. The land increased in 1900 from 835,092,000 acres to 836,073,000 in 1910, or five per cent., but a larger increase, fifteen per cent., is noted in improved acreage, which in 1910 was 414,490,000 acres and in 1910 477,424,000 acres.
