## TO UNITE THE SOUTHWEST.

ALL SET FOR SATURDAY ORGANIZATION MEETING

Everything Possible Has Been Done To Tell Everybody Of Meeting And Its Purpose

Although publicity for the big meeting to be held here next Saturday afternoon may have been started a little late it certainly has been done thoroughly. Hundreds of letters were mailed yesterday and today to leading citizens in every county of the Southwest, dozens of personal letters have been written by Pulaski men and women to friends in other counties and the editors of all the papers in the Southwest have been requested to give as much space as possible to the organization meeting.

If there is any one left who fails to hear about it by these means he will probably be told by his friends as the addressee of each letter was asked to tell about it. Therefore, there is good reason to believe that there will be a real crowd here Saturday and that the movement will start with a rush.

The local committees in charge of the program have been busy and the meeting should be entertaining even to an outsider. The committee drafting the constitution and by-laws will have their work ready for the consideration of the committee of twenty-five to discuss at a meeting of that committee to be held in the directors' room of the Pulaski National Bank on Thursday afternoon. In fact, nothing has been overlooked.

The constitution and by-laws will, of course, be only tentative. They will be for the discussion of those assembled Saturday and will be subject to change if the meeting so desire. The committee intends their work merely as suggestions, although it must be said that they have worked carefully and believe that they have about worked out the proper form. In their work they have had similar papers of the Shenandoah Valley organization, taking these as a general basis but adding and subtracting to make the results fit the Southwest.

Word received from surrounding counties is to the effect that most of them are just as enthusiastic as Pulaski County. The object of the meeting must touch every loyal Southwest Virginian and it seems to be simply a matter of the counties getting together on a mutual basis. The spirit of unselfishness which has been manifested will continue throughout the meeting as it is fully realized that in no other spirit can the needs of this section be met. In the organization the counties will lose their idles, sacrificing these for the good of the Southwest.

As briefly stated in the letter which has been mailed the objects of the organization are:

- Increase the residential population.
- Take care of tourists and proper accommodation for them.
- Better railroad facilities and transportation.
- Development of hydro-electric power and industries.
- Popular publicity for our scenic, historical and natural attractions.
- Development of good roads throughout the Southwest.

Welding together the Southwest into an organization that will function and let the world know what the section has to offer.—Pulaski Times.

## Tornado Carries Into Two States

KNOWN DEAD KNOWN TO BE BETWEEN 800 AND 900 AND LIST STILL GROWING.

Wednesday afternoon the most destructive tornado ever known in the country swept through portions of Illinois, Indiana and a part of Tennessee, leaving death and destruction in its wake.

Friday morning the death list had reached 845 known and was steadily growing. Several towns in Illinois were completely wiped out.

The injured up to the present time is reported as 2,909. In Murphysboro, Ill., and West Frankfort, there being 250 dead in the first town and 107 dead in the second with over 500 injured in each town.

In Gallatin, Tenn., there are reported 27 killed and many injured. The Red Cross people have sent their entire force to the stricken district.



## Teachers Hold Meeting

The Smyth County Teachers Association met in the Court House Auditorium, Marion, Virginia, March 14th, 1925, at 10 A. M., Prof. C. E. Anderson presiding. The meeting was opened by the singing of "America." The invocation was made by Dr. J. R. Edwards of Marion. The program was as follows:

The Teachers' Obligation to the Pupils Outside the Text, E. W. Hurt, Love's Mill, and Miss E. Jennings, Saltville. Mr. Hurt showed that there was needed in school work, the right motive on the part of the teacher, the right motive on the part of the pupil, and a willingness to pay the price necessary for the obtaining of a thorough education. These the teacher could encourage by work and influence outside the text. Miss Jennings emphasized the many activities in which the teachers influence could and should be utilized, such as health work among pupils, special program, social and athletic events. An interesting discussion of the topic from the floor was led by Miss Caspari of Saltville.

The professional Trend, by Mr. W. T. Miller of Marion. Mr. Miller reviewed the development of educational methods with particular emphasis on the growing demand that teachers be specialists in their subjects.

Demonstration in Fourth Grade Geography, Mrs. M. M. Bennett and Fourth Grade Class of Saltville. Mrs. Bennett demonstrated methods of arousing interest and encouraging self expression in a subject usually dry and distasteful. The lesson was drawn almost entirely from material outside of the text, in order to get the pupils to realize that they were finding out about real things and not merely memorizing statements from a printed page.

Miss Ruth Henderson, of East Radford, the Community League Secretary for this District, reported to the Association on the plans for the May campaign, the Preventorium and the work of Community Leagues and Junior Leagues. The May Campaign is designed as a period for the intensive preaching of Education throughout the State during the month of May this year. It is planned to arouse sentiment in the State along several educational lines, among them increase in appropriations for graded and high schools, revision of pension law, passage of a tenure law for the benefit of teachers; perfection of the compulsory school attendance law, and the adoption of some system whereby large capital expenditures can be made for the extension of the institutions of higher education in the State.

There was a good attendance in spite of the inclement weather. The meeting Saturday was the final meeting of the Smyth County Teachers Association for the present session.

## Watch Your Cabbage Seed

### CONTROL OF SEED-BORNE DISEASES OF CABBAGE

The losses due to seed-borne diseases of cabbage, particularly black-leg and black-rot, are considerable each year. The growers who plant an acre more or less to cabbage will find it good insurance to treat his seed before planting this spring. Seed treatment will not control yellows since our only preventive for this disease lies in the use of resistant varieties as the "Wisconsin Hollander" and "Wisconsin All Seasons."

The mercuric bichloride treatment is the simplest of any of the methods known and in most cases gives good results. Procure a small bottle of bichloride of mercury tablets at the drug store. These tablets usually come in two sizes, one for making a pint of 1-1000 strength solution and the other for making a quart of the same strength. Procure the pint size tablets. If possible procure them in smaller than bottle lots, since one or two tablets will be sufficient. Dissolve one of the tablets in a little hot water in a quart fruit jar, or other wide-mouthed glass, wooden or earthen receptacle, avoiding metal containers, since bichloride of mercury corrodes metal. Place the seed to be treated in a square piece of cheese cloth which when tied up into an improvised sack should not be more than one-third full. Immerse this sack of seed into the disinfectant and allow to soak for 30 minutes. After the

thirty minutes remove and rinse in clear water, spread out in a thin layer and allow to dry.

Corrosive sublimate or bichloride of mercury is a deadly poison when taken internally, but it does not injure the skin. Keep it away from children and stock. Do not pour the water that has been used in the treatment where animals can drink it. Destroy extra tablets if they cannot be stored away in a safe medicine chest.





An old man once remarked 'that he could not believe in our survival after death because there was not space enough for the countless numbers of human beings who had left this life since the foundation of the world.

He had a limited idea of space, had never studied astronomy, though many a night on his sheep skin rug on the ground he had looked up at the stars, those little shining specks of light that he had been taught were made to give light to this little world of ours and did not know that the nearest fixed star would require 4 years travel to reach it. To go to Altair would require 15 years traveling 11,000,000 miles a minute.

To Vega and Arcturus 30 years. Each 80 times as bright as our sun. To reach Capella, 47 years are required. Two stars instead of one and each 100 times as bright as our sun.

To the Pleiades more than 4,000,000 miles a minute traveling for 325 years to reach them.

They are a group of stars 300 to 500 filling a niche in space 180 trillion miles in diameter.

To visit Rigel 500 years is required. It is 13000 times as bright as our sun. The fine cluster in Hercules estimated to contain a million stars, has some 33,000 that are from one to a thousand times as bright as our sun. 33,000 years required to reach them.

These are a total mass equal to 1,000,000 of our suns moving hither and yon among themselves and yet possessing a swarm velocity of 195 miles a second.

Clusters have been found 200,000 light years away.

A million spiral nebulae at a distance which ranges from 500,000 to 10,000,000 light years away from us and appear to be another universe like our own, yet so distant that their stars cease to be separately discerned by the most powerful telescope.

According to all these facts lack of room in the universe would not be sufficient evidence to disprove immortality. A skeptic once derisively inquired of an humble peasant, "How big is your God?" He replied, "He is so big the heaven of heavens cannot contain Him, yet so small He can dwell in my heart."
