



School Fund Apportioned

Provision Made of Total Appropriation Among Cities and Counties.

Below is given the apportionment of the State school fund for the year 1910 among the counties of the 9th district. The apportionment is based on the new school census recently completed. The State has less money for school purposes this year than last, although the school population has increased. The reason is the new law which requires the delinquent capitation taxes to be deducted on the basis of the preceding year.

Hitchcock's Plan.

His Magazine Postage Program Officially Explained.

Washington, Nov. 7.—Postmaster-General Hitchcock's plan of requiring magazines to pay increased postage on their advertising pages sufficient to eliminate postal deficits and warrant, in the near future, one-cent postage on first-class mail, was officially explained on last Friday. Postmaster-General Hitchcock believes that in carrying out the administration's purpose to accomplish a reasonable increase in the postage rates on certain kinds of second-class mail, a distinction should be made between advertising and what is termed legitimate reading matter. He does not favor, under present conditions, an increase in the rates of postage for carrying reading matter. Any increase thus applied, he points out, will place a special burden on a large number of second-class publications, such as educational and religious periodicals, that derive little or no profit from advertising. It is the circulation of this type of publications, which aid so effectively in the educational and moral advancement of the people, that the government can best afford to encourage. For these publications, and also for any other legitimate reading matter in periodical form, Mr. Hitchcock suggests a continuation of the present low postage rate of one cent a pound, and recommends that the proposed increase in rate be applied only to the magazine advertising matter.

Opening of Oil Fields in Virginia.

"The opening of the new oil fields in Southwest Virginia will place the Old Dominion well up among the oil producing States of the Union, if the opinions of oil experts who have viewed the territory are verified," said Mr. Obas. P. Brown, of Norton, Va., now at the New Willard, in to-day's Washington Post. "It is expected that the new industry will be well launched before the coming spring. Already thousands of dollars have been invested in machinery, and wells are being bored through the mountainous sections, particularly in Lee county. That part of Virginia abounds in mountains and hills filled with coal of the best character. Several efforts in the past to induce capitalists to come to that section and bore for oil failed. Six months ago a large corporation, however, sent men and material to Lee county, and before the expiration of a month evidences of large streams of oil were found. It is believed that countless millions of barrels of oil are now sweeping through the mountains of coal, only waiting for an opening, when they will be diverted toward the surface."

Moon in Eclipse Nov. 16th.

The Show Comes Early in Evening, So That Everybody Can See It.

With the present year having already brought several very interesting celestial displays, astronomers announce that still another number on the 1910 program remains to be carried out. On the night of Nov. 16th there will be a total eclipse of the moon, which will be visible in every part of the United States.

Making its appearance early in the year, after nearly a century's absence, Halley's comet occupied the centre of the aerial stage until well on in the summer, disappearing finally for another long jaunt through space. Following very close upon its passing came the announcement that a man up in Massachusetts had discovered another comet that put it all over Halley's for glory, and that in two months the world might expect to see a celestial visitor that was really worth while. It never materialized, however. Then in August came the shooting stars, which astronomers call the Perseids, and just about this time old Luna one night suddenly shifted her position, moving from the part of the sky where she had been accustomed to rise, to a new place way on the other side.

All during the fireworks the comets and the stars have had nothing on old Mr. Moon. This is the second total eclipse that he will treat the world to this year, the first having been on May 23rd. In this second eclipse the moon will enter about six p. m. The total eclipse is scheduled to begin at seven p. m., and end about an hour later, still another hour being required for it to leave the shadow. Coming early in the night, the eclipse will afford a splendid chance to be observed.

A Great Victory Won By a Great Leader.

The Ninth district Republicans should, and do feel proud of the splendid victory they won Tuesday. It was a great contest. Against them was fitted the wealthiest Democrat in the district—behind him was the wealth and combined political machinery of the entire State. The odds were simply wonderful—but against all these combined forces the loyal Republicans of the Ninth district stood firm and invincible. The majority, though small, represents the greatest victory ever won in the Ninth district, and only one man could have withstood the mighty conflict, and that man was Bascom Slemph. The Republicans of this great district owe him a debt of gratitude they can never pay. He has stood out a great leader and never for one moment did he swerve from the path of duty, never for a moment did he cease to hold high the standard of his party and never did he stop 'til he placed it safely on the battlements of the enemy; never did he turn his face from the firing line 'til victory was his and the noise of the last Democratic gun had died away on the field of battle. We once more in behalf of the loyal Republicans of old Smith doff our hats and give three cheers for our splendid leader, Bascom Slemph. True, tried and loyal; a man of the highest character; a leader of men; he has shown himself invincible and secure against the combined forces of the Democratic party of the entire State.

The big rich man from Russell didn't get across the line.

"The conquering hero goes marching on"—that is, up Salt River.

The Roanoke Times can't control the great Ninth District. "Stuart is sure to win" said the Democratic press. But Stuart did not win.

The Hon. Henry C. Stuart can now open his campaign for Governor. He will not be bothered by Congressional duties in Washington City.

That Democratic celebration in Marion Tuesday night left a bad taste in the mouths of our democratic friends. Some of them lost their voices and others have retired to their homes in a very dilapidated condition. They have our sympathy.

The Democrats are playing all kind of tactics to take the victory away from Mr. Slemph, but they will find this is no child's play. They tried to rob Colonel Slemph of his first victory, but they failed. Henry Stuart in the Rhea investigation put his veto on such work, and we hard by think he will sanction such work now.

No Grounds for Change.

The talk of irregularities in Smyth county are absolutely without foundation, so far as Republicans are concerned,—with two ardent Democrats as Judges of Election at every precinct in the county, with every Registrar a Democrat and all the machinery in their hands, such talk is only a reflection on these Democratic officials. They conceded, in the public press, before election that Smyth would give Slemph 200 majority. This was cut down to 184, and still we hear the talk of "irregularities." The very fact of the result shows these charges false on their face. Republicans who were qualified and armed with their tax receipts were denied the right to vote because of a list sent out to the polls by Democratic workers. Democrats who have resided in other counties, with their families for months, and some for years, were voted at a number of precincts. The election, however, was quiet and orderly and the count, so far as we know, was fair and impartial.

Slemph Elected by a Small Majority.

Bristol, Nov. 9.—Slemph has been elected to Congress from the Ninth Virginia district. While the vote was very close, it is certain that his majority in the district will be from 300 to 350.

These figures are not partisan, but are based upon the reports received from both democratic and republican headquarters and a careful comparison of the same.

DEMOCRATS CONCEDE IT.

Chairman H. G. Peters, of the Bristol, Va., Democratic organization Wednesday afternoon concedes the election of Mr. Slemph and says that his majority will be from 240 to 300. The Hon. R. Tate Irvine, of Big Stone Gap, in a private telephone message to Bristol friends, concedes the re-election of Mr. Slemph.

The Democrats were disposed to claim the election up to a late hour Tuesday night by a meager majority, but it was even then evident that they were not sincere, as they claimed figures for Scott and other counties they must have known were incorrect.

Reports received from all the counties show that Slemph has undoubtedly won, and when all minor corrections are made, it is quite certain that the majority will not be materially reduced or increased. It is not probable that Slemph has more than 350 majority, nor less than 299.

The reports received from the various counties show a gradual gain in most instances for Mr. Slemph and drop down from the claims made by the Democrats.

Considering the strenuous efforts made by the Democrats and the immense expense they went to carry the district, the showing for Mr. Slemph may be considered quite good; at any rate, he is pleased with the result, although disappointed that he did not receive a larger majority. He feels, however, that his friends did their utmost to cope with the Democrats of the entire State in their effort to wrest the district from the Republicans that they might make it entirely subject to the ring rule in Virginia.

Bristol, Tenn., Nov. 10.—Returns from the Ninth Virginia district received up to late yesterday afternoon leaves no doubt apparently that Mr. Slemph has been re-elected to Congress; the figures showing a majority in the district for him over Stuart, the Democratic nominee, of 336. Will Control House.

Estimated Democratic Majority Thirty-five and Senate Will Have Fewer Republicans.

The elections held throughout the country Tuesday resulted in a political convulsion of far-reaching extent similar at many points to the famous tidal wave of 1882 and apparently more widespread in its effect.

The indications toward midnight were that the National House of Representatives had been carried by the Democrats, reversing the present Republican majority of forty-three.

United States Senate.

The outcome of the United States Senate is now definitely settled. The Republicans are assured of sixteen new Senators, which with thirty-four hold-over Senators gives them a total of fifty. The Democrats are assured of fifteen new Senators, which with twenty-five hold-overs, gives them a total of forty. Two Senatorships are still in doubt, namely the successor of the late Mr. Dolliver in Iowa, and of Mr. Carter in Montana, where there is prospect of a tie.

The United States Senate will probably have a reduced majority as a result of legislative elections held in many States.

In New York State John A. Dix, Democratic candidate for Governor, is elected over Harry L. Stimson, Republican, by a plurality of about 55,000, reversing the Republican plurality of 70,000 in 1908 for Governor Hughes.

In New Jersey Woodrow Wilson, Democratic candidate for Governor, is elected over Vivian M. Lewis, Republican, by about 15,000 plurality, reversing the previous Republican plurality of 8,000 for Governor Fort.

In Massachusetts Eugene N. Foss, Democratic candidate, has defeated Governor Eben S. Draper, Republican candidate for re-election, by a about 30,000 plurality, reversing Governor Draper's former plurality of 8,000.

In Connecticut Judge Simeon E. Baldwin, Democratic candidate, is elected Governor over Charles A. Goodwin, Republican, by about 4,000 plurality, reversing the previous Republican plurality of 15,000.

In Ohio Governor Judson Harmon, Democratic candidate for re-election, appears to have carried the State by about 15,000, over Warren G. Harding, Republican candidate.

In New Hampshire Robt. H. Bass, Republican candidate for Governor,

is leading Charles E. Carr, Democratic candidate, by about 6,000 plurality.

In Pennsylvania, the election of John R. Tener, Republican for Governor, is claimed by a large plurality.

In Rhode Island Governor Pothier, Republican candidate for re-election, is slightly in the lead over Lewis A. Waterman, Democratic candidate, with a plurality much reduced from that of 1909.

Democratic Governors have been elected in Alabama and South Carolina.

In Iowa the Democrats claim the election of Claude R. Porter for Governor, but this is not yet conceded.

In Wisconsin the election of the Republican candidate for Governor, Francis E. McGovern, is claimed by a reduced majority and the return of Senator LaFollette to the United States Senate is assured.

In Michigan C. E. Osborne, Republican candidate for Governor, appears to have a safe lead over L. T. Hemans, Democrat.

Lynchburg Votes for the Amendments.

Lynchburg, Va., Nov. 8.—Only two precincts went against any of the amendments, these being against the extension of the General Assembly session.

The vote was for extension of the General Assembly 870, against 445; for simplifying legislative procedure 988, against 197. In reference to election of Treasurers and Commissioners of the Revenue in the cities, for 1,092, against 150; in reference to election of Treasurers and Commissioners of the Revenue in counties, for 1,110, against 145.

The interest in the Constitutional amendments drew out the vote much larger than it would have been otherwise. Allison's vote for Congress represented the Republican vote of the city.



President's Thanksgiving Proclamation.

Washington, Nov. 7.—The vigorous growth and progress of the country, as reflected by the records of population and harvests and the general conditions of international peace, are things for which thanksgiving is especially due for the year, 1910, according to the annual Thanksgiving Day proclamation issued by President Taft yesterday. The proclamation is as follows:

"This year of 1910 is drawing to a close. The records of population and harvests, which are index of progress, show vigorous natural growth and the health and prosperous well being of our communities throughout this land, and in our possessions beyond the seas. These blessings have not descended upon us in restricted measure, but overflow and abound. They are the blessings and bounty of God.

"We continue to be at peace with the rest of the world. In all essential matters our relations with other peoples are harmonious, with an ever growing reality of friendliness and depth of recognition of mutual dependence. It is especially to be noted that during the past year great progress has been achieved in the cause of arbitration and the peaceful settlement of international disputes.

"Now, therefore, I, William Howard Taft, President of the United States of America, in accordance with the wise custom of the civil magistrate since the first settlement in this land, and with the rule established from the foundation of this government, do appoint Thursday, November 24, 1910, as a day of national thanksgiving and prayer, enjoining the people upon that day to meet in their churches for the praise of Almighty God and to return heartfelt thanks to him for all his goodness and loving kindness.

"In witness thereof, I have hereunto set my hand, and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

"Done at the City of Washington, this fifth day of November, in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and ten, and of the independence of the United States the one hundred and thirty fifth. (SEAL) "WILLIAM H. TAFT."

"Alvey A. Adee, Acting Secretary of State." "By the President:

That was a fine celebration Thursday night, orderly and good-natured. The fireworks were fine.

Hooper Elected Governor of Tennessee.

Nashville, Tenn., Nov. 8.—Summed up, the result of to-day's election appears to be B. W. Hooper, republican and fusionist, for Governor, by 15,600 to 18,000 majority over former Governor Robert D. Taylor, democrat, and a possible small fusion majority in the Legislature. Both sides claim the Senate.

In the Congressional races, R. W. Austin, republican, appears to have defeated N. W. Hale, independent republican; Sam R. Sells, republican, defeated C. H. Lyle in the First; Z. D. Massey, republican, was elected to fill out the unexpired term of W. P. Brownlow. In the other eight districts the democrats have won, although T. W. Sims, in the Eighth, had a hard fight with Murray, republican.





Wolf God Found.

Dug Out of Mud of Lake Tezoco, Says Professor Nivin.

San Antonio, Tex., Nov. 8.—Prof. William Nivin claims that he has dug out of the mud of the shores of Lake Tezoco, the wolf god, Nexahacoyoti. The professor has brought the idol, weighing at least two hundred pounds, to the City of Mexico. It bears close kinship to the remarkable tablets found not long ago by this explorer in the ruins along the Balsas river, Mexico, and, in fact, has many characteristics in common with the idols found in Palenque, and many other famous ruined cities in Mexico. The idol is about three feet in height and represents the god kneeling, with a cap and long flowing hair, not unlike the cap depicted in drawings of Daniel Boone. All the image lacks to be a reproduction of the famous Kentucky hunter is the pea rifle. The idol was brought on the back of a native from the station, San Lazaro, in the City of Mexico, to Prof. Nivin's office. Many who saw the idol on the street laughed at the bearer, supposing he was bringing them a piece of stone to be placed in some building. Yet, when fairly cleaned, the idol revealed remarkably beautiful carvings of the wolf's head and other features which make it a valuable find.


