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A TERRIBLE AFFAIR.

AN-ALLEGHANY COUNTY FATHER'S ALLEGED BRUTAL CRIME.

TALK OF LYNNING HIM. The officers of the Law to Take Him Away Secretly.

One of the worst cases of brutality came to light at Longdale Furnace, Alleghany county, Monday evening late. As far as learned, the facts are about as follows: Elizabeth Dawney aged about eighteen years, a daughter of George Downey, who is an employe of the Longdale Iron Company, at its furnace in Alleghany county, left home last Friday to visit some of her relatives in Rockbridge county, a distance of about five miles.

On Tuesday the girl's mother questioned her closely, and the above facts developed themselves. A warrant was at once gotten for the man's arrest, and Constable G. J. Cochran, of Clifton Forge, made the arrest late Tuesday night.

The preliminary hearing was had yesterday morning before Justice Guy Johnson, and the above statement of the case came out, except that the man denies everything. The girl tells a straight tale of the unfortunate affair. The justice sent the prisoner to the guard yard.

Yesterday Justice E. A. Sneed, of Clifton Forge, in response to a wire message from Longdale furnace, went there, and with the constable and several special guards, brought the man here to await the arrival of the night train for Covington, but upon the arrival here found such a gathering of people, that it was deemed best to send the prisoner on by private conveyance.

Considerable excitement prevailed at the furnace, after the preliminary hearing, and the cause of his being taken there by wagon instead of waiting for the train. The county court meets on Tuesday next, and Judge Moore will have a special grand jury to consider the case, and the man's conviction.

COLONIZE 10,000 NEGROES. A Tract of \$2,500,000 Acres Purchased in Mexico.

SAN ANTONIO, TEX., June 1.—An extensive land deal has been closed here involving 2,500,000 acres, lying on the Rio Grande in the Mexican States of Coahuila and Chihuahua. The land was sold by ex-Governor Gonzales, of Chihuahua, to the Mexican Coffee, Cotton and Canalization company, with headquarters here, and represented by Mr. J. S. McNamara. It is reported that Mr. W. H. Ellis, who is interested in the Mexican colonization schemes, will colonize 10,000 negroes on part of the land.
