



Had No Faith in Banks.

Aged Woman Found Dead in Home and Large Sum of Money Missing.

Sisterville, W. Va., Dec. 3.—Mrs. Elizabeth Allen, aged eighty-seven years, a wealthy widow, was found dead yesterday at her home at Sherley, near here. A large sum of money, which she had in the house is missing, and the coroner is of the opinion that she was strangled to death, after which the robbery was effected. Mrs. Allen lived alone, and had no faith in banks. She owned considerable property, including several farms, on which were producing oil wells.

The money she received in royalties from these wells she kept in the house. When Mrs. Allen did not appear early in the day, search was made for her, and she was found fully dressed, in a rear room on the floor. Other rooms were in confusion, showing she had fought hard for her life. The physician, who was called, said a number of small bones in her hand were broken and her windpipe had been crushed. In a house twenty feet away Mrs. Allen's son, John, is dying from tuberculosis. Attorneys for Mrs. Allen went through the house late yesterday, and found \$172 sewed in an old quilt and \$12 in an old sofa. There is missing an old wallet in which Mrs. Allen is known to have had over \$3,000 cash, with bonds, notes and other securities.

The Census Returns GIVE the Old Dominion 2,061,612.

Washington, Dec. 5.—The population of the State of Virginia, according to Census office figures announced several days ago, is 2,061,612, as compared with 1,854,184 ten years ago. The increase is 207,428, or 11.2 per cent, which gives the State an additional member in the new apportionment of the House of Representatives. The population of the Ninth district is as follows:

Slice from Ninth District.

Commenting on the Census returns for Virginia the Richmond Times-Dispatch says:

"It becomes quite evident that territory must be taken away from the Ninth district. The immense industrial development there has caused a faster growth than that enjoyed by any other section of the State, and on any sort of basis the district has too many people to elect only one member of the House. Under new Census the Ninth has 265,657 people as now constituted, and it will be seen that this is out of all proportion to the others. Even with the increased ratio of 215,000 population to a Congressman some of the counties will almost inevitably be taken from the district. The Fifth district has now but 172,835 people, or nearly 100,000 less than the Ninth.

Wise county, in the Ninth, shows the largest growth and the largest percentage of growth of any in the State. It jumps from 19,653 in 1900 to 24,162 in 1910, a gain of 78.8 per cent. Wise held the same distinction in 1900, for it had then grown faster than any other county for the preceding ten years. In 1890 it had but 9,345 people and in the decade to 1900 it grew 110 per cent. The opening of mineral industries has accomplished the result.

Russell, an adjoining county to Wise, comes second. It has grown since 1900 from 18,031 to 23,474, or 30.2 per cent.

Probably Polaski, Bland, Giles and Wythe the counties will be taken away from the Ninth in the re-districting.

SLEMP'S STATEMENT.

Congressman C. B. Slemp's expense report for the campaign recently held in the Ninth district, when he was re-elected to Congress, has been received by the Secretary of the Commonwealth. It shows that the successful candidate spent \$7,423.48, not half so much as was spent by Mr. Stuart, who was defeated.

It was generally thought that Mr. Slemp's expenses would exceed those of Henry C. Stuart, but such was not the case. Mr. Slemp, in his report, enumerates the following items:

The Price of Butter.

The discussion given to the subject of cost of living has directed more or less attention to the Federal oleomargarine tax and the price of butter. People who are in favor of repealing the present oleomargarine law have taken advantage of the situation to loudly condemn as "undemocratic and un-American" this "burden-some tax on a pure, wholesome and nutritious food product."

The conveniently forget to explain that over ninety-seven per cent of the oleomargarine put upon the market is taxed at only one-fourth cent per pound. They do not explain that only that oleomargarine that is artificially colored is taxed at ten cents per pound.

Even if it were all taxed at ten cents per pound it would have absolutely nothing to do with the price of butter after the latter reaches thirty cents a pound retail. It costs about fourteen cents a pound to produce the very best grade of oleomargarine. Add to this a ten-cent tax and the cost of production would be twenty-four cents. The product could be retailed at thirty cents at a handsome profit to manufacturer and retailer.

Looking at the question from any view point it is clearly seen that the oleomargarine law has absolutely nothing to do with the price of butter.

The whole proposition may be thus summed up: Oleomargarine is now made to taste and smell something like butter. The manufacturers and a few retail dealers want the privilege of putting it upon the market so that it will look like butter, thus making it easy to commit fraud.

Every good citizen should be interested in effective pure food legislation and the oleomargarine law is just such legislation—no more, no less.

Notice of Election.

VIRGINIA: At a Circuit Court continued and held for Smyth Co., at the Courthouse thereof, on Monday 21st day of November, 1910:

This day came the Board of Supervisors of Smyth County, by its attorneys and presented a petition signed by all the members of the said Board, praying the Court to enter an order requiring the Judges of Election of the County of Smyth, to open a poll on December, 22nd, 1910 to take the sense of the qualified voters of the said County, on the question whether the Board of Supervisors of said County, on the question, whether the Board of Supervisors of said County shall issue bonds of Smyth County, to an amount not exceeding fifty thousand dollars, said bonds to bear interest at the rate of 6 per cent. per annum, payable semi-annually, payable on the first days of January and July of each year, one fourth of said bonds to run for five years, one fourth for ten years, one-fourth for fifteen years and one-fourth for twenty years, for the purpose of macadamizing and otherwise permanently improving certain public roads in the Rich Valley Magisterial in said Smyth County, to-wit:

1. To macadamizing the road beginning at the mouth of Cove Creek on what is known as the river-road and running down said river road to the line of the Corporation of the Saltville, near McCready's Gap, a distance of about eight miles, said Macadam to be nine feet wide with turnouts fourteen feet wide at intervals of about each one half mile, said turnouts not to exceed one hundred feet in length.

2. To permanently improve the following road: (A) The road running from the mouth of Muddy Branch up Beaver Creek to the Valley Road, a distance of about three miles, width, twelve to fourteen feet. (b) The road leading from old Broad Ford along the Scott road road via United Church to Cedar Branch, a distance of about five miles; width, twelve to fourteen feet. (c) The road lead leading from the residence of T. G. Sanders along the Walker road to the Rich Valley near the residence of H. L. Morgan, a distance of about two miles; width, twelve to fourteen feet. (d) The Rich Valley road running up Rich Valley from the line of the corporation of the Town of Saltville on the East of said Corporation to the Bland county line, a distance of about twenty miles; width from twelve to fourteen feet. (e) The road leading from the mouth of Cove Creek, eastwardly to Chatham Hill, a distance of about seven miles; width from twelve to fourteen feet. (f) The road leading from Olympia to the Walker's Mountain at Whitehead Gap, a distance of about 3 1/2 miles, width from twelve to fourteen feet.

It is therefore considered by the Court that the Judges of the Election of the County of Smyth, shall on December 22, 1910, open a poll at the various voting places in the County of Smyth, and take the sense of the qualified voters of the said County on the question whether the Board of Supervisors for said County shall issue the bonds for Macadamizing and otherwise improving the said Rich Valley Magisterial District, in said County of Smyth, not to exceed in amount the sum of fifty thousand dollars, and it is further ordered that the regular election officers of said County, at the time hereinafore designated shall conduct such election and close the polls in such manner as is provided by law in other elections, and made return thereof, as provided by statute in such cases made and provided. And it is further ordered that the Electoral Board of Smyth County shall have printed and furnish the ballots for said election as required by Section 2 of an Act of the General Assembly of Virginia, approved February 25, 1908, as amended by an Act approved February 16, 1910. And in the event the question of issuing the said bonds for the said Rich Valley District shall be decided in favor of the issuing of said bonds, and said bonds are issued by the said Board of Supervisors, it is further ordered that the bonds so issued shall have written or printed on said bonds the following sentences:

"These bonds are issued for Rich Valley Magisterial District, but the full faith and credit of the entire County is hereby pledged for their payment; and a tax to be levied upon the property of said district to pay them upon maturity" and said bonds shall be in all other respects as required by an Act of the General Assembly of Virginia, approved February 25th, 1908, as amended by an Act of the said General Assembly approved Feb. 16, 1910.

And it is further ordered that certified copy of this order shall be published for four weeks in the newspapers published in Smyth County, and posted by the Sheriff at the front door of the Courthouse for Smyth County, and at each voting place in said County, at least 30 days prior to the election.


